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ICAAAAA Loses Two Old Friends

TWO ELDER STATESMEN of the ICAAAA, whose names are indelibly interwoven in the history of America's oldest track and field organization, have passed on since the last indoor intercollegiate championships a year ago.

John Terence McGovern, Cornell 1900, died on May 27, 1960, the day his beloved I.C.4-A. was holding the trials of its 84th outdoor championships at Villanova. Alfred Carlton Gilbert, Yale, 1909, who never used more than his initials, A.C., died on January 24. The former was 83; the latter 76.

One was a lawyer, the other a medical graduate who founded a multi-million-dollar toy company on a shoestring, but to generations of college trackmen who competed in the I.C.4-A. and served as officials, they were Terry and Gilly, as closely identified with the I.C.4-A. as it is possible for two former trackmen and Old Grads to be.

The obituaries in the metropolitan press covered their long and illustrious careers most completely. But they couldn't touch all the bases, particularly their lifelong hobby of association with and service to the I.C.4-A. Both had been I.C.4-A. athletes in charter member colleges, and they never lost touch.

Gilly was the more famous athlete, an Olympic pole vault co-champion, though actually he won the title all alone. It could have happened only in the bitter Anglo-American animosity that prevailed in the 1908 London Olympics.

Gilbert had tied three Yale mates for the I.C.4-A. vaulting title that year at 11 feet. He had set a world record of 12-6 in 1906 and boosted it to 12-7 $\frac{3}{4}$ in the 1908 tryouts. He also had an unofficial mark of 13 feet, though it was another Yale man, in what seemed a Yale monopoly for a long time, who earned official credit four years later for the first 13-foot vault. That was Bob Gardner, later national amateur golf champion. If there was a direct connection between Gilly's interest in vaulting and a long succession of Yale champions, including Sabin Carr, 1928 Olympic champion and the first 14-footer, and Keith S. Brown, Gardner's nephew and a world record-holder in 1935, it was no happenstance.

With a business in New Haven (A.C. Gilbert Co., makers of the Erector Set, the American

Flyer, and all sorts of toy and magic kits) and a 600-acre estate, "Paradise," in suburban Hamden, Gilly was able to keep in close touch with Yale track and Yale vaulters. A fellow who started covering I.C.4-A. championships 35 years ago learned a lot from the man addicted to old gabardine suits, rubber-soled shoes and pipes which, while talking, he absent-mindedly stuffed, hot ashes and all, into his pocket.

We digress, which is no difficult thing to do in a salute to Gilly and Terry. Oh, yes, about the 1908 Olympics. Edward T. Cooke, of Cornell, vaulted 12-2 in the preliminaries, which were conducted in two sections. Gilbert won the final at 12 feet and justifiably deemed himself the champion when he retired to the locker room. There, Olympic officials routed him out with the warning that he had to go on vaulting to match or exceed the 12-2 vault by Cooke in the prelims. Gilbert returned to the runway and cleared 12-2 for an Olympic record to save a half share of the title.

That was the Olympics in which the British officials wouldn't let Gilly introduce his new vaulting technique.

Vaulting then was accomplished with a spike in the pole's end. The creative, imaginative and progressive Yale vaulter had discovered the advantages of a hole dug in the ground, into which the pole, without a spike, could be lodged for firmer leverage. He got a shovel and dug his hole, but the officials would have none of it. Shortly, the spiked pole was outmoded, and the vaulters started climbing to heights Gilly had envisioned on a mathematical formula involving a man's height and his speed.

