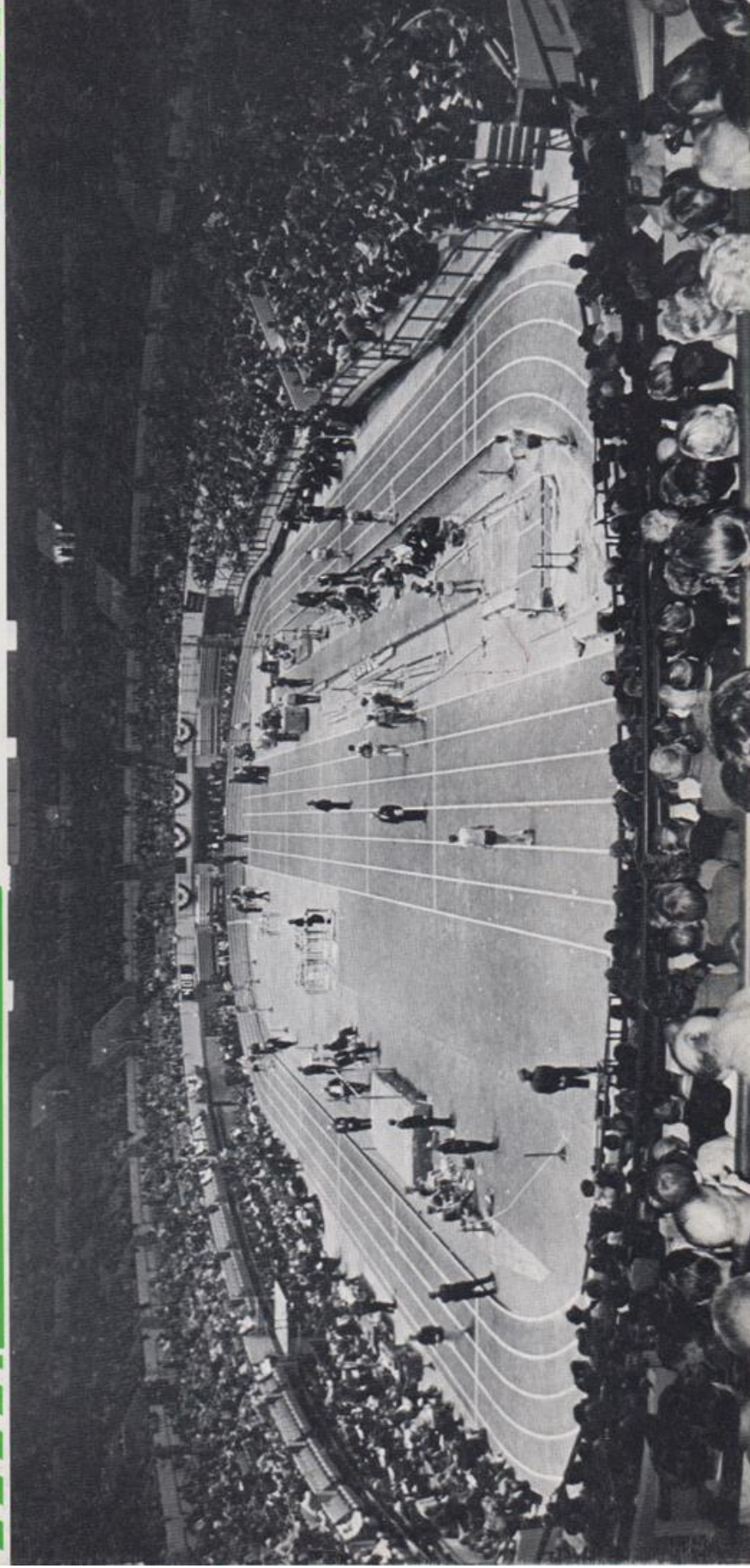

(EDITOR'S NOTE: Jesse Abramson, whose first by-line was J. P. Abramson, covered his first Olympic Games for the New York Herald Tribune in 1928 at Amsterdam. Well, not really his first, since he was the re-write man on the Herald Tribune desk who put together Grantland Rice's cabled and cable-ese dispatches from the Paris Games in 1924. For the same newspaper, Abramson covered all the ensuing Olympics through Tokyo in 1964. Having out-lived the Herald Tribune and even the World Journal Tribune, Abramson "covered" the 1968 Olympics in Mexico City as supervisor of the foreign press. He kept his typewriter active, however, by sending a series of dispatches to the Washington Post.)

