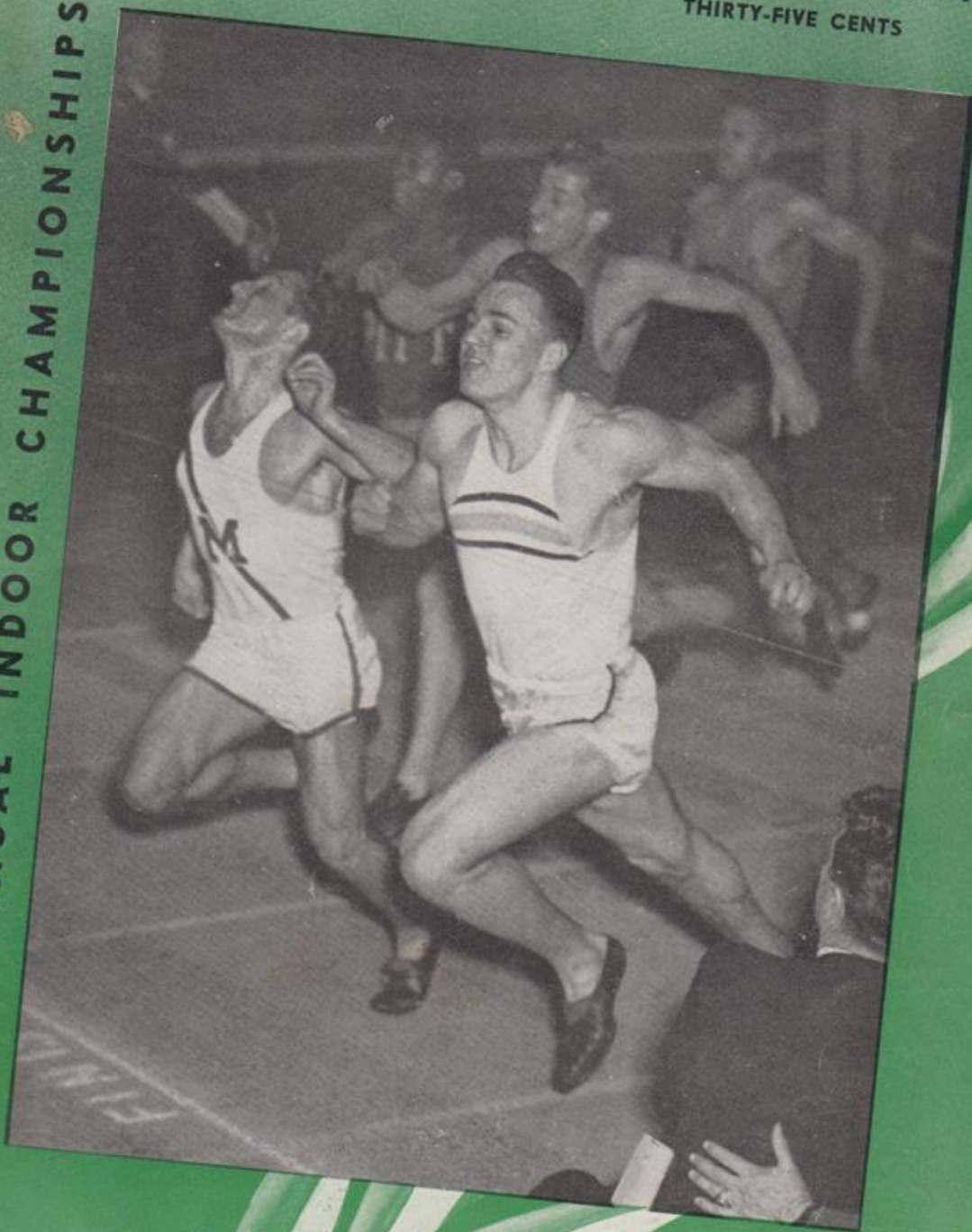

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GENERAL INFORMATION

TRACK measures eleven laps to mile.

Firing of revolver denotes beginning of final lap in all races.

Competitors must be on time, field contestants entering enclosure five minutes before scheduled start of their event, and track contestants entering enclosure upon completion of race next preceding theirs. As soon as their event is over, competitors will kindly leave track and infield at once.

In all races there is no penalty for first false start, but competitor is disqualified by second false start.

In hurdle race competitor is not disqualified for knocking down hurdles.

In all relay races baton must be carried in runner's hand and must be passed to next succeeding teammate within clearly marked 20-yard zone, extending 10 yards in both directions from leg finish line.

In 600-yard, 1000-yard, one-mile and two-mile runs no member college may be represented by more than two competitors.

