VILLANOVA RETAINS TEAM TITLE IN I. C. 4-A TRACK

DOUBLE FOR BUDD

Villanova Runner Wins 100, 220—Harvard Second in Scoring

Through rain, cold and mud, Villanova's favored forces swept to victory yesterday in the eighty-fifth annual track and field championships of the Intercollegiate Association of Amateur Athletes of America.

With a brilliant double winner in Frank Budd and three other victors, Coach Jim Elliott's Wildcats from Philadelphia's Main Line rolled up 46 points. This enabled them to finish at the head of the forty-seven-college field for the fourth time in five years.

Despite atrocious competitive conditions at Downing Stadium on Randall's Island, three meet records were set—all in events added to the program last year to encourage Olympic development.

Bobby Lowe of Brown, though balked in a bid to repeat his double of 1960, lowered the three-mile record to 14:11.8. Pat Traynor of Villanova, in dethroning Lowe in the 3,000-meter steeplechase, reduced that mark to 9:25.3. And Winston Cooper of St. John's improved his own standard in the hop, step and jump to 48 feet 9 inches.

Budd Is Star of Show

However, the star of the whole watery show was Budd, a chunky junior from Asbury Park, N. J. First, he raced 100 yards up-wind on the drenched track in 9.6 seconds. Eighty minutes later, he won the 220, also off by himself, in the coasting time of 0:21.4.

Other racing victors were Dick Edmunds of Princeton, who captured the 440 in 0:48.1; Jon Dante of Villanova, who took the 880 in 1:55.5; Steve Paranya of Wesleyan, who won the mile in 4:15.9; Bill Johnson of Maryland, who led in the 120-yard high hurdles in 0:14.8; Jay Luck of Yale, who took the 440-yard hurdles in 0:53.1, and Fordham's mile relay team, clocked in 3:18.5.

Villanova's other winner was William Joe, who took the shot-put.

Harvard finished a surprising second to Villanova in the team standings with 29½ points. Maryland, with 24½ points, and Penn State, with 18½, were next in line.

Then came St. John's with 18, Michigan State 14, Yale 13½, Fordham 12½, Manhattan and Dartmouth, 12 each, and Brown 10. Twenty-three colleges broke into the scoring.

All By Himself

Because of even worse weather conditions on Friday, the meet was compressed into one day. As a result, trials had to be held in the morning. Fortunately, fields scratched down to a point where semi-finals, usually required in the sprints and hurdles, were not needed.

In the 100, Bobby Brown, Penn State's double winner of last year, got off even with Budd. But the Villanovan, with a tremendous burst after he had settled into stride, opened up a wide gap. Bringing his knees high in his distinctive upright style, Budd kept widening the

gap. He was three yards ahead at the finish.

His 9.6-second clocking under the conditions confirms the impression that Budd, timed in 0:09.4 in dual meets, is as fine a sprinter as any other in the world. He looks at least two yards faster than the Budd who finished a close fifth in the 100 meters at the 1960 Olympics.

In the 220 yesterday, it was even less of a contest. Again Budd got out in front with his early lift. He virtually stopped running after 200 yards and finished looking around. Here, too, he was a comfortable three yards ahead of a team-mate, Paul Drayton, who had finished third in the 100.

The mile was a tremendous duel between the co-favored Paranya, also the I. C. 4-A indoor winner, and Mark Mullin, Harvard's Heptagonal champion.

Mullin Sets Pace

Mullin set the pace and tried to run the field into the ground. But Paranya refused to be shaken off and eased in front in the last few strides. He and Mullin had battled virtually shoulder-to-shoulder around the whole last lap. Each was timed in 4:15.9, 8 to 9 seconds off their normal capabilities.

Another exciting stretch duel marked the 880. Pete Brandels of Cornell ran at Dante as hard as he could all the way down the final straight. But the Villanovan wouldn't give in. He hit the tape two feet to the good.

The morning trials of the 880 had knocked most of the other favorites out of the running. Frank Tomeo of Fordham was spiked and lost a shoe. The defender, Tommy Carroll of Yale, and Jim Stack, a team-mate, couldn't muster any lift in the sloppy going. Neither could Artie Evans of Manhattan.

