VILLANOVA EXCELS IN I. C. 4-A TRIALS

Wildcats' Relay Squad and 11 Individuals Advance to Semi-Finals and Finals

VILLANOVA, Pa., May 27—Villanova loomed as the team to beat for the Intercollegiate Association of Amateur Athletes of America title on the basis of today's deck-clearing trials.

Coming up with peak performances on their home cinders, Coach Jumbo Elliott's Wildcats advanced eleven individual athletes and their mile relay team to tomorrow's finals and semi-finals.

Manhattan and Yale had nine qualifiers each, plus relays. Pennsylvania and Pittsburgh, with six qualifiers each, also were in front of Penn State, the defending team champion. The Nittany Lions had five qualifiers, plus their relay.

One meet record fell and there were other smashing performances in warm, mostly sunny weather as some 400 athletes from a forty-six colleges began their two-day exercises at Villanova Stadium.

Nick Kovalakides, a 20-year-old University of Maryland junior from Princeton, N. J., accounted for the championship mark by flinging the javelin 233 feet 2½ inches. That was exactly four feet beyond the old record Don McGorty of Manhattan set here two years ago.

Two Post Same Time

On the foot-racing side, Paul Drayton and Frank Budd, both of Villanova, turned in clockings of 9.6 seconds for the 100; Drayton whippetted the 220 in 0:20.9 and Willie Atterberry of Michigan State ran the 440, in lanes around two turns, in 0:47.

In an added open test, Tom Murphy of the New York Athletic Club became the first Eastern athlete to meet the Olympic 800-meter qualifying standard. The national and Pan-American champion returned 1:49.7, one-tenth under the required 1:49.8, in handily defeating his clubmates, Mike Carafitis and Ed Moran, in a special 880-yard run.

Villanova suffered no major competitive casualties and bobbed up with some plus values in the trials. The biggest Wildcat pick-up, perhaps, was getting Gerry Donini, its sophomore shot-putter, into the final of that event, which was paced by Joe Marchiony of Manhattan, who achieved 55 feet 1 inch.

Jon Dante scored another coup for the home forces by pacing the 880-yard trials in 1:52.6, two-tenths of a second faster than the clockings of Ed Slowik of Yale, Larry St. Clair of Manhattan and Fred Howard of Harvard. Tommy Carroll, Yale's favorite, was content to breeze home on top of a slow 1:54.8 heat.

Bain Is Injured

Yale and Penn State each lost men they had hoped would score. Dave Bain of the Bulldogs suffered a muscle pull in the 100, which put him out of the 220 and the relay. Steve Snyder, another good Yale sprinter, failed to make the grade in the 100.

Bob Szezyler, Penn State's 1959 winner of the 220-yard low hurdles, won his heat of the 440-yard hurdles, substituted on this year's program for purposes of Olympic development, but was disqualified for trailing his foot over the outside of a hurdle. The rules say both feet must clear the top of a barrier.

In addition, Jim Schwab, Don Davies and Dick Engelbrink of the Nittany Lions all missed out in the 880. Engelbrink, last year's two-mile champion, and a scheduled mile contender tomorrow, was way off form and did not even finish.

Manhattan gained ground in the half-mile by putting Artie Evans, who had been bothered by a bad back earlier this week, as well as St. Clair, into the eight-man final.

Villanova Takes Title as Lion Relay Runs Third in Finale

VILLANOVA, Pa., May 28—

Villanova's host forces dethroned Penn State as the team champion today in a stirring finish to the eighty-fourth annual title track carnival of the Intercollegiate Association of Amateur Athletes of America.

A matter of twelve inches tilted the scales in favor of Coach Jim Elliott's Wildcats over Coach Chic Werner's Nittany Lion defenders.

That was the margin by which Penn State's Don Davies trailed Manhattan's Larry St. Clair to the finish in the one-mile relay, which brought the 18-event program to a close.

Fifteen yards ahead of both straining runners, Bob Raemore had snapped the tape for Villanova. However, since Penn State had carried a lead of 1½ points into the relay, it required more than just a victory to put Villanova over the top.

Manhattan Beats Lions

Another team also had to beat Penn State. Manhattan, which had faded out of title contention itself, obliged. So the final point score read: Villanova 38 and Penn State 37½.