I.C.A.A.A. rules of competition will be strictly enforced by Referee and other officials.

TONIGHT'S THE NIGHT

Now College Athletes Reach Climactic Contests Which Determine
Which of Them Are Real Champions

FOR dyed-in-the-wool track fans, as distinguished from the pub-trotting dilettantes who interrupt their round of the night clubs in the hope of getting a fast thrill at Madison Square Garden of a Saturday evening, tonight is the night of nights.

The varsity free-for-all sponsored annually by the Intercollegiate A.A.A.A. is a real, honest-to-goodness athletic competition, in contrast to some of the ballyhooed super-productions that are foisted on the public in the name of track and field.

Specific comparisons can be invidious but it seems quite in order to observe that tonight's medals will be awarded on the basis of tonight's performances. Press clippings are checked at the door in the Intercollegiates. In this meet, an athlete has to lay it on the line.

Too often in the invitation carnivals that compose the bulk of the spot-lighted indoor track program, the real fight is for the command bids to compete in the featured "special" events. These bids have come to carry such prestige that there always is a grim tug-of-war behind the scenes for the right to race.

Quite frequently there is less effort exerted in the actual theatre of operations by the candidates who have been tapped into the exclusive cup-racing fraternity. The main objective has been attained, so why bother?

Since past reputation, rather than current form, is more than likely to be the determining factor in selecting the field for an invitation event, many a "dream race" on paper has turned out to be a ghastly nightmare on the track, to the hand-wringing despair of the Hollywood-minded meet director who has exhaustively culled the list of champions for the most illustrious names.

Of course, once the gun goes off in any race, the athletes are on their own. But it is unfortunately true that the results in many so-called cup classics lack great significance because of the arbitrary procedure followed in choosing the contestants.

It particularly irritates spiked-shoe devotees who feel strongly on this subject to read thoughtless references to this-or-that runner having won the "title" in this-or-that cup race. Titles are won in championship competition, not in handpicked invitation events.

There is none of this nonsense in the Intercollegiates, a championship meet in the best tradition. The IC4A entry lists are open to all certified varsity athletes of the sixty-one member colleges and the title aspirants must run the gauntlet of heats and trials that play no favorites.

IC4A titles carry the stamp of validity. The gold medals tonight's winners will take home may not be as imposing, or as valuable, as the big silver cups or the jewel-studded watches that sometime are at stake in invitation events, but they mean more in the long pull.

They represent definite achievement and demonstrated superiority over all eligible opposition.

Seasoned cup-racers like George Guida, Reggie Pearman and Gerry Karver know what they are up against tonight. This is no county-fair meet, no Roman holiday to whet the appetite of the jaded "fancy". This is The Intercollegiates, the real thing.

Take the case of Guida, for instance. The chunky powerhouse from Villanova, one of the IC4A circle's many good Olympic bets, by the way, has won all this winter's major 600-yard cups without getting more than a good workout. Bang the gun and a minute and thirteen seconds or so later little George has another big mug to display on his mantelpiece.

It's no reflection on Guida, who is one of the very best and always runs close to form, that his victories have been somewhat hollow. The time-tested recipe for a "special" calls for the use of such interest-promoting ingredients as big names and local favorites to round out a field while he has come through, in many cases his rivals haven't performed up to advertised expectations.

Tonight Guida's opposition theoretically is less distinguished. Actually, the IC4A 600 probably will turn out to be the stiffest assignment he has faced.

George will get a race all right. In fact, he'll get three of them. Before he gets his shot at that gold medal that is worth a thousand times its weight to him, he will have to risk the hazards of trial and semi-final against a bunch of good footracers who have been too busy pre-

OLYMPICS RETURN TO LONDON

Warm Welcome Plus Extensive Plans Being Prepared There
for 1948 Games

BECAUSE of the several unpleasant happenings at the Winter Olympics, dire things are being predicted for the Summer Games in London. These viewers-with-alarm even go so far as to say that the British aren't at all enthusiastic about playing the role of Olympic hosts . . . that the facilities are inadequate . . . and that the well-conditioned, properly caloric American athlete will be subjected to ridicule if he loses and censure if he wins.

This is a case of much smoke and little fire, and the time has come, now that our athletes are about ready for the big outdoor offensives leading up to Olympic trials, for a thorough scotching of these ugly rumors. Despite the difficulties of the times, Britons are looking forward with high enthusiasm to the staging of their first great Olympic tournament since 1908. They consider it a challenge to their well-known ingenuity and industry. They may not send many winners to the victor's dais in the Empire Stadium at Wembley, but from the effort already put forward in over-all planning, it is not unreasonable to presume that these XIVth Olympics have a chance of becoming the best coordinated set of Games ever held.

