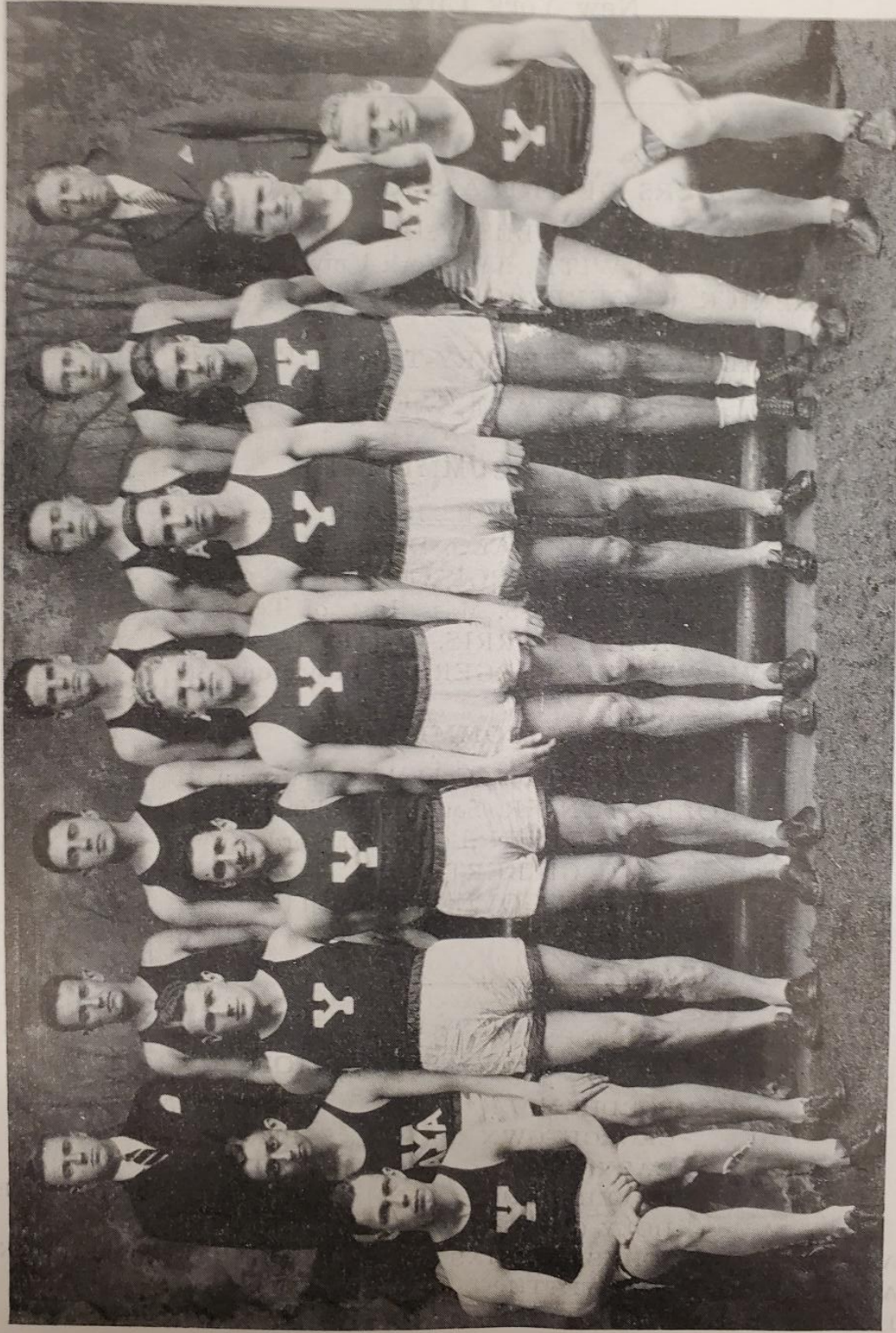

TRACK EVENTS

EVENT NO. 1

VARSITY 4 x 400 METER RELAY—TRIAL HEATS

4 MEN EACH RUNNING 400 METERS

(1219.778 Yards. One Mile is 1760 yards. 400 Meters is 3.56 yards less than a quarter mile.)

Each relay is 2 1/2 laps on the 160 meter track. The first relay runs the first lap only on the inside or 133 1/3 meter track and hence will run 2 1/2 laps plus 26 2/3 meters.

After the first lap the runners are turned onto the 160 meter track. 160 along a diagonal line from one curb to the other and the inner course will be obstructed so as to eliminate any confusion.

The first lap is run in lanes with staggered starts, each lane being measured for the same distance. With each change of relay, the position on the track of every team is changed so that each team will have substantially the same distance to cover.