The Wildcats regained the crown they had won here two years ago and lost in New York in 1959.

Since Villanova was involved on its home grounds, a rain-spattered crowd of 6,500 at Villanova stadium was more engrossed by the stirring team contest than by four meet record performances, including a 7-foot 1½-inch high jump by John Thomas.

The Boston University wonder boy cleared the bar six times without a miss up to and including that height. Then Long John failed three times at 7 feet 2½ inches, which would have matched his best indoor effort and topped his week-old outdoor mark of 7 feet 1¾ inches.

Maryland Star Wins

Nick Kovalakides of Maryland improved to 235 feet 7 inches his qualifying meet record performance of 233 feet 2½ inches in the javelin throw. Villanova set an I. C. 4-A championship mark of 3:12 in its title-clinching mile relay victory.

In the first half of an amazing double, Bobby Lowe of Brown wiped from the books an eighty-four-year-old meet mark for the three-mile run with a clocking of 14:12.6. Less than an hour later, he captured the 3,000-meter steeplechase, one of three events added to the program for Olympic development purposes.

Since the event was being

run for the first time, Lowe's steeplechase time of 9:35 qualified as an automatic meet record. So also did the 0:52.6 clocking of Jim Moreland, another Brown winner, in the 400-meter hurdles, and the 46-foot 11-inch leap by Winston Cooper of St. John's in the hop, step and jump.

Disallowed because of a favoring wind above the allowable four-miles-an-hour limit was a record-equaling time of 14.1 seconds by Leon Praz of Villanova in the 120-yard high hurdles.

Joining Lowe as a double winner was Bobby Brown of Penn State. The Nittany Lion sprinter retained his 100-yard title in 0:09.7 and also sped off with the 220-yard crown in fast time of 0:20.6, aided by, the same wind that helped Praz.

Other racing victors were Jim Wedderburn of New York University, in the 440 (0:47.4); Tommy Carroll of Yale, 880 (1:51.9) and Dick Engelbrink of Penn State, mile (4:09.1).

In the field, the other champions were Joe Marchiony of Manhattan in the shot-put (56 feet 3½ inches); Bob Reed of Pennsylvania, broad-jump (24 feet ½ inch); Bob Batdorf of Pennsylvania, discus throw (169 feet 5 inches), and John Lawlor of Boston University, hammer throw (199 feet 7½ inches).

Four-Way Pole Vault Tie

The pole vault produced a four-way tie at 14 feet among Bjorn Anderson, the defender, and Tom Glass of Maryland, Barney Berlinger Jr. of Pennsylvania and Michael Kleinhans of Michigan State.

Trailing Villanova and Penn State in the tense team fight were Manhattan, with 23 points, Pennsylvania, with 21½, and Yale, with 21. Rounding out the top echelon of the forty-seven college field were Brown, with 15 points, Harvard 13, Maryland and N. Y. U. 12 each and St. John's 11.

In the mile relay, Joe Manion, Carl Wagner, Nick DeAngelis and Raemore reeled off their quarter miles in 0:48.6, 0:48.8, 0:47.6 and 0:47, respectively. The Wildcats were in command all the way.

Penn State, fifteen yards out of the running on the first two legs, got back into contention for second on an 0:47.4 third stint by Bob Szezyler, whose disqualification in the 440-yard hurdles trials yesterday, in effect, cost the Nittany Lions the title.

This put Davies within striking range of St. Clair. The blond Penn State sophomore from Tenafly, N. J., gave spirited pursuit to the Manhattanite and, for a time in the stretch, it appeared he might overhaul him. But St. Clair had just enough left to win.

After the race, there was momentary confusion as to the team winner. The official scorer was mixed up and had credited Penn State with 2 extra points. But Elliott and his Wildcats were aware of the situation, as were many unofficial bystanders, even if Penn State was not.

In his sprint double, Penn State's Brown took the 100 by two feet from Frank Budd, Villanova's I. C. 4-A indoor 60-yard champion. Bobby won the 220 by about the same margin from fast-closing John Fernandez of Manhattan after Paul Drayton of Villanova, rated his more dangerous rival, had pulled up lame in the semifinals.

The meet was full of such casualties, affecting all contenders. But Villanova, in another coaching masterpiece by Elliott, was closest to realizing its full potential.