He was 5-7 and 135 in his prime, but a veritable one-man Council for Fitness all his life, developing a frail body to become a world vaulting champion, intercollegiate wrestling champion, star gymnast, and the best goldarned quarterback in Oregon before

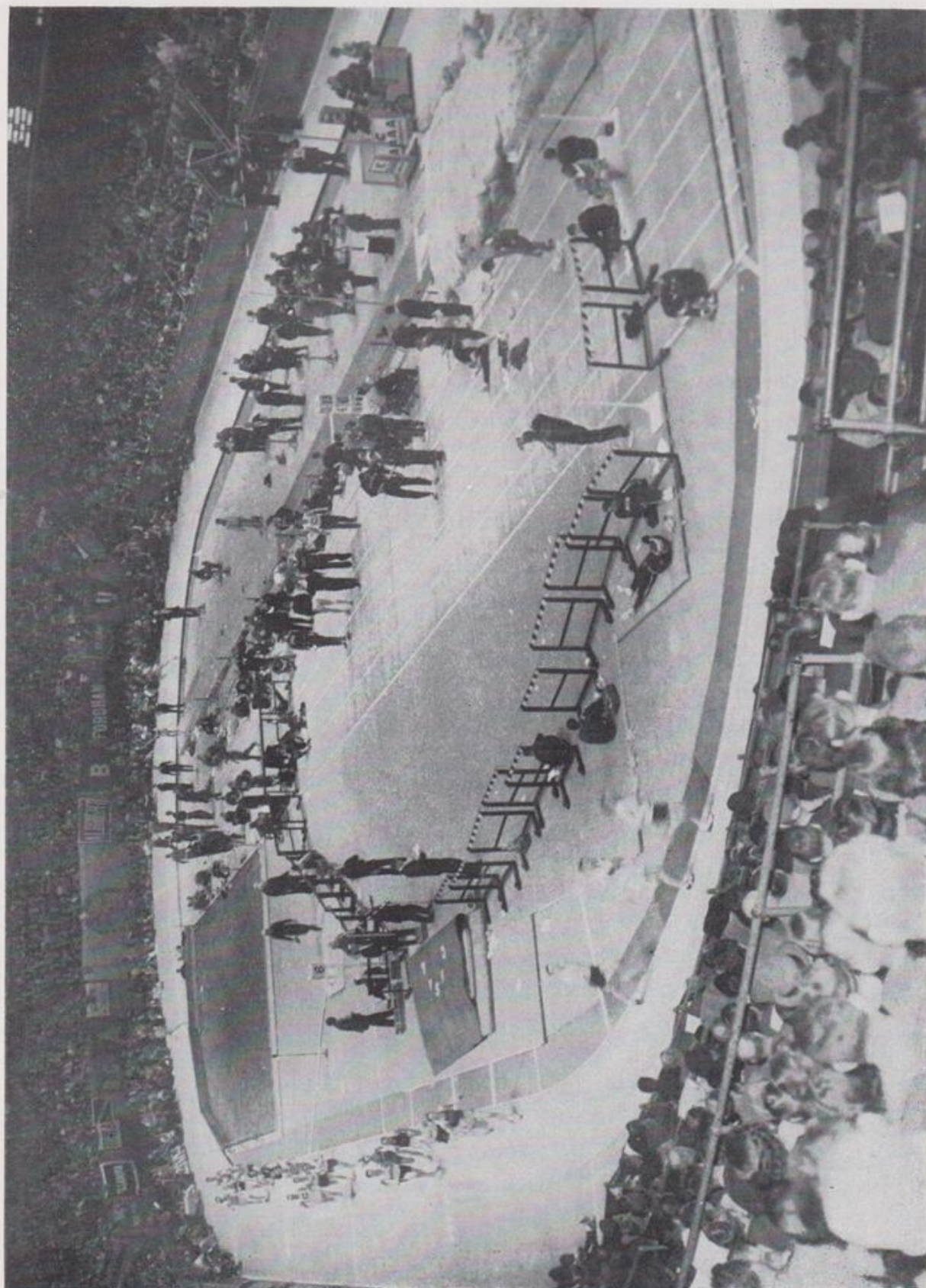
he went to Yale. Starting with his gifts as a magician, Gilly had become a millionaire toymaker, had stuffed his home with big-game trophies, had a private golf course, trout-stocked lakes and wild-game preserves.

