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Hartnett, Manhattan Team Take IC4A Harrier Titles

By ELLIOTT DENMAN NEW YORK — It's a long way from Ballyhooly. County Cork, Ireland to the Philadelphia Main Line but just a short jaunt from Villanova. Pa. to Van Cortlandt Park in the upper reaches of the Bronx.

Thrat's been John Hartnett's itinerary — and once again for the Irishman it turned out to be a winning trip.

The teetotaling Irish senior — a member of the Pionter Association dedicated to total abstention — was an offagain, on-again starter up to just minutes before the star'ing gun of yesterday's 65th annual Intercollegiate Association of Amateur Athletes of America University Division varsity five-mile crosscountry race.

A sore left hip had plagued him all fall and he waited until his final warmup before deciding he'd definitely run.

Once underway, though, the ailing hip posed no problems at all. Neither did the 190 other starters from 31 Eastern colleges as Hartnett dashed off to the speediest IC4A victory in history in the Van Cortlandt Park course record time of 24 minutes on the nose.

University of Pennsylvania sophomore David Merrick, who took a year off from college life to sort out personal problems, was Hartrett's closest rival, settling for second 40 yards back.

While these two were deciding the individual honors, Manhattan College's defending team champions packed four men in the top 14 and then waited until Cliff Bruce arrived in 58th place to wrap up a second straight crown with low score of 87 points.

Penn State was a distant second place while Massachusetts was a surprise third. Penn, Navy and Villanova, winner of six straight titles before being dethroned in '72, were next in line. Princeton's N.J. intercollegiate champions nabbed seventh spot while Providence. Georgetown and Harvard rounded out the top 10.

Pete Squires, the Metropolitan champion, started Manhattan's winning drive going in third place and right behind him was freshman teammate Matt Centrowitz, whose 24:21 clocking was the best frosh time in Van Cortlandt annals.

Mike Keogh, a teammate of Hartnett on the 1972 Irish Olympic team and defending IC4A champion, took 11th and Tony Colon, a Puerto Rican Olympian, was 14th, to give Manhattan its big early lead. Then it was just a matter of waiting for Bruce's arrival — delayed by two falls in the back woods.

Tendonitis in a foot has slowed Keogh's training this fall while Colon, runner-up in 1972, also is slightly off form. Hartnett ran third behind these two last year but then went on to win the IC4A outdoor six-mile track title in May.

First New Jersey finisher was Princeton soph Ron Vander Kraats, seventh in 24:31.

Further back in the pack was his senior teammate, **Bob** Bazley of Long Branch, N.J. 44th in 25:26. Keyport's Tom Clark placed 71st for St. John's in 25:55; Peddie School graduate Ray Fitzgibbon ran 96th for Columbia in 26:19, and Fair Haven's Brian Kelly, the Yale captain, was 168th in 27:31.

Springfield's Charles Duggan won the College Division title in 24:36 but team honors went to Bucknell University's Jerseyan-studded team with 64 points. Four-time defending champion Lehigh was shunted back to fourth place.

Manhattan also ran off with the University Division junior varsity title, 45 to 51 over Navy, as Jasper senie-Marty Walsh won the race in 25:39.0.

Navy yearling Gary Mitchell of Middletown Township placed 11th in 26:14: Manhattan junior Warren Gordon of See MANHATTAN Page 26

Hazlet Township was 22nd in 26:30; Penn freshman Bill Huntley of Colts Neck Township ran 35th in 26:57; Villanova senior Larry Bova of Oceanport was 61st in 27:42, and Army sophomore Tom Meyer of Middletown Township placed 69th in 28:04.

Manhattan's champions have decided against seeking the NCAA title Monday at Spokane, Wash. Instead, they'll start gearing their training to indoor season competition.

Dwyer's Flyers IC4A Gliders

By Press Wire Services NEW YORK — Manhattan College apparently has the new dynasty of IC4A crosscountry — and if the rest of the country wants proof, it's just going to have to come fast and take a look.

"Dwyer's Flyers," as Coach Fred Dwyer's Manhattan gang bills itself, proved that last year's IC4A rout of long-time ruler Villanova was no fluke with a similar runaway in yesterday's 65th annual run at Van Cortlandt Park.