Certainly, it will be a cantankerous customer, indeed, who will precipitate any international sports arguments while a guest of the country which took such a shellacking as did England in World War II. And if the competing nations can't get along at the site, and while viewing the consequences, of international bad will,

then there is very little hope for a war-less future.

At a time of wide food shortage, the problem of providing for the great influx of visitors is a big one, but the whole question is being handled by the official Organizers of the Games and the Ministry of Food. Although some points still are under discussion, it has been announced that every visitor, whether competitor, official or spectator, will receive at least the normal British scale of rations. In addition, any person entering Britain can bring 25-pounds of food; nor is there any restriction being placed upon the receipt of further parcels of food sent by post, and these will remain duty-free as long as they're under 23 pounds in weight.

Under such an arrangement, there would appear to be very little room left for whipping up a complaint on the food situation.

Further, the British have stated that they'll make every effort to cater to national tastes in the preparation of food at the competitors' camps, although it is expected, and hoped, that most teams will bring their own chefs. For the nations which can't set up their own kitchens, arrangements already have been made for the serving of meals to competitors at a number of schools (unoccupied during the summer holidays) close to Empire Stadium.

Main focus of the Games will be the Stadium in Wembley, the adjacent Empire Pool and the old Palace of Engineering. On these three sites will be decided the Olympic crowns in track and field, swimming, football and the rest, and the entire layout is more than adequate. Taking no chances, however, the British have undertaken renovations which will extend the Stadium's seating capacity to 60,000 with further accommodations for 22,000 standees. The more recently constructed Empire Pool, where swimming and boxing will be staged, will seat a little over 8,000.

Even at this point of the Olympic proceedings (mid-June is the closing date for entries), it is expected the Games will set a new highmark in the number of competitors, and the British are prepared for the record throng. Seven countries have entered for all 17 events, these including, along with their estimated team strength: Czechoslovakia (284), France, 310), Great Britain (348), U.S.A. (415), Hungary (220), Italy (248), Switzerland (270). Six other countries have entered all but one or two events so that, on a long-range estimate, the total should break the record turnout of 3,959 competitors at Berlin in 1936.

The athletes will be housed at three main cen-

I.C.4-A. FOOTNOTES

CARDINAL rule of the track writers' guild in an Olympic year: Cherchez la Olympique Significance! . . . If that isn't French, send your complaints to Commissioner Bushnell . . . The I.C.4-A. has an unbeatable record in the Olympics (track and field). It has never failed to produce an Olympic champion from its own roster of champions, past, present or future, in any Olympiad . . . They were Tom Burke, W. W. Hoyt and Robert S. Garrett in the 1896 inaugural at Athens, Alva C. Kraenzlein, J. W. B. Tewksbury, Maxey Long, George W. Orton, I. K. Baxter, Myer Prinstein and R. Sheldon in 1900; Sam Jones and Prinstein in 1904; A. C. Gilbert in 1908 at London; Ralph Craig, Carl Reidpath, Ted Meredith and Harry Babcock in 1912; Allen Woodring, Frank Foss and Dick Landon in 1920; Bud Houser and Fred Tootell in 1924; Ray Barbuti (now an E.I.F.A. football official), Sabin W. Carr, Robert W. King and Dr. Houser in 1928; Eddie Tolan, Bill Carr, Bill Miller, Leo Sexton and John F. Anderson in 1932, John Youie Woodruff and Ken Carpenter in 1936.

We cite the roll to remind the current I.C.4-A. crop of its duty . . . Also to note that the I.C.4-A. has never produced an Olympic decathlon winner . . . It's rude to point, but this points to Irving (Moon) Mondschein, N.Y.U. senior, 24 years old, 198 pounds, six feet tall, ready, able and willing. He's been National A.A.U. decathlon champion three times, but this in itself isn't a recommendation. Because Glenn (Flash) Morris, 1936 Olympic champion, and Jim Bausch, his 1932 predecessor, burst into decathlon bloom in their Olympic years without past experience . . . Mondschein was not one of the best ten decathlon athletes in the world in 1947, and needs to improve his marks in the javelin, pole vault and discus drastically to climb into the Olympic contender's class. His best in these events are 150 feet, 12 feet and 141 feet 4 inches, respectively . . . His strength lies in the following events (with his best marks)—high jump, 6 feet 7 $\frac{7}{8}$ inches; broad jump, 23 feet 10 $\frac{3}{8}$ inches; shotput, 47 feet 9 $\frac{3}{4}$ inches (left-handed) . . . Mondschein is one of the finest competitors Emil Von Elling has ever coached . . . Mondschein holds the I.C.4-A. high jump indoor record of 6 feet 7 $\frac{1}{4}$ inches, which he will have to defend with the jump of his life against William Armstrong Vessie, of Columbia (1943 record-holder at 6 feet 7 $\frac{1}{8}$ inches) and Dick Phillips, Brown's new sophomore sensation.