Two years ago after winning with a squad headed by Ron Delany, Don Bragg, Ed Collymore, et. al., Jumbo, when reminded that his stars were about to fade out of the varsity picture, said: "Don't be sorry about us. Other stars will rise."

Sophomores Pace Victors

They did. Villanova's newly crowned champions are mainly a sophomore group. The only upper classman who scored individual points for the Wildcats was John Buckley, the runner-up in the broad jump, which he had won two years in a row.

Elliott paid special tribute to Hubert White, Jon Dante and Gerald Donini, three members of the Villanova cast who outdied themselves. White, mainly a basketball player, placed third in the hop, step and jump and shared third in the high jump. Dante bagged an unexpected second in the 880. Donini was a surprising third in the shot put.

In the mile, Penn State's Engelbrink, who couldn't finish his half-mile trial yesterday, stayed on the pace, took out with 400 yards to go and breezed home twelve yards ahead of Mark Mullin of Harvard. Bob Vinton of Georgetown was third by another five yards, ahead of Steve Paranya, a "sleeper" from Wesleyan.

It was a gratifying victory for Engelbrink, last year's two mile champion. The lanky Nittany Lion captain had not been himself since incurring a respiratory ailment at last year's national championships in Boulder, Colo., after running a 4:00 mile in the national collegiates the week before.

In the three-mile run, Tony Laris, Dartmouth's I. C. 4-A indoor champion and record holder, and Hank Levin of

N. Y. U. ran with Lowe to the final turn. There the Brown junior from Englewood, N. J., put on a terrific burst that left his rivals far behind.

Forty-five minutes later, Lowe returned to the track and took the gruelling 3,000-meter steeplechase by fifteen yards from Steve Moorhead of Penn State. Ron Rush of Penn State was third, ahead of Walter Cooper of Fordham and Jimmy Brown of N. Y. U., each of whom took jarring spills on the final water jump.

By way of making his performance the more amazing, Lowe had been severely spiked on the foot and knee in a second-lap traffic jam in the three-mile. The cuts required medical treatment and he ran in the steeplechase heavily bandaged.

Brown's other victor, Moreland, cut three-tenths of a second from his newly-coined 440-yard hurdles mark of yesterday's trials, in a close but clear victory over Jay Luck of Yale. Luck, however, was disqualified for trailing a leg over a hurdle. The rules specify that both feet must clear each barrier. Henry White of Manhattan was moved into second place as a result.

It was Praz all the way in the high hurdles. The Bulova photo-timer, consulted on several occasions during the two-day meet, established Luck as the runner-up over Don Cohen of Columbia.

Dick Edmunds, 'Princeton's

quarter-mile record-holder, set the early pace in the 440, run in lanes around two turns. Wedderburn, in an inside lane, stayed close, had the stronger lift in the stretch and won by four feet. The Violet sophomore hails from Barbados in the British West Indies. He had established himself as a contender by winning the Metropolitan Intercollegiate title in 0:47.5.

Stack Finishes Third

Jim Stack, Yale's two-time I. C. 4-A indoor 600-yard and Heptagonal 440-yard champion, could not muster his usual finishing wallop and had to settle for third, ahead of Bob Rasmore, a Villanova sophomore. Willie Atterbery of Michigan State, yesterday's trial leader with a clocking of 0:47, scratched. He had pulled up with a muscle knot in the 220 and decided not to jeopardize his Olympic chances by risking serious injury.

A dawdling first quarter of 0:57.8 killed the chances of fast time in the 880. Carroll took command in a six-man charge down the backstretch and went on to win by five yards from Dante. Pete Brandesi of Cornell overhauled Artie Evans of Manhattan for third place in the last few strides. St. Clair, the Jaspers' metropolitan champion, dropped out of contention early.

Rather chilly temperatures may have hampered Thomas and others, but the Boston U. high jumper couldn't have had finer footing. The big high jump take-off apron was made of a macademized mixture described as "Philadelphia soft mix." John did not get close to making 7-2½, but he had the satisfaction of adding two more seven-footers to his collection, which now totals twenty-four.

In the other field events, the chief development was the rise to second from sixth place by Stan Doten of Harvard in the hammer throw. In so doing, the big redhead set a Harvard record of 195 feet 8½ inches.
