A Friend's Memory

JUMBO ELLIOT: Legendary Coach, Outstanding Man

Jumbo Elliott was the best track coach in America. But he was more than a coach--as any athlete who ever competed for him will attest. Jumbo Elliott was special.

The legacy that he left at Villanova is reflected in his athletes. Almost without question, Jumbo's athletes were better for having shared the experience with him, the ultimate tribute to any coach. More than their times and distances, Villanova athletes grew in substance and style during their intercollegiate years.

There was a sense of loyalty about Jumbo that often was overlooked in the glitter of his impressive coaching record. Jumbo cared -- about the Penn Relays, about the IC4A championships, about those events and people that had been involved with his program when it mattered.

What I will miss about Jumbo was his smile and laugh. You could hear that laugh anywhere. It was unmistakable -- loud, fresh, lively. His vibrance spoke as much for his positive attitude toward life as his personal friendship.



The smile was a symbol. Jumbo invited you to share his joy of the sport. If the smile didn't succeed, he might even try a headlock on you for good luck. No matter that it was one o'clock in the morning.

Jumbo succeeded, even while most of the public believed he was a coach without other responsibilities. He was a full-time coach. But until recently, few people outside of track realized that he was a successful businessman who somehow could manage heavy-duty equipment and heavy-duty runners in the same day.

My memories of Jumbo are fond. I can still see him scowling over Dave Patrick's failure to make the 1968 Olympic team; it was Jumbo's protests in Patrick's behalf that probably cost him the head coaching position in 1972 and 1976.

Jumbo took amazing satisfaction from Marty Liquori's "Dream Mile" conquest over Jim Ryun in 1971. More than any single event in the sport in recent years, that race represented the ultimate tactical challenge of two runners fulfilling the promise of an event. Jumbo saw Liquori's willpower and determination as an extension of himself.

Then there was the time when Jumbo almost drowned during an ill-advised canoe trip in Oregon. That night, over dinner and drinks, he recounted the tale and the laugh was longer and louder than ever, even if the fright was genuine.

Jumbo was not a saint. He labored through the social unrest on college campuses during the late 1960s and early 1970s, and there were delicate periods of adjustments with sensitive athletes like Larry James, the 1968 Olympic silver medalist. But Jumbo survived and endured, and each time rival coaches began to count him out, thinking that his era had come and gone, he unleashed new talent -- Sydney Maree and Amos Korir from Africa, Don Paige and Mark Belger from New York.

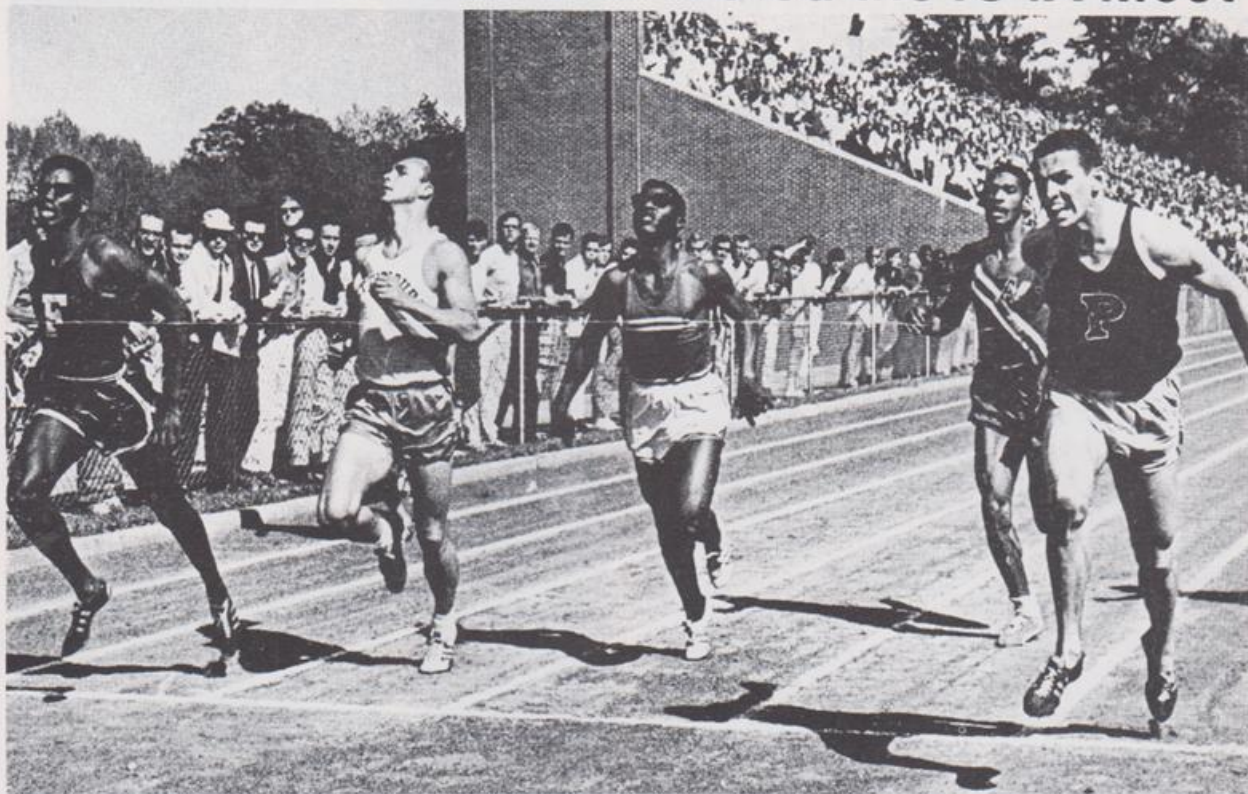
It is no coincidence that Villanova athletes became symbols of what the quality college competitor should be. Athletes are an extension of their coach, and Jumbo set a lofty example.

