Red Ninth in IC4A Run

NEW YORK — Cornell cross country runners didn't do as well as in recent years in the IC4A 5-miler in Van Cortlandt Park Monday but Coach Jack Warner said that he felt "Cornell's ninth was very good."

"I am well-pleased," added Jack. "Any time you can finish in the first 10 in that field you're doing very well."

The Big Red had five runners finish between 25:19 and 25:59. Mike Keogh of Manhattan won in record time of 24:03.4. He broke the record of 24:04.4 set by Art Dulong of Holy Cross in 1967.

The Cornell point-winners

were: 32nd, Phil Collins, 25:19; 46th Ray DeMarco, 25:28; 49th, Mark Curtis, 25:31; 61st, Dave Oertel, 25:40; 72nd Bob Cardin, 25:51; and 81st Tim Cahill 25:59.

Manhattan won with 40 points.

Although Collins and DeMarco qualified for the NCAAs in Houston later this month Coach Warner said, "They won't be going."

The Cornell jayvees were sixth. Paul Diedrich was 15th for the Red in 26:20.

The best Ivy League finisher in the varsity race was Denis Fikes of Penn in 24:27.

Keogh Leads Manhattan To I.C.4-A Harrier Title

Confident he could conquer the course, but admittedly "uptight" about his competition, Mike Keogh led Manhattan to its first I.C.4-A cross-country championship in 18 years yesterday with a meet-record performance.

The 21-year-old Jasper junior improved on his victorious effort in the Metropolitan Intercollegiate championships last week with a time of 24 minutes 3.4 seconds. He broke the record of 24:04.4, set by Arthur Dulong of Holy Cross in the 1967 Intercollegiate Association of Amateur Athletes of America event.

Manhattan also placed two other runners, Tony Colon and Pete Squires, in the first 10, and all five scorers in the top 20, to the delight of a crowd of followers at Van Cortlandt Park. The victory snapped a string of six team titles taken by Villanova, which wound up second this year.

"I don't think I could have won it," Colon said of his mis-

hap, which occurred while he was leading the field. "But I think I could have been closer."

Colon, the mustachioed sophomore, continued to surprise himself as a cross-country performer by finishing second, despite rolling down a hill and gashing his hand 2½ miles into the race.

Colon, who competed for Puerto Rico in the 1,500-meter run at the recent Olympics, was clocked in 24:11.6, an incredible 30 seconds faster than his best previous performance over the five-mile course.

John Hartnett of Villanova, fifth in last year's race and considered Keogh's chief challenger, finished third, 10 yards ahead of Denis Fikes of Pennsylvania.

Fikes, who collapsed during the recent Heptagonal championships with what later was diagnosed as a "bad head cold," ran a consistently strong race and nudged out a teammate, Bob Childs, the Heptagonal champion, for fourth place.

Seventeen runners finished the race in under 25 minutes compared with seven on a wet day last year, an indication of the brisk pace that Keogh and Colon set with their opening 4:26 mile.

"It's a very demanding

course," said Keogh, who wound up 10th last year. "You can't overrun the hills, or you'll get an oxygen debt. If you run the hills strong and don't overdo it, you can come down strong and can still run the flats fast."

Before the race, Keogh had cautioned his teammates about tactics.

"I told them to run with their heads, not against anybody," said the Irish Olympian from Kearny, N.J., who runs with a familiar bright-green headband.

Manhattan will enter a complete team in the National Collegiate championships next week. The race will be run over six miles on a golf course in Houston.

"It's going to be a fast race," Keogh said. "But I think we'll do all right."

The college-division race produced three finishers under 25 minutes, led by Daniel Moynihan of Tufts. Moynihan, who won last year's race in 25:03.7, finished in 24:34.9, also a meet record.

'Dwyer's Fliers' sweep IC4A's

After an absence from the winners circle of 18 years, Manhattan College, led by juniors, Mike Keogh and Tony Colon returned the Jaspers to the number one position in Eastern Cross Country competition by winning the 64th Annual running of the IC4A championships held at Van Cortlandt Park yesterday.

The return to prominence was greeted by an enthusiastic crowd estimated to be at 5,000, when pacesetter Mike Keogh crossed the finish line eight seconds ahead of teammate Tony Colon with a new meet record of 24:03.4, one full second ahead of the old mark which was set by Arthur Du-long of Holy Cross in 1967.

For Fred Dyer, coach of the Jaspers, this meet was the culmination of four years of preparation and work since he took over the helm to guide and change the track fortunes at Manhattan.