The I.C.4-A. Indoor Meeting is now 27 years old, and beginning to show its age . . . For the first time in the history of the indoor championships, Lawson Robertson (retired) doesn't lead his Pennsylvania team to New York . . . But the Robertson family is doubly represented in the

entry, with Lawson jr. in the shot put and 35-pound weight throw, and George in the 60-yard sprint, both carrying the Red and Blue . . . Showing no prejudice, Acting Coach Jack Glascock, of Penn., entered Jack jr. in the 60-yard high hurdles . . .

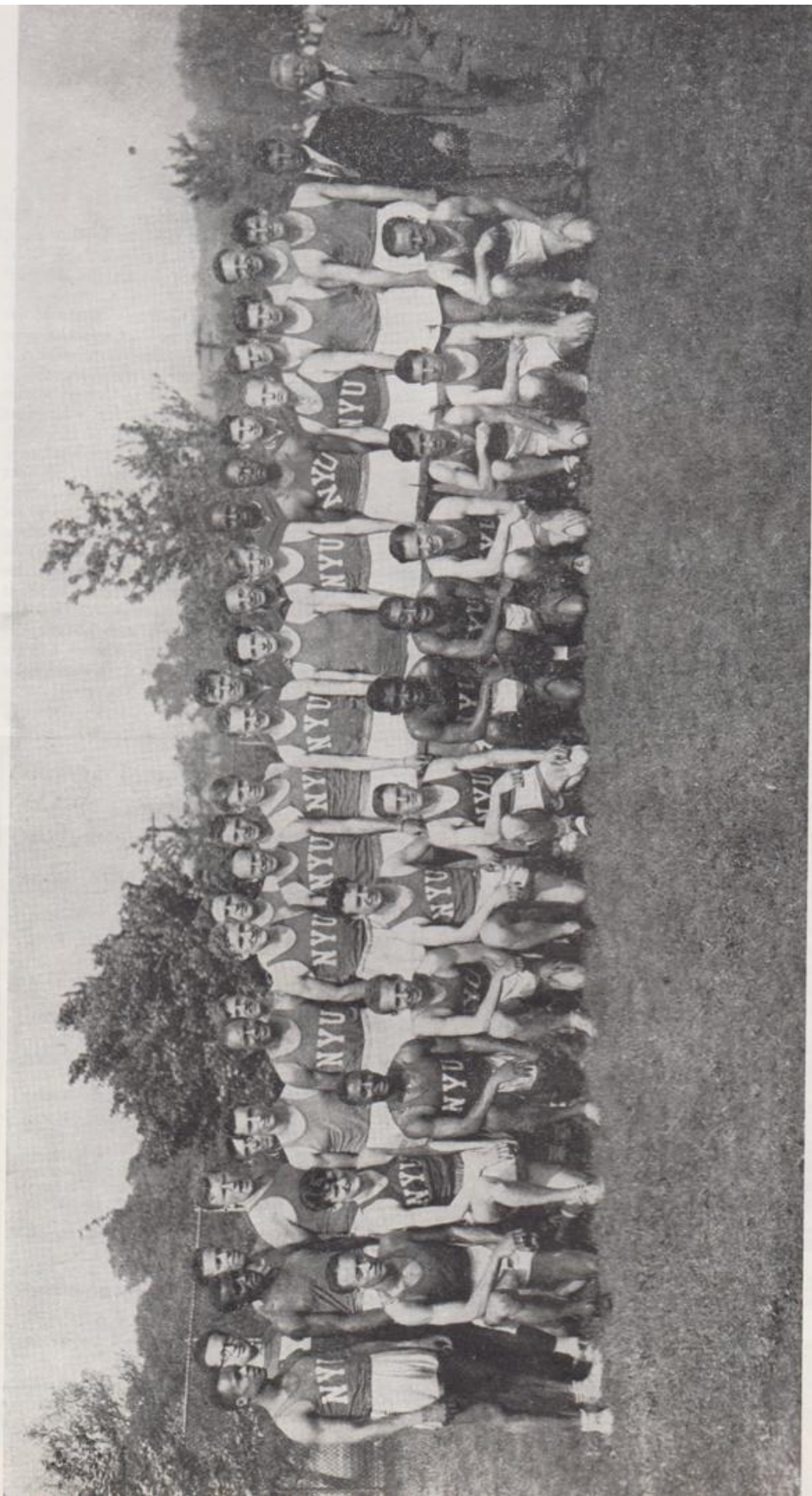
Sons of three Olympic champions are to be found in the I.C.4-A. entry . . . Commissioner Bushnell will not give a Cadillac automobile, a Frigidaire icebox, a Hoover carpet sweeper, a Philco television set and a pair of tickets to the 1949 Championships to the reader who first identifies them . . . Sam Felton jr., of Harvard, who has been heaving the 35-pound hardware close to record distances with tosses of 55 feet 7 $\frac{1}{4}$ inches, 55 feet 11 $\frac{1}{2}$ inches, 56 feet 10 $\frac{3}{4}$ inches, is not related to Sam Felton, the great Harvard punter of a generation ago . . . Felton is in an I.C.4-A. rut from which he hopes to escape today. In three past indoor meets he placed third, always third, with tosses of 46 feet 1 $\frac{3}{8}$ inches in 1945 for Dartmouth, 49 feet 3 $\frac{3}{4}$ inches in 1946 for Dartmouth, and 52 feet 1 $\frac{3}{4}$ inches in 1947 for Harvard . . . Felton credits Ed Flanagan, old-time A.A.U. hammer throw

