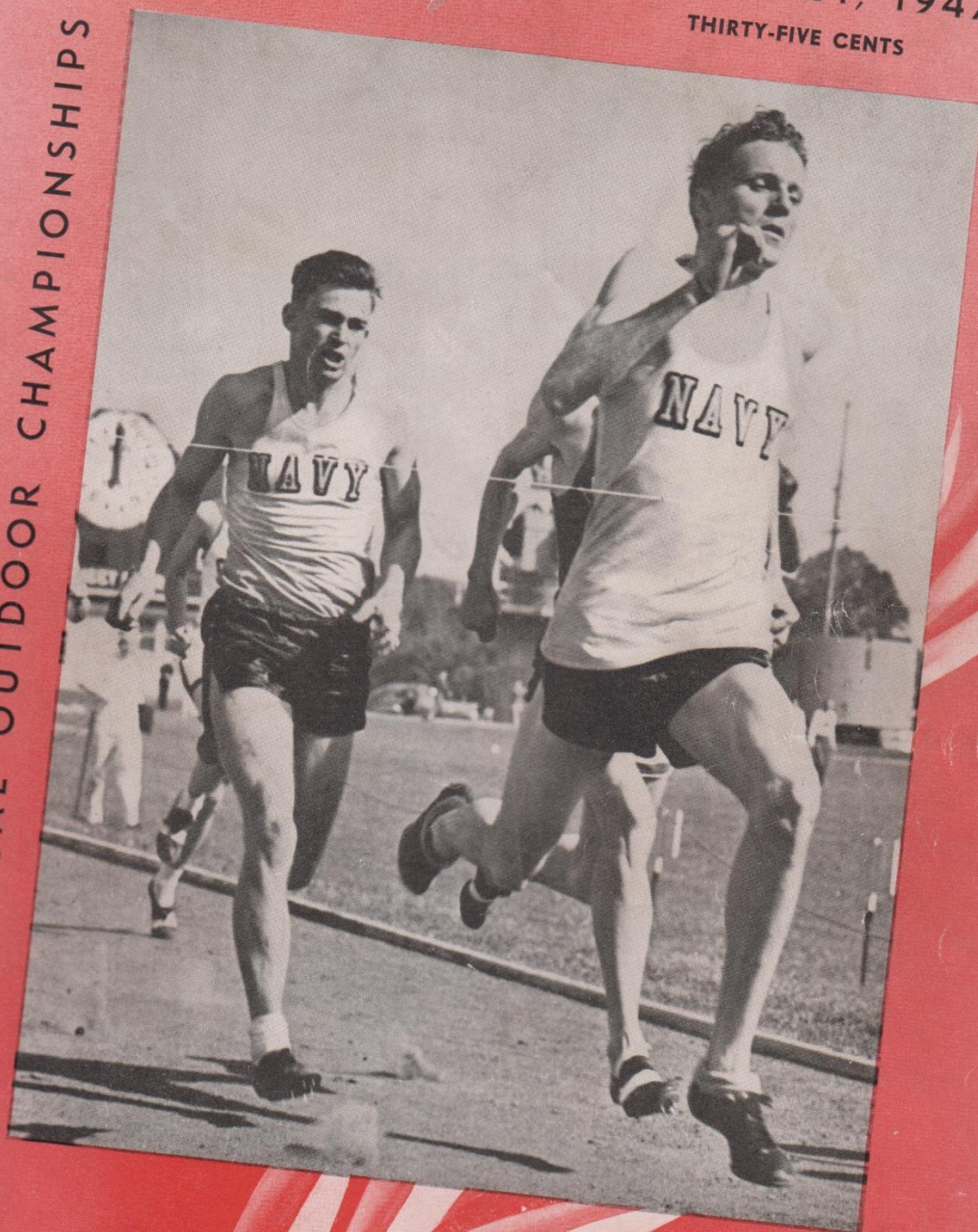

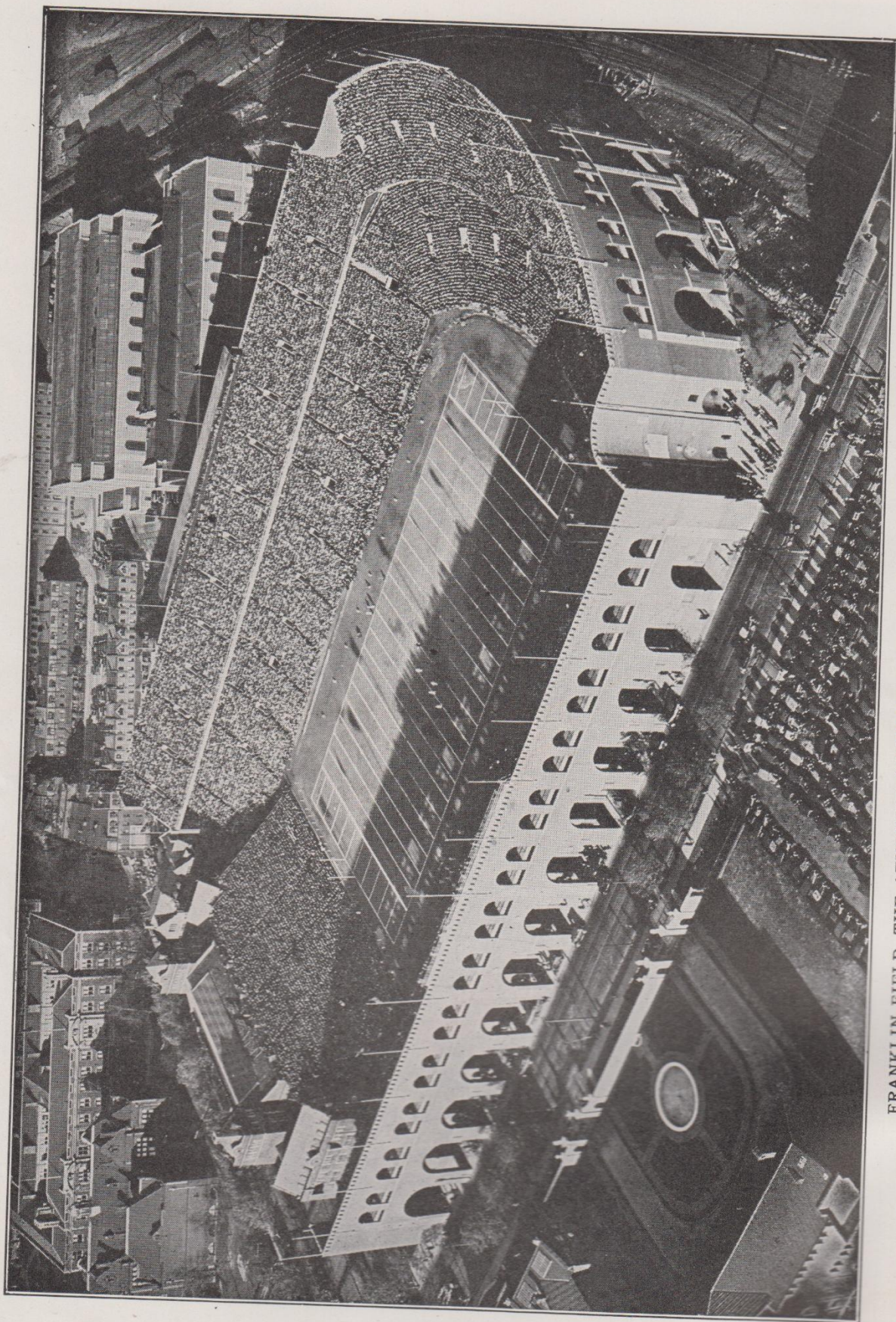

Route to the Olympics

I. C. A. A. A. and Franklin Field Have Always Been Prominent Among its Way-Stations—Is History Repeating Today?

WHEN and if Reginald Pearman, with the United States shield on his chest, gallops home on top in the Olympic 800-meter final fourteen months hence in London's Wembley Stadium, 40,000 track fans will be able to say, "I saw him run his first race right here on Franklin Field in April of 1947."

Well, track fans also have the right to exaggerate a little bit. Actually the New York University G.I. freshman had done considerable racing before April of 1947. As a New York high school runner in 1942 he had been champion of the vast Public Schools Athletic League at 1,000 yards, one mile, and cross-country. Like many another schoolboy of that vintage Reggie had disappeared into the obscurity of the Army. While still in the service he had reappeared, thanks to week-end passes from Camp Lee, in Madison Square Garden in the winter of 1946. But the cloak of obscurity he still wore, for Pearman was a runner-up in such famous cup races as the Millrose 380 and Casey 600—and who remembers a runner-up?