They Stamped Their Names on the Games

There are three ways to remember Olympic Games: by the host city, by the Roman numerals which designate their number, or by the outstanding athlete who places his stamp on the games through a performance of rare merit.

Of course, one can remember the Olympics any way one pleases. For Bill Toomey, the Mexico City games, the XIX Olympiad in which he won his gold medal, the title of greatest all-around athlete, will forever be filed under The Apparel Games: Shoes, Socks and Gloves, a reminder that what the athletes wore on the Victory Stand and what they found in their shoes stole the headlines even from such an unbelievable feat as Bob Beamon's long jump of 29 feet 2¼ inches. But for me they were Bob Beamon's Olympics.

If the U.S. were not so dominant in Olympic track and field—and here we are concerned only with men's track and field, the main event of the gala—one could identify the Olympics with the winning country if points were scored. When the Soviet Union finally came to play, in the 1952 Olympics at Helsinki, we were warned that our days of dominance were ended.

The Russians, we were told, had organized and subsidized their sports program to an extent that could not be matched by a public-supported program such as ours. The touring experts, welcomed into Russia and fed the pap that 60 million Russians "tried out" for their Olympic teams, alarmed a lot of people. But not our athletes, who went about the business of winning, on the average, one-half of all the men's track and field titles in the Olympics.

Perhaps, these warnings have had their effect in preventing complacency, for the record shows that since the USSR came into the Olympics the U.S. has won 14, 15, 9, 12 and 12 firsts (including, overall, 8 of 10 relays) to the Soviet's 0, 3, 5, 2 and 3. No contest, in short.

On a team basis, one can't separate one track Olympics from another the way one can the I.C.4-A. indoor championships. For instance, the 1929 meet was the one N.Y.U. became the first local college to

crash through to the team title, or 1959, 1961 and 1966 were the years of the Villanova Era when Jumbo's 'Cats did not win the team title.

To identify the Olympic Games by a single individual becomes a task only when one is faced with an embarrassment of riches.

Mexico City, with its altitude and turista problems, provided such embarrassment—with more world records than any Olympics had produced. World records are not normally achieved under the exquisite pressure of the Olympics.

Despite the 9.9 by Jimmy Hines and his explosive come-from-behind leg of the world-record 400-meter relay; the 19.8 by Tommie Smith, whose arm-waving finish over the last five yards cost him a tenth second or two in the 200; the 43.8 and 43.9 laps by Lee Evans and Larry James; the record-tying 1:44.3 by Australia's Ralph Doubell, the fantastic

Jumbo Elliott Keeps His Fingers Crossed

Ron Delany started it. Twelve years ago he won the 1000-yard run and the two-mile at old Madison Square Garden and led Villanova to its first indoor I.C.A.A.A. championship.

Winning the team title has become a tradition at Villanova. Only the names of the stars have changed. Delany . . . Ed Collymore . . . Phil Reavis . . . Frank Budd . . . Paul Drayton . . . Rolando Cruz . . . Pat Traynor . . . Noel Carroll . . . Vic Zwolak . . . Tom Sullivan . . . Dave Patrick and many, many more. Some, like Delany, were Olympic medal winners. Others never made an Olympic team. But they all had the ability to rise to the occasion in the I.C.-4A championships.

Now the names are Erv Hall and Larry James and Marty Liquori and Frank Murphy, the 1968 Olympians who almost surely will lead Villanova to the 1969 I.C.4A. title.

