Break Up The Wildcats? It's a Maryland Mission

The sons of critics who demanded they break up the Yankees lest they ruin the American League, and more of the same who cried that the Packers were ruining the National Football League, have now turned their destructive designs on Villanova's track team.

"Break up the Wildcats" is now their rallying cry lest Jumbo Elliott's habitual successes ruin the Intercollegiate Association of Amateur Athletes of America.

Well, the good old I.C.A.A.A.A. is not about to be wrecked because one team dominates its indoor or outdoor championships. (Some 66 colleges entered their campus track elite in this meet). The country's most venerable track organization (nearing its centennial in 1975) has survived the domination of its championships by Harvard, Yale, Pennsylvania, Cornell, Southern Cal and Manhattan, outdoors and indoors, and doubtlessly will survive Villanova's reign too.

In modern times, to be sure, there has been none so dominant as Villanova over so long a stretch. Indoors, Villanova has now won the I.C.A.A.A.A. team title 10 times in 13 years, has retired two trophies (needing five victories to lift each cup), and is going for its fourth straight to match its run of 1962-63-64-65.

"I don't know how you do it, Jumbo," Mary-

land's Jim Kehoe said in congratulating Elliott a year ago. "Damned if I do."

Kehoe knows. He is the only one in the last eight years to stop Jumbo in this meet; his Terrapins won in 1966. (Maryland was the only team to tame the Wildcats in the '60s in the outdoor I.C.A.A.A.A., winning three times in 1965-66-69).

Moving up to athletic director, Kehoe has turned over the "Stop Villanova" mission to Nick Kovalakides (as John Stewart reveals on Page 4). There is evidence that others are planning similarly. Fred Dwyer, who swept three indoor I.C.A.A.A.A. miles as Jumbo's pupil, makes his debut as Manhattan coach in these championships. Watch for a duel between master and pupil in the near future.

Regarding Kehoe's wonderment on how Jumbo does it, the record shows that Villanova generally does it with first-place talent. The 'Cats have a 15-year gold streak going in this meet. (Manhattan's 18-year gold streak ended in 1969). The last time Villanova was shut out of first place was in 1954, the year it won the non-scoring freshman medley relay for the first of seven times. The team title most often goes with the gold. In 1957 (a Ron Delany year), Villanova won six of the 13 varsity events. No one else ever did that. Three times—in 1956-68-69—Villanova took five firsts and lost the 1956 team title to Manhattan. Five times Villanova has won four firsts in this meet. It has won in every event except the weight throw.

For all this Villanova dominance, the vitality of the I.C.A.A.A.A. championships remains undiluted. Each year is a new year to challenge Jumbo and his 'Cats.'

Is this the year that someone—meaning Maryland—will stop Villanova?

"I do think that this is the best string of runners Jumbo has ever had," mused Jim Tuppeny. He is an expert on the subject. He was Elliott's aid through the Villanova glory years, and now as Pennsylvania's coach he beefs up the Quakers and keeps an eye on what's doing down the Lancaster pike.

Tuppeny was musing about Marty Liquori, Dick Buerkle, Chris Mason, Dave Wright, Donal Walsh, Andy O'Reilly, et. al. in the distance events. And Larry James, Hardge Davis, Lamotte Hyman and Greg Govan in the quarter. Actually, as a group, in competition this winter, they haven't measured up as Jumbo's best. Not yet. Of the dis-

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48 Years Is A Long Time, But Why Not Make It 50?

Given 24 hours notice, it is conceivable that H. Jamison Swarts could sweet talk, transport, feed, classify and schedule enough athletes to conduct a major track meet. Without much fuss, he could also start, judge placings or play the Big Daddy role of referee as he will tonight in the annual IC4A indoor meet.

Dating back to 1923, when he became a managerial candidate for the University of Pennsylvania's team, Swarts has been associated with track and field for 48 years. The other day, he relaxed in room P-204 of the University's Purchasing Department, of which he is director, and calmly confessed this would be his final year as referee of the unique IC4A competition.