Gilly was devoted to winning. But he couldn't win his battle to make the United States metric-

A SALUTE TO THE COACHING FRATERNITY

THE ATHLETES in today's intercollegiate Association of Amateur Athletes of America championships will speak for themselves. We'd like to talk a little about their coaches.

No track coach we know ever has been hung in effigy, deserving of such fate or otherwise. It's one of the more unsung jobs in the field of sports instruction. But, individually and collectively, there is no group to compare with track coaches for dedication to their sport, for articulateness, for conviviality and for all-around good-guyiness.

The ICAAAA, as the senior track and field organization, collegiate or otherwise, in this nation, has been blessed by having had some great coaches. Certainly, the spiked-shoe sport was enriched in having on its coaching roster such men of sainted memory as Lawson Robertson of Pennsylvania, Jack Moakley of Cornell, Harry Hillman of Dartmouth, Carl Merner of Columbia, Tom Keane of Syracuse, Keene Fitzpatrick of Princeton, Jake Weber of Fordham, Jack Ryder of Boston College and Harold Anson Bruce of Union, Lafayette and City College.

Others who have retired from active service also have been great decorations to the game, such as Emil von Elling of New York University, Pete Waters of Manhattan, Nate Cartmell of Penn State, Charlie Hoyt of Yale, Ken Doherty of Pennsylvania, Fred Tootell of Rhode Island, Carl Olsen of Pittsburgh, Leo Novak of Army, Jaako Mikkaala of Harvard, Art Winters of Lafayette and Matty Geis of Princeton.

Happily, the present crop of ICAAAA coaches fully measure up to the high standards set by their illustrious predecessors. Here's a few random observations about them, with humble apologies to anyone who may have been missed.

Harry Coates of Providence, formerly at Seton Hall, is the senior member of the firm. At Seton, his relay quartets ruled the boards and the world indoor two-mile record one of his teams set way back in 1942 stood until this winter . . . Tom Russell of Rhode Island was a crackerjack two-miler at Manhattan and won the ICAAAA indoor 3,000-meter title in 1935.

TOP SOPHOMORE—

YALE'S MACK THE PICK HERE

THERE WAS no question who the outstanding sophomore performer was going to be when the 1960 IC-4A indoor championships rolled around last winter. It was John Thomas of Boston University all the way. How high will he go taking over the meet record was the question.

But how about this year?

Well, we'll take Bobby Mack, the 18-year old from Newark who would be happy to try his luck in every race tonight if coach Bob Giegengack would give him the green light.

Bobby, weighing 115 pounds and standing 5-5, first appeared on the New Jersey track scene as a first term freshman in the spring of 1956.

"Sonny, how would you like to come out for track practice," said Weequahic High coach Joe Nerenberg after watching Bobby scooting around the gym in a physical education class.

"I'll have to ask my mother," Bobby replied.

A few days later Bobby did report to Nerenberg for practice and before the season was over the youngster had turned in a 4:56 mile.

Still a freshman the following fall, Bobby took over as Weequahic's top harrier. "Yes, I am a freshman," Bobby repeated to surprised reporters after winning the City of Newark and Essex County championships and taking the third place in the Group IV state championships.

Mack had only two more scholastic cross-country seasons as one summer school session permitted him to graduate in 3½-years with an average in the high 90's. Yes, he won the state championship in those two years.

Bobby's accomplishments in track were on even a higher level. Though indoor track wasn't held on full scale in Newark then as it is today, Nerenberg supervised his prize pupil's training. The result was that Bobby entered the 1959 National indoor interscholastic championships in

Madison Square Garden and brought the mile crown back to Newark.

The question — "Where is Mack going to school?"—actually became an annoyance to this reporter. The usual greetings disappeared in our sports travels. Being from Newark we were supposed to have the latest on Mack's intentions.

The invasion of coaches and bird dogs from numerous schools was in full swing for 18 months. Bobby and his mother stood up under the bombardment and were not rushed into a quick decision. On weekends during his final high school semester, Bobby visited a few schools and made his decision on Yale just a few weeks before graduation. No one was more surprised than Giegengack.

