# UVM Duo Goes 1-2, Team 3rd

INDIANA. Pa.— University of Vermont teammates Judi St. Hilaire and Leslie Bancroft beat the field by more than 20 seconds to finish 1-2 in the Eastern women's collegiate Division I cross country championships Saturday.

On a difficult hilly course of 3.1 miles, St. Hilaire won her first Eastern title in a time of 17:28.6 and Bancroft was right behind in 17:29.3. The third place finisher, Heather Carmichael of Penn State, was clocked in 17:50.

Vermont, however, did not have enough depth to win the team title, finishing third with 100 points behind winner Penn State with 60 and Maryland with 67. Harvard was fourth with 160, New Hampshire fifth with 192, Princeton sixth with 193 and Dartmouth seventh with 215. Eighteen teams competed.

In the Division III race run over the same course, Middlebury College placed three runners in the top 11 to finish second with 93 points. Army was first with 80 in a field of 26 teams. Vermont's best previous finish in the Easterns was fifth and St. Hilaire had placed as high as fourth and fifth in past years.

"Judi just outkicked Leslie at the end. They were tied with a quartermile to go," said UVM Coach Perry Bland. "Judi broke out early while Leslie stayed in the pack until about the mile mark. Leslie moved up and caught Judi on a hill. About the two-mile mark you knew they were going to be 1-2. They were pretty far ahead of everybody else. And then Judi just outkicked Leslie to win."

Other UVM runners were Ann Schiavone, 18th, 18:43.4; Donna Raymond, 26th, 18:54; Karen Bucke, 53rd, 19:42; Erika Thuro, 57th, 19:56; and Lise Cota, 74th, 20:06.

Competing without its No. 1 runner, Beth Paxson, who is injured, Middlebury runners did not place in the top five but Jane Ogden was sixth, Tara McMenamy was ninth and Karin VonBerg was 11th. Jane

Petrick of Bowloin won in 18:40 while Ogden finished in 19:12.7, McMenamy in 19:25 and VonBerg in 1928.

Other Middlebury scorers were Su Long, 44th, 20:27; Ann Leggett, 49th, 20:35; Janie Maerder, 50th, 20:35.6; and Chrissy Lewis, 76th, 21:13.

'Vermont kes did well because they're used to hills," said Middlebury Coach Terry Aldrich. "The course was like running on the Middlebury golf course or Burlington Country Club only the hills were tougher."

The top four eams in Division I, the top three in Division III and the top 15 individuas in both qualify to compete in the lationals Nov. 15 in Seattle.

## Penn State Women Take EIAW Honors

This year's Eastern Association for Intercollegiate Athletics for Women cross country championship was not expected to be another walkaway for Penn State but the Lady Lions upheld tradition in outpointing Maryland 60-67 for their fifth straight title at Indiana, Pa. Saturday.

It was quite a different meet from last fall's 85-point spread over the Lady Terps but coach Gary Schwartz ex-

pected a dogfight.

Vermont's Judi St. Hilaire and Leslie Bancroft took the top two spots ahead of Penn State's Heather Carmichael. Miss St. Hilaire was clocked at 17:28.6, .4 seconds ahead of her teammate on the tortuous 5,000 meter course. Miss Carmichael came in 22 seconds later.

Mary Rawe finished fourth and Peggy Clearly took tenth while Patti Murnane and Natalie Updegrove grabbed 20th and 23rd places for the

winning Lady Lions.

"The team responded really well. There were a couple of very strong points we had to deal with going into the meet," said coach Schwartz. "First the opposition. This is the first time probably that Penn State has been pushed to that extent. We knew that Maryland was going to be tough. We battled them twice before and beat them by five points the first time and four points the next time."

Schwartz also noted the challenging course and the fact that Penn State had a four-year winning streak on the line. "That put a lot of pressure on the team but they responded well and generally the team ran very well."

The Vermont tandem took off fast at the starting gun. Miss St. Hilaire grabbed the early lead but Miss Bancroft caught her and they ran away from Heather Carmichael for an easy win.

"Heather put in another strong performance," said her coach. "She was beaten quite convincingly but I would say she had a fine race."

Miss St. Hilaire ran a 5:40 first mile compared to Miss Carmichael's 5:51 over a very hilly segment of the course. The leader continued to blaze with a 5:29 second mile but Miss Carmichael quickened to a 5:30 pace.

The Vermont runners finished with a 5:44 mile while Miss Carmichael had a

6:04 kick.

"The times don't really reflect the running because of the difficulty of the course with the uphill and sidehill running. The winning time was excellent."

Had Vermont and Harvard been able to come up with a high-finishing third runner the eastern championship would have been a four-way battle, but Maryland made it tough enough on the Lady Lions.

Mary Rawe and Peggy Cleary made considerable improvement over last year's EAIAW placings to help secure the win. Miss Rawe, 29th last year, took fourth while Miss Cleary moved from 26th to 10th.

"Mary had another strong race, possibly her best," said Schwartz. "Peggy Cleary and Natalie Updegrove (23) had our best performances. It was very definitely Peg's best race of the year and Natalie, a sophomore walk-on who didn't even know last year that she could run for the team, finished really well for us.

"It was truly a team race. The challenge at easterns is to come in the top 10 (individually) and it's really close after that. To win easterns it's necessary to place in the top 20, for nationals you have to get in the top 40."

Coach Schwartz is hoping his team can place in the top 10 in nationals but that won't be easy with Virginia, Tennessee, Michigan State, Arizona, Oregon, Berkeley and the regional rivals of Maryland, Vermont and Harvard chasing powerhouse North Carolina State for the title.

The AIAW championship will be held Nov. 15 in Seattle, Wash.

### Greene teacher wins race