"We'll just keep our fingers crossed and hope for the best," their coach, Jumbo Elliott, likes to say, while warning that Harvard or Maryland or some other clearly outclassed team might take it all.

Occasionally, somebody else does. In 1961, for example, Villanova lost the title to Yale on a disqualification in the climactic mile relay. Elliott did not take the setback lightly. "We were victimized by mob psychology," he stormed. "I'm a hard loser. This stuff about being a good loser is for the birds . . ."

PERHAPS IT IS that philosophy that has made the Villanova coach such a consistent winner. For more than a decade, he has sweated out these

I.C.-4A victories, screaming, imploring, cheering from early afternoon to late night.

The pattern seldom varies. "I'm just going to sit here and relax," Elliott will say. "I knew what I was going to do weeks ago. What's the sense of worrying now?"

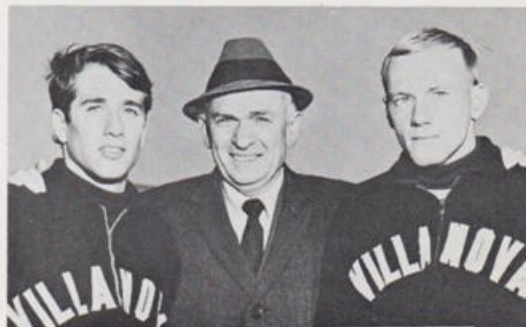
And then he will sit there for five minutes or maybe even 55 minutes, playing out the role, until something lifts him out of his chair.

One year it is John Buckley, a little-known long jumper, battling to score vitally needed points. Another year it is Irishman Carroll cutting it so fine in the afternoon 1000-yard trials that Elliott's face turns a beet red and his shouts can be heard clear across the Garden.

"Get going! Get going! You won't make it!" he screams, near panic setting in. And then, inevitably it seems, his boy gets going and makes it.

Elliott has never lost that desire for victory in this meet. Nor has he lost the ability to communicate his feelings to his athletes.

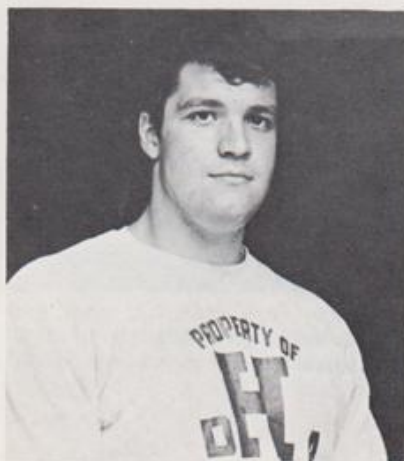

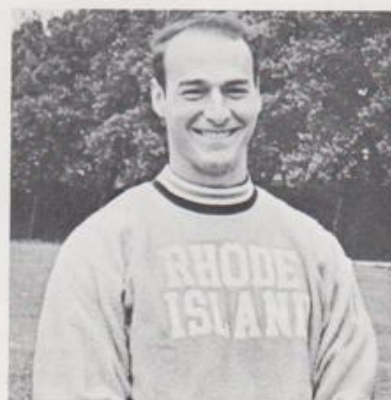
60-YARD HIGH HURDLES—Villanova's Erv Hall scored easily in 0:07.2. He also won in 1967.

The New England Contingent Masses for Attack

Notably with a mass attack on the individual I.C.A.A.A.A. two-mile title, the New England delegates probably will come on strong, but nobody is prepared to dispute the posture of Dick Benka, the Harvard University captain, as the Yankee-lander Most Likely to Succeed.

Benka is a massive fellow with intense dedication to shot putting, to the extent that already this winter he has hurled the ball 61-5½, virtually four feet beyond his winning IC 4-A distance a year earlier.

This is both an all-time Harvard and New England record, but Benka is not prepared to stop there. His goal is 65 feet. Benka may be majoring in economics in the class room, but not in workouts at Harvard's new plastic training bubble.

The 6-6, 247-pound senior from Wauwatosa, Wis., a community that once produced a mighty miler entitled Chuck Fenske, leads a talented group including three other all-time Harvard records men.

