EASTERN COLLEGE ATHLETIC CONFERENCE

The Nation's Largest Athletic Conference

64 Years of Tradition, Diversity and Service

In the 64 years since its inception, the Eastern College Athletic Conference (ECAC) has emerged as the nation's largest conference. The ECAC has grown considerably from its charter membership of 58, currently boasting 313 member schools in Divisions I, II and III, ranging in location from Maine to North Carolina. In the 2001-02 academic year, the ECAC will host 106 championships in 35 men's and women's sports as the sponsors of over 2,000 varsity teams and 125,000 male and female athletes.

HISTORY - The ECAC was founded in 1938 as the Central Office for Eastern Intercollegiate Athletics. One of the most significant events in ECAC history occurred in 1983 with the consolidation of the Eastern Association of Intercollegiate Athletics for Women (EAIW) into the ECAC infrastructure. With the addition of women's sports, the ECAC doubled its number of championships and greatly increased its member base.

Through the years the ECAC has exerted leadership not only at the regional level, but at the national level as well. Comprising more than 25 percent of the NCAA membership, the conference plays an integral role in national collegiate athletics policy and legislation. The conference, led by Commissioner Philip Buttafuoco, continues today to address many of the same issues affecting college athletics in the past while striving to lead this industry in the 21st century.

LEADERSHIP - Inaugural commissioner Asa S. Bushnell molded the organization from its formation in the 1938 to his retirement in 1970. George Schiebler succeeded Bushnell as commissioner from 1970-72, followed by Robert M. "Scotty" Whitelaw (1972-1989) and Clayton Chapman (1989-98). Current commissioner Phil Buttafuoco assumed chief administrator responsibilities on July 1, 1998. Buttafuoco brings extensive knowledge and leadership into the mix based on his experiences as senior assistant director of championships for the NCAA.

LOCATION - The Asa S. Bushnell Center, the ECAC's current headquarters, is located in Centerville, Massachusetts on Cape Cod. It is on the picturesque Cape that the conference hosts its fall convention and honors dinner. More than 300 athletic administrators attend the convention to partake in the membership committee meetings, professional seminars, tournament, and affiliate meetings. The reminder of the year the center remains the hub of activities for the ECAC with daily tasks focused on championships, officiating, public relations and recognition awards, legislative services, sponsorship, special events and television venues.

CHAMPIONSHIPS - The ECAC administers 103 preseason and post-season events for its member institutions, including the EARC, EAWRC, CICR and IRA rowing, men's IC4A cross-country and track & field, IFA fencing, EIWA wrestling and men's EIGL gymnastics championships. In 1997, the ECAC was awarded USOC grant money to fund conference championships in Olympic sports considered "endangered" (men's gymnastics, men's water polo) or "emerging" (women's synchronized swimming, women's water polo). Additional grants were awarded to the ECAC in wrestling and men's and women's fencing in 1998. The grant program will continue to fund these championships through 2001.

OFFICIATING - The ECAC assigns officials in 12 sports in Divisions I, II and III, including baseball, men's and women's basketball, men's and women's fencing, football, men's gymnastics, men's and women's ice hockey, men's and women's soccer, and wrestling. Furthermore,

ECAC official coordinators provide clinics and workshops to improve the level of officiating and attract the most qualified collegiate officials. The officiating bureaus assign officials for both conference and NCAA championships, over 20,000 assignments for over 4,000 officials each year.

PUBLIC RELATIONS/RECOGNITION AWARDS - The ECAC publicizes the achievements of its member institutions and student-athletes via weekly and postseason awards. The ECAC honors weekly 39 student-athletes in the fall, 36 in the winter and 64 during the spring season.

CONVENTION and MEETINGS - The business of the ECAC publicizes the achievements of its member institutions and athletes via weekly and postseason awards. These selections stem from nominations submitted by the college's sports information director and the conference's public relations director.

INTERNSHIP PROGRAM - The ECAC has established the prestigious Asa S. Bushnell internship program, employing interns at the office each year. Candidates must hold an undergraduate or graduate degree from an ECAC institution. Former interns work in all fields of collegiate and professional athletics including directors of athletics, assistant commissioners, sports information directors and coaches.

LEGISLATIVE SERVICES - The conference maintains a legislative and compliance service to assist its membership with the application of NCAA and ECAC regulations. The conference sponsors workshops and seminars, processes hardship waivers and facilitates the Collegiate Commissioners Association National Letter of Intent program for its members.

SPONSORSHIPS - The ECAC actively pursues the development of partnerships that garner the financial support of corporate and individual entities. Through these sponsorships, the ECAC enhances championship events for participants, while supplementing associated event-operation expenditures. Elements conference sponsors may receive include, but are not limited to: official access to the membership, television exposure, event signage, event entitlements, tickets and hospitality, and the opportunity to promote volume incentive buying programs.