Dethroning the defending champions Villanova winner of the team title the past six years, and 28 other Universities from as far away as Michigan and Indiana was especially sweet to Dwyer and his team. They had worked and pointed for this meet since the beginning of the season in September.

Dwyer's initial comments right after the conclusion of the race were: "What a performance. It's just beautiful. I've never been more proud of a bunch of kids than I am right now."

He then added: "They worked very hard for this. They deserved it."

Keogh and Colon who both competed in the Olympics at Munich, but for Ireland and

Puerto Rico respectively in events other than the cross-country went to the front early in the hilly, five mile run.

Going into the hills at the end of a mile, Keogh was first being clocked in 4:26. Two strides behind was John Hartnett (one of the pre-race favorites) of Villanova, followed closely by Colon and Ricardo Rojas of Harvard. About one-half mile later Colon moved by Hartnett into second place.

Emerging from the hills the first time to re-traverse the flats, Keogh and Colon were still together and passed the three mile mark in 14:24.6. Rojas was now third, Hartnett fourth and a surprising Pete Squires of Manhattan had moved into fifth.

As they circled the flatlands and headed back towards the woods and steep Cemetery Hill, Keogh had opened a ten yard lead on his team-mate with Rojas now about 40 yards behind as they neared the four mile point.

When they emerged from the woods for the last time and headed down the long, flat stretch to the finish line, Keogh had opened up about a 50-yard lead on Colon. Pete Squires, a surprising but distant third was engaged in a real duel with Hartnett, Denis Fikes and Bob Childs of Pennsylvania and Rojas.

At the finish it was a smiling Keogh first, who seemed to be hardly winded by the arduous grind and a jubilant Colon pranced across second with what he later said: "Was my greatest race ever. I never ran like that before."

But Squires, just didn't have the finishing kick to match the others and was overtaken by Hartnett, Fikes, Childs and

Rojas as he dropped to seventh position.

But with three runners finishing in the top ten and with Joe Savage and Paul Squires coming in 12th and 20th, Manhattan had dethroned Villanova 40 points to 131, with Penn State right behind with 132.

The 40 points scored by Manhattan is also a meet record, lowering by five points Villanova's mark which was set last year.

Keogh, a native of Ireland who resides in New Jersey and is majoring in history at Manhattan said after the race: "My plan was to control the race by going to the front as soon as possible. That way Hartnett and the rest would have to gear themselves to my pace and that's exactly what happened."

He also added: "I was loose, yet on edge before the race. I slept only five hours last night and was up with the birds at 5:30 this morning. I felt kind'a tired going up that last hill."

"We really worked very hard," the 5'8", 130 pound champion added. "It's the hardest working team that I have ever been on and today was the most satisfying day of all."

Tony Colon, who had run his best race ever despite taking a fall at the two mile mark on the still slick ground from a weekend of rain, lowered his previous best time by 31 seconds and improved over his best time of last year, by one minute.

"I slept well over the weekend," Tony said; "I thought, ate and drank nothing but track for the last three days and was tight at race time. My first relief came when the starter's gun went off and we began running."

Jaspers Romp In IC4A

NEW YORK — There's joy in Spuyten Duyvil today.

Manhattan College is the only U.S. institution of higher education that considers cross-country a spectator sport and an estimated 5,000 fans were on hand — undergraduates, alumni and enthusiasts — as Manhattan's Jaspers ran away with the team title in yesterday's edition of the Intercollegiate Association of Amateur Athletes of America five-mile championship race at nearby Van Cortlandt Park.

Classes were canceled for the day at Manhattan and the rooters flocked to the park to see Olympians Mike Keogh and Tony Colon run 1-2 in the big pack and set up the victory.

KEOGH'S 24:03.4 performances bettered the meet mark set six years ago by Holy Cross' Art Dulong by one second. But the Kearny, N.J., resident later claimed "I could have run 30 seconds faster if I was pushed."

Colon, too set a career best with a 24:11.6 in second. Villanova's John Hartnett, another Irish Olympian, stayed close to them through a 4:26 opening mile and a 14:24.6 three-mile, but wilted going up make-or-break Cemetery Hill.

He settled for third and his team settled for second after winning the IC4A title, designating Eastern supremacy, the last seven years.

Pete Squires took seventh, Joe Squires 12th and Paul Squires 20th to wrap up the Manhattan win with 40 points and a 91-point margin on second-place Villanova, largest in meet annals.

SEVENTH MAN home for the Manhattan varsity was sophomore Warren Gordon of Hazlet Township, N.J., 114th in 26:27.