Last summer Pearman won the South Atlantic and Metropolitan A.A.U. junior and senior half-mile championships. His best time was 1 minute 54.3 seconds—excellent time, to be sure, but nothing to make anyone sit up and notice him particularly. In fact Pearman would have made no impression larger than agate type on the sports pages of his home town if it weren't for his winning of A.A.U. championships in two A.A.U. districts in the same season in violation of A.A.U. rules. (That was straightened out: Pearman had been ordered by his Camp Lee C.O. to run in the South Atlantic meet.)

Pearman promptly disappeared from the athletic scene again, winding up in Japan as a corporal in the transportation corps. Rapid Reggie quite evidently moves fast. He was discharged from the Army on February 13, reentered N.Y.U. the next day. Starting his conditioning program from scratch, three weeks later he was on the N.Y.U. two-mile relay team which hadn't won a race all winter. But with Pearman's help the Violet foursome won the I.C.4-A title in Madison Square Garden. However, relay runners, unless they are champions running the anchor leg, revel in obscurity.

Despite this background as sketched, Pearman was just another G.I. Joe among the 3,000 athletes (we are accepting Jim Swarts' figures) when he moved into the most recent Penn Relays. What he achieved on the two days of that carnival is now history. Insofar as his national reputation was concerned, Pearman ran his first races then and there. He rose from the horde of track athletes to become a track celebrity. He took on the best in the country and in the world at two distances—the half and quarter—and beat them both in first-class style with a memorable demonstration of speed and power that immediately established him as an Olympic prospect of the first magnitude.

The Olympic 800-meters, the I.C.4-A, and Franklin Field are interwoven in the fabric of track history. Ted Meredith won the Olympic 800 at Stockholm, came back to make Franklin Field his home and win I.C.4-A records and glory on this track. John Y. Woodruff followed the same trail, and now Pearman may use an I.C.4-A half-mile championship, and maybe the quarter-mile, too, on Franklin Field as a stepping stone to Olympic fame at London.

Is this going overboard on a runner merely on two such flashing exhibits as his 1:51.5 half and 48-second quarter? I think not. Rarely has any racer been more impressive than Pearman in his varsity debut on Franklin Field. His home-stretch wallop is as great as the best I have seen. If Pearman can come out of the Army and attain such speed as he has shown after ten weeks of training, what limit would you put on his future accomplishments? What will he do after he has put a season of cross-country behind him next fall?

Of all the athletes participating in these 71st Annual I.C.4-A Championships none would appear to have a brighter hope in the London Olympics than this six-foot-two, 168-pound, twenty-three-year-old freshman who catapulted to the front so spectacularly in the Penn Relays a month ago.

The I.C.4-A family of colleges has an Olympic tradition surpassed by no other group. Starting with the first modern Olympics when Bob Garrett, of Princeton, and Tom Burke, of Boston

Versatile Executive—

*Jim Swarts, I. C. A. A. A. President and Pennsylvania Athletic Director,
Is One of Track and Field's Outstanding Figures*

MANAGING a college track team is serious business. Managing a championship I.C.A.A. meet is both serious and big business. The senior manager of a college track team is not a towel hustler, he is an executive who assigns definite jobs to each of his managerial candidates, keeps the coach happy by having things run smoothly day in and day out, makes plans for trips away from the campus, and performs so many diverse and detailed duties that to list them all would take up too much space.

The manager's job is not seasonal, say from shortly before the Relay Carnival until the Intercollegiate championship games. It is a year around task that starts when college begins in the fall and the cross country season gets under way. It continues through the winter with trips to New York, Boston, and other places with relay teams and individuals. There is a brief respite for the athletes but not the senior manager from mid-March until about April 1 when the outdoor season gets started.

My first intimate contact with a track manager occurred in the spring of 1923 when a young fellow, then a sophomore, just two years removed from Mercersburg Academy, was named assistant manager of the University of Pennsylvania track team.

The competition in those days for the important managerial positions was keen and to win one of them stamped the successful individual as a combination bank president, diplomat, laborer, and general utility man.