AMERICA'S OLYMPIC METRIC MILE HOPE

Gerald Karver of Penn State Defends His I.C.4-A. Indoor Title Tonight

YOU who sit in Madison Square Garden tonight watching the I.C.A.A.A. championships, may see America's best bet for the 1,500-meter Olympic title at London next summer race to victory in the mile run. I refer, of course, to Gerald Karver, the defending I.C.4-A. indoor mile champion, who is favored to retain the eight furlong crown he won last March on this board track.

That statement stands despite the awe-inspiring reputation of Gilbert L. Dods, now suffering from a severe case of mumps in Boston. This disease is a virus infection of the glands which can have serious consequences for adults. It is possible that Dods will not regain his 4:05 mile form during the four months that remain before the Olympic Torch is lit in London.

The mile is an exacting test of physical condition. It is probable that a football, basketball, or baseball player could approximate his best form within six weeks after being hospitalized with an infectious illness, but to run an ultra fast mile calls for months of preparation and demands absolute bodily fitness.

I suspect that Dods is through for the 1948 summer campaign as well as for the winter season. Should the "Parson" be unable to rebuild his amazing stamina in time for the Olympic 1500-meter trials, then Penn State's Karver automatically becomes Uncle Sam's metric mile hope at London.

Incidentally, 1500 meters measures approximately 120 yards less than the Anglo-Saxon mile. To compute so-called "Equivalent Times", add 17 or 18 seconds to a competitor's 1500-meter clocking and you'll have a rough estimate of his mile potential. Thus, when Sweden's Lennart Strand tied Gunder Hagg's phenomenal 1500-meter World record of 3:43 last summer, his effort was "equivalent" to the four-minute dream mile. Presumably, however, Strand ran close to his limit for 1500 meters and it is doubtful if he could have averaged seven yards per second for an additional 120 yards.

Karver, his sinewy legs toughened by cross country runs over the steep grades of the Nittany Mountains which girdle Penn State College, won the triple crown of the cinder circuit last summer when he romped off with the I.C.4-A. mile, the N.C.A.A. mile, and the A.A.U. 1500-meter titles. That's what our English cousins would call "Turning the hat trick"—referring to a race horse which wins the Derby, the St. Leger, and Two Thousand Guineas stakes. An American counterpart could be a thoroughbred which won the Kentucky Derby, The Preakness, and the Belmont.

But enough of equine analogies. Karver must do his hoofing on "Shank's mare" and though he looms above the current crop of American

milers on cinders — Dods excepted — there is nothing in Gerry's performances to suggest that he is a potential Cunningham, Bonthron, Venzke, San Romani, or Zamperini.

Karver can unleash a blazing kick if the early race is not too strenuous, but he has yet to show a real lift at the end of a 4:10 mile. When Dods set his amazing indoor mark of 4:95.3 a few weeks ago, Karver caned in like a tower of toothpicks and trailed home last. For 800 yards Gerry clung to the Parson's coat-tails before nature called a halt. In his dressing room later that night, the Penn State captain admitted he couldn't take Dods' robot-like pace.

"I'll do better outdoors," Karver promises. "It's hard to breathe in the cigarette-smoke filled Garden. In the open air, I get my second wind easier and can adjust my breathing to a steady pace rhythm."