But the rising economic pinch will keep Manhattan and many of the other top runners from entering the NCAA championships, which next week will be held in the Far West for the first time — in Spokane, Wash.

John Hartnett of Villanova, who yesterday set a course record of 24 minutes flat, and runnerup Dave Merrick of Penn will also be among the NCAA stay-at-homes.

CROSS-COUNTRY

Mike Keogh of Manhattan, 1972 IC4A champion whose record Hartnett broke by 3.4 seconds, ran 11th, slowed all fall by tendonitis. But teammates Pete Squires and Matt Centrowitz, the latter a freshman sensation who was the nation's fastest schoolboy last spring, ran 3-4, Keogh was 11th and Tony Colon, like Centrowitz a product of New York City's Power Memorial High, 14th.

The fifth Dwyerman was far back in 55th but the team's 87 still was miles ahead of runnerup Penn State's 155. Villanova was an inauspicious sixth, behind Massachusetts, Penn and Navy. (Vestal grad Steve Wynne, Navy soph, has done little cross-country running, setting his sights on the track season instead.)

Individual winner Hartnett,

third last year to fellow-Irelander Keogh, didn't decide that he would run yesterday until almost race-time. Because of a sore hip he had competed but twice this season.

Merrick is a well-traveled 20-year-old who as an Illinois schoolboy had 254 college offers, signed a Villanova letterof-intent but wound up at Penn where as a 1971 frosh he finished high in the NCAA run. He left after one semester, enrolled at Alabama for a year, disappeared from there last December, registered at Indiana this fall, but halfway through the line took a sharp right turn right back to Penn's Franklin Field.

Centrowitz replaced Colon as the state's fastest schoolboy miler ever, in addition setting sensational records for the 3-mile, 1,500 and 3,000 meters. (He and Catholic Central grad Pat Maher were both named to New York State Scholastic Track News' 1972 all-state cross-country team.

Bucknell won the College Division meet in an even greater runaway, Springfield edging Colgate for second by a single point. Charles Duggan of Springfield was the top individual runner.

Best individual Upstate finish was Jim Shrader of Albany State, fourth in College Division. Bruce Fischer of Syracuse was 13th in University Division, his team 13th, one notch ahead of Cornell. Susquehanna Valley grad Tom Kinsman ran 166th, for 14thplace Rutgers.

Cornell 14th NEW YORK – Cornell finished 14th in the University Division with 400 team points.

Cornell's high finisher was senior captain Phil Collins, who was 62nd in 25:44. Ray DeMarco was close behind in 25:46, while Mark Curtis finished 69th in 25:53. Other Big Red finishers in the field of 186 that completed the race were Craig Holm (91st in 26:14), freshman Free Hunter (129th in 26:52), Scott Meyer (137th in 27:00), and John Boots, another freshman (147th in 27:10).

Hartnett sets IC4-A record

New York (P-John Hartnett of Villanova, who did not decide to run until almost race time, won the university division title at the IC4-A Cross Country Championships yesterday with a meet record time of 24 minutes for the 5-mile course in Van Cortlandt Park.

Manhattan retained its team championship with 87 points after placing four of its five runners in the top 20. Penn State was second with 155.

Hartnett, a senior from County Cork in Ireland, was competing for only the third time this year because of a sore left hip and did not decide to run until after he warmed up.

He beat Dave Merrick of the

University of Pennsylvania, who was timed in 24.07 by 32 yards in breaking the meet record of 24.03.4 set last year by Mike Keogh of Manhattan. Keogh finished 11th.

The Naval Academy finished fifth in the University Division race with 182 points. The scorers for coach Al Cantello's club were 12, Steve Gilmore, 24.41; 37, Jim Kramer, 25.18; 38, Dale Bateman, 25.19; 47, Richard Salazar, 25.28; and 57, Charles Cvrk, 25.38.

For coach Frank Zarnowski's Mount St. Mary's squad, 14th of 30 teams in the College Division race, John Buchner was 21st, 25.53; followed by 77, Ben Amoss, 26.52; 88, Ray McLaughlin, 27.01; 92, Jim Draper, 27.03; and 128, Jeff Good, 27.38.

Charles Duggan of Springfield won the College Division in 24.36, finishing 125 yards ahead of Wayne Rogers of Lehigh.

Bucknell easily won the team title with 64 points to 154 for Springfield.