I will miss Jumbo Elliott--as a coach I respected, as a person I trusted, as an individual who gave more than he took. Jumbo will be enshrined in the National Track and Field Hall of Fame in Charleston, West Va. later this year. He deserves the tribute. Jumbo filled life's unforgiving minute with 60 seconds worth of distance run.

Pirate Record-Setting Relay Corps

Seton Hall University track coach John Moon calls it simply a "coach's utopia".

That's the way he describes his five sprinters that have put the Pirates back into the national track picture this season with some dazzling times in the mile relay. The best of the clockings came at the Penn Relays last month when the Hall foursome of Washington Njiri, Brian Denman, Mike Paul and Derrick Peynado ran a 3:02.96 on the Franklin Field course to establish a new collegiate record.

With Linval Francis subbing for Derrick Peynado, the Hall will be looking for another outstanding performance in the mile relay this afternoon at the 105th IC4A Outdoor Track Championship at Villanova University.

"I'm excited about the meet," said Moon. "It figures to be a very close meet and it almost turns into a chess match between the coaches. I'm just very happy to have five quarter milers that I can move around in the mile relay and still get some other points."

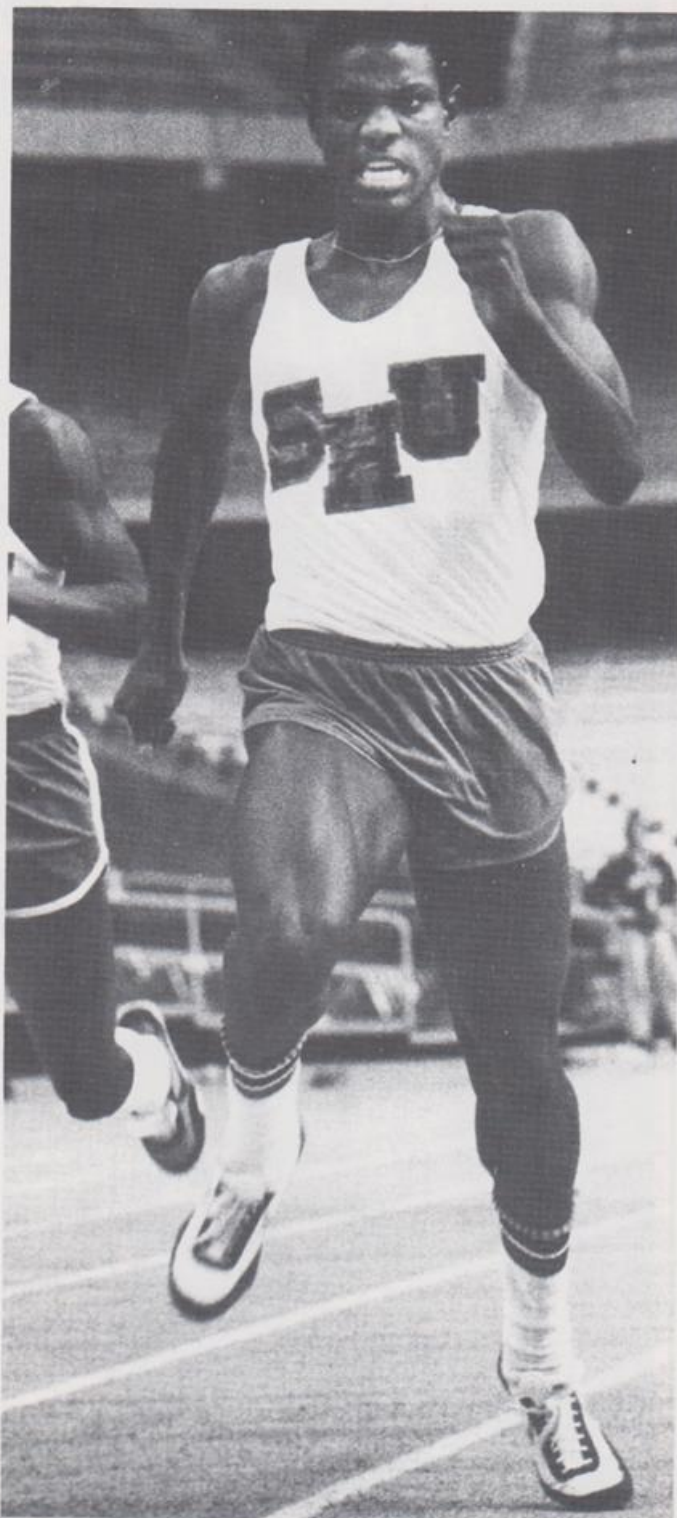
It was back in 1975 that Moon and his running Pirates were near the top of the track world. That year, the Hall pulled off a rare feat by winning the IC4A Championship both indoors and outdoors. The mile relay unit sparked those victories with convincing wins in both meets.

After those two titles, Moon has had to rebuild his squad. It hasn't been an easy task. His hard work has paid dividends this season with a squad that is extremely deep in the sprints and has won the BIG EAST Indoor Championship while finishing second by two points to Villanova in the Outdoor Championship.

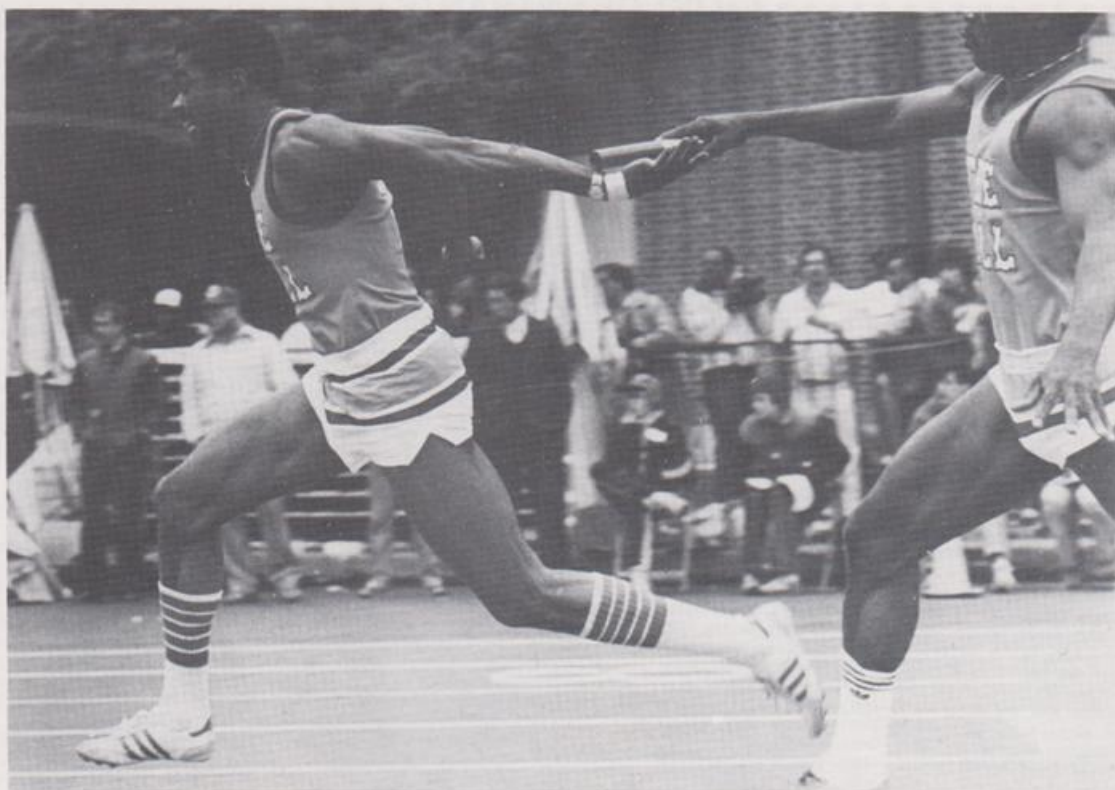
"This mile relay team is a coach's dream," noted Moon. "All my runners have a very positive attitude. They are not afraid when you start talking about a 44 or 43 second leg. They don't get turned off but rather they know it's something to strive for in an upcoming meet."

