## Villanova A Gasper In IC4A

NEW YORK (AP) — Coach Jim Elliott, whose Villanova team captured its fifth straight IC4A cross-country title here yesterday now is faced with the task of telling one of his runners he won't make the trip to William & Mary for next Monday's NCAA university division meet.

Jumbo Jim is allowed to enter seven men in the NCAA event in his bid to retake the title from the Texas-El Paso, which dethroned the Wildcats last year in the 6-mile grind.

Olympian Marty Liquori, sidelined for the Van Cortlandt Park event with a continuing leg-muscle problem, is expected to make the trip, as is Donal Walsh, who toured yesterday's five-mile course yesterday in 24:10.4 to take first place.

Two first-year men also have been tapped—John Hartnett and Les Nagy, who finished second and third in yesterday's freshman event.

The three others, then, would have to be selected from among Wilson Smith, who finished fifth, Chris Mason, seventh, Bill McLoughlin, 29th, and Byron Beam, 32d.

Another Villanova standout, Englishman Dave Wright who was fifth here last year, has been unable to make the line-up this fall after a sleep-walking incident that required four hours' surgery on a slashed right arm.

Walsh, runnerup to Art Dulong of Holy Cross last year, won yesterday by 35 yards over Greg Fredericks of Penn State, who shaded him for the 1968 frosh title. Winning time of 24:10.4 four seconds off Dulong's course record.

Pitt gave Villanova a scare expected only by the Panthers, losing by only a 70-79 margin and bunching four finishers between Elliott's No. 3 and No. 4 man. It was no contest otherwise, in the 27-school field, with Harvard another 71 points back, followed by NCAA host W&M and Cornell, whose Jon Anderson finished third behind Greg Fredericks of Penn State. Next Cornellian was Phil Ritson in 19th.

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BINGHAMTONIAN Karl Thornton, a Penn junior in only his second year of the sport, ran 11th in the main event, his 25:14 for the cold 5-mile grind a minute, 3½ seconds back of county Cork import Walsh. He'd been 24th last year. Penn was eighth, no other Quaker in the front 35 of the 177 finishers.

Dan Thomas, former Central High athlete (his dad at the time First Presbyerian minister) who now lives in Allentown, was third in the College Division race, beaten only by Lafayette teammate Dale Keenan and Tim Steele of Lehigh, as 2-time winner Ron Stonisch of C. W. Post skipped the race because of a toe injury. Lafayette coach is Central grad Bill Donahue.

Another Central grad, Cornellian Steve Banker, was 32d of 156 University frosh finishers. Robert Wheeler of Duke won that 3 miler, favored Dennis Fikes of Penn fifth. Cornell was gain fifth.

### W&M 4th, Michael 8th In IC4A Chase

NEW YORK-Donal Walsh, runner-up last year, took first place in the 62nd Annual IC4A cross country championships Monday at Van Cortland Park and led Villanova to its fifth straight team title.

The 21-year-old native of County Cork, Ireland, toured the five-mile course in 24 minutes 10.4 seconds to beat Gregg Fredericks of Penn State by 35 yards.

Howell Michael led the William and Mary runners, finishing eighth at 25:08. Randy Fields placed tenth at 25:13. Jay Gsell and Steve Snyder finished with the

# Cornell Harriers 5th in IC4As

With the exception of 1957 when the Big Red was 4th, Cornell posted its best finish since before World War II in the IC4A's championship cross country run Monday at New York's Van Cortlandt Park. The Big Red was 5th in the final standings, while Capt. Jon Anderson captured third in individual running.

"It was a very good showing," said Coach Jack Warner. "We hope to take them to the NCAAs next Monday at Van Cortlandt."

Villanova won its 4th straight team championship with 70 points, just edging Pitt which had 79. Harvard, the Heptagonals champion, was third with 150 points, William & Mary had 165 and Cornell had 199. Penn, second in the Heps, dropped to 8th in the standings with Princeton 11th and Dartmouth 12th.

Don Walsh of Villanova, who was second a year ago, took individual honors with a 24:10.4 timing. Doug Fredericks of Penn State was second in 24:17 in basically a two man race.

Anderson sprinted out the last yards to post a 24:45 time, edging Jerry Richey of Pitt who was 24:48. Other scorers for Cornell were Phil Ritson, 19th in 25:26, Don Alexander 34th in 25:43, Tom Baker 62nd in 26:16 and Dave Oertel 95th in 26:52.

Also running for the varsity

were Tim Cahill who was 109th in 27:09 and George Mitchell who was 146th in 27:45.

"We ran a good race," said Warner, "but we can do better. I think we're getting a little more mature with the more competition of this type that we can get.

"Jon was about 5th through the woods, which are from a mile and a quarter to two and a half miles into the race. Then he worked his way up to third."

In the freshman competition the Big Red was also fifth, with Manhattan winning the title with 93 points followed by Penn (110), Villanova (126), Northeastern (145) while Cornell scored 188.

Bob Wheeler of Duke won in 14:24.5 over the three-mile course, while Phil Collins of Cornell was 7th in 14:57. Other Big Red scorers were Mike Walker, 15th in 15:11; Steve Banker, 32nd in 15:31; Bob Anastasio, 34th in 15:33; and Pete Christensen, 110th in 16:32. Others for Cornell were Carl Yahnert, 111th in 16:33 and Mike Arnones, 114th in 16:43.