A wire to Yale for a short story on how Mack was progressing track-wise brought these descriptive words from the typewriter of Eli Oracle, Charley Loftus.

"While he has not turned in any terrific times for his mile and two-mile efforts in competition to date, Mack gives you the impression that he can get the job done on any occasion. Fast time efforts were out as he ran the mile, two-mile and relay leg triples to help win meets.

"A casual, relaxed runner, Bob has deceptive speed and plenty of stamina. This Eli performs with effortless ease. No huffer or puffer he, it seems possible that he is a descendant of that ancient Greek runner who covered some 26 miles afoot to announce the opening of the Olympic Games.

"While most of his lagging rivals finish the event in a state of near-collapse, Mack appears and is as fresh as the proverbial daisy."

Need we say more?

A month or so ago of Mack, Giegengack said:

"He is the best two-miler I ever coached."

Bob might be of a mind to add to that statement before the night is over.

Violet Coach Recalls Track Thrills

WHEREFORE is this meet different from all other meets? Joe Healey has a ready answer. "It's the ICAAAA and to any college athlete or coach that stands for the big one," he says. Healey should know. He has been both—a star runner for New York University in the early 1930s and then coach of the Violets, a job he still holds.

With that, silver-thatched Joe goes on a journey through Memory Lane to emphasize what ICAAAA means to him.

"The victories I remember most as an undergraduate came in ICAAAA indoor mile relays, first in 1932 and again in 1934," he reports.

"On the 1932 team, I led off, followed by Milt Sandler, Sid Schleffar and Harry Hoffman. We whirled around in 3:17.8 on a six-lap track. The meet was held in the Kingsbridge Armory, the only time the ICAAAA pitched its tent there.

"Two years later I ran with Harold Lamb, Les Williams and Hoffman and we won again."

By the 1934 race, the ICAAAA had moved into Madison Square Garden and this brought some vivid recollections to the NYU coach.

"The Garden then was using an eight-lap track which we nicknamed 'Kirby's Folly,' after Gustavus T. Kirby, a leading official of the ICAAAA," Healey continued. "Remember that one? They used to hoist the corners in order to hold the sprints and hurdles.

"The track had eight lanes, each lane being painted in a different color. There was an upper and lower track. You'd start on the lower one and finish on the upper. It was something to behold."

It wasn't long before "Kirby's Folly" gave way to the present 11-lap orthodox-type banked boards currently in use. But by that time Healey had received his diploma and set out on a coach-

ing career, starting as assistant to the then head—NYU tutor, Emil von Elling.

There were special thrills for Joe even then.

"As an assistant, I'd say the race that gave me my top kick was George King's victory in an ICAAAA indoor two-mile," Healey recalled. "I was on the track that night yelling out fractional times each lap George went by.

"For most of the race, there were five or six fellows bunched for the lead, with George right in the middle. It looked like a tough one. But all of a sudden, with two laps to go, King winked to me as he ran by, sort of signalling that there was nothing to worry about.

"With that he broke loose, sprinted away from the field and won easily. I'll never forget it."

In Healey's first year as head coach—1958—Mike Herman took the broad jump to bring an ICAAAA championship to NYU.

"I got a bang out of that too," Joe concedes, "but I couldn't help but feel that I had inherited Mike from von Elling and that he wasn't all mine."

It remained for the Spring of 1960, in an outdoor ICAAAA, for Healey to get his "biggest thrill, either as athlete or coach."

"Jimmy Wedderburn did that for me by winning the 440," the NYU bossman insists. "Jimmy was my boy all the way, coming into college when I already was head coach. It's a funny thing about that—you get a bigger bang out of developing a winner as a coach than out of winning yourself when you're still an athlete."

There's still the supreme thrill to come for Healey—that of winning an ICAAAA team championship.

And he's nursing a quiet belief that his goal isn't too far away. Did you see some of those NYU frosh phenoms—like Gary Gubner, Jeff Little and Paul Woodall—in action?

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General Information

Track measures eleven laps to mile, and 160 yards to lap.