H. Jamison Swarts, Pennsylvania's Director of Athletics, had all the qualifications and more. His seriousness in his job, his ability to organize, his unflagging loyalty to the sport and his college, and his many other attributes won the attention of those in authority with the result that in June of 1923 he won the appointment he had worked for so zealously—assistant manager.

To become the assistant meant more hard work and tougher competition because there was another assistant who had the same ambition, to be senior manager. Again, it was a year-long competition between two individuals, one of whom

would be chosen for the big job.

At the conclusion of the 1924 season after what was termed one of the closest competitions in Pennsylvania track history, Jim Swarts walked out of the meeting room the senior manager of the 1925 track team.

Senior managers now and then rest on their laurels, designating most of the work to their assistants and the managerial candidates. They take the bows and enjoy the social prestige on the campus that goes with the job.

Jim Swarts was not that kind of a manager, nor was he the kind who tried to do everything himself. He made the usual assignments, but from then on he was on top of the job all the time seeing that the assignments were carried out, improving on the work of those under him, and otherwise keeping in close touch with every phase of his managerial position.

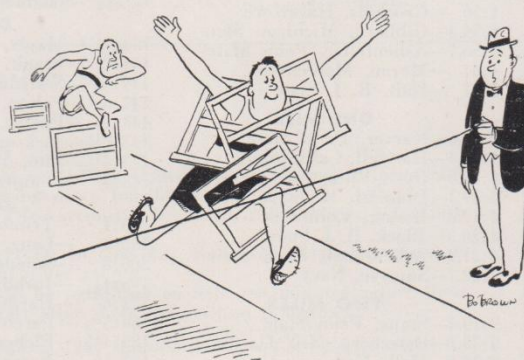
There was another reason why Swarts could not enjoy all the rights and privileges of his position without working hard. Franklin Field was to be the scene of the 49th annual I.C.A.A. championships and, in keeping with tradition as it existed then, Swarts was elected president of the I.C.A.A. That meant that he was in full charge of the championship meet.

The Central Office did not exist in 1925 and, although Jim Taylor, from his office in New York, handled the entries and did considerable paper work, it was Swarts' duty to run the meet. That was a big job for a senior in college, one of the most important in intercollegiate athletics.

It so happened that the writer was in the athletic office at that time and one of his jobs was to do the publicity for the I.C.A.A. games by appointment from the manager. From the time the indoor season was over until the Intercollegiates,

GENERAL INFORMATION

Track measures four laps to mile.

All events are scratch, i.e., none is handicap.

Firing of revolver denotes beginning of final lap in all races.

In all races there is no penalty for first false start, but competitor is disqualified by second false start.

In hurdle race competitor is not disqualified for knocking down hurdles.

In each event 15 points are scored: 5 for first place, 4 for second, 3 for third, 2 for fourth, 1 for fifth (for score sheet, turn to page 46).

Each college is limited in actual competitors to one team in One-Mile Relay, two representatives in One-Mile and Two-Mile Runs, and five representatives in all other events.

Competitors must be on time for their events. They will be permitted on field ten minutes before their events are scheduled, but will be asked to leave immediately after their competition is finished.

All rules of competition as set forth in I.C.A.A.A. Official 1943 Handbook will be strictly enforced by Referee and other officials of the meet.

