

VILLANOVA EDGES MARYLAND

IC4A

Franklin Field, Philadelphia, 5-19(a), 20(b), rain most of Saturday, mild and cloudy Sunday.

It was almost a carbon copy of last year's meet. Maryland led by a point in '78, going into the final event, the 4x400. Running in separate sections, they couldn't match Villanova's time and lost by one point. This year the teams were deadlocked 114-114, and again were separated in the 4x400.

The Wildcats seemed vulnerable after winning the 1st section in 3:08.4 (last year they ran 3:04.5), but Maryland, running without Rinaldo Nehemiah (winner of the 200 10 mins. earlier), fell short, finishing 4th in their section and 5th overall.

It was an exciting team battle all the way, with disappointments and heroes on both sides. Unheralded Dave Ungarady edging Mike England for a point in the 800; John Burns, shut out in the 1500 heats, came back the next day and finished 4th in the 5K; Mike Corbin fails to clear a height in the 4J final and Dean Childs gets shut out in the steeple—both were expected to place high in their events; Dan Lasp coming through with an upset win in the 100.

Then, of course, there were the horses, doing extra work to get more points. For Maryland it was Nehemiah, forsaking the hurdles, but winning the 100-200, and anchoring the victorious 4x100; Bob Calhoun, placing 1st in the 1J, 4th in the 100, and also running on the relay; Dennis Ivory, finishing 2nd in both the 1J and 100. For Villanova, it was Don Paige, completing the first 800-1500 double in the IC's in 20 years; Amos Korir, 1st in the 10K and steeple; Keith Brown, 1st in the 400, 3rd in the 200, and a leg on the 2nd place 4x100; and Sydney Maree, 2nd to Paige in the 1500 (after a 3:35.5 heat) and winner of a fast 5K. It was college track at its best. Unfortunately, there were only about 2,000 people in the stands on Sunday to witness the duel.

The two teams have become so dominant in the IC4A that the 3rd place team, Manhattan, scored only 36 points.

John Gregorak, Georgetown's talented freshman gave Amos Korir a scare in the steeple while setting an American Junior (under 20) Record, 3:33.8. He broke Bruce Blackford's mark of 3:38.7, set in 1976 when Bruce won the IC's as a freshman.

All three had plenty left after the slow pace and Ross still had the lead coming off the final turn. It was a gallant but futile effort as first Paige, then Maree passed Donoghue in the stretch.

The previous day was wet and quiet during the trials. That is, until the 1st heat of the 1500.

Maree, looking for a good workout and a fast time, woke everyone up with a 58.1:1:56.2 opening 800.

Pretty fast, but surely he'll let up and qualify easily. Not Sydney, as he continued with 2:55.0

at 1200, and finished with 3:38.5, breaking Eamon Coghlan's meet record of 3:40.6 set in 1976.

and give it a try.

It was a fast pace, with Bickford, Korir, Gregorek and Childs quickly pulling away from the rest of the field. Childs was the first to let go, and eventually faded to 12th. It looked like Korir and Bickford would battle to the end while Gregorek seemed to be struggling to stay with them. With a lap to go though, it was Bickford who started to lose contact and Gregorek who challenged Korir. It was still close going into the final water jump, when Korir completely cleared the water and sprinted to a meet record 8:30.3, breaking Bickford's '76 mark of 8:38.7, which was also the Junior mark that Gregorek (8:33.8) broke.

Hillary Tuwei, hoping to take advantage of Maree's busy schedule, set a fast pace, pulling Dan Dillon, Mike Quinn and Maree away from the rest of the pack.

Maree and Tuwei moved ahead of the rest but Hillary was no match for Maree as Sydney gradually opened a large lead and finished with a 56.9 last 400. His 13:27.1 (07) broke Eamon Coghlan's mark of 14:02.9 set in 1976. That's two of Eamon's marks that Maree broke in this meet. The old SAfr. mark was 13:29.6, set by Matthews Motwarareu in 1978.

Villanova Keeps IC4A Track Title

May 21, 1979

PHILADELPHIA, May 20 — For the second consecutive year, the team title in the IC4A outdoor track and field championships was decided in to the final event, the 1,600-meter relay. And again today Villanova beat the clock and Maryland for the title.

The Wildcats, adjusting their order, of runners for one of the few times this season, did 3 minutes 8.4 seconds in winning the first section of the relay. Needing a faster time but without their star hurdler-sprinter, Renaldo (Skeets) Nehemiah, Maryland finished last in its four-team section in -3:10.9, thus enabling Villanova to take its 13th outdoor title.

Villanova's first sweep since 1971 of the three Intercollegiate Association of Amateur Athletes of America championships — cross-country, indoors and outdoors — came from the following: Don Paige's victories in the 800-meter run (1:47.50) and the 1,500 (3:43.91), the first such double in 20 years; meet records by Amos Korir in the 10,000 last night (29:01.3) and the steeplechase today (8:30.3); another triple-jump title by Nate Cooper and an amazing series of performances by Sydney Maree.