"At the same time, our practices have been very relaxing with little pressure. I guess that really shows that we have some class athletes. Obviously, I try to motivate them as a coach. But they all have a lot of self-determination and I know that if I'm not at a practice session they will strive to have a very productive practice. That's what makes them winners."

Paul, a 5-11, 180-pound native of Trinidad, is the only senior among the group. He has really come into his own during the outdoor campaign and had a 44.9 split at the Penn Relays when the Hall shattered the collegiate mile relay record. In early April, the Trinidad Olympian ran a 45.3 400-meters at the Dogwood Invitational in Knoxville, Tennessee.

A strong runner, Paul received a trophy for the "Outstanding Performance" at the recent BIG EAST Conference Outdoor Championships when he won both the 200 and 400 meter titles. He is looking forward to the final stretch of the outdoor season.

Francis can easily be classified as the surprise runner of the group. The native of Jamaica has showed steady improvement since the beginning of the year and ran a personal best of 46.7 in the 400-meters at the Pittsburgh Invitational earlier this month.

One of the runners with the most raw potential in the unit is sophomore Njiri, a native of Kenya. Despite his small size of 5-8, 130-pounds, Washington has shown tremendous power. He ran the anchor leg when the Hall won the 1981 NCAA mile relay title indoors.

Denman is the fourth member of the mile relay unit for today's race. The former high school All-American from Boys and Girls High School in New York City won the 400-meter race last year at the IC4A's with a 45.99 time. He is a deceiving runner who was the odd man out when the mile relay team competed during the indoor season.

This time Peynado is scheduled to compete in a number of individual events and will not run on the mile team. The Brooklyn resident has been enjoying a fine season and will be hoping to give the Hall a number of points to improve on the squad's chances for a shot at the IC4A crown.

Peynado was one of the keys to Seton Hall winning its first BIG EAST Conference title last February. He captured the 500-meters and anchored the 4 by 400 meter relay team on the way to receiving the "Outstanding Performance" trophy at the indoor meet.

Just about a week after the Hall had knocked off Villanova, Connecticut and Syracuse in the meet, Pirate Athletic Director Richie Regan arranged for a video tape of the meet to be shown to various students, athletes, alumni and administrators at a special lunch time reception.

The championship was originally broadcast by ESPN, the national cable network, on a delayed basis but was taped for the reception. The television premier drew rave reviews from the Seton Hall community, but it was obvious the Pirate runners enjoyed it the most.

"I could watch it all day long," said Peynado. "There's nothing like watching a Seton Hall runner breaking the tape as a winner. The mile relay was definitely my favorite."

The mile relay has been a favorite at the Hall for many years. Until this season, the foursome of Howard Brock, Orlando Greene, Al Daley and Charles Joseph held the outdoor school record with a 3:07.1 set in 1974.