Firing of revolver denotes beginning of final lap in all races.

In all races there is no penalty under rules for first false start, but competitor is disqualified by second false start.

In hurdle race competitor is not disqualified for knocking down hurdles.

In all relay races baton must be carried in runner's hand and must be passed to next succeeding teammate within clearly marked 20-yard zone, extending 10 yards in both directions from leg finish line.

Governing rules provide that, in races around turns, no runner shall cross in front of another unless and until he is 2 yards in front of his nearest competitor. Interference resulting from breach of this rule subjects offender to disqualification.

Each member college is limited to following numbers of actual participants in various events in Indoor Championships:

Two-mile run—2

(Plus (1) one more upon approval of Executive Committee)

Relay races—one team

All other events—4

No contestant may be entered in two-mile run in Indoor Championships if he can cover distance no faster than 9 minutes 55 seconds.

A nominee or qualifier who fails to compete in any running or hurdling event for which he has been nominated or has qualified will be ineligible for any further participation in the meet.

Competitors must be on time, field contestants entering enclosure five minutes before scheduled start of their event, and track contestants entering enclosure upon completion of race next preceding theirs. As soon as their event is over, competitors will kindly leave track and infield at once.

In each event 15 points are scored: 5 for first place, 4 for second, 3 for third, 2 for fourth and 1 for fifth.

LITTLE THINGS (LIKE SPLIT-SECONDS) BECOME BIG IN ICAAAA TRACK MEETS

BIG THINGS are expected at this year's ICAAAA indoor championships.

But, if history repeats itself the outcome might depend on such little things as a fraction of a point, a half step, a portion of an inch, or a split second.

Close finishes are the rule, not the exception, in ICAAAA races and in the scramble for the team crown.

For example, old timers still talk about Cornell's upset victory over Georgetown (by half a point) back in 1928, or the 1950 meet in which Michigan State scored 21, Seton Hall 20, Manhattan 19½ and Yale 19 1/10 points.

In last year's competition, when Villanova edged Yale 27 to 23 1/5 for the championship, there were at least two individual thrillers, both involving Villanova runners: Frank Budd's victory over Bobby Brown of Penn State in the 60-yard dash and a near upset in the 60-yard hurdles race between Leon Pras and the favored Bill Johnson of Maryland.

In these close races and all others at the 1960 meet judges had help from the Bulova Phototimer, an electronic timing instrument and precision camera that uses space-age technology to check official times and give a photograph of the finish.

Invented in 1948 and used at major meets (including the 1952 Olympic trials) in the early 1950's, the Bulova Phototimer was the center of attraction at one memorable ICAAAA indoor

meet—the 1954 affair in which judges studied the photograph for 15 minutes before deciding on second place in the 1,000-yard run. The result gave Yale the championship—19 to 18½—over Boston University.

The Phototimer was improved by Bulova scientists and reintroduced last year following another ICAAAA meet in which the outcome hinged on a third place in a hurdles race. It was Penn State's 1959 victory (by 17/36 of a point) over Manhattan announced 11 days after the meet ended.

In most races the Bulova Phototimer confirms judges' decisions on winners and checks, to an accuracy of 1/100 of a second, the official times and meet records which are recorded to 1/10 of a second on hand-held timers. It also helps unscramble the awarding of those little but all-important second, third, fourth and fifth-place points and sometimes shows up ties—resulting in the appearance of fractions of points in the final standings.

In horse racing between 1910 and 1935 when races were judged visually only 77 dead heats—an average of three per season—were called. With the introduction of finish line cameras at major tracks the total rose to an average of 350 a year.

With ICAAAA competition keener than ever, history might this year see a repeat of another meet that old-timers still talk about—that 27½-to-27½ team tie between Cornell and Penn back in 1930.

minded in track. Well, not completely. He liked indoor track as a winter substitute, but he always said the only way to compare the world's athletes was in outdoor competition, where tracks were uniform. He was the leading American advocate of conversion to the metric system, so that our athletes could be compared with the best in identical distances. He wrote the definitive brochure on the subject in leading the metric fight in the A.A.U. and I.C.A.A.A.