Among the Yankee milers whom Karver must beat in the Olympic Trials are Bill Mack (Michigan State), Quenton Brelsford (Ohio Wesleyan), Don Gehrmann (Wisconsin), Roland Sink (U.S.C.) and Bill Hulse of the N.Y.A.C. Hulse is the lanky chemical engineer who set a U.S. citizen's outdoor mark of 4:06 for the mile while chasing Sweden's Hagg.

Karver hotly denies that he deliberately slowed down on the last lap of the Baxter mile a week ago, when he won in 4:15. "If I seemed to be jogging," Gerry said, "It was because I didn't have anything left. I was just plain bushed. I wanted to take the Baxter Bowl home for keeps by beating Leslie MacMitchell's 4:12.3 clocking, made two years ago, but I couldn't whip up a sprint."

Coach Werner of Penn State hasn't hurried Karver this winter in his mile preparation. "No sense having the boy grow stale before the Olympic trials," Werner says. "We're bringing Gerry along slowly, hoping that he reaches his peak at London in August."

ORIGINAL TROPHY IS FINALLY RETIRED

I.C.A.A.A. Indoor Championship Cup, Eagerly Sought by Competing Teams for Over Quarter Century, Falls to Possession of N.Y.U. with Fifth Victory in 1947.

BACK in 1922, when the I.C.A.A.A. had already conducted forty-five annual championship meets in the track and field sport's normal outdoor setting, the Association decided to add indoor title competition to its yearly program. A handsome trophy was straightway offered as a prize for the rival teams, with the stipulation that it would be held between meets by the most recent winner and would become the permanent property of the first I.C.A.A. member college to capture the championship five times. That same cup, pictured below, was at long last retired twelve months ago tonight when, in the championship token's twenty-sixth year, New York University captured its fifth title on the boards and thereby achieved the full complement of five legs which were the prerequisites to outright proprietorship of the trophy. This development vitiated the partial stakes in the prize which had been established by ten of the other colleges on the Association's roster. These institutions were Manhattan, which had amassed 4 legs; Pennsylvania, which had $3\frac{1}{2}$; Army, with 3; Cornell, with $2\frac{1}{2}$; Columbia and Harvard, with 2 each; and Fordham, Georgetown, Penn State and Yale, with one apiece.

A new I.C.A.A.A. indoor championship cup is in competition for the first time in tonight's 1948 meet. Unfortunately, it is so new that it hasn't yet been photographed.

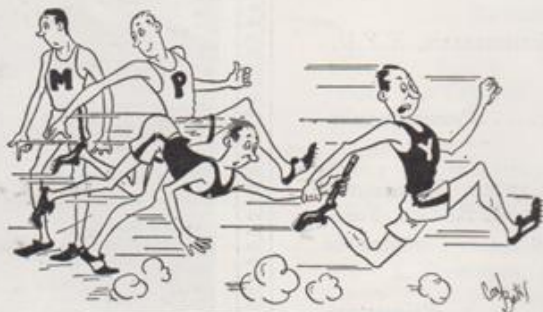

ters—Richmond, Uxbridge and West Drayton. At the former two, large R.A.F. camps will be utilized, while the West Drayton competitors will reside in an ex-Army convalescent camp. The three centers are geared to accommodate over 4,000 without crowding. Additional accommodation is being arranged for oarsmen and canoeists at Henley; for the yachtsmen, at Torquay.

Apart from the competitors and officials, the British have launched elaborate plans to take care of the many thousands of spectators. A special committee already has been formed, including representatives of the XIVth Olympiad Organizing Committee, the Hotels and Restaurants Association of Great Britain, the Residential Hotels Association of G.B., and the Creative Tourist Agents' Conference, and the sole duty of this body is insurance for the visitor of proper housing accommodations.

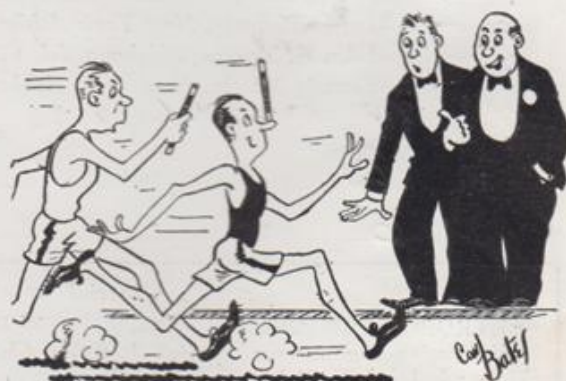
And, as a tip to local addicts who are contemplating making the Olympics and wish to reserve hotel accommodations, the requests should

be addressed to The Manager, Olympic Games Accommodation (Overseas Visitors) Bureau, 10 Mayfair Place, Piccadilly, London, W. I., England. As for the ticket situation, interested parties should make inquiry immediately at the U. S. Olympic Committee Office, Biltmore Hotel, New York City 17.