"I think this will be it," smiled Swarts, "Forty-eight years is a long time." During his long association with the sport, Swarts has emerged as one of the best, perhaps the best, organizers track has ever known.

Though he is perhaps best-known for enlarging the Penn Relays into one of outdoor track's classics, Swarts has a particular fondness for the IC4A meet.

"The IC4A competition is the only indoor meet in the East where there is a championship involved," Swarts said. "It's the team championship that makes it unique. When you talk about prestige, you talk about the IC4A meet."

"Normally, it's a close meet that goes down to

the final relay. And often it comes down to the positions of more than just one team."

It was custom in the early years of the IC4A competition that the senior manager of the host school's track team also serve as president of the track body. In those days, the position of track manager was only slightly below that of student body president in prestige. To gain that honor, Swarts had to complete a few laps—managerial candidate in 1923, assistant manager in 1924 and, after a year-long skirmish with another assistant, senior manager in 1925.

In his senior year, Swarts not only managed the track team and presided over both the indoor and outdoor IC4A meets, but he handled all the meetings of the intercollegiate group.

In a rare bit of repetition, Swarts in 1947 was returned to office as president of IC4A. He has held just about every other office in the association.

"I've seen every IC4A meet since 1922, when I was a sophomore in college," Swarts said. "I can still remember the meets in the old 168th Street Armory before the old Garden was available. It had a 220-yard layout without banks. Then we shifted to the Garden where the track was designed like a cycling track with steep banks. Running a race there was a monstrosity. They had to use winches to pull up the end of the track so there could be a sprint race held. And in the longer races, why you had to be a contortionist to negotiate the turns. You would go up over the first seats going high on the turns."

Sifting back over the years, Swarts finds it hard to select *THE* athlete who impressed him the most in IC4A meets. But Ron Delany, the Irish bloke who introduced cross-Atlantic recruiting to American track, is one of his favorites.

The Villanova great, who swept three IC4A miles from 1956 to 1958, was "my type of runner," Swarts admitted.

"He ran to win," said the veteran track executive. "He wasn't record-conscious at all. He'd double in events for team scoring and he was unselfish at everything he did. And he was a clean-cut fellow, too. He never popped off and there were no clinched fists, either. He was one of my favorites."

The other outstanding IC4A competitors include Greg Rice, the famed Notre Dame runner, and Villanova's recent mile standout Dave Patrick. "But

Ave Atque Vale; Or, Hail & Farewell

Tonight marks the debut of the University of Maryland's Nick Kovalakides as a head coach in I.C.A.A.A. track competition. His is the unenviable task of replacing Jim Kehoe, who has stepped up to the position of athletic director at the College Park institution.

Kehoe amassed a spectacular record during a 23-year coaching career at his alma mater. Not only has he won the last 14 consecutive Atlantic Coast Conference indoor and outdoor track titles and the last five cross country titles, but he has been the only one to break up Villanova's domination of I.C.A.A.A. track competition.

Maryland has won the outdoor crown three of the last five years and is the only college to interrupt a Wildcat string going back to 1960. Indoors, the Terrapins' 1966 victory marks Villanova's only setback since 1961.

Kovalakides himself is no stranger to I.C.A.A.A. competition. While a Maryland undergraduate he won three javelin titles, including a meet record which stood for five years. The Princeton (N. J.) native also competed in the 1963 Pan-American Games and served as an assistant coach at North Carolina State for one year before returning as an assistant to Kehoe four years ago. His elevation to the head job came last summer.

For Maryland to make another dent in the Villanova string of successes tonight it must find a replacement for some of the valuable field event points which accounted for all but eight of a winning 53 outdoor points last spring.

Twenty-two of those came in events not contested indoors — discus, javelin and triple jump — but Kovalakides is hopeful of making up some of the difference with promising newcomers.

This group includes juniors Tony Greene, a sprinter, and Ed Bowie, middle distances, and sophomores Vince Struble, pole vault, and Russ Taintor, distances.

Greene, a starting defensive back on the football team, clocked 5.3 for 50 yards in winning an open dash in Philadelphia, placed third to John Carlos and Ben Vaughn in the Millrose 60 and won the Boston A.A. 50 in earlier starts this winter.