The same thing happened to Jimmy Wedderburn, New York University's defender, in the 440 trials. So Edmunds had a breeze. Princeton's captain, strong and sure of himself, was in command all the way. He snapped the tape with a seven-yard lead on Tom Holzel of Dartmouth, who was sorted out of a cluster as the runner-up by the Bulova photo-timer.

In the three-mile run, Lowe put on a blazing finish and won by ten yards from Gerald Young of Michigan State, with Bobby Mack of Yale twenty yards farther back.

Forty minutes later, Lowe gallantly returned to the track to defend his steeplechase crown. Wearily, he dropped back to eighth place, a good 100 yards off the pace in midrace.

Then he flagged himself on, passing runner after runner. But though he moved up to second, he couldn't make any appreciable dent in Traynor's margin.

Johnson of Maryland, the 1959 winner but a 1960 absentee because of scholastic examinations, won the high hurdles by four feet from Leon Pras, the defender from Villanova.

Luck, disqualified last year when he finished second, scored by four yards over Chris Stauffer of Maryland in the distance hurdles.

Tie for First in Discus

Peter Weiss, Tom Kenney, Doug Tynan and Tomeo, patched up after his morning casualty, carried the stick for Fordham in the mile relay. St. John's, N. Y. U. and Manhattan trailed the Rams closely in an all-metropolitan finish. Villanova, without Bob Raemore, who had wrenched his knee in the 440 final, wasn't in the picture.

Villanova's rivals weren't made any happier by the realization that no senior scored a point for the Wildcats. And next year, Elliott will have such reinforcements as Rolando Cruz, who has cleared 15 feet in the pole vault, and Vic Zwolak, who has bettered 9 minutes for two miles.

One more team triumph would give Villanova permanent possession of the I. C. 4-A Cup, on which Manhattan also holds four legs.

The field event men, throwing from concrete circles except in the javelin and jumping from all-weather asphalt runways, weren't so badly affected by the weather. But the chilly temperature and generally poor conditions kept them from doing their best, too.

There was the rarity of a tie in the discus throw. Ed Kohler of Fordham and Mike Pyle, Yale's 1960 football captain, each spun the plate 158 feet 10 inches.

In the shot put, Joe, despite two sprained fingers on his throwing hand, won with an effort of 54 feet ½ inch. He had to palm the shot because of the injured fingers.

Nick Kovalakides of Maryland retained the javelin title with a toss of 222 feet 4 inches, a remarkable effort from a clin-

a remarkable effort from a slippery turf take-off.

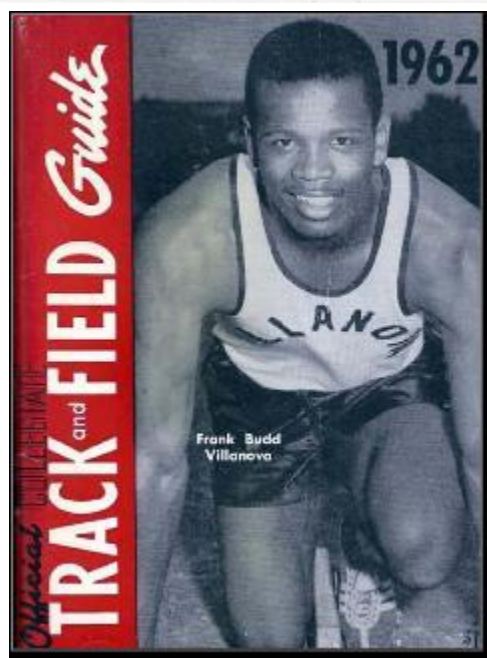
With Jud Sage of Navy absent with a strained neck, Stan Doten of Harvard took the hammer throw with a good flip of 189 feet 10 inches.

In the high jump, John Thomas, who cleared 7 feet 1½ inches last year, won at 6 feet 5 inches and discreetly called it quits. Boston University's defender took only two jumps, at 6—4 and 6—5. He cleared these heights wearing his warm-up uniform.

Calvin Glass made it a double victory for St. John's in the jumps by capturing the broad jump with a leap of 23 feet 5¼ inches.