One of them—Doug Hardin, 8:44.2—is training back from strained ligament and hopes to peak in time for tonight's two-mile run, an event in which the District I brothers are, as they say, "loaded."

Colby's Olympian from Ethiopia, Sebsibe Mamo, ran down everybody, including Hardin, in last winter's 8:50.7 championship race, but not even his dearest friends and closest relatives suggest that such a clocking will be fast enough tonight.

At least three of Mamo's New England neighbors—Hardin of Harvard, Frank Shorter of Yale and Art Dulong of Holy Cross—have the capacity to go much faster.

The I.C.A.A.A.A. championships has never seen Dulong, the raven-haired junior from Holy Cross,

at his best. He has clocked as fast as 8:33.3 (at the Coast Guard Academy's cage) and as slow as 9:05.

Plagued by pneumonia, then "mono," and head colds, Dulong has reached peaks (he won the NCAA freshman mile, the IC 4-A cross-country as a sophomore) and fallen quickly off them.

A healthy Dulong would obviously be the runner to beat in a classic IC 4-A confrontation tonight.

Bill McCurdy's Harvard entries, who've dominated New England track for several years, just as obviously figure to do more business in the team scoring than—perhaps even on a combination basis—any other squad from the area.

Benka's shot putting is backed by the 61-foot weight throwing of Charlie Ajootian, a '68 scorer, and the hot running of Hardin, Royce Shaw and Keith Colburn. All are individual-championship contenders.

Colburn '20, may be Harvard's greatest all-time foot racer before he is graduated. A junior academically, he is really merely a sophomore competitively.

Following a freshman year in which the six-footer from Beverly Hills, Calif., matched the Crimson's all-time 1:10.5 for 600 yards and ran a 1:48 half mile in England, Colburn was grounded virtually throughout his sophomore year with an Achilles tendon injury.

In his first serious race this winter, Colburn clocked 2:09.3—a university record—for the invitation 1000 at Boston Garden. He has been filling in the "experience gap" there in specials.

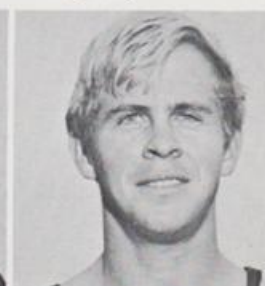

All-America Press Steward

In 1924, Dan Ferris left his post as press steward at the major track meets in the New York area to devote himself to his other duties with the Amateur Athletic Union.

Abel Kiviat, who had been Dan's assistant in 'feeding the press' with the minute details of every event, was asked to take over.

Little did Kiviat realize that 35 years later he still would be on the job.

"And I have enjoyed every minute of it," said the former runner for the Irish American A.C., who will celebrate his 77th birthday on June 23.

"There have been trips to many places in the East . . . Harvard and Penn in particular . . . for some of the I.C.A.A.A. meets, and they bring back many fond memories."

Before getting into some of those memories, Kiviat talked about his own career as a runner.

"I'll never forget 1907 when I was a senior at Curtis High School in Staten Island," recalled Abel, who has been Deputy Clerk at the U.S. District Court in Manhattan for the last 28 years.

"One afternoon I won the 880 and mile titles in

the PSAL citywide championships and that night I learned that I discovered that I was picked as the all-city PSAL shortstop."

After graduation from Curtis, Kiviat ran for the Irish-American A.C. and also the John Wana A.C., forerunner to the present Millrose A.C.

"With the Wana A.C.," he stated, "I was a member of the mile relay team that went undefeated for two years in the Industrial League.

"And with the Irish-American A.C. in my first race in Met AAU competition I took the 880 in the record time of 1:59."

Kiviat also had some excellent accomplishments indoors, taking the 600 and 1,000 on the same night in the National AAU Senior meet in 1911.

"It's never been done since," he said, quickly adding, "Nowadays, of course, there are heats in each race."