"I'm hoping we get under the three minute mark," said Moon. "I know it's a tall order, but you have to set high goals. If the conditions are right, this is the team that can run that fast."

Navy High Jumper Leo Williams

Millions fantasize about winning one, thousands earn the opportunity to compete for one, but only a select few athletes actually acquire one. But for Navy's Leo Williams the realization of an NCAA title doesn't fulfill his dreams, it has just started them.

The sophomore high jumper from Muncie, IN doesn't mince words when asked about his future aspirations. "Competing in the 1984 Olympics is my main objective," Williams told writer Mike Wilbon in an interview with the *Washington Post* this winter. "I placed 12th of 61 jumpers in the 1980 trials and they took the top three." After his accomplishments this past indoor season, Williams' timetable appears to be right on target.

Ardent track & field followers identify his name with this year's NCAA Indoor Championships where Williams leaped a record-breaking 7-5¼, surpassing the previous standard set by Franklin Jacobs (Fairleigh Dickinson), whose 1978 meet mark was 7-5. Before capturing the NCAA Crown, Williams had already claimed first place honors in the IC4A Championships (7-2¾) at Princeton and in the Heptagonals Games Championships (7-3) at Harvard.

But Williams was making headlines long before he garnered post-season laurels. Reporters were swarming over Annapolis this past winter like bees to their hives. The buzzing began after an extraordinary pair of performances in holiday season invitational.

Williams waltzed into the national limelight on the night of Friday, January 2. On that particular evening, Leo shocked the field at the Runner's World Track Classic in San Francisco by skying 7-3 and outleaping among others renowned amateurs Dwight Stones and James Frazier.

It may turn out to be the single most important meet in Williams' career and he owes the opportunity to Navy's field-event coach Al Cantello, who called the meet directors before the Christmas break and offered Leo's services. "We don't need him," Cantello was told. "We have Dwight Stones and James Frazier and a bunch of others. Our field is filled. Besides, who is this Leo Williams?" Cantello finally convinced the directors that Williams would be a competitive leaper and that he would find his own way to get to San Francisco. The meet directors agreed to enter him and the rest is history.

Upon his departure from the Cow Palace that evening in early January, Leo Williams would no longer be labeled "Leo who" by meet directors.

A week later, riding the crest of his strong West Coast showing, Williams flew to Eastern Tennessee University to participate in the Eastman Kodak Track Invitational. The result: Another victory against proven amateurs and top-notch collegiate competition. His leap of 7-4¼ bested American indoor recordholder Franklin Jacobs and the world's top effort at that juncture of the 1981 season. Triumph also served to silence skeptics who might have discredited his Cow Palace performance as a fluke. Not too bad for a sophomore who was originally wooed by Navy as much for his basketball talents as his high-jumping prowess.

For Williams the road to an NCAA championship had its roots in the fifth grade. Although jumping throughout junior high, Leo didn't really begin to take high-jumping seriously until his junior year of high school. "As a sophomore I cleared 5-10 and I hoped of maybe making 6-8 in my senior year," recalls the 6-3 thirdclassman. "When I hit 6-7½ as a junior, I had to re-establish my priorities."

He identifies Steve Cookesey, currently the head coach at Ball State University, as the most influential person in his career. "He noticed my potential in junior

high and urged me to continue jumping during a period of my life when I might have otherwise stopped," he noted.

Williams gained some valuable collegiate experience in the 1980 IC4A Championships. In Philadelphia, the lanky freshman turned heads by becoming a member of the elite 7-foot club, when he leaped 7-3 to place second behind winner Franklin Jacobs, who prevailed on one less miss at the same height.

Leo's performance at Franklin Field was definitely a confidence booster as he prepared for the upcoming indoor season.

The season opened last December with a dual meet against VMI and the Navy Invitational. In both meets, Williams cleared 7-0 with ease and then relaxed due to lack of stern competition.

Then came the two surprise holiday invitational victories and suddenly the Naval Academy's Halsey Field House was the place to be.