The most recent move of the Organizing Committee has been the establishment of a Transport Department for the convenience of competitors and officials in their junketing between playing fields and housing centers. On their arrival in London, they will be met by their own buses and will be taken, with equipment, direct to their living quarters. Throughout their stay, this transportation will be available for their daily Olympic travel needs.

So, it would seem to this pressbox observer, at least, that the British are doing a bang-up job of preparing for this XIVth Olympiad . . . that a little less backyard gossip and a bit more knowledge of the facts will help pave the way for a great revival of world athletics.

It may be unorthodox to end an essay with a question, but if the sportsmen of the world can't set an example, what can we expect from the U.N.?

Meanwhile, in Sweden's Jamtland Province, the probable Olympic 1500-meter champion is padding along the pine needle carpeted trails of that woodland resort. Lennart Strand, nearing his foot racing peak at 27 years of age, hopes to cut three seconds off Jack Lovelock's Olympic mark of 3:47.8 next summer. Whenever Strand spies a snow drift, he wades in hip deep. Len claims this strengthens his knee lift.

Strand has done 4:04.8 for the mile, but seldom competes at that Anglo-Saxon distance. He was a champion oarsman before he ever tried running and hated to give up crew for track. Rowing, oddly enough, stresses leg drive as well as arm pull, and hence his crew racing helped Strand as a runner.

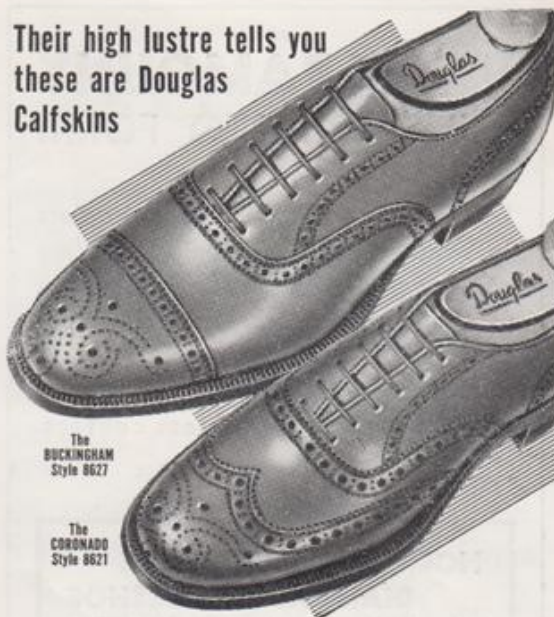
Tinkering with American made outboard motors is Strand's hobby. In his work shop at Malmo, Len built a boat for the "kicker" he bought in Los Angeles on his 1946 American tour. Strand is a piano player of such talent that he could earn a living on the concert stage, if he weren't so devoted to running. He owns an auto-accessory store and sells bicycles, motor boats, and auto gadgets.

Weighing 142 pounds, blue-eyed, blond-haired Strand looks frail at first glance, but his chest is deep and his stride is long for his size. Critics say Len can sustain a finishing sprint longer than any other miler in history. He can kick for 500 yards at the close of a 4:05 mile.

Following his expected triumph at London, Strand hopes to visit New York next winter and learn the art of indoor running. If Len ever gets accustomed to breathing tobacco fumes and taking banked turns that 4:05.3 indoor mile mark by Dodds will go by the boards!

paring for this occasion to become overawed by his crowning reputation.

So it is, too, with Pearman, who will have to qualify in a trial for the 1000-yard final. N.Y.U.'s big Reggie came within an inch of being knocked out in the IC4A outdoor 880-yard heats last spring by a runner whose name very few tonight will even remember.

In the mile, Karver will have no trial heat to run. But the IC4A eight-furlong race is not an exclusive affair, where the field is held down to five or six starters with unencumbered racing room for all. Milers by the drove, good and just fair, but all brimming over with hope and burning desire, will come to scratch. If Karver can fight his way through and around this bloodthirsty pack, he can return to Penn State's mountain campus aglow with the knowledge that he is a real champion.

That's the way it goes all through the IC4A program—sprints, hurdles, two-mile run, those extra-specially thrilling relay races, and the field events. In this meet also, there's none of that "all or nothing" philosophy that prevails in cup competition.