Bowie, a transfer student, won the Washington

CYO 500 in his first race at the distance, while Struble has cleared 15-6 and Kovalakides easily sees 16 feet before long.

Taintor, a former New Jersey schoolboy track and cross country star, set the ACC two mile indoor record as a freshman, 9.00.8.

A year ago, the Terps posted 32 indoor points in finishing second. They return 25 of them, including pole vault champion Buddy Williamson, a consistent 16-6 this season; miler John Baker and high jumper Joe David (seconds) and hurdler Marshall Bush and shot putter Jack Hanley (thirds). Also available in the distances is two-time cross country all-America Charlie Shrader.

And how does Kovalakides feel about the situation?

"I believe we will be a contender, but there are some other strong teams to be considered. Certainly, Villanova must be favored, but Pennsylvania and Harvard are tough and Manhattan has come along very well this winter."

Although Kehoe is the athletic director, he still stays in close touch with the track team and lends assistance when needed.

The Multi-Miles Of Art Dulong

A year ago, Art Dulong couldn't shake the feeling that he was on a one-way street to utter boredom. He really hadn't lost any of his enthusiasm for distance running. Winning the race was still most vital. Yet, the old exhilaration he used to feel merely from running was missing.

This winter—and with rather incredible results—Art Dulong has changed and/or broadened his track philosophy.

The Holy Cross senior, who will be defending his I.C.A.A.A. two-mile championship tonight, has merely "unspecialized" himself so that he can now point for any distance event he chooses.

"Last year, I limited myself pretty much and it all got quite monotonous," Dulong commented. "I was in a training rut and bored last winter. This year I'm having fun again."

His fun includes a victory in the B.A.A.'s featured Hunter Mile late last month at Boston Garden in which he ran the fastest indoor mile—a 4:01.1—ever in Boston, and then a 50-yard triumph in the two-mile invitational in the Knights of Columbus meet in Madison Square Garden a week later.

"I like to run the longer races, and so I decided this year to try a variety of distances," Dulong said.

An IC4A cross-country champion in two of his three varsity seasons at Holy Cross, Dulong had never before run an indoor mile in Boston as a collegian and his coach, 75-year-old Tom Duffy, felt he not only deserved this opportunity but that he was ready to win it all.

"This fellow is something, I tell you. He's exceptional . . . just a tremendous boy," Duffy said.

"But he's been snake-bit in his three previous indoor seasons at Holy Cross."

Duffy would be so right. As a freshman out of Randolph, Mass., Art was an undefeated cross-country runner and indeed looked like the potential great all of the 50 college track recruiters had envisioned, capping his initial season by winning the IC4A freshman cross-country event.

However, he was a pneumonia victim that winter and was sidelined for the season. As a sophomore, he contracted mononucleosis and was again out of it, and last year in December he was smitten by the Hong Kong flu and so missed more than six weeks of competition.

Thus far this winter, Art has had no physical difficulties. "I feel great . . . just great," he said. "And my mental attitude going into races has been so much better."

Since winning the Hunter Mile, Dulong has been "discovered" by a lot of people. "I can't understand what all the fuss is about," he said. "I just happened to have a good night and won. I feel that if I race well and the body chemistry is just right I can win any race I enter."

"With me, I find that some days I can race well; other days I can't race my way out of a paper bag. You just hope for one of the good days in the big meets."

Actually, while his indoor career has been hampered so much by illnesses and therefore perhaps slowed his rise as a big-meet star, Dulong has long been one of the brightest runners in collegiate circles.

Art followed up his freshman year at the Cross with an unbeaten dual-meet record, then plodded on to his first of two IC4A cross-country championships. He established the existing record for the IC4A five-mile course in 24:04.4, winning by 80 yards.

As a junior, Dulong won the New England cross-country race in a record 21:48, finished second in the IC4A and National AAU tests and third in the NCAA. Then last fall he successfully defended his

Man against man long has held a fascination for everyone. Man against man, and both against the elements, has held such a deep fascination that it easily may explain the tremendous popularity of Western movies and TV shows.