The following year was an Olympic year and Abel was a member of the gold-medal winning team in the 3,000-meter race and a silver medalist in the individual 1,500, losing in a photo.

"That team race is not in the Olympics now," he recalled. "It was similar to cross country and you used five men and scored them with low points."

One of the highspots in his long running career, and one which he likes to recall, was a victory in the National AAU senior cross-country championship in 1913.

"So," he delights, "that gave me victories and titles at all distances from 220 yards to 6¼ miles."

He also recalls, with pardonable pride, that the late Lawson Robertson, the great coach of the University of Pennsylvania for many years, dubbed him "the most versatile runner I've ever known."

Abel remained in competition until 1915 . . . and like all ex-runners . . . quickly turned to officiating.

"There were no press stewards in '15," was the way he put it. "I was a timer and a judge and anything else they needed. In 1923 I made a comeback as a runner for a brief period, but in '24 I was assistant press steward."

In taking over for Ferris, Kiviat has seen some great athletes through the years, but the one who sticks in his mind the most is Bill Carr of Penn, a real stickout in IC4A competition.

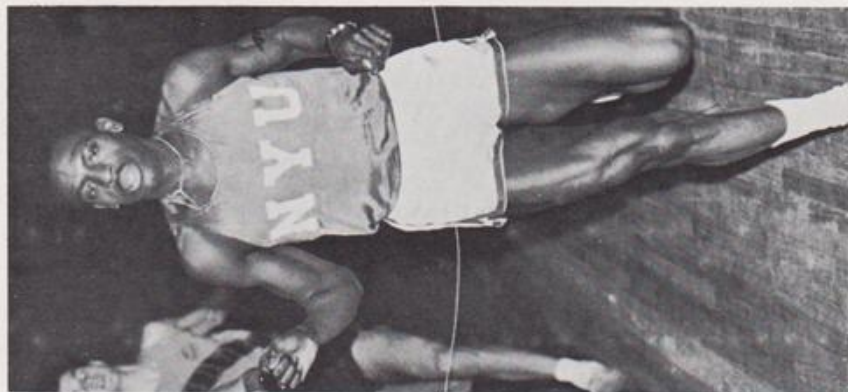

**From the 600 to the Two-Mile
They Won Nicely and Handily,
Two of Them Setting Meet Records**

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Track measures eleven laps to mile, and 160 yards to lap.

Firing of revolver denotes beginning of final lap in all races.

In all races there is no penalty under rules for first false start, but competitor is disqualified by second false start.

In hurdle race competitor is not disqualified for knocking down hurdles.

In all relay races baton must be carried in runner's hand and must be passed to next succeeding teammate within clearly marked 20-yard zone, extending 10 yards in both directions from leg finish line.

Governing rules provide that, in races around turns, any competitor willfully jostling, running across or obstructing another competitor so as to impede his progress, shall be disqualified. If in any race a competitor is disqualified for any of these reasons, the Referee shall have power to order the race to be re-run excluding the disqualified competitor or, in the case of a heat, to permit any competitors affected by the act resulting in disqualification, other than the disqualified competitor, to compete in a subsequent round of the race.

Any competitor may be disqualified if, in the opinion of the Referee, he has in any way been aided by a coach, teammate, or anyone connected directly or indirectly with the team concerned, such as running along-side of a teammate, being stationed at various points near the track, or located near by any of the field events for the purpose of aiding or coaching a compe-

titor after the race or field event has officially been started.

Each member college is limited to following numbers of actual participants in various events in Indoor Championships:

Two-mile run—two (plus one more upon approval of Executive Committee)

Relay races—one team

All other events—four

No contestant may be entered in two-mile run in Indoor Championships if he can cover distance no faster than 9 minutes 55 seconds.

In the weight throw, shot put, and the broad jump each contestant shall be allowed three preliminary tries. The first six men in the standing at the completion of the trials will qualify for the final. Each finalist will then receive three additional tries. All marks made, in both the trials and the finals, will count in determining the results. Each competitor shall be credited with best of all his efforts.