Under his urging, they adopted the metric system in 1933, following the Los Angeles Olympics. The noble experiment lasted four years in the I.C.4-A., 20 years in the A.A.U. It wasn't a lost cause for Gilly; the A.A.U. outdoor championships are held in meters every Olympic year and, at the discretion of the track committees, may be held in meters any year.

Terry McGovern was a lifelong associate of Gilly's in I.C.4-A. affairs, particularly in those years when the alumni advised the undergraduate organization. Terry, as a lawyer, was the Father of the Constitution when the I.C.4-A. was reorganized to represent the college athletic associations directly. At the same time in 1938 he set up the Central Office for the conduct of the numerous eastern intercollegiate sports groups which grew into the largest of all college sport conferences, the Eastern College Athletic Conference, under Commissioner Asa S. Bushnell.

In amateur sports, Terry was The Counsellor, not only for the I.C.4-A. and the E.C.A.C. but also, for life, for the United States Olympic Association. As a boy who ran away from home to join the circus, who went to school in Cooperstown and naturally threw the first curve on a Cooperstown diamond in 1889, and became an attorney for the Engravers' Union, an author, a prolific writer, a counsel to the New York Police Commissioner, president of the New York City Baseball Federation and Gramercy Boys Club, Terry McGovern had a great variety of interests and received numerous awards, topped by the Bowditch Award from the Sportsmanship Brotherhood in 1950.

Terry also loved parties. He could play the violin at least as good as Jack Benny and often did. He was the prime spirit in those I.C.4-A. Veterans Association gatherings which made the I.C.4-A. championships in Harvard Stadium, Franklin Field and New York a social as well as a sport delight. The last time the Olympic team in a body went to the Olympics by chartered ship, in 1948, Terry of course ran the ship's concert and gala by and for the Olympians.

Terry never was a champion distance runner, as his obit said, but it was distinction enough that he was one of Jack Moakley's harriers the first year Moakley came to Cornell. His interest in track never flagged thereafter. One of his pet projects was international intercollegiate athletics; he helped organize the Princeton-Cornell, then Penn-Cornell biennial meets with Oxford-Cambridge.

The last annual meeting of the E.C.A.C. passed a resolution: "We are here standing for a few moments in devoted memory to one of the most beloved men ever associated with amateur athletics, John Terence McGovern. Above all other benefactors, he contributed hours of his time, gave of his legal talents, his energies, his vast experience, to intercollegiate and Olympic matters. . . . A wise counsellor, a witty companion, vivid and eloquent, warm friend to all of us. We pay fond tribute to Terry McGovern and pray fervently his memory may be kept alive."

The Rt. Hon. Philip Noel-Baker, M.P., a Nobel Prize winner, echoed the sentiment for British athletes. He never got the chance to tell Terry that he had been made Honorary Member of the Achilles Club, composed of Oxford and Cambridge athletes, in recognition of his efforts in promoting the international college meets. The M.P. said it would be a great satisfaction to members of the Achilles Club and to all athletes in Great Britain if this item were published.

KEYSTONE STATE STARS HOLD SPRINT MONOPOLY

Maybe one of those Congressional investigating committees which periodically explore the area of sports ought to look into the monopolistic stranglehold of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in ICAAAA sprinting circles.

In the last seven years, runners from five Pennsylvania colleges have won the ICAAAA 60-yard sprint six times. But that's not all: representatives of the Keystone State have been second all seven years—and third three times in the last five.

There's no let-up in sight. Three Pennsylvanians stand out as the class of the 1961 indoor field. They are Olympian Frank Budd of Villanova, Bobby Brown of Penn State and Paul Drayton of Villanova, who finished in the order named last year. Few experts will pick against them to take the top three spots tonight.

Chief competition is expected to be furnished by Jay Luck of Yale, John Fernandez of Manhattan, Jerry Fitzpatrick of Notre Dame, Don Voorheis and Zach Ford of Michigan State, Ken Melrose of Princeton and Joe Almaguer of Army.