Princeton turned in its best IC4A showing in years by placing sixth. Canadian

freshman Ron Vander Kraats led the Tigers in 25th with junior teammate Bob Bazley of Long Branch right behind him in 26th in a career best time of 25:14.

Yale wound up 20th as team captain Brian Kelly of Fair Haven, N.J., also achieved a career record of 25:32, placing 51st.

The College Division title was won by Lehigh with 50 points as Tufts' Dan Moynihan retained the individual title in 24:34.9.

The meet's leading individual and team performers will move on to the NCAA Championships in Houston Saturday.

ONE OF THE first to congratulate Manhattan Coach Fred Dwyer was Villanova's "Jumbo Jim" Elliott, Dwyer's coach as an undergraduate.

"If there was anyone to break the Villanova streak, I'm glad it was you," said Elliott. "Normally, I'd say you're the second best coach in the U.S.," he joshed. "Today, I'd have to say you're the best." Dwyer's five scorers improved on prior best times by a massive average of 27 seconds.

Manhattan IC4A King; Butynes 11th Among 225

NEW YORK (UPI) — Manhattan College, with Mike Keogh and Tony Colon finishing one-two, won the IC4A cross country title yesterday over the five-mile course in Van Cortlandt Park.

Keogh set a meet record time of 24:03.4 as he paced Colon home by 40 yards. The Jasper junior, 5-8 and 130, shattered the meet record of 24:04 set by Arthur Dulong of Holy Cross in 1966.

Keogh's win touched off a team title romp for Manhattan, which showed 40 points in official tabulation. Villanova was second with 131 and Penn State third with 132.

Following were Navy, 157; Penn 160; Princeton 180; Harvard 189; Army 234; Cornell 247 and Massachusetts, 284.

In all, there were 190 starters from 30 universities. Duke, the 1971 champion, did not defend.

In the college division race, Don Moynihan of Tufts defended his title successfully in 24:34.9 and Lehigh retained the team title with 50 points.

John Hartnett of Villanova was third, and Penn took the fourth and fifth places with Dennis Fikes and Robert Childs.

Harvard's Ricardo Rojas headed the next five men, with Manhattan's Pete Squires seventh, West Virginia's Don Sauer eighth, Dan Dunne of Notre Dame ninth and Rutgers's Bill Sieben tenth.

Former Sterling High School star Mike Butynes finished 11th in the 225-runner field and

helped lead his C.W. Post College team to a third-place finish. Butynes, who was unbeaten at Sterling last year and won the state Group 3 title, had a 24:41 clocking over the five-mile course, which was just eight seconds off the record for a freshman.

IC4A crown to Manhattan

NEW YORK — Manhattan's Mike Keogh and Tony Colon duplicated their 1-2 of last weeks Mets in leading the Jaspers to the 64th Annual IC4A cross country championship yesterday at Van Courtlandt Park.

The pair were in front throughout, with Keogh taking off on his teammate with a mile remaining and establishing a meet record of 24:03.4 for the five mile course. Colon finished in 24:25.0.

Keogh's time broke the former mark of 24:04.4 set by Art Dulong of Holy Cross in 1966.

Manhattan romped to the team title with 40 points as Pete Squires also broke into the top ten with a seventh place 24:34.0 effort for coach Fred Dwyer's club.

Villanova finished second with 131 points and Penn State was third with 132. Rounding out the top six and earning a trip to Monday's NCAA's in Houston were Navy with 157 and Penn with 160. Princeton finished sixth with 180 points, while Rutgers placed 11th 301.

Navy, which grossed 167 points in the low-score-wins meet, was led by Steve Gilmore, who placed 15th with a time of 24:54.

Other Midshipmen finishers, with their places and times in parenthesis, were Jim Kramer (22nd, 25:07), Dale Bateman (34th, 25:18), Charles Cvrk (37th, 25:32), Jeff Kramer (59th, 25:38), Rick Elliott (93rd,

26:06) and Bruce Lowman (109th, 26:21).

Navy, the heptagonals' champion, has a dual-meet record of five victories and two losses. A trip to clash with Army at West Point on Saturday, Nov. 25, is all that remains on the Midshipmen's regular-season schedule.

In the junior varsity competition of the IC4A, Pennsylvania won the team title with 55 points, followed by runner-up Navy's 66 points.

The top finishing Midshipman in the junior varsity meet was Rick Salazar, who was seventh with a 26:08 time.

Other Navy finishers were Don Benette (11th, 26:14), Steve Giorgis (14th, 26:20), John Simcox (16th, 26:24) and John Lovasz (18th, 26:32).