It also explains the intensity of the track fan who rivets his attention on man against man, and both against the element of time—and, in the case of field events, the elements of height and distance as well.

The fascination with time never ends. The Bulova Watch Company's natural interest in time accounts for the presence of the Bulova Accutron Phototimer at major track meets in the nation, including all the principal IC1A, NCAA and AAU meets throughout the nation. It also played an important part in the Olympic trials of 1960 and 1964, and the Canadian Olympic trials of 1968.

That odd-looking green box perched high in the stands (the Bulova Accutron Phototimer camera) has been the court of last resort in deciding some very unusual races.

Whoever would dream of a six-mile race ending in a photo-finish, with two runners clocked in the same time by officials using hand-operated Sports Timers? It happened in the 1965 AAU championships, but the Phototimer proved that Bill Mills beat Gerry Lindgren by the margin of 5/100ths of a second.

Again, in the three-mile run of the NCAA championships of 1955, Doug Brown, of Montana, and John Lawson, of Kansas, ran so close a race that the fans demonstrated for their favorites in an effort to influence the judges' decision. The hand timers caught both men in the same time of 13 minutes 40.2 seconds, but the Phototimer showed Brown the winner by a fraction.

An even closer "Believe-it-or-not" was the very first meet at which the earliest version of a Bulova Phototimer performed—the National AAU cross-country championships of 1948. Bob Black and Curtis Stone finished 1/100th of a second apart,

with the Phototimer picture making it possible for the judges to declare Black the winner.

Unlike the hand-operated Sports Timers that Bulova, through jewelers all over the nation, supplies to hundreds of events, the Bulova Phototimer system is an electronic device that photographs both the runner and his time.

A comparison of these two timing systems inevitably raises the question: When does a race actually start?

Harry B. Henshel, Bulova president and timing adviser to the National AAU, has studied the subject for years. He says the answer depends on whose point of view you take—that of the runner, the individual timing official at the finish line or the Bulova Accutron Phototimer, which is at both the start and the finish line.

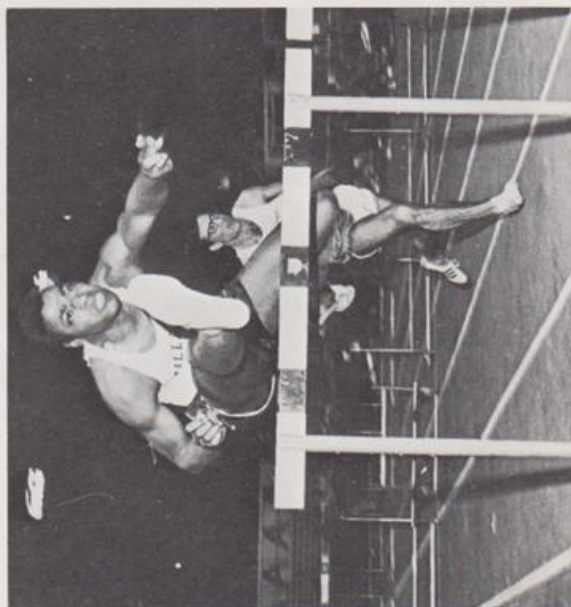

I.C.A.A.A.A. MEET OFFICIALS

General Information

N.C.A.A. RULES OF COMPETITION WILL BE STRICTLY ENFORCED BY REFEREE AND OTHER OFFICIALS.

Track measures eleven laps to mile, and 160 yards to lap.

Firing of revolver denotes beginning of final lap in all races.

In all races there is no penalty under rules for first false start, but competitor is disqualified by second false start.

In hurdle race competitor is not disqualified for knocking down hurdles.

In all relay races baton must be carried in runner's hand and must be passed to next succeeding teammate within clearly marked 20-yard zone, extending 10 yards in both directions from leg finish line.