Considering that there are 65 eligible colleges in the ICAAAA set from 16 states and the District of Columbia, Pennsylvania's sprint domination is remarkable.

The five institutions that have engineered this runaway are Villanova, Pennsylvania, Penn State, Pittsburgh and La Salle. The only breakthrough came in 1957 when Dave Sime of Duke defeated George Sydnor of Villanova for the title.

Villanova has won the 60 the last three years—Ed Collymore scoring in 1958 and 1959, and Budd last year. Johnny Haines of Penn was the victor in 1954-55-56.

Art Pollard of Penn State trailed Haines in 1954 and 1955. Sydnor was second to Haines in '56 and to Sime in '57. Brown was runnerup to Collymore in '59 as well as to Budd last year.

Other Pennsylvania runners who have finished in point-scoring positions over the seven years: Alan Kline of Penn, 4th in 1954; Herb Carper of Pitt, 3d in 1956; Carper 5th, and Ira Davis of LaSalle 4th in 1957; Davis 4th in 1958; Mel Barnwell of Pitt, 3d in 1959; Drayton, 3d in 1960.

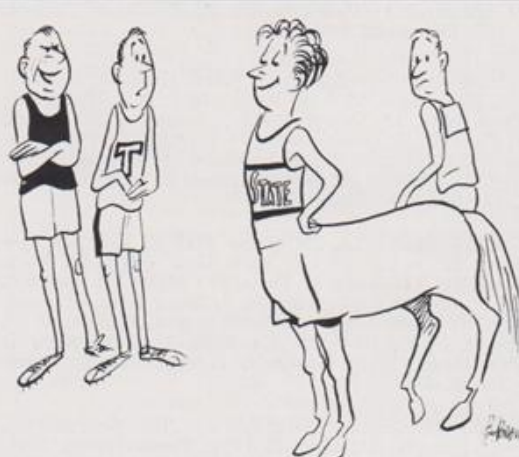
On total points for the seven years (scored 5-4-3-2-1 for first to fifth places), the five Pennsylvania colleges have outscored the rest of the 65 I.C.4-A members by 74 points to 30. Individually, Villanova scored 26 sprint points, Penn 17, Penn State 16, Pitt 11 and LaSalle 4.

Outdoors, the story's much the same. Pennsylvania sprinters have captured the I.C.4-A 100-yard dash in each of the last seven years, and the I.C.4-A 220 in each of the last six. They've produced the 100-yard runnerup in five of the last six years and the 220 runnerup in three of the last seven. Pennsy flyers have been 1-2-3 in the 100 in two of the last three years.

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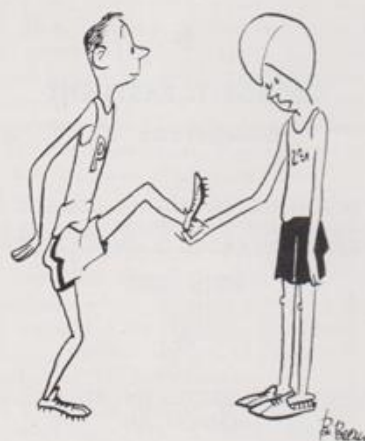
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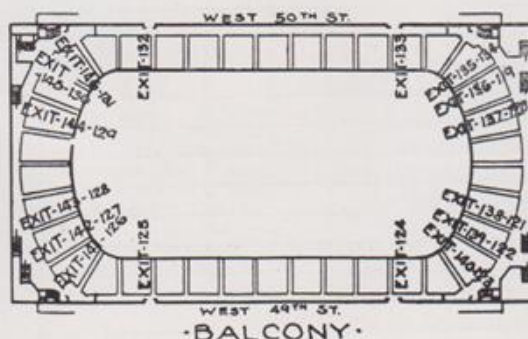
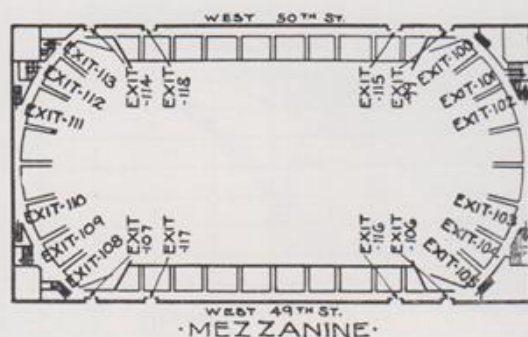
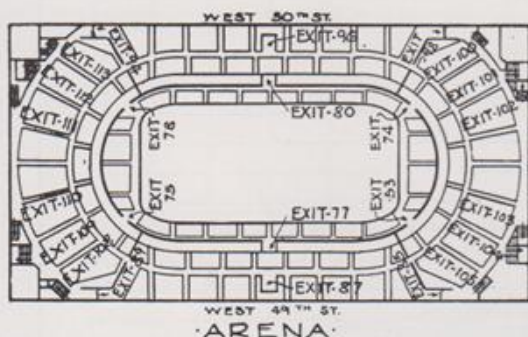
ASSISTANT COACH, U.S. OLYMPIC