A baton must be passed to each succeeding team-mate within a zone of 20 yards—10 yards before and 10 after the finish line.

Penalties: for first and second false start, no penalty; disqualification for third false start.

THE NEW TRACK

The track used tonight is not only newly constructed, but incorporates novel ideals in design intended to promote speed and fairness for competitors.

There are two courses on the track which is 27 feet wide. The inner course measures 133 1-3 meters or three laps to 400 meters. This course will be used for only one entire race, that is the 3000 meter. The other course is designated by a broad painted band beyond the center of the track. This course measures 160 meters or 2-1-2 laps to 400 meters. If there are too many competitors to be fairly accommodated on the 160 meter course then the first lap of all other races than the 3000 meter will be run for the first lap on the inner course, so that the competitors will be somewhat separated and then they will be turned onto the 160 meter course along a diagonal line from one curb to the outer. The inner course will then be obstructed so as to eliminate any confusion.

While no banking over which a number of races must be run at different speeds, can be perfect the banks of the track have been constructed on scientific computations considering the centrifugal force and strain on the runners and are believed to be a fair compromise for all races. Since the banking is higher than usual, in order to compensate for the greater lift on the outside of the bank, the straightaways on both sides have also been slightly banked. This will relieve the men in the outside lanes from the necessity of elevating themselves for the entire height of the end banks and will be fairer for all.

The curves are not semi-circles as is the case on all other tracks. The first part of the curve is gradual and increases in curvature slowly until the head of the curve is reached when the runner is at his slowest speed. From that point the curve decreases in sharpness until when entering the straightaway the runner can increase his speed without leaving his course as is so often the case on semi-circular tracks. This design enables a runner to enter the curve at greater speed and reduce it slowly. When leaving the curve he can accelerate more quickly since the curve at this point is very gradual.

The lanes are designated by white borders 4 inches wide with various colored stripes 4 inches wide beside them to aid in identifying each lane. Each lane will be measured 8 inches from the inner margin and not 12 inches. The colored stripe may be run upon, but not the white border on penalty of disqualification.