An unusually large crowd showed up for the dual meet with LaSalle on January 17. They were there for one reason only. After the 118-18 drubbing of the Explorers in which Williams leaped a "mere" 6-10, because of the absence of competition hundreds of disappointed fans went away unhappy. Head Coach Jim Gedhres was quoted in the *Washington Post* following the meet, "My wife was mad at me because Leo took only one jump. She didn't appreciate driving all the way out here to see Leo jump just once." Mrs. Gedhres spoke for all chagrined Navy track followers.

A week later Williams didn't disappoint. In a triangular meet with North Carolina State and William & Mary he was challenged by Wolfpack freshman Mike Ripberger. Both athletes cleared 7-2¼ but Leo won on fewer misses. When asked whether the freshman (Ripberger) was going to be an outstanding jumper, Leo smirked, "He has potential." Williams and Ripberger had put on a world-class exhibition to the delight of the Halsey Field House throng.

In the next two weeks, Williams faced a demanding schedule. First, he continued his unbeaten skein against Princeton with a leap of 7-0. Then six days later and a mere 12 hours before a dual meet with Pennsylvania, he participated in the prestigious Millrose Games at

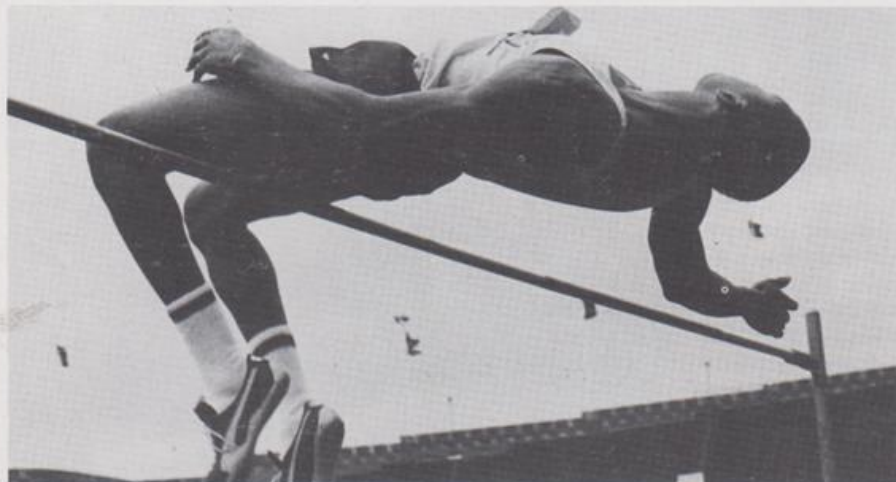
Madison Square Garden. It turned out to be the low point of the season for Williams, who jumped only 7-0 and finished a distant 9th. His only defeat of the year was a sound one.

"The boards at the Garden were very soft," observed Williams. "Also, it seemed as if there were a lot of dead spots on the floor." Although he commented on the floor conditions Williams didn't supply any excuses for his sub-par outing. He didn't provide a single reference to his brutal travel itinerary; which saw him leave after his last class on Friday afternoon and jump in New York City that same evening without sufficient warm-up time

himself mentally for the opening round of jumps scheduled for Friday morning.

"Your first jump in any competition, especially in a championship session, is very important," noted Williams. "It sets your rhythm for the entire competition."

Williams passed the preliminaries with flying colors along with ten other jumpers who cleared 7-1½ to advance to the finals Saturday afternoon. It was an unusually high number of finalists for a championship of this magnitude and it worried Williams. The final was loaded with top names like Milt Ottey (Univ. of Texas at

or practice. Remarkably, Williams was back in Annapolis the next afternoon to help the Midshipmen down the Quakers of Penn 78-58. He won the high jump with a 7-0 effort.

Williams closed out an undefeated season with wins in the Virginia-Manhattan triangular (7-0¼) and the traditional Army-Navy clash (7-0¼) in which the Mids prevailed 73-63. His contributions to the Mids' 8-1 dual meet record, the best indoor mark at Navy since 1973-74 were immeasurable.

Next, it was on to post-season competition. At the Heptagonals, Leo wasn't threatened as he soared over the bar at 7-3 and took home a new Heptagonals Games record to go along with his second consecutive Heps title. The IC4A's followed a week later and Williams was the champion again edging Bill Theirfelder of Maryland with a leap of 7-2¾.

