African Connection' Is Key for Villanova

NEW YORK — Once upon an earlier athletic era, The Irish Connection carried Villanova University to footracing glories.

Villanova's supply of championship trophies hasn't slowed a perceptable bit in recent years. But now the Wildcats are doing it with The African Connection.

Sophomores Sydney Maree of South Africa and Amos Kipkorir of Kenya ran 1-2 yesterday and thus carried Villanova to the team title in the 70th annual Intercollegiate Association of Amateur Athletes of America Cross-Country Championships at Van Cortlandt Park.

Coach James "Jumbo" Elliott's Wildcats did it with the runaway low total of 36 points. It was their first IC4A crown since 1971 and they did it with one of the lowest scores in IC4A annals.

Maree became the first IC4A king from Africa since Steve Machooka won this classic five-mile test, the oldest intercollegiate cross-country event in the nation, for Cornell back in 1961. Maree did it in 24:04.0, thus missing the IC4A record of 23:51.0 by Penn's David Merrick by just 13 seconds.

"I think I might have had that record, too," said Maree after he had toweled off from the run up and over Van Cortlandt's flats, backwoods and feared Cemetery Hill.

"I was running with plenty left. If it wasn't my teammate closest to me, I might gone a lot faster."

Kipkorir landed second in 24:13.1 and was followed by teammates John Burns in eighth, Rob Earl in 10th and Kevin Dillon in 18th to lock it up.

This IC4A run was held earlier than ever before, in deference to the NCAA District II Regionals to be held at Lehigh Nov. 11, and consequent scheduling problems kept away several traditional IC4A powers, including Princeton, Harvard and Yale, who were booked for their own Big Three race yesterday.

Fairleigh Dickinson, winner of the 1977 IC4A University Division title, moved up to the Championship Division for the first time and did it in style. Coach Walt Marusyn's Bergen County Knights claimed second with 136 points, exactly 100 behind Villanova but one ahead of Massachusetts, the 1977 IC4A titlist.

Rutgers ran fourth with Cornell fifth, Maryland sixth and Army seventh.

This year's University Division team crown went to Millersville, Pa. State College, over East Stroudsburg and Bates, 106-107-116. Individual champion was Mark Kimball of Boston University in 24:51.5.

Brandeis ran off with the College Division crown with 52 points while George Mason University of Virginia had the gold medalist in freshman Chuck Wimberly in 24:50.

Running 24th in the Championship Division run in what he called "the best race of my college career was Jim Casey, the ex-Manalapan High School schoolboy flash who was dominating Shore events at this time two seasons back. He was clocked in 24:50.7.

"What a difference a year makes," was Casey's tune. "A year ago, I was 127th. Must be those good West Virginia hills I train on and those 15-mile Sunday workouts.

"And I've got to give a lot of credit to this guy right here." At Casey's left was running mate Dave Wilson, who placed fifth. "He makes me work in practice and he keeps my mind going. They said I made the All-IC4A team by placing 24th.

"Now if I can only make All-NCAA ... "

First man over the line for Rutgers was former Madison Central High School star Paul Friedman, in 20th. FDU's leader, surprisingly, was not Canadian soph "pheenom" Paul Steeds. Instead, it was Paul Marzan in 12th as Steeds, the 1977 N.J. college champion, settled for 15th.

Monmouth College had two entries in the College Division. Mike Fine placed 147th and Greg Bordiuk 133rd.

Harriers Take IC4A Crown With A 97 Point Margin

Led by Sydney Maree and Amos Kip, Korir the Villanova harriers won the 70th annual IC4A Cross Country Championship last Friday at New York City's Van Cortland Park.

In winning for the first time since 1971, the Wildcats tallied 39 points, 97 points better than second place Fairleigh Dickinson. Behind Fairleigh Dickinson were, among others, the University of Massachusetts, Rutgers, a tough Cornell team, Navy and preseason favorite Georgetown. Villanova's five man average time of 24:38 was the fastest in IC4A history and is indicative of the teams capabilities.

Another indication of the teams ability was Sydney Maree's uncontested first place finish. Sydney, who finished tenth in this race last year, cruised to a time of 24:04.0, the sixth fastest ever on the five mile Van Cortland Park Course.

Amos Kip Korir, third in last yean's Junior College Nationals, was second in 24:13.1, succumbing to Sydney's awesome final kick. Amos was unchallenged for second place and finished 100 yards ahead of Maryland's Dave Cornwell, his nearest competition.

In third place for Villanova, and

The team races again next weekend when they travel to Lehigh for the NCAA Region 2 sectional meet. The first five teams in this race will then travel to Madison, Wisconsin for the NCAA Championships. Villanova, ranked number six nationally by Harrier magazine, is co-favored with number four ranked Penn State to take the sectional title. This is a grudge race for Villanova as they face Penn State, the only team to beat them this year and also the only Eastern team ranked ahead of them nationally.