A nominee or qualifier who fails to compete in any running or hurdling event for which he has been nominated or has qualified will be ineligible for any further participation in the meet.

Competitors must be on time, field contestants entering enclosure five minutes before scheduled start of their event, and track contestants entering enclosure upon completion of race next preceding theirs. As soon as their event is over, competitors will kindly leave track and infield at once.

In each event 16 points are scored: 6 for first place, 4 for second, 3 for third, 2 for fourth and 1 for fifth.

comeback by Kipchoge Keino to win the second fastest 1500 meters ever run (3:34.9)—his sixth effort in eight days—after he failed to place in the 10,000 meters and had been outfinished by Tunisia's Mohamed Gammoudi in the 5,000; the stunning world-record 48.1 by Boston University-trained Dave Hemery in the 400-meter hurdles; Dick Fosbury's fascinating backward flip in a 7-4¼ high jump; Bob Seagren's gamesmanship and world-record 17-8½ vault; Al Oerter's unprecedented fourth straight discus victory with his all-time best of 212 feet 6 inches; the 2:56.1 world-record by our 1600-meter relay AVERAGING 44-second laps, and Toomey's recovery of the "greatest all-around athlete" title, despite all these track feats which made the Mexico games so memorable, I will remember them as Bob Beamon's Olympics on his jump-to-the-moon leap.

This, then, is one man's opinion of the athlete who identifies his particular Olympics. At Amsterdam it was Percy Williams, an obscure young sprinter from Canada. He won the 100 and 200 meters, the first and only non-American or non-Yankee, if you will, to take the double gold in the sprints. Harold M. Abrahams, the Cantab who had upset Charley Paddock, Jackson Scholz, Chet Bowman and Loren Murchison in the Olympic 100 in 1924, had sung, "Oh, to be young and unknown in the Olympics".

Williams fitted the Abrahams' formula.

Williams took the spotlight, but barely, from rugged Ray Barbuti, the Syracuse halfback, who won the 400 in a headlong plunge through the tape and anchored the winning 1600-meter relay. Having started to cover the I.C.4-A. championships only two years before, I was intrigued by the fact that I.C.4-A. 440 winners owned the Olympic 400. In the time that they won the I.C.-4A. 440, Maxey Long of Columbia (1900), Charley Reidpath of Syracuse (1912), Barbuti (1928) and Bill Carr of Penn (1932) all went on to win Olympic gold. Charley Jenkins of Villanova (1956) somehow managed not to win a title all that year until the Olympics, losing the I.C.-4A. 440 to John Haines of Penn, but he maintained the I.C.4-A. tradition in this one-lap classic, and Wendell Mottley, Yale product from Trinidad-Tobago, and Larry James of Villanova did not miss by much at Tokyo and Mexico City.

A reporter whose home conference was the I.C.4-A. had to go for Bill Carr, the hero of the 1932 Olympics in Los Angeles on his world-record 46.2 conquest of Ben Eastman, with whom he had built a vivid rivalry that spring, and his anchor contributions to the world-record 1600-meter relay.

In 1936, it was Jesse Owens and his four gold medals, 'nuff said.

Harrison Dillard winning his Olympic title in the wrong event, a hurdler taking the 100-meter and fastest-human honors, put his mark on the 1948 London Olympics.

The Helsinki Games were Emil Zatopek's Olympics when the writhing, grimacing Czech officer

romped off with the 5,000, 10,000 and marathon—a triple task believed to be beyond reach in the Olympic week. At Melbourne in 1956 it was Vladimir Kuts' Olympics, the Russian taking the Five and Ten with bursts that tore his rivals apart. I.C.4-A. runners—Jenkins, Tom Courtney and Ron Delany—swept the 400, 800 and 1500. Courtney's second effort after he had been passed in the homestretch has rarely been matched in any big race.

Aussie Herb Elliott's incredible runaway in a world-record 1500 highlighted the Rome games in 1960, despite the story-book marathon triumph by Ethiopian Abebe Bikila, trodding impassively in bare feet over the cobblestones, smoothed by centuries, of the Appian Way to the flare-lit finish next to the Arch of Constantine.