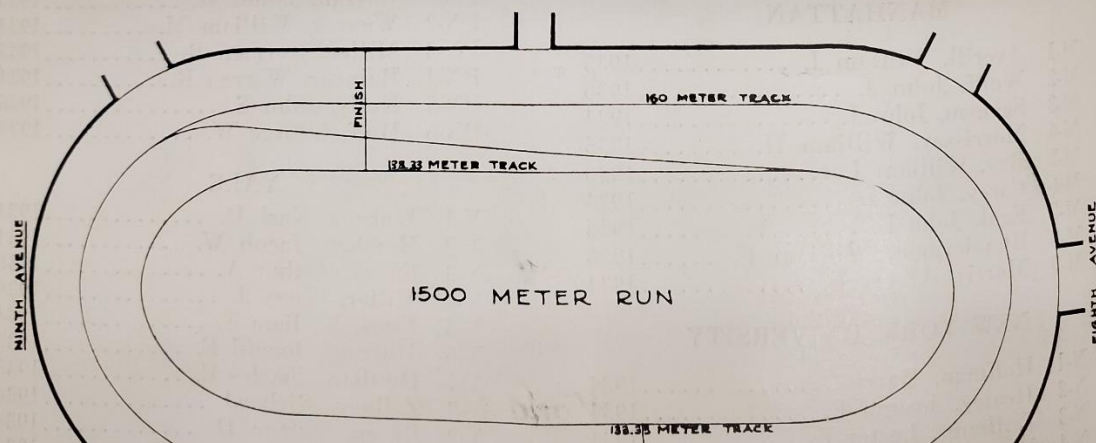

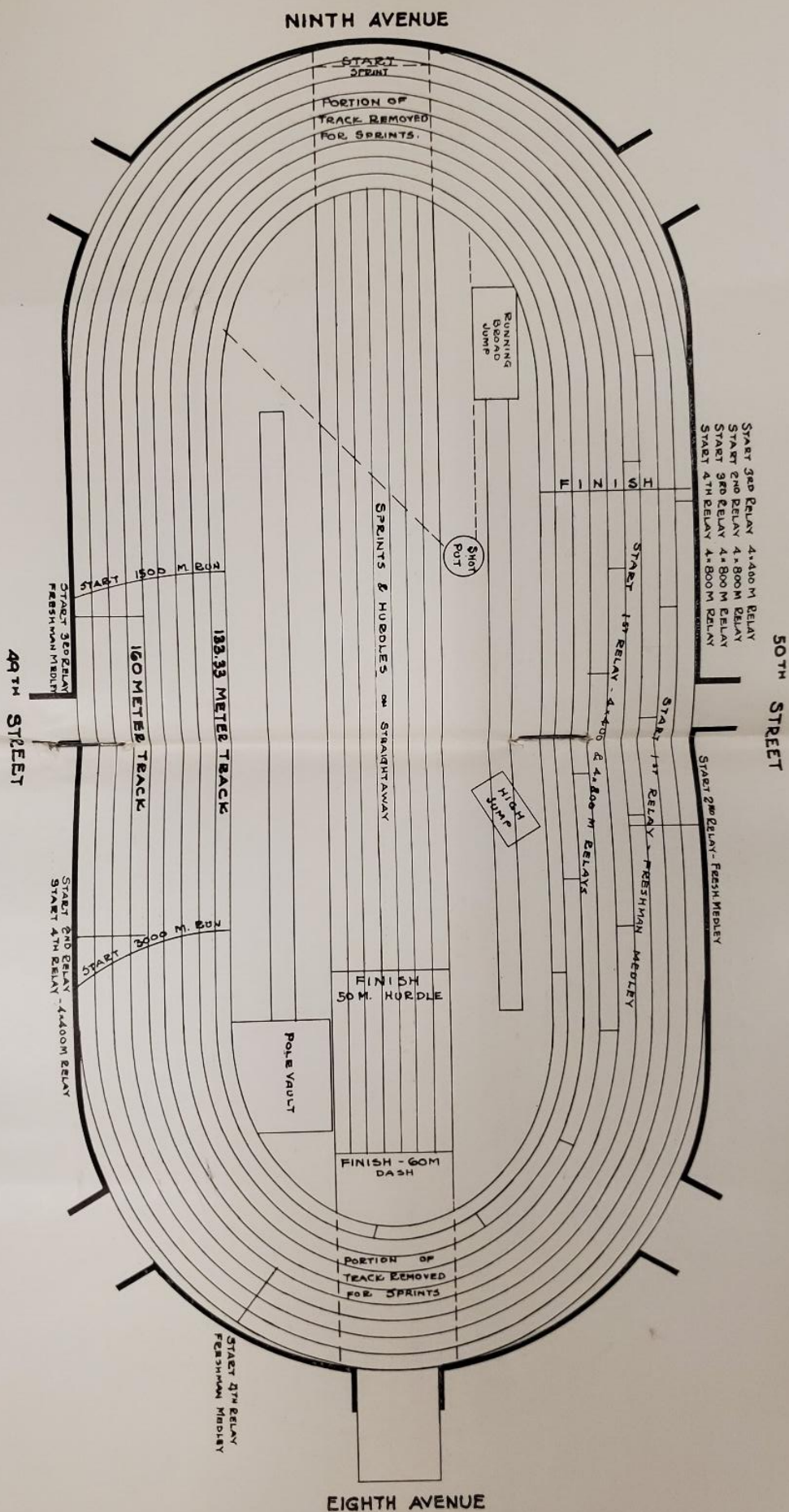

Penalties: For the first or second false start, no penalty, for the third, disqualification.

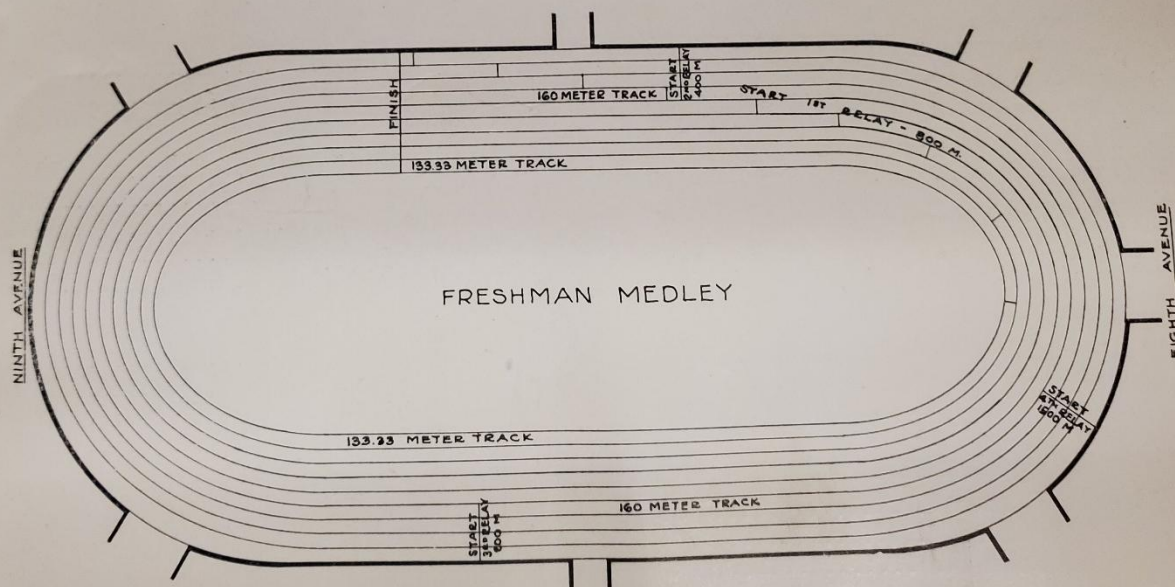
A baton must be passed to each succeeding team mate within a 20 yard zone—10 yards before and 10 yards after the finish line.