TELEVISION - ECAC Productions coordinates with institutions, television vendors and broadcast partners to produce and obtain clearances of quality sports programming promoting the conference and its members. ECAC Productions televised sports events include football, men's gymnastics, men's and women's ice hockey, and wrestling. These events are aired through partnerships with the following regional sports networks: Empire Sports, the New England Sports Network (NESN), Home Team Sports, Sunshine Network and Comcast Broadcasts.

SPECIAL EVENTS - The conference hosts events such as the ECAC Men's Basketball Holiday Festival at Madison Square Garden, the Eastern College Football Awards Banquet at the Meadowlands and the ECAC Division I Women's Soccer Classic on Cape Cod.

The ECAC is a host of several NCAA championships in 2001 including the Frozen Four, the Division III Baseball Northeast Regional, the Division I Swimming and Diving Championships, and the Division II Indoor Track and Field Championships.

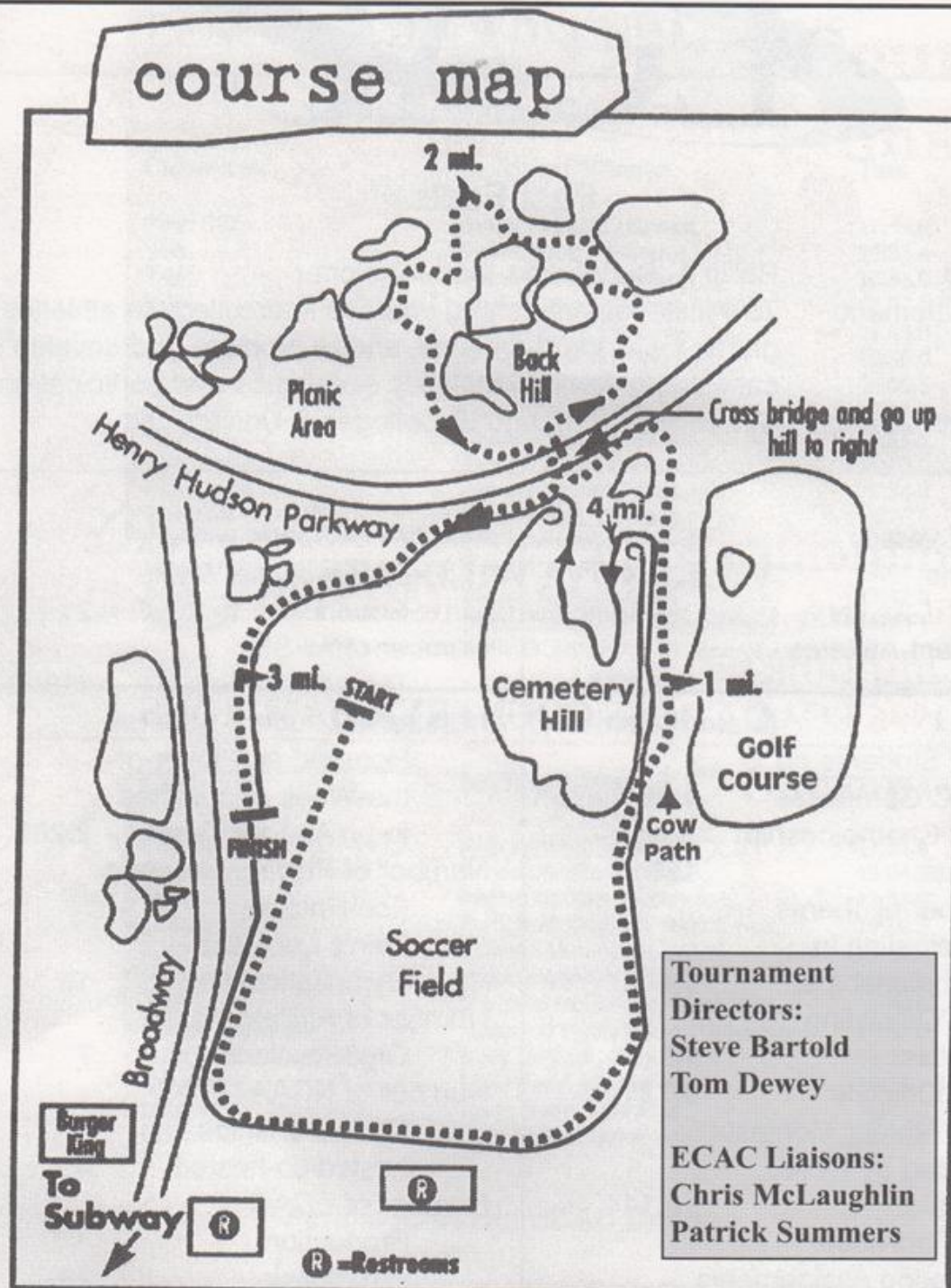