Maree, 22-year-old South African sophomore, ran a blistering 3:38.5 heat of the 1,500 yesterday, which was the equivalent of a 3:56 mile and a meet record. He finished second to Paige in today's 1,500 in 3:44.01, then returned 90 minutes later and set a meet and South African mark in the 5,000 (13:27.07), which included an outstanding 56.9-second final lap.

The first person to greet Maree at the finish line was Paige, who earlier had said that the two were "going for a tie in the 1,500," until Ross Donoghue of St. John's showed surprising stamina in the last straightaway.

Too Strong at Finish

"I thought I had it at the turn, but then they came by," said Donoghue, sophomore and Metropolitan Intercollegiate champion, who took the lead at the gun and wound up third in 3:44.11.

Villanova finished 1-2-5 in the 1,500, 1-2 in the 800 and 1-3-5 in a 900 that Keith Brown won in 46.56. The Wildcats' winning point total was 124, with Maryland at 116.

The Terrapins, who lost by 1 point last year (99-98)-, scored impressively with a 1-2-5 finish in the long jump, led by Bob Calhoun; a 1-3 in the 400 hurdles and Nehemiah's 100-200 double and victorious anchor leg in the 400-relay.

Nehemiah, the world record-holder in the high hurdles, ran the anchor leg of the 1,600-meter event during the Penn Relays last month and beat Villanova with a 49.3-second split and a 3:07.2 time. But the 20-year-old sophomore from Scotch Plains, N.J., decided to skip the hurdles and concentrate on sprinting this weekend. He won the 100 comfortably in a hand-timed 10.9 seconds and the 200 in 20.79.

Villanova's traditional middle-distance dominance did not go unchallenged. Besides Donoghue, John Gregorek, the Georgetown freshman from Northport, L.I., battled Korir until the final straightaway of the steeplechase and finished second in 8:33.8, a national junior record.

"I never expected him to be with the leaders under that fast pace," said Korir, a Kenyan, who let Bruce Bickford, the defending champion from Northeastern, set the early pace. "I had never heard of him. In fact, with three laps to go, I was more worried about him than Bickford."

Gregorek, whose best previous steeplechase time was 8:53, said he felt surprisingly good, bothered only by his lack of timing over the hurdles. "With lap to go, I thought I could beat him," said the 6-foot-1-inch, 163-pounder, who seems to compete well in big races. "But he pulled that last splint and -caught me off guard."

Matte was jubilant, smiling and arms outstretched, at the finish of the 5,000, after having pulled away from Hilary Tuwei of Richmond. He took victory lap and jogged close enough to the stands to shake hands with some of the 7,000 spectators at Franklin

"I didn't sense I had a chance," he said. "I looked at the clock at the start of the last lap, but didn't calculate; I really happens when you don't plan it."

Villanova knew it needed a fast finish in the 1,600-meter relay. So the Wildcats shifted Tim Dale, a senior and regular anchorman who had not been at peak effort this spring, and Anthony Tufariello, the sophomore from Hewlett, L.I., who had run second behind Paige in the 800. It worked. Dale ran 46.9 and Tufariello finished in 46.7.

The Wildcat dynasty, which has produced 36 IC4A championships since 1957, should continue. From today's point scorers, only Dale, Cooper and John Burns, a senior who went from 10th to fourth in the 5,000, are seniors. Coach Jumbo Jim Elliott already has signed two of the country's best highschool prospects, Carlton Young, sprinter, and Rodney Wilson, a hurdler.

Pyka Sets Shot Record, IC4A Continues Today

May 20, 1979

The downpour was nonstop, and, in an attempt to conquer a giant puddle that kept threatening to inundate the shot put circle, brooms were employed between every throw. The 16-pound iron ball felt slippery on Ian Pyka's fingers, and the footing was worse.

But the University of Maryland senior captain made the five longest throws in today's 103rd IC4A Track and Field Championships. Included was a 62-3 heave that washed away the oldest mark in the meet record book-62-1 3/4 by NYU's Gary Gubner in 1962.

"All I wanted this week was the record," said Pyka, who won his fifth IC4A career shot put championship. "I got it. But I'm not pleased. I wish it had gone further. Had the conditions been better . . .

"It affects how you cross the circle. You have to be careful you don't slip. I made a couple alterations in my technique. It still caused a lack of balance going to throw. But if you consider yourself the best in the East, that's the way you throw, regardless of conditions."

Manhattan's Manny Silverio (198-7, hammer throw) and Villanova's Amos Korir (29:01.3, 10,000 meters) were today's other winners. The inclement weather forced postponement of the long jump, in which Maryland's Bob Calhoun is the defending champ, and the competition ended with the Terps and favored Villanova tied with 10 points apiece. Sunday's schedule includes 17 finals as Maryland tries to avenge last year's 99-98 loss to the Wildcats, who won the 1979 NCAA indoor crown.