Governing rules provide that, in races around turns, any competitor willfully jostling, running across or obstructing another competitor so as to impede his progress, shall be disqualified. If in any race a competitor is disqualified for any of these reasons, the Referee shall have power to order the race to be re-run excluding the disqualified competitor or, in the case of a heat, to permit any competitors affected by the act resulting in disqualification, other than the disqualified competitor, to compete in a subsequent round of the race.

Any competitor may be disqualified if, in the opinion of the Referee, he has in any way been aided by a coach, teammate, or anyone connected directly or indirectly with the team concerned, such as running along-side of a teammate, being stationed at various points near the track, or located near by any of the field events for the purpose of aiding or coaching a competitor after the race or field event has officially been started.

Each member college is limited to following numbers of actual participants in various events in Indoor Championships:

Two-mile run—two (plus one more upon approval of Executive Committee)

Relay races—one team

All other events—four

No contestant may be entered in two-mile run in Indoor Championships if he can cover distance no faster than 9 minutes 55 seconds.

In the weight throw, shot put, and the broad jump each contestant shall be allowed three preliminary tries. The first six men in the standing at the completion of the trials will qualify for the final. Each finalist will then receive three additional tries. All marks made, in both the trials and the finals, will count in determining the results. Each competitor shall be credited with best of all his efforts.

A nominee or qualifier who fails to compete in any running or hurdling event for which he has been nominated or has qualified will be ineligible for any further participation in the meet.

Competitors must be on time, field contestants entering enclosure five minutes before scheduled start of their event, and track contestants entering enclosure upon completion of race next preceding theirs. As soon as their event is over, competitors will kindly leave track and infield at once.

In each event 16 points are scored: 6 for first place, 4 for second, 3 for third, 2 for fourth and 1 for fifth.