It's a battle to the last gasp for every IC4A place, for a single scoring point has enshrined

To continue the list of Olympic hopefuls: Reginald Pearman, of N.Y.U., in the 800 meters; George Guida, Villanova, and John Hammack, Army, 400 meters; Joseph Cianciabella, Manhattan, 100 and 200 meters; Gerald T. Karver, Penn State, 1500 meters; Stanley Lampert, N.Y.U., shotput, and Ted Vogel, Tufts, marathon . . . Vessie, at six feet six (his height, not his jump), and Cianciabella, at five feet two, are the Mutt and Jeff or vice versa of the I.C.4-A. entry . . . Phillips, a week short of sophomore status, defeated all the major high jump champions in the country when he cleared 6 feet 7 inches in the Massachusetts K. of C. games . . . Pearman was in last year's indoor Intercollegiates but he was an obscure participant then. He was shut out in the 1000, ran the second leg on the winning N.Y.U. two-mile relay that upset Fordham . . . He was just back from Tokio then . . . In winning the I.C.4-A., N.C.A.A. and A.A.U. outdoor mile and 1500 meter titles last outdoor season, Karver duplicated the feats of Bill Bonthron (1934) and Leslie MacMitchell (1941).

The Bulova Photo-Timer, a camera eye with a stopwatch, makes its public debut in these Intercollegiates . . . Pearman's Photo-Finishes demanded that such a gadget be built to take the strain off the judges . . . Vogel has virtually clinched his spot on the Olympic team by virtue of his third place (he was the first American) in the 1947 Boston marathon and his first in the National A.A.U. marathon. They are two of the three official marathon tryouts . . . All Vogel has to do is to place well up in the Boston marathon on Patriot's Day.

Give up? The three sons of Olympic champions in the entry are Tom Foss, Cornell vaulter, son of Frank Foss, Cornell, 1920 Olympic vaulting champion; Geoffrey Tootell, Harvard shotputter, son of Fred Tootell, Bowdoin (now Rhode Island State coach), 1924 hammer throw champion; J. Rodney Meredith, Yale quarter-miler, son of Ted Meredith, Penn, 1912 800-meter champion.

The Tobey's of Brown will outnumber any other family by one, anyway . . . Twins Jonathan and Joshua will run on the Brown two-mile relay, usually they're the middle-leg men, while brother Joel is on the Brown freshman medley relay . . . Cianciabella is the fifth man since the indoor meet was inaugurated to sweep the I.C.A.A. indoor and outdoor sprints, i.e., 60, 100 and 220 . . . The predecessors were Alf Leconey, Lafayette, 1922; Henry A. Russell, Cornell, 1926; Ben Johnson, Columbia, 1937, and Barney Ewell, Penn State, 1940. Barney did it only once. He was beaten in the 60 in his junior and senior bids . . . Harvard men stay in their class of original matriculation. That's why you'll find Philip Zeigler, '44, in the weight throw. He was a 49-foot tosser in the 1942 championships, but failed to score.

After twenty-six years, the I.C.A.A. had to shell out for a new team trophy this year. New York University took the last one to University Heights for keeps by beating Manhattan to the fifth leg, 35 points to 30 . . . Robert Simpson, Army sprinter and hurdler, is the son of Bob Simpson, of Missouri, who held the world 120-yard hurdles record of $14\frac{3}{5}$ seconds just after the first World War, and relinquished same to Earl Thomson's $14\frac{2}{5}$ seconds in 1920 . . . You can find a good backfield in the entry, to wit, Elwyn (Rip) Rowan, Army (sprint); Winfield Scott, Army (broad jump and sprint); Larry Joe, Penn State (sprint); William C. Brooks, Wesleyan (sprint), Bobby Deuber, Penn (pole vault); Skip Minisi, Penn (broad jump); Jim Fuchs, Yale (shotput), and Dick Cramer, Rutgers (sprint).



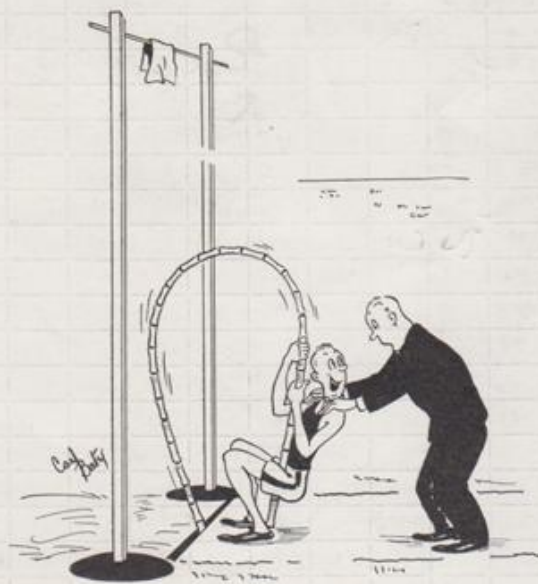
