Providence Tops Bucknell

Powerful Providence, a team composed entirely of Irish and English runners, defeated Bucknell for the IC4A championship yesterday at Lehigh 47-126. Penn State was fifth in the IC4A meet with 174.

In the NCAA District 2 meet (the same race eliminating the New England teams from District 1), Bucknell emerged on top with 85 points, nipping Iona and Fairleigh-Dickinson, both of which had 86.

Penn State finished fourth with 118.

Providence's Brendan Quinn (29:43 for 10,000 meters) and Richard O'Flynn finished 1-2 in the IC4A meet.

Bucknell's Bill Reifsnnyder finished third overall in 30:00. Penn State's top finisher was Jeff Adkins, 11th in 30:57.

Quinn battles wind and cold to win IC4As

Wind is a way of life on the west coast of Ireland. It never seems to stop, pounding constantly and strongly off the Atlantic Ocean, providing any and all potential runners with the most severe of tests.

The same conditions commonly prevail in Massachusetts, again from the Atlantic and compounded by Massachusetts Bay.

Brendan Quinn of Providence College and Lynn Jennings of Princeton University grew up in such conditions, he in Waterford, Ireland, she in Harvard, Mass. Aspiring runners, they learned to fight the elements, especially the wind. Yesterday, at Lehigh's Saucun Fields, they passed those severe tests.

Quinn, charging ahead as many of his opponents choked for air in the force of a cold mini-gale, ran to a 16-second victory over roommate and fellow Irishman Rich O'Flynn to win the 10,000-meter IC4A cross-country championship in 29 minutes and 43 seconds.

"I feel I'm very strong going into the wind," said Quinn, a two-time Big East champion who was eighth in this prestigious meet a year ago in New York. "I feel it (the wind) was a factor in my winning.

"Rich (O'Flynn) and I were on Jimmy O'Connell's shoulder as we started into the wind at about the 2 1/2-mile mark. We were running on a slight grade at the time, and we decided to try and break it. I took off with Rich right behind me, and nobody could catch up with us." He appeared as strong at the finish as he did at the start.

O'Connell, a Syracuse senior who won the Paul Short Memorial run on the same course a couple of weeks ago, finished fourth in 30 minutes and 16 seconds, about 20 seconds better than he had run in the Short and 16 seconds behind Bill Reifsnyder of Bucknell.

"The wind was too much," said O'Connell, who now has lost all three of his races against Quinn. "I started to get chest cramps and just couldn't run any faster. Brendan is a great runner; he ran a magnificent race today. He should be in the top five in nationals."

Surprisingly, Quinn prefers the steeplechase, where he is the reigning IC4A champion. "I hope to run the steeplechase for Ireland in the Olympics," he said.

Quinn, O'Flynn, O'Connell and Reifsnyder will each run in the NCAA meet Nov. 22 in Bloomington, Ind. So will Daryl Simoneau and Fernando Braz of Boston College, James Sapienza of Dartmouth, Brian O'Keefe of Villanova, Kevin King of Georgetown, Jon Babcock of George Mason and Jeff Adkins of Penn State, as well as the top five runners from Providence, Northeastern, Bucknell, Iona and Fairleigh Dickinson. All qualified yesterday in this unusual meet that combined the IC4A championship with regional qualifying from NCAA Districts I and II.

O'Keeffe Qualifies for NCAA's

The Villanova men's cross country team competed in the IC4A and NCAA District regional championships on Nov. 13 at Lehigh.

The team finished 5th in the NCAA District II competition with 154 points and 6th in the IC4A with 216 points.

Brian O'Keeffe performed outstandingly as he finished 8th overall, good enough for fourth place in the districts. O'Keeffe began with a reasonable pace, hitting the first mile mark in 4:44. He was about 20th at this point. Building up speed as he pressed on, O'Keeffe eventually reached home in the eighth spot, clocking in with a 30:36 for the 6.2 mile course.

Coach Jack Pyrah stated, "O'Keeffe had been working very hard for this race and he raced to his best performance ever in cross country."

Marcus O'Sullivan, running just behind O'Keeffe, was bo-

thered by a side stitch which gave him such severe pains that he had to stop to treat it. This cost him about one minute, dropping him back to about 100th place. Shortly thereafter he returned strongly and began passing runners ahead of him. O'Sullivan finished in 51st place overall (49th in IC4A) and 35th in District II.