"Everyone knows what it means to beat Villanova and be number one in the East," Pyka said. "We've pushed them around a little, indoors and out. But it comes down to one meet a year, and this is it."

Villanova's Sydney Maree, who ran a South African national mile record of 3:53.7 this month, won his 1,500-meter heat in 3:38.5, 2.1 seconds under world mile indoor record-holder Eamonn Coghlan's meet record.

Most American track fans are not adapted to metric times, but Maree's heat translates to a 3:55.5 mile. The sophomore was coasting because he has the finals of the 1,500 and 5,000 meters Sunday.

Maryland's sprinters were also coasting, but Renaldo Nehemiah, who isn't hurdling in this meet, and Calhoun shared the fastest 100-meter qualifying time, 10.37. Freshman Chris Person was the quickest 400-meter hurdler in 51.03.

Pyka paid his way to Maryland for a year after transferring from Rhode Island, where he was an outside line-backer until a knee injury ended his football career.

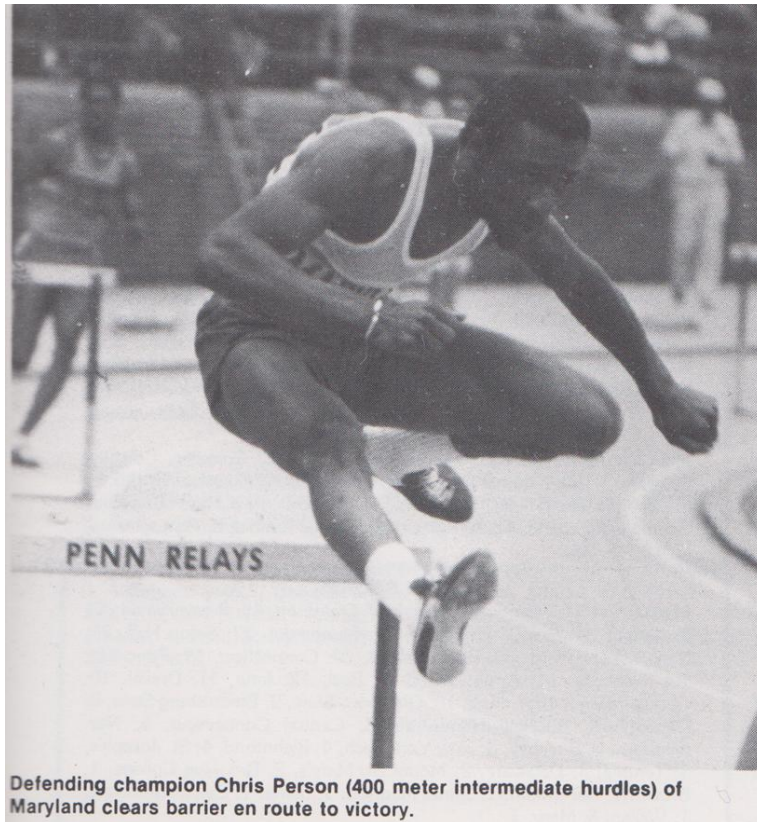
"I tore a ligament, and the doctors told me not to risk further injury," said Pyka, a 6-1, 235-pounder. "Rhode Island didn't have a good track program. I just wish I'd come here to Maryland in the first place, straight out of high school. Then I could have really set some records. My best was 53 at Rhode Island. I've improved 10 feet since I transferred."

Pyka's best, 63-7, is third among the nation's collegians this season, despite a near-total lack of competition.

"Motivation is the biggest factor in a weight event," Pyka said. "It's a lot of psych. It's not like a race when you've got someone to chase. You're throwing against a tape measure. When there's not too many people, and you're next to a highway, you pretty much have to do it on your own."

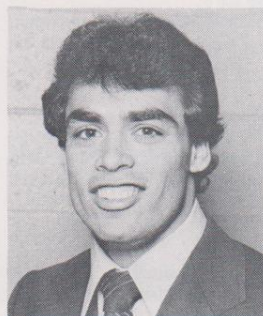
Because Franklin Field has Astro-Turf, the shot put is held away from the stadium.

"Next year, I'm going to take the year off, go out West, and try to make the Olympics," Pyka said. "It's somewhat demoralizing to throw in the East. I don't know why that (meet) record lasted so many years. I'm going to throw out West against the better throwers next year because I need that competition."



Defending champion Chris Person (400 meter intermediate hurdles) of Maryland clears barrier en route to victory.

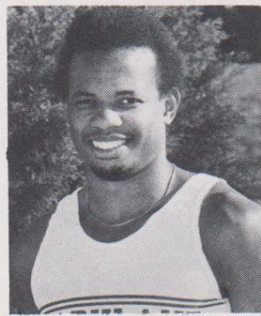