The city of Detroit, MI was the scene for the 1981 NCAA Indoor Championships held on Friday and Saturday, March 13-14. For Williams, qualifying for the championships was a dream come true but also a rare opportunity that he couldn't afford to waste. Although just a youngster surrounded by the nation's best athletes, Williams kept concentrating on the words of his father. "My dad always said they put their socks on the same way I did. The way I saw it, I didn't stand a chance if I stood there in awe of them."

Williams arrived in Detroit at 11:30 a.m. Thursday morning with Coach Gehdres and the other Mid qualifier, sprinter Pat Bailey. After a workout at the Joe Louis Arena in the afternoon, he began to prepare

El Paso), James Howard (Texas A&M), and Ken Glover (Eastern Kentucky). Other top competitors included darkhorse Larry Weaver (LSU), and former adversaries Ripberger of North Carolina State and Theirfelder of Maryland.

If Williams was indeed worried, the anxiety brought out the best in him. Williams appeared shaky at the outset missing his first attempt at 7-2¼, while his chief rivals, Ottey and Howard, both cleared on their first jumps. Williams recovered and all three challengers cleared the bar without difficulty at 7-3. Howard failed to clear at 7-4¼ and Ottey barely hung on, passing on his third attempt. Williams, who had cleared 7-4¼ on his second attempt, clinched the title moments later jumping 7-5¼ on his third attempt. After watching her son set a new NCAA Indoor Meet Record, Mrs. Williams ran onto the infield, into the pit, and hugged her son laughing and crying with emotion.

NATIONAL CHAMPION! Williams smiled after the meet. "It has a nice ring to it."

For a young man whose father narrowly missed qualifying for the 1936 Olympics, the chance to compete for his country is more than enough to keep him striving. Williams commented on the U.S. boycott of 1980. "I was disappointed that we didn't go to Moscow but that was the president's decision. And he is my boss. But we will be at the Games in '84. I'm sure of it."

If this personable young athlete wins the opportunity to represent the United States in the '84 Summer Games in Los Angeles, you better believe he won't waste it.

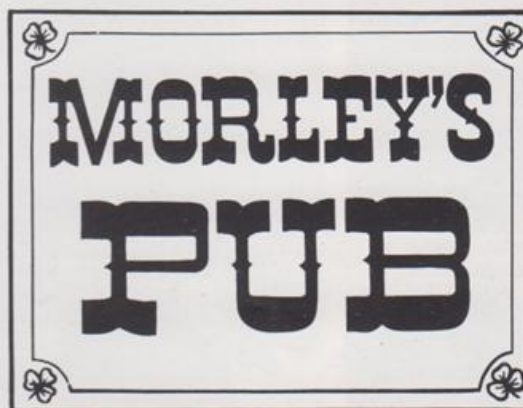

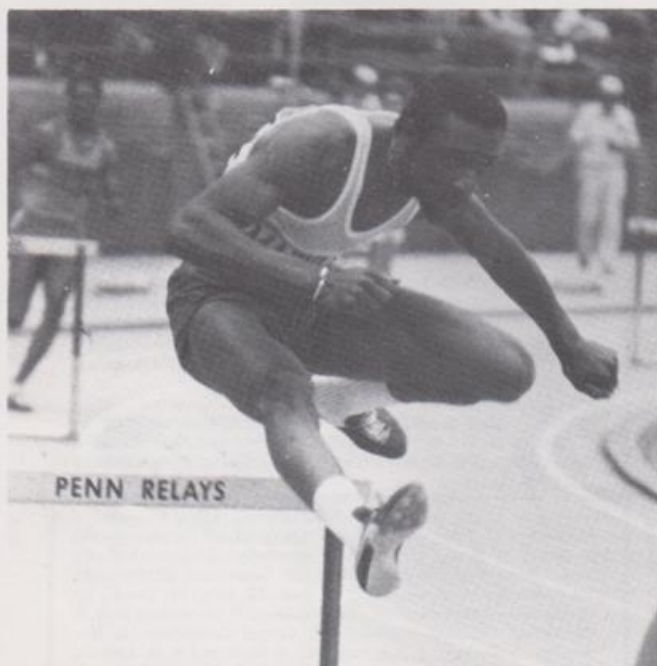