Anthony O'Reilly took 49th in a time of 31:33. Pyrah remarked, "Tony wasn't feeling well from the start and didn't feel too well during the race."

After finally getting over all his chest ailments, John Keyworth was able to run one of his best races of the season; he finished 45th overall in a time of 31:31.

Next came Dermot Anderson, who wound up in 71st place, followed by Ken Lucks in 97th place, while J.J. Clarke brought up the rear in 112th. Pyrah stated, "Everybody on the team set personal records for the course."

Despite that fact, Villanova did not qualify for the NCAA's as a team. Pyrah expressed his happiness, however, that the team was able to send at least one runner to the Nationals in Bloomington, In. on Nov. 22.

Pyrah also said, "District II of the NCAA is composed of very tough teams, such as Bucknell, Iona, and Fairleigh Dickenson. All of these teams recruit basically long distance runners, which is why they have powerful cross country teams. Our team is composed basically of half-milers and milers," the coach added.

Summing up the cross season, Coach Charles Jenkins felt that overall, the season had gone well. The Wildcats placed second in the Big East meet and won the Big Five. As Jenkins stated, "We are always shooting for number one, and no matter what, we will continue to do so."

W&M Wins X-Country Title

BOSTON (AP) — William and Mary won the university division and defending champion Brandeis took the college division in the 74th IC4A cross country championships at Franklin Park Monday in perfect running conditions.

More than 170 runners from 30 schools competed in the 5-mile race held at Franklin Park

for the first time since 1915.

Greg Rapp of Glassboro State set a new record in the college division, finishing first in 24:11.3 over the five-mile course. The old record, set in 1973, was 25:06.7.

Andy Whitney of William and Mary set a university division record of 24:27.1. The old record was 24:51.3, set in 1978.

Trailing William and Mary, with 33 points, were Millersville State 91, Delaware 92, East Stroudsburg State 92, Plattsburgh State 110, C.W. Post 124, New York Tech 180, Marist 201,

Holy Cross 209 and Colgate 247.

Sheely takes second with IC4A harriers

Boston—Mike Sheely, the Kenwood High School product running for Haverford (Pa.) College, came on strong at the finish, but could only place second to winner Greg Rapp of Glassboro (N.J.) State College in the 74th IC4A crosscountry championships, yesterday.

Rapp, who ran a 4-minute 28-second opening mile, broke away from the pack and won with a 24:11 clocking, 15 seconds ahead of Sheeley's 24:26 effort over the 5-mile Franklin Park course.

Brandeis University successfully defended its college division team title, with 29 points, outdistancing runnerup Glassboro State 47, Haverford 108, Rochester 167, Bates 171 and MIT 215.

Mike Sterling, the leading area finisher, placed eighth with a 24:54 clocking for the University of Maryland-Baltimore County.

Towson State University tied Williams College for seventh place at 217 points apiece.

Larry Pickett led the charge for Towson State, finishing 33d in 25:52. The remaining Towson State runners, in order, were Andy Passmore, 40th at 26:08; Tom Jackson, 45th at 26:19; Doug Lane, 52d at 26:26; Kevin Dolan, 64th at 26:58; Steve Tauber, 81st at 27:42.

William and Mary won the university division and Andy Whitney, of William and Mary set a record of 24:27.1, bettering the old record of 24:51.3, set in 1978.

Rapp sets record, Glassboro second

BOSTON — Greg Rapp set a course record in taking individual honors as Glassboro State College finished runnerup for the team championship in the IC4A College Division cross-country championships yesterday.

Brandeis, bunching five runners between third and 10th, took the championship with 29 points while Glassboro finished with 47 in placing second for the second straight year.

Rapp, a senior from Pleasantville High School, covered the five-mile Franklin Park course in 24:11.5 to cut almost a minute off the former record. It was the best time of the day because the University Division race was won by Andy Whitney of William and Mary in 24:22.

"Greg ran a great race," said Glassboro Coach Bill Fritz. "He took the lead going up a hill a little more than two miles out and stayed in front the rest of the way.

"The heat bothered a couple of our guys and Brandeis had the advantage of running on its home course, but we did have a good team effort. I think we are ready for the (NCAA Division III) Eastern Regionals."

In addition to Rapp, Glassboro had Bob Rimkis, Washington Township, place 11th; Len Hernandez, 12th; Tim O'Brien, 13th; Joe Haney, 18th, and Bob Kielbowicz, Cherry Hill West, 21st.