To New Zealander Peter Snell belonged the Tokyo Games with his 800 meters in 1:45.1 and 1500 meters in 3:38.1, the first such Olympic double in 44 years, though Americans will never forget Billy Mills' stunning 10,000-meter success, the similar breakthrough by Bob Schul in the Five, Bob Hayes' powerful charge to win the 100 and, even more explosive burst from behind to take the 400-meter relay, and Mike Larrabee's surge from fifth to become the oldest (30) ever to win this one-lap sprint in the Olympics.

Williams, Carr, Owens, Dillard, Zatopek, Kuts, Elliott, Snell and Beamon—they made the Olympics THEIR Olympics from 1928 through 1968.

Even Villanova's foreigners, unaccustomed to the "old-college-try" approach to athletics, have developed a great pride in the team, and therefore in the I.C.-4A championship.

There was the night, five years ago, when Noel Carroll felt so terrible he said, "If you see something with my number on it crawling around the track tonight, that'll be me."

Yet, as bad as he felt, Carroll ran because the team desperately needed points. He contributed four—and Villanova beat Manhattan by one.

"It took me a while to get the old college spirit," Noel said after the meet. "You continually listen to your teammates drive it home to you. They keep saying, 'The I.C.'s are coming up. The I.C.'s are coming up. That's the one that counts'."

It is a team spirit that carries on, even after graduation; a spirit that prompted Dave Patrick to take a day off from work to travel to New York to see Villanova win the NCAA cross-country championship. "I couldn't help it," the Baltimore school teacher said. "I had to be there."

They will all feel the excitement tonight, too. In Mexico City, each man stood alone—Hall in the high hurdles, James in the 400 meters, Liguori and Murphy in the 1500 meters. Here they are part of a team, continuing a tradition Ron Delany started 12 years ago. ●

Shaw, another Californian, has also been exposed to the hard-nosed competition of the mile specials in Boston this winter. As a junior he clocked 4:02.8 on the Dartmouth track, a Harvard indoor record, and has 1:48.5 credentials as an outdoor half miler.

Jim Baker, Harvard's graduated ace from Old Blighty, just missed last year of making it to the mile in 4:00, but at Cambridge they feel that, sooner or later, Shaw will not miss.

If the shadow of Harvard's group power falls upon its neighbors in the Greater Boston area, so does that of the towering captain, Dick Benka.

Nearby Northeastern University has a shot putter of its own, entitled Andy Kenney. Andy has popped the ball 57-9 and 56-7½. Ordinarily this would be even for him to win, even capture an IC4-A title.

It just happened that Benka, the same days, popped it farther.

In the Greater Boston meet Kenney went past Carl Wallin's all-time N.U. record with 58-10½—but Benka came out of a sick bed with 59-6¾, a last-putt effort, to beat him again.

Ed Nosal, a 220-pound sophomore from Oak Lawn, Ill., exploded into Harvard's IC4-A picture by surpassing Ajootian and the Crimson record with a massive 62-2 throw of the big weight in the recent Greater Boston meet. ●



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THE PICTURE WINS TITLES

You hear it often: that pictures tell no lies. That is true, but what needs emphasizing is that sometimes the angle from which the picture is taken will create a false impression, especially about who was the winner in a race.

What makes the Bulova Accutron Phototimer and the I.C.A.A.A. championships a team working to assure the best athletes full credit is that there are no angles to the pictures taken by this camera which has become so much a part of track and field over the past 21 years. It is placed exactly, but exactly, on the finish line, and only those runners are photographed who cross the finish line.

Thus, the history of the IC-4A championships shows that the Bulova Phototimer has even determined the winner of the team championship, which it did at Madison Square Garden in February of 1954. That was the year Paul Radenbausch, of Penn., was named as the second-place finisher in the 1,000 yard run, with Mike Stanley of Yale third.

