Terps Win, Lady Lions 2nd

It's not often a team gets to wipe its disappointments off the books, but that's exactly what happened to the Penn State women's track team this morning.

When the Lady Lions left the Eastern AIAW track and field championships yesterday at Pitt, they were a close third behind Rutgers, 76-75. However, a mistake in the team scoring revealed this morning that Penn State finished second by a not-so-close 81-70. Apparently, Penny Fales' third-place points in the 800 were originally credited to Rutgers instead of the Lady Lions.

Powerhouse Maryland won the meet as expected with 108 points. After Penn State and Rutgers, Morgan State finished fourth with 66 points and Boston U. was fifth with 28.

"Actually, for a while it looked as if we were going to be able to make a run at Maryland," State coach Gary Schwartz said, "but they came out Sunday morning and won the 10,000 and placed two others, and that blew us away."

Nine meet records fell during the two-day meet, and a number of Lady Lions set school or personal records.

"I guess the highlights for us were Peggy and Carolyn's double in the 3,000 and the 5,000 and Debbie Lewis ran the race of her life in the 200," Schwartz said.

Miss Lewis, a freshman from Avon Grove High School, finished second in the 200 meters in a school record 23.85 to Morgan State's Roberta Belle, who set a meet record of 23.75.

Miss Lewis also finished fifth in the 100 in 12.25, while teammate Vivian Riddick finished sixth in 12.42.

State's 4 x 100 relay team was disqualified for passing out of the zone.

The Lady Lions notched one win in

the meet when veteran middle-distance performer Mary Rawe took the 1,500 in 4:20.33, a meet, stadium and school record.

"Mary's really been coming along," Schwartz said. "I don't think she realizes how good she can be."

Teammate Heather Carmichael finished a close second in 4:21.04.

In the 5,000 Saturday, West Chester's Eileen Hornberger won in 16:23.6, while Penn State's Peggy Cleary was third in 16:46.2 and Carolyn Ihrig was fourth in 17:03.3.

The same pair came back in the 3,000 yesterday to duplicate those finishes. Miss Cleary in 9:34.65 and Miss Ihrig in 9:39.87. And Miss Carmichael took fifth in 9:46.52.

Vermont's Judi St. Hilaire won in 9:24.5.

In the 10,000 Mary Walsh of Maryland won in a record 34:16.35. Lady Lion Janet Norem was fifth in 37:10.

The Lady Lion two-mile relay team was edged out of a win by Villanova, 8:58.8 to 9:00.2. Penny Fales led off with a 2:13.8; Sandy Miller ran 2:18.2; Patty Murnane did 2:16.5; and Miss Rawe anchored in 2:11.7.

In the open 800 Miss Fales qualified for the nationals with a 2:09.5, good for third behind Darlene Beckford of Harvard's 2:07.5.

In the long jump Saturday Miss Riddick broke her own school record with a 19-5, good for third. In the high jump Karen Krawiec cleared 5-8 for second behind Maryland's internationalist Paula Girven who did 5-

Maryland Pads Lead In EIAW Track Meet

Maryland added to its lead with two first places and set a meet record yesterday in the second day of the Eastern Women's (EIAW) track and field championships at Pitt Stadium.

Marita Walton set the discus record with a throw of 49.66 meters, while All-American Paula Gervin took the other Maryland first with a high jump of 5-10½.

Maryland women lead EIAW track meet

Pittsburgh (AP)—Paula Gervin cleared 5-feet 1½-inches in the high jump and Marita Walton threw the discus 49.66 meters to give Maryland two first-place finishes and an early lead in the Eastern Association for Intercollegiate Athletics for Women track and field championships yesterday.

The 1980 championships end today at the University of Pittsburgh. Four final events were held yesterday. Over 80 schools and 650 women participated in the EIAW championship competition.

Gervin jumped 2½ inches higher than second-place finisher Karen Krawlice of Penn State and 4½ inches more than teammate Jolene Chase.

Pia Iacovo of Holy Cross and Sharon Mitnik trailed Miss Walton in the discus.

Evalene Hatcher of Morgan State leaped 6.20 meters to win the long jump

ahead of Pat Knighton of Rutgers and Vivian Riddick of Penn State.

Eileen Hornberger of West Chester handily won the 5,000-meter run in 16:23.6 ahead of Mary Walsh of Maryland and Peggy Cleary of Penn State.

Hurdler Brian Faber and long jumper Tracey Jamieson turned in outstanding efforts for SUNY-

Jamieson, a freshman from Fishkill, leaped 17 feet, 4 inches to take sixth place— and the last "All-East" designation— in the Eastern Association for Intercollegiate Athletics for Women championships at Pitt. Morgan State's Evalene Hatcher defended her EAIAW title with a 19-9 jump.

SUNY-Binghamton frosh shot putter Sharon Quinn did not get as far as she wanted in yesterday's EAIAW championships at the University of Pittsburgh despite improving her own school record almost a whole foot to 43-6³/₄ for eighth place overall.

Roberta Belle of Morgan State was the only double winner. She set an EAIAW record, making the 400-meter run in 53.0. She won the 200-meter dash in 23.75.

Kathy Duvorsak was Pitt's only participant to place in an event, finishing ninth in the pentathlon.

Terp Nears Crown

Janet Terp of the University of Vermont is just two events away from successfully defending her Eastern Pentathlon championship.

Terp, who won this same event a year ago, is ahead of the field in the Eastern Championships, now going on at the University of Pittsburgh.

Terp set two personal records in collecting 2,337 points. She ran the hurdles in 15.2 seconds and three the shot put 34 feet, seven inches.

In the high jump she cleared 5-9 $\frac{1}{4}$, her best ever.

Terp is also trying to qualify for the national pentathlon championships. She will need in excess of 3,000 points. A year ago Terp did not qualify for the nationals.

Another UVM performer, Judi St. Hilaire will be going after her second straight 3,000-meter run crown today.