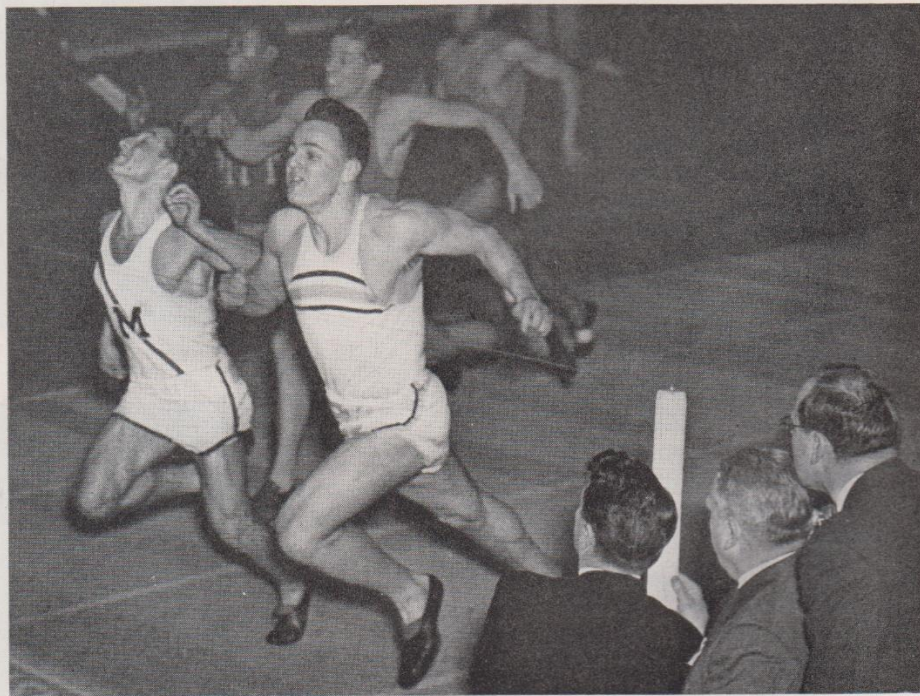

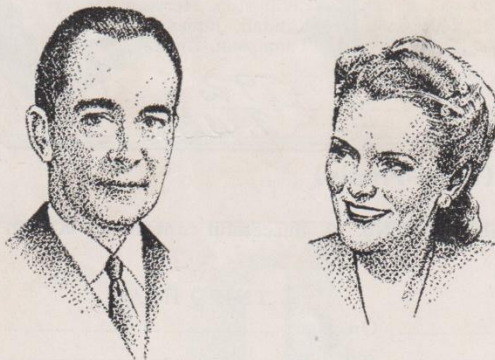
University, scored four triumphs at Athens, I.C.4-A champions have taken their share, and more, of Olympic laurels.

The statistics, in fact, are astonishing. I.C.4-A athletes have won championships in sixteen Olympic events down through the years. In the early Olympics it was natural enough that the long-established I.C.4-A, with the oldest track tradition of any college organization, should dominate the American Olympic team. The 1900 Olympics at Paris were virtually a re-run of the Intercollegiates. But even in the modern Olympics, with track no longer a sectional monopoly of the East, the I.C.4-A is carrying on just as vigorously and successfully. The United States track team of 1932, for instance, had seventy-one places on it, and I.C.4-A athletes won thirty-three, or 46 per cent, of them.

Although track talent is no longer concentrated in I.C.4-A territory as it once was, the I.C.4-A athletes are expected to get their quota of Olympic berths next year. Selecting the possibilities a year ahead is a risky business, considering the vast field of candidates and what can happen in the fourteen months intervening until the 1948 final tryouts which will determine the team—in competition, not on paper.

Nevertheless, there are many cavorting on Franklin Field these two days who can be singled out as hot prospects, and the hottest, I repeat, is Pearman. There are others—Harvey Kelsey, of Princeton, I.C.4-A sprint champion in 1943 as a freshman; Jeff Kirk, of Penn, whose very first race in the 400-meter hurdles produced a Penn Relays record of 53.1 seconds; Frank Dixon, of N.Y.U., if he should recapture the form that made him I.C.4-A. cross-country king and a 4:09.6 miler in 1942-43; Gerald Karver, of Penn State, I.C.4-A. indoor champion, whose recent 4:11.6 mile was the fastest by a collegian outdoors in five years; Curtis Stone, his teammate, I.C.4-A. two-mile indoor champion; Eddie O'Toole, of Manhattan, with an eye on the 10,000 meters; Ted Vogel, of Tufts, who already has one leg on a marathon berth; Bernie Mayer, of N.Y.U., 53-foot shot-putter; Bob Bennett, Brown's hammer-thrower; Irving Mondschein, of N.Y.U., I.C.4-A record-holder in the indoor high jump and national A.A.U. decathlon champion; Bill Vessie, Columbia's 6-8 high jumper; Boo Morcom, of New Hampshire, in the pole vault.

Their Olympic chances won't be hurt by the fact that they developed in the I.C.4-A Championships. After all, that's where Olympians are born.

Swarts was the busiest man in the office. His planning, his hard work during every available minute he could spare from his classwork and studies, his determination to make the championships successful from every angle—the entries, the comfort of the athletes and the coaches, the physical setup of the field and the myriad duties essential to managing such an extensive meet, won Swarts the recognition and unstinted praise of everyone connected with intercollegiate athletics.

