Trials of the Twenty-fourth Annual Championships Run Off.

BROAD-JUMP RECORD BROKEN

A. C. Kraenzlein of the University of
Pennsylvania Cleared 24 Feet 4 1-2
Inches — The Summaries.

The trial heats of the twenty-fourth annual intercollegiate championship games were held on Manhattan Field yesterday. The finals will be decided this afternoon on the same field. There was much enthusiasm over the "trials."

One world's record was broken yesterday—running broad jump. A. C. Kraenzlein of the University of Pennsylvania made the jump of 24 feet 4½ inches. The intercollegiate record until yesterday was 23 feet 7¾ inches, made by M. Prinstein of Syracuse, and the collegiate record, 24 feet 3½ inches, made by Kraenzlein last year. The Pennsylvanian beat his record at the second trial by three-quarters of an inch, and his third trial would have been 24 feet 9⅞ inches but for an unfortunate slip backward after landing. The jumper's foot marks showed the sensational distance had been covered, but in his slip he slid back to 24 feet 4½ inches.

The crowd of spectators was large. Those present expressed disappointment at not seeing Burke of Harvard or Boardman of Yale in the 440-yard run. They, with Long of Columbia, were expected to put up the hardest athletic contest on the programme.

Long ran in the first heat and won easily. Cregan and Adams looked about the best of those that secured places for the finals in the half-mile run, but Adams, although finishing third, seemed perfectly fresh.

PENNSYLVANIA WINS OUT

Philadelphians Take the Championship by a Wide Margin.

HARVARD SECOND, YALE THIRD

Long of Columbia Takes the Quarter-Mile and Breaks the Intercollegiate Record—The Summaries.

The University of Pennsylvania again carried off the championship at the annual track and field meeting of the Intercollegiate Association of amateur athletes of America, held at Manhattan Field yesterday afternoon. It was a foregone conclusion that the Philadelphia collegians would win, but they were hardly expected to score as many as 57 points, more than twice as many as Harvard, which finished second.

The weather was of the kind that brings out athletic enthusiasts, and there were more people at Manhattan Field when the games began than have witnessed the college championships in New York in recent years. There were fully 3,500 persons present, among whom were a large number of young women. There were also the usual squads of college "rooters," but after the games were once well under way the adherents of the University of Pennsylvania "had the floor," for nearly every event saw the red and blue of Pennsylvania either in front or among the first four.

Harvard and Yale had a close fight for second honors. Yale, although unable to do better than gain third place, did remarkably well, considering the material Trainer Copeland had to work with. He had all his men in splendid condition.

Unlike last year's games, there were few records equaled, and only one broken, but this fact did not rob the events of any interest. Indeed, with a few exceptions, the track events were hotly contested.

A. C. Kraenzlein, J. W. B. Tewksbury, "Alex" Grant, and J. C. McCracken were the men who enabled the University of Pennsylvania to carry off the championship honors so easily. The former secured three wins, while Tewksbury scored twice and Grant once. Grant won the two-mile race in a romp, and got second place in the half-mile run, after being practically out of it coming into the stretch. Kraenzlein's two wins in the hurdle events were easy. In the 220-yard hurdle race he made a gallant effort to lower his own record of 0:23 3-5. He came within one-fifth of a second of equaling the record. In the 120-yard hurdle race he equaled the record made by himself. He did not have to compete in the finals of the broad jump yesterday, as his jump of 24 feet 4½ inches in the trials on Friday could not be beaten.

M. W. Long of Columbia won the quarter-mile run in easy style, beating the intercollegiate record.

The one-hundred-yard dash furnished a sensational finish—in fact, it was the most exciting race of the day, and every one on the grounds was yelling when the men breasted the tape. Before the race a report was circulated that F. W. Jarvis, the Princeton representative, could beat the champion, Tewksbury. He failed at this, but he did give the Philadelphia collegian one of the hardest fights on record. Scarcely four inches separated these two athletes when the tape was broken. Jarvis was out in front for more than half the distance when Tewksbury caught him. The men ran abreast to within a few yards of the tape, when Tewksbury managed to get in front. The time was 10 seconds, but if the track had been in better shape it is probable that the world's record of 9 4-5 seconds would have been equaled.

The pole vault furnished a tedious competition. The men were at it nearly three hours. Clapp of Yale won with a vault of 11 feet 5 inches, beating the intercollegiate record by half an inch. He tried for a new world's record, the bar being raised to 11 feet 11½ inches, but he failed to get over it.

The total number of points scored by the colleges having a representative among the first four in the various events follow: University of Pennsylvania, 57; Harvard, 28; Yale, 22½; Princeton, 11; Syracuse University, 10; Columbia, 5; Cornell, 5; Williams, 3; Georgetown University, 1; Haverford, ½.

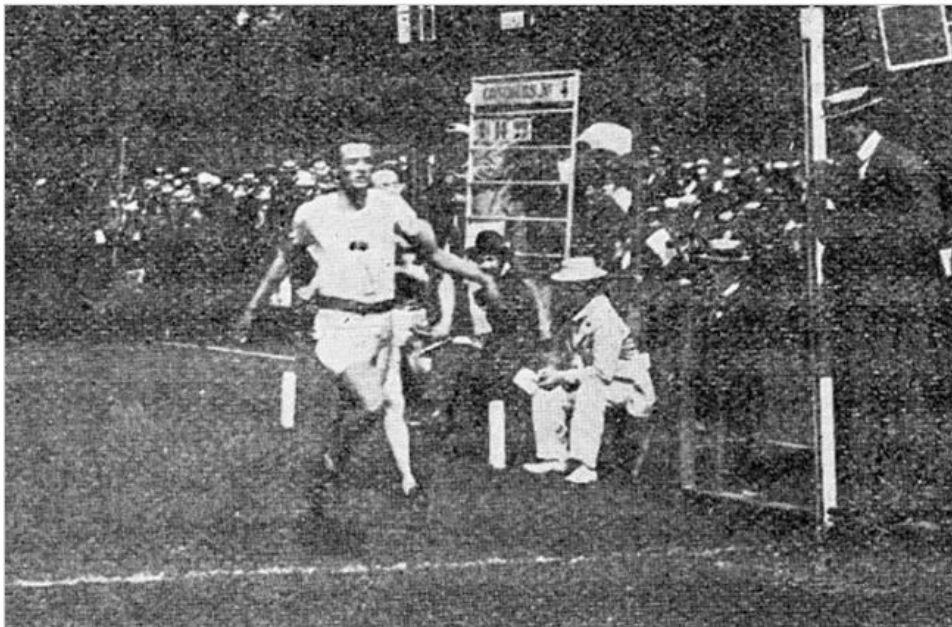