EVENT NO. 9 VARSITY 4 x 800 METERS RELAY—FINAL (4 MEN EACH MAN TO RUN 800 METERS OR 5 LAPS)

The first relay runs the first lap only on the inner or 133 1-3 meter track. They are then turned onto the 160 meter track for the remainder of the race. The first lap is run in lanes with staggered starts, each lane being measured for the same distance. The first relay runs 5 laps plus 26 2-3 meters to compensate for the first lap being run on the smaller track.

With each change of relay the position on the track of every team is changed so that each team will have substantially the same distance to cover.

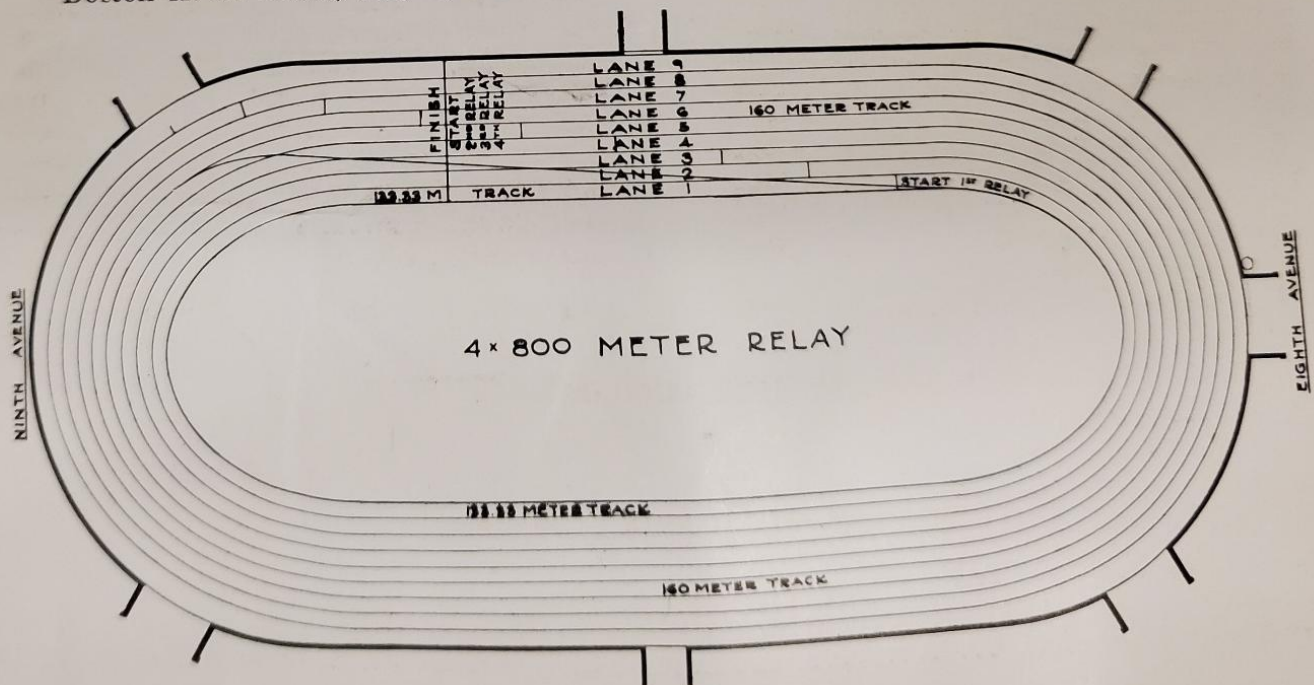

FIELD EVENTS

NOTE.—In the High Jump the standards with platform rests will be used. Instead of the old pegs supporting the cross bar, supports are provided at the top of the standards which are 11-2 inches wide and 23-8 inches deep. It will be seen that with this standard a very slight touch will be sufficient to dislodge the cross bar. In the Pole Vault the old type of standard with 3 inch pegs will be used. There are no longer any balks or balk lines in any field event.