Jim Kehoe of Maryland was a topflight half-miler and 1936 Olympian. . . . Joe Healey of New York University, also a 1936 Olympian, in the 400-meter hurdles, put in a full term of service with the New York City Fire Department before taking over as a full-time coach after von Elling's retirement. . . . George Eastment of Manhattan, a former Georgetown half-miler, is a full professor of business law as well as a molder of championship teams.

Bob Giegengack of Yale, who coached at Fordham before going to New Haven, operates Camp St. John's in Sullivan County, one of the leading camps in the East. . . . Frank Ryan, Yale's field coach and an I.C.4-A shot put champion at Columbia, also is a member of Yale's academic faculty. . . . Bill McCurdy of Harvard is a "do as I do" as well as a "do as I say" coach. On the Crimson's spring training junkets in the South, he often puts on track togs and works out with his athletes.

Carleton Crowell of Army sometimes doubles up as a football scout. . . . So does Bob Grieve of Syracuse. . . . Chick Werner of Penn State was a great hurdler at Illinois and, if you can't find him on the track, look for him on the golf course. . . . The golf champion among the coaches, though, is Jim Elliott of Villanova. Jumbo's official handicap has been as low as one. . . . Lou Montgomery of Cornell developed many high school champions in Buffalo before coming to Ithaca. . . . Ellie Noyes of Dartmouth, who has more, better ideas on rules than any I.C.4-A coach, perhaps, is assistant director of athletics at Hanover.

Bill Ward of St. John's coached the powerful Navy V-2 team at Columbia in World War II. . . . Boo Morcom of Pennsylvania probably was the greatest triple-jumper—pole vault, high jump and broad jump—in track history. . . . Earl Thomson of Navy won the 1920 Olympic high hurdles crown for Canada as a Dartmouth student. Tommy's assistant, Jim Gehrdes, also was an I.C.4-A hurdles champion.

Dick Mason of Columbia scored an outdoor ICAAAA sprint double for Pittsburgh in 1936. Jim Liebertz is director of athletics at Kings Point and Bill Omeltchenko, who helps with the coaching when he isn't teaching mathematics, is an old City College half-miler turned walker. . . . Howie Bulger of Iona ran the mile and half-mile for Manhattan.

Ivan Fuqua of Brown was a member of the world-breaking 1936 United States Olympic 1600-meter relay team. . . . Artie O'Connor of Fordham, a man of many off-track enterprises, has a son, Donald, on his current Ram team. . . . Irv Kintisch, Manhattan's field coach, was an I.C.4-A shotput champion at N.Y.U. . . . Jack Warner of Colgate was a star miler at Syracuse. . . . Johnny Gibson of Seton Hall, an Olympic 400-meter hurdler, has an I.C.4-A 600-yard champion, Bob Carter, as a son-in-law.