It was a busy year for a young senior. In addition to managing the Pennsylvania track team and the Intercollegiate, he conducted all the meetings of the I.C.4-A. As its president, he was a member of the undergraduate council, member of the Sphinx Senior Society, and was active in his fraternity.

In March of 1925 in the midst of his many duties he was selected to take a relay team, composed of Charles Rogers, Oliver MacDonald, Everett Lomansson, Ray Wolf, and Keith Schnebley, to England for a mile race with a combined Oxford-Cambridge team. And as in everything else he did, he made a success of this undertaking, one that would have sorely troubled a less poised and resourceful individual.

It was on the return trip home on the *Homeric* that Swarts and the members of the relay team were the helpless witnesses of the sinking of a Japanese steamer. Rough seas prevented the launching of rescue boats and all hands were lost as the ship's company and passengers looked on horrified at such a tragedy of the seas.

David, Lord Burghley, starting an athletic career that carried him to international fame, and Weightman Smith joined Swarts and the relay team when they left England.

The late Ernest B. Cozens, one of Pennsylvania's football and baseball immortals, was graduate manager of athletics in 1925. His assistant of the previous year, William E. Almy, had resigned and he needed a replacement. Impressed with the acumen and ability of Swarts as the manager of the track team and of the Intercollegiate, Cozens selected him without hesitation.

In the spring of 1926 Swarts succeeded George W. Orton as director of the annual Relay Carnival, a fitting testimonial to his executive and managerial capacities. The success of the annual Carnival, through the years that Swarts had managed it, has won the praise of athletes, coaches, athletic directors and the general public. To manage a meet in which 3000 athletes from 500 schools and colleges compete takes more than average ability. From December until the last race is run, Swarts, with his assistant, Frank Dallahan, does as much paper work as an army general.

Visitors are amazed on the Friday and Saturday of the Carnival to find that a definite time schedule is followed to the minute. It isn't done with mirrors, but by planning the many details

with those associated in running the affair, the officials, who deserve the lion's share of the credit for the smoothness with which the Carnival is run, with the laying out of the field for the various events and with all the details that show the organizing talent of the individual at the head of it all.

When Ernie Cozens died suddenly in 1929 Swarts was named acting graduate manager, a position he held until 1931 when he was appointed assistant director of athletics. Two years later he became the director of athletics.

A veteran athletic official once remarked to me, "Swarts knows more about intercollegiate athletics from football to track than anyone in the business. Few have had more experience in every phase of athletics than he has. His advice is constantly sought by those who are either new to the business or whose experience doesn't cover the twenty-two years that Swarts has been associated as a graduate with intercollegiate athletics."

To name all of the valuable contributions Swarts has made to athletics through the years would be taking up too much time and space. Some of them include the organizing of the Heptagonal, now the Nonagonal, track and field games in 1935. From 1935 through 1945 he was treasurer of the Eastern Intercollegiate Football Association. From 1938 until 1946 he was president of the Eastern Intercollegiate Basketball League. From 1940 through 1944 he was a member and treasurer of the National Basketball Rules Committee.

Since 1941 he has been a member of the Board of Stewards of the Intercollegiate Rowing Association. In 1936 he was selected as an assistant treasurer of the American Olympic Committee, a job that kept him busy for a year before and which sent him to Berlin for the Olympic Games.

And in 1947 he has more jobs than an octopus has arms. He is chairman of districts 1, 2, and 3 of the NCAA fund-raising campaign for the 1948 Olympics. He is a member of the Executive Committee of the United States Olympic Association, and chairman of the Olympic Equipment and Supplies Committee.

And today, as history repeats itself, he is president of the I. C. A. A. A. A. Not in the 72 year history of the Intercollegiate Association has any other president been returned to this office, and it is very unlikely that a college senior will ever repeat years later as president of the oldest track and field association in the country.

Track and field owe much to H. Jamison Swarts. And intercollegiate athletics, including football, soccer, basketball, swimming, wrestling, baseball, tennis, golf, lacrosse, rowing, and all the other sports, are indebted to him for the many contributions he has made to their success since he became a managerial candidate for the track team in 1923.