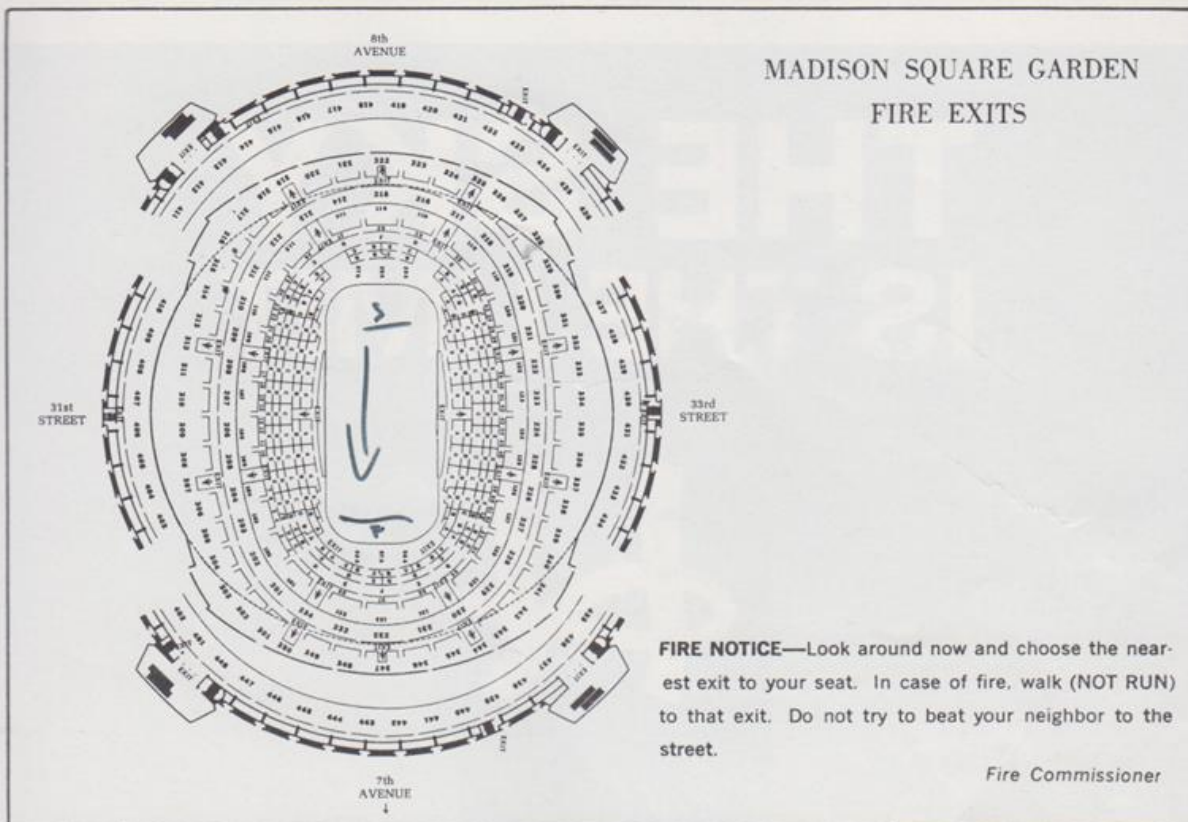

I have seen so many meets, it's hard to pick out the greats. I'm sure to miss some if I make a list," Swarts said.

Invariably, talk got around to Villanova's domination of the championships in recent years. "They have good material and are a well-coached, well-handled team," Swarts noted. "And they have tremendous team spirit that is genuine, not put-on. It's seldom that you come to a meet where you hear the student body behind a team like it is behind Villanova at these meets.

"And Villanova has quite a few foreign boys, which adds a little zest. Delany, for example, was well-liked and popular. He had a great student body following."

Swarts, in his career, has managed a Penn relay team as a senior on a trip to England in 1925, conducted the Penn Relays for 26 years, organized the Heptagonal Games in 1935, held various Olympic and intercollegiate posts and served as Penn's athletic director from 1929 to 1950.

"I like track because of its individual competition," Swarts said. "A man is out there on his own, except for the field events, where there is a minimum of equipment, and for the relay races. He either makes it or he doesn't make it alone. There are no aides or implements. Give a man a pair of shorts and a shirt and he's in business. And track has withstood the test of time. The first athletes in history were runners, weren't they?

"Life is a lot like track. It's a race to see who gets where first. You can't be struggling in life or in racing."

Swarts has little or no interest in dual meets. "You can sit down and figure out those meets on paper and nine out of 10 times you'd be right as to the winner. I prefer meets where the outcome isn't predictable, like the IC4A meet or the Heps.

"I don't think there's anything finer than being the champion in the Olympic Games, or the IC4A, or the NCAA."

What does Swarts think when he sees a shaggy-headed athlete running on the boards?

"Well, I think that type of fellow is in the minority," he said. "You don't see Villanova with any of that kind. Take Patrick. He was the right kind . . . always encouraging others. That's the thing Villanova has—spirit."

A veteran track official once said of Swarts, "Swarts knows more about intercollegiate athletics from football to track than anyone in the business. Few have had more experience in every phase of athletics than he has. His advice is constantly sought by those who are either new to the business or whose experience doesn't cover the time Swarts had been associated with intercollegiates."

Swarts plans to split from the IC4A scene after this year. But there may be some wise advice offered by his colleagues before they let Jim leave. "We'll tell him to go for 50," confided one fellow track executive. •

"It's nice to have the old coach around for advice," Kovalakides says, "particularly for the strategy involved in a championship meet. It is one thing to have the athletes, but it's another to know how to place them in events. The problem of who goes where is a vital one."

"There is a lot to being a head coach, especially since my background is in the field events. I must learn more about the runners and that is where coach Kehoe has been a big help. He puts in long hours in his office, but still finds time to give the track men an hour or two almost every evening."

Kovalakides will have an extra reason for making a good showing tonight. His athletic director is the current president of the I.C.A.A.A. Track Coaches Association and as such will have a ringside seat for the championships. A team title would not exactly make him unhappy. •

New England title and regained the IC4A championship.

Just before he went hors de combat from a visitation from the Hong Kong flu last year, Art sped the two-mile course at the Coast Guard Academy in New London, Conn. in 8:33.3, a New England record. Only seven men in the world have ever raced this indoor route any faster.

Dulong isn't cut from the same mold that seems to stereotype most track athletes, which doesn't infer in any way that he is any less dedicated. His choice of Holy Cross might serve as an example.

