Harvard and Alitz of Army Capture Titles in 1C4 A Cross -Country Run.

It took more time to decide the team champion at the IC4A cross-country meet yesterday than it did for Curt Alitz of Army to win the individual title. The 21-year-old Cadet, the runner-up last year, covered the five-mile course at Van Cortlandt Park in 23 minutes 58.1 seconds and finished 25 yards ahead of John Flora of Northeastern in the University Division.

It toots almost 30 minutes, however, to decide the winner. in the closest team finish in recent years. Even after Harvard was declared the surprising winner over Villanova by only 3 points, several other bizarre developments fueled otherwise chilly afternoon proceedings.

First, discrepancies occurred between the number of competitors who were counted at the three-mile mark (181) and the number who finished the race (185). Did four athletes • hide out somewhere on the course for a portion of the race, perhaps behind a rock or along the cow path, and then rejoin the field? Or were the discrepancies a clerical error in the heat of combat?

No one will ever know whether this situation could have altered the outcome of the team competition. But coin toss earlier in the week unquestionably affected Villanova's chances for another crown.

The coin toss was to decide whether Don Paige, a sophomore, or Phil (Tiny) Kane, a senior, would become the seventh Wildcat entry. Kane, a 4:01 miler, called heads; the coin came up tails. Paige, who also has run a 4:01 mile, finished 50th yesterday in 25:34. An angry Kane won the junior varsity section in 25:06, a time that would have tied him for 22d place in the university division and given Villanova the team title.

Winner Starts Bid Early

"We shouldn't have flipped a coin," Kane said afterward. "The coaches should have made a decision. I thought I deserved the chance because I was a senior and I had a better personal best. I wasn't going to run after I lost the coin flip. Then I decided to show them they made a mistake."

Villanova, trying to regain a crown in a sport it once dominated, also lost potential points when Steve Crooke, junior, failed to finish, and Ed Takacs, an IC4A half-mile champion, was overtaken by four runners in. the final 15 yards.

"It was a tough race all the way," said the 6 - foot - 2 - inch, 165 - pound Cadet, who also swam competitively for Army last year but intends to concentrate on track and field in the distance events. "I started breaking it right after three miles. I knew if they were close with 300 yards left, I'd be in trouble, because I have a poor kick."

The College Division team title was taken by Lehigh, in another closely contested competition with Fairleigh Dickinson, 94 points to 108. Frank Richardson of Massachusetts Institute of Technology was the individual winner in 25:05.8.

It was Harvard's first team title in 45 years, and Jeff Campbell, who finished fifth, led the spirited squad in a series of cheers when the official result was finally announced.

The first five finishers count in team scoring. Four Harvard runners were among the first. 20, but the Crimson had to sweat it out until 91st place before their fifth point-scorer reached the finish.

"We've had some seconds and thirds in the team competition over the years," said Coach Bill McCurdy, who received a victory ride on the shoulders of his athletes. 'But running against those Villanova teams, you might as well have stayed home,"

McCurdy said it was an unusual squad, even by Harvard standards.

"All during training camp, they would be practicing huddles, like 'football team, clapping and doing cheers. They had everything from one potato, two potato to two-four-six

Other placewinners for coach Andy Jugan's SU harriers were: Matt Hellerer, 83rd (25:54); Bill O'Brian, 109 (26:13); freshman Brian Trippany.130 (26:26): and Baldwinsville native John Buckley, 139 (26:38).

Among the top 25 finishers in the university division race was former Christian Brothers Academy athlete Dave Dobrzynski, running for Georgetown. Dobrzynski finished 13th with a clocking of 24:42.

In the College Division race, a seventh-place finish by former Notting-ham harrier Jerry Scholder helped his Marist-College team to an overall placing of 13th. Lehigh won the College Division crown with low score of 93. Scholder was timed in 25:25. Colgate placed 12th in the College Division competition.

Alitz, whose time was the second fastest ever for the course, was 7.1 seconds off the meet record of 23:51 set by Penn's Dave Merrick last year. Alitz finished second in that race.

Villanova second in IC4A meet

NEW YORK — Villanova finished second in the IC4A cross-country championships yesterday at Van Cortlandt Park, thereby qualifying for next Monday's NCAA meet in Denton, Tex., but it may have been only a toss of the coin that separated the Wildcats from first-place honors in the traditional Eastern collegiate title meet.

That toss, to determine whether Phil Kane or Don Paige would fill the last spot on the Wildcat varsity and which of the two would lead the JV team, went in favor of Paige, but it was about the last thing that went right for the sophomore from Baldwinsville, N. Y.

Paige placed only 50th, in 25 minutes, 34 seconds, while Kane won the JV race in a time, 25:07, that would have enabled Villanova to overtake Harvard for the team title if he'd been running it in the varsity race. Army's Curt Alitz took the lead shortly after the 3-mile mark of the 5-mile race and won in 23:58.1, finishing 20 yards ahead of John Flora of Northeastern.

Villanova's five scorers were Kevin McCarey, 10th in 24:39; Carey Pinkowski, 18th in 24:59; John Burns, 29th in 25:14; Chris Schaefer, 36th in 25:20, and Ed Takacs, 44th in 25:26.

Penn, led by Steve Sholtes, who placed 27th in 25:12, was 11th in the team standings, and St. Joseph's, with Mike Glavin's 37th-place finishing in 25:21 leading the way, finished 23d.

In the college division race, Lehigh won the team title with 93 points, finishing ahead of Fairleigh Dickinson's 106 and Delaware's 107. Steve Thorne was the first Engineer finisher, placing third in 25:16, 10 seconds behind winner Frank Richardson of MIT and 9 seconds back of runnerup Steve Facus of Bloomsburg State.

Alitz, who finished second behind Dave Merrick of Penn in last year's race, recorded the second fastest time ever on the hilly Van Cortlandt course, bettered only by Merrick's 23:51 a year ago.

Even after the top finishers were in, it took several minutes of waiting and calculating to determine the outcome of the team battle between Villanova and Harvard. The first rour Crimson harriers came in 5th, 7th, 11th and 20th, but the fifth didn't cross the line until 91st place had been reached — with only three places to spare for Harvard's victory.

Harvard wins IC4A cross-country title

NEW YORK — For an agonizing 30 minutes — what seemed an eternity — Harvard cross-country coach Bill McCurdy awaited the official decision.

Although the Crimson had unofficially won the 68th annual Intercollegiate Assn. of Amateur Athletes of America cross-country championships (IC4As) yesterday, McCurdy was cautious about accepting congratulatory handshakes.

But when the official results of the 26-team race were finally posted, the Crimson had won by three slim points over Villanova, and McCurdy received a victory-celebration ride from his runners.

Army's Curt Alitz, who finished second in last year's meet, won the individual honors in 23:58 over the five-mile Van Cortland Park layout.

Greater Boston champion John Flora of Northeastern was second (24:02), followed by James Peterson of Georgetown (4:14), Bruce Bickford of Northeastern (2:13) and Jeff Campbell of Harvard (24:13).

Harvara's Peter FitzsImmons crossed the tape in seventh (24:35), while mates Stein Rafto (11th), Reed Eichner (20th) and Rockwell Moulton (92d) rounded out the Crimson scoring.
