Villanova teams win cross country championships

BOSTON — The Villanova men's and women's cross country teams won titles at their respective meets in Franklin Park Saturday.

The men's team accumulated 139 points to win the 88th annual IC4A championships. The women's squad totaled 37 points to win the ECAC title.

Villanova's Kristine Jost won the women's 5,000-meter race in 16:26.

The Wildcats placed four runners in the top 10, including Krestena Sullivan (third, 16:38), Carmen Douma (fourth, 16:42) and Carrie Tollefson (sixth, 16:44).

Both the men's and women's teams qualified for the NCAA championships which will be held Monday, Nov. 25, in Tucson, Ariz.

The men's team will be making its third straight trip to the NCAA meet and 16th overall. The women's team, which won six consecutive national titles from 1989 to '94, will be making its 12th appearance in its 15-year history.

In the women's race, Princeton's Katie Talarico closed out a solid season, coming in 28th with a time of 17:21, just under a minute slower than Kristine Jost's winning time for Villanova. Teamwise, Princeton scored a 10th-place finish with 352 points. Senior Tanya Baker was Princeton's second finisher, coming in the 50th spot with a time of 17:47.

Syracuse University freshman Laura Murphy, of Endicott, helped the Orangemen to a fifth-place finish at the ECAC University Division Championship cross-country meet, where 27 teams competed. Murphy was Syracuse's sixth-best finisher.

Lady Lions fare well at ECACs

BOSTON — The Penn State women's cross country team finished sixth overall and third among District II teams Saturday at the ECAC Cross Country Championship at Franklin Park Field.

Villanova and Georgetown finished first and second, respectively, in both the overall and District II races. In the overall race, Providence was third, Dartmouth fourth and Boston College fifth.

Penn State coach Teri Jordan said she believes her team is a shoe-in for an at-large bid to the NCAA championship. At-large invitations will be extended Monday.

"The only other at-large team ahead of us was Boston College," she said. "With six at-large bids available, I think we've earned a spot in the NCAAs."

Kim McGreevy led the Lady Lions with a seventh place finish. Next for Penn State was Erin St. John, who placed 20th. Both have grade point averages above 3.24 and have earned academic All-America honors.

"We have two academic All-Americans, we have a team going to NCAAs," Jordan said. "Six of seven runners were under 18:00 and the other came in at 18:08. It was a very successful day. We couldn't ask for much more." Woodson excels — At Franklin Park in Boston, Marist College senior Kathleen Woodson finished 21st at the ECAC Regional Qualifying Meet. Woodson's time of 18 minutes, 49 seconds on the 321-mile course was the highest finish by a Marist woman in the history of the meet. It was also her personal best. Helen Kent of Bucknell had the winning time of 17:55.

Souderton's Kate Detterline, a junior at Lafayette, finished ninth in a field of 221 runners at the ECAC cross-country championships Saturday at Franklin Field Park in Boston. She completed the 5,000-meter course in 18 minutes, 28 seconds.

Villanova: 1-2 punch

It dominates cross-country

With schools throughout the East converging on Franklin Park to show who is best, many thought the locals would benefit from a 'home course' in yesterday's IC4A and ECAC Cross-Country championships.

Not exactly true for Providence.

With bids to the upcoming NCAA championships on the line, the women of Villanova dethroned the defending champion Lady Friars behind a gritty effort from sophomore Kristine Jost and a solid team showing. Villanova had four of the top six finishers in the ECAC 5K finals.

Jost, who was unable to compete during the recent Big East championships because of illness, used a last-leg comeback to oust Marie McMahon of Providence, 16:26 to 16:31. McMahon, a senior, placed second in last year's ECACs, but had dominated this season. Along with winning the New England and Big East titles, McMahon represented her native Ireland in the 5,000 meter competition in the Olympic Games in Atlanta.

"I didn't really believe until I actually saw her hair in front of mine," said Jost. "My coach had said to me 'You don't get that close to a girl like that and let her win'."

The same illness that kept her away from McMahon and the conference finals was a possible benefit in yesterday's race for Jost, who hadn't previously raced for almost a month.

"I had no idea what to expect today," said Jost. "In hated having to miss the Big East [finals], but because of that I do feel I'm rested. Mostly we were just going for the team win today."

The victory returns the Villanova women to the top of the cross-country pinnacle, a position they held from 1989 to 1994, before losing to McMahon and the Lady Friars last year.

"Everyone ran very well. This meet we put it together and we had to run a great race to beat Providence," said Wildcat women's coach John Marshall. "We can't just walk up here and win. Not against a great team like that."

Vermont runners end season on upbeat

The University of Vermont men's and women's cross country teams finished up the 1996 season Saturday with solid showings in the ECAC and IC4A championships in Boston's Franklin Park.

Vermont's women, coming off their second-place showing at the America East Championship two weeks ago, followed up with a strong ninth-place finish in District I in the ECAC Championship. The Catamounts finished with 204 points, just 30 points out of sixth place, as the top four runners recorded personal-best times on the 3.1-mile course and two others ran their season-best times.

Senior Kera Smalley paced the women with a 59th-place effort (17:52), followed by junior Dana Devlin (85th, 18:06), sophomore Alanna Jones of Milton (120th, 18:36) and freshman Joya Tetrault of Rutland (134th, 18:42). Junior Stacey Keane was 151st in 18:52.