When he picked Holy Cross, he knew he would find no big-league track program or facilities. He chose it instead, for the curriculum it offered.

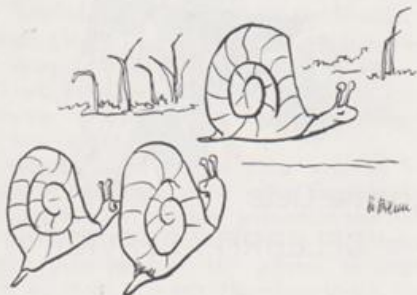
As a schoolboy, he mulled over more than 50 offers from colleges—including Kansas and Villanova. "It was frustrating at times, but I didn't take track into too much consideration when I was selecting my college. I figured I could run anywhere I went," he said. "And I liked what the Cross had to offer academically. It's a great school."

He has never regretted his decision even though his winter training program—by necessity—is a daily 12 to 20-mile outdoor romp over neighboring hills, on icy roads and in sub-freezing temperatures.

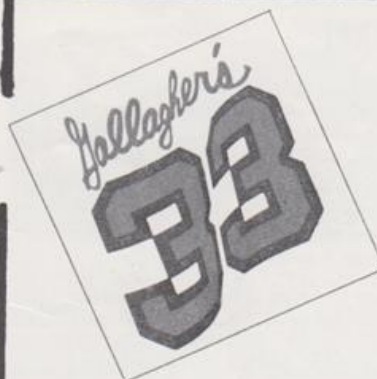
"I sort of like it that way. I love to look at the scenery," Art said.

When he tried the Hunter Mile for the first time, Duffy, his coach, reiterated a message he has been delivering since Art turned up in Worcester's Pakachoag Hill section. "Never underestimate him," said Duffy. "He's a winner."

tance men, only Liquori and Buerkle have won big races. Marty, the miler rated No. 1 in the world in '69, has swept everything except the race on the Philadelphia track he abhors. Buerkle, consistently under 8:51 at two miles, posted an 8:39.5 on the Astrodome 5-lap track and will challenge Arthur Dulong. James goes for his third straight 600 in which he set the meet record of 1:09.2 last year.

Mason and Wright are from England; Walsh from Ireland. Phil Banning, another Englishman, will anchor the freshman medley relay. It's a mistake, though, to think Jumbo doesn't have his problems. He has spent a year and a half changing Wright's style to eliminate excessive bounce, and speeding up Walsh, who is essentially a 6-miler.

Whatever the problems, the record shows that Villanova keys itself for top performance in this meet. In the relays, which often bail the Wildcats out, Villanova has the fastest mile foursome (3:15.4 on an 11-lap track this winter, 3:17.1 here), but its 2-mile relay has not been a standout except when Elliott massed Wright, Mason, O'Reilly and Liquori for a 7:39.4 effort in Boston. They'll split up for points, of course, with O'Reilly in the 1000, Liquori and Mason in the mile, Buerkle and Walsh in the 2-mile, James anchoring the mile relay after his solo stint in the 600.

Elliott, who leaves predictions to others, may get a point or so from Mark Edman in the pole vault (remember, Villanova was scoreless in the five field events last year), but he has no strength in the sprint and hurdles.

Is Villanova, therefore, vulnerable to a Maryland attack tonight?

About 11 p.m., I expect to have the answer. •

"For the runner," says Mr. Henshel, "the race starts when the sound of the gun reaches his ears and he reacts by beginning to run. For the official at the finish line, as much as 100 yards from the start in outdoor track, the race begins when he reacts to the flash from the starter's gun by starting his watch.

"For the Phototimer, the races starts with the flash of the gun that instantaneously triggers an electronic control attached to the barrel of the starter's gun."

Mr. Henshel emphasizes that, since the Phototimer reacts instantaneously while the human timer reacts a fraction more slowly, the Bulova time usually is a bit slower than that shown by the hand timers.

If it were possible, Mr. Henshel believes that a foot race, like a horse race, should start at a specific electronic point beyond the starting line. This would be the true beginning of a race. •