It didn't seem like much at the time, except that the point score thus left Yale in second place with 18 points to 18½ for Boston College. The officials then waited for the Bulova picture and when they finished studying it, they announced a correction in the second-place finish.

The picture showed Stanley lunging, head down and forward, with Radenbausch upright. There was the difference, enough to reverse the positions so that Yale gained an extra point to win the title with 19 points to 18½ for Boston College.

Every IC-4A championship, indoor and outdoor, has had so many hair-raising finishes that the Bulova technicians were busy producing pictures from which the judges made their decisions.

Just two years ago, in the 60-yard dash, Sam Perry of Fordham won the second semi-final race by a photo over James Lee of Maryland and Richard Carle of Springfield. Sam went on to win the final and the title. ●

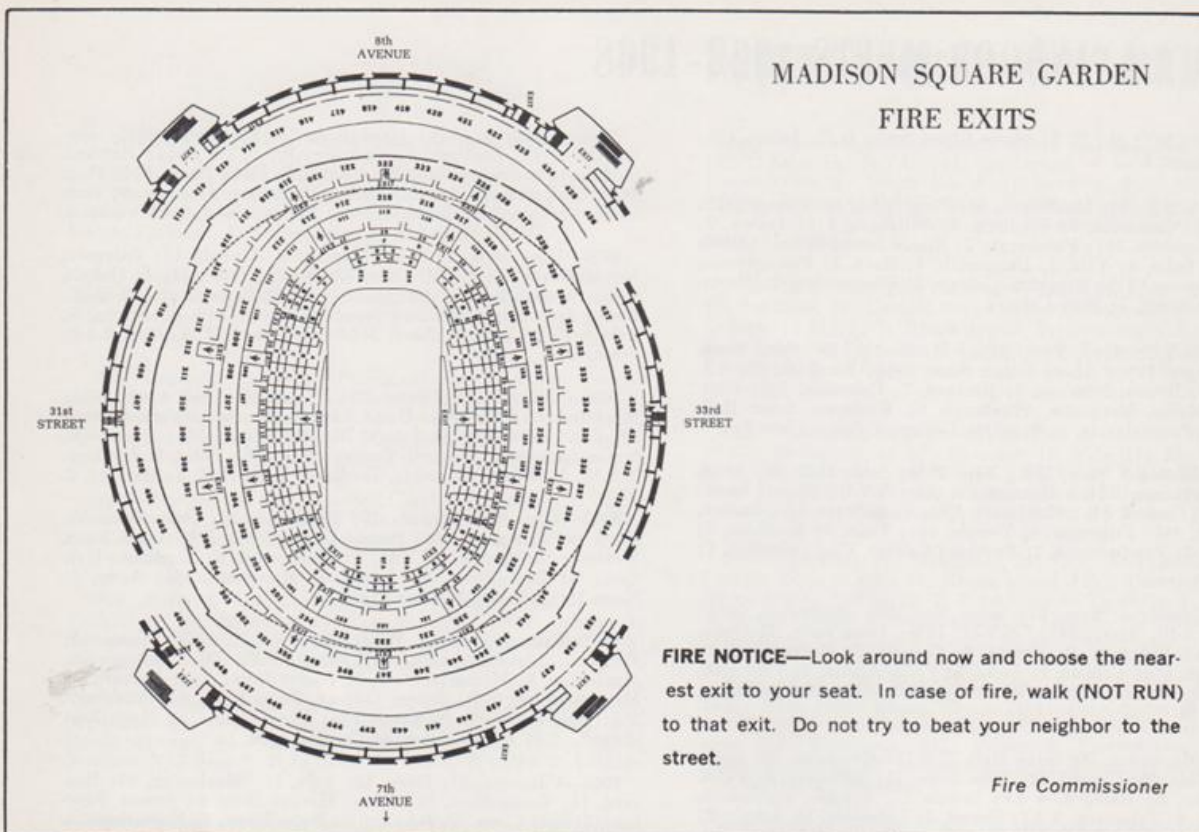
