THE IC4A INDOOR TRACK AND FIELD CHAMPIONSHIPS
75TH CELEBRATION...1922-1996

by John A. Lucas, Track and Field Historian, The Pennsylvania State University

It was 46 years after the inaugural IC4A outdoor competition at Saratoga, New York (1876), that eastern college officials were able to organize the first IC4A Indoor Championships--this time inside New York City's historic 102nd Engineer's Armory on Saturday, March 11, 1922. However, it was two years before the U. S. entered World War I, that the IC4A Executive Board decided to conduct an indoor intercollegiate track meet, "not for the purpose of ascertaining the champion, but for the purpose of bringing together each year in some central locality the athletes and their supporters in a athletic and social gathering." This first non-championship IC4A indoor meet took place in the "second" Madison Square Garden (Madison Ave. & 26th St.) in New York City on Saturday, March 6, 1915, and was called a "relay carnival." Pennsylvania, led by Olympic champion Ted Meredith, won the medley relay, while other relays were won by Dartmouth, Harvard, Cornell, Columbia, and Penn State. The so-called Great War intervened and these "athletic-social" gatherings were canceled. It was not until 1922 that the indoor meet resumed, this time with the rubric "First Indoor Championships" attached.

March 11, 1922 - 102nd Engineers Armory, N Y C - Cornell 35-1/2, Coach: Jack Moakley

Dartmouth's Leroy Brown broke the world's indoor record in the high jump (6'4-7/8"). Bill Stephenson, Princeton anchored the mile relay in 49-2/5 seconds, an astonishing time on a wooden flat-floor. 6,000 fans cheered every event, including Penn State's Larry Shields' mile (4:20.8). It was Standing Room Only, prompting the New York Times to wonder "why the IC4A waited so long before making this event a regular part of the intercollegiate program."

March 11, 1923 - 102nd Engineers Armory - Pennsylvania 29, Coach: Lawson Robertson

Harold B. Lever, University of Pennsylvania ran 7.1 seconds for 70 yards--a world record. Another "SRO" crowd cheered every final, including intercollegiate records by Jimmie Connolly, Georgetown (4:17.8 mile); E.O. McLane, Pennsylvania (9:39.3 two-mile); the Syracuse mile relay (3:23.0); Al Rose, Pennsylvania, 22" 3-1/2" long jump; N.B. Sherrill and B.M. Owen, both from Pennsylvania, 12'6" pole vault, and the young giant from Bowdoin--Fred Tootell, with 52" 9-1/4" in the 35-pound weight. Lastly, Ralph Hills, Princeton tossed the shot a record 45' 8-1/4". "An amazing track meet," wrote Jack Masters in the New York Tribune.

March 1, 1924 - 102nd Engineers Armory - Pennsylvania 21-1/3, Coach: Lawson Robertson

Jules Verne Booth, Johns Hopkins, a future Olympian, ran a record 9:36.0 (2 Miles), while Princeton's Ralph Hills repeated in the shot (46' 3/4"). A new event, the 70-yard high hurdles, was won by Penn State's Charles M. Moore (9.1 seconds), while his school's Schuyler Enck won the mile in 4:24.0. "The Standing Room Only crowd of 5,000 went home pleased with the evening's events."

March 7, 1925 - 102nd Engineers Armory - Georgetown 37, Coach: John D. O'Reilly

Georgetown's first victory came amidst two world indoor records: 7:41.6 two-mile relay (Georgetown) and 13 feet in the pole vault by Nelson B. Sherrill, Pennsylvania; as well as five IC4A record performances: 70-yard High Hurdles, two mile, one mile relay, long jump, and shot put. The 1924 Paris Olympics probably contributed to quality performances in almost every event.

March 6, 1926 - 102nd Engineers Armory - Harvard 28, Coach: Eddie Farrell

The specially built 220-yard banked track was fast and likely caused Georgetown's Jimmy Burgess to fall anchoring the mile relay, thus leaving Harvard free to win the meet. Willard Tibbits, Harvard won the two miles (9:30.8, an IC4A record). Frank Hussey, Boston College equaled the 70-yard world record (7.1), but couldn't beat the brilliant Henry A. Russell, Cornell in the final. Georgetown's multi-event star, Tony Plansky, won the shot put and was fourth in the 35 lb. weight.

March 5, 1927 - 102nd Engineers Armory - Harvard 23-3/7, Coach: Eddie Farrell

Penn State Olympian Bill Cox won the mile in a swift 4:18.6, while Harvard's husky "Truck" Miller regained his 70-yard title (7.2). Journalist Jesse Abramson described the mile relay as "a brilliant orange Syracuse victory and record" (3:21.4) over Georgetown (3:21.6). Indoor pole vault world record-holder, Yale's Sabin Carr, had to share his title with Stephen Bradley, Princeton (13'0"). Sweden's world champion, Edvin Wide, ran a near-record 6:44.4 to win the Invitational 1-1/2 mile event.

March 3, 1928 - 102nd Engineers Armory - Cornell 26, Coach: Jack Moakley

"It was a great track meet," wrote Jesse Abramson, in the New York Herald Tribune. "Four records were broken before a packed crowd." The Syracuse mile relay, Sabin Carr, Yale (Pole Vault); Dave Adelman, Georgetown (shot); and Norwood Wright, Cornell (35-lb. weight); were the meet record setters. The Olympic Games were in Amsterdam that summer and among IC4A athletes who would medal: Ray Barbuti, Syracuse (two gold...400m/1600m relay); Carr, (gold...pole vault); Ben Hedges, Princeton (silver...high jump); John S. Collier, Brown (bronze...high hurdles); Al Bates, Penn State, (bronze...long jump); Ed Black, Maine (bronze...hammer). As Abramson said, "It was one of the IC4A's finest hours."

March 2, 1929 - 102nd Engineers Armory, N Y C - New York University 25, Coach: Emil Von Elling

"Amid wild scenes of jubilation that left seven thousand souls with boiling blood pressure"...a local school--New York University--would win its first IC4A title. The Violet's hero was Phil Edwards, a Canadian born in British Guiana and running for Von Elling's team. Edwards was second (to teammate Joe Hickey) in the mile and came back in less than an hour to anchor NYU's two mile relay team to victory. Yale's Frederic A. Strudy vaulted to a new record (13'7-3/4") while Pennsylvania sophomore, Barney Berlinger, scored 9-1/4 points in the shot; long jump, pole vault, and high jump. Arthur J. Daley, in his New York Times essay, noted that NYU's seven scoring athletes "deserved a welcome victory in these college games."

March 1, 1930 - 102nd Engineers Armory - Cornell and Pennsylvania 27-1/2, Coaches: Jack Moakley and Lawson Robertson

Indoor track and field was a big sport in New York City and 1930 was no exception. Seven thousand fans enjoyed an evening's "nerve-tingling competition" which included Harvard's world record run in the mile relay...a one-inch decision over Holy Cross in 3:20.6. The Crimson ran with Vincent L. Hennessy, Francis E. Cummings, Vernon Munroe, and Eugene L. Record. In the two mile run Penn State's Paul E. Rekers out-sprinted defender, Joe Hagen, Columbia, in 9:22.8, both well under the IC4A record. In another blanket finish, Billy McKniff, Pennsylvania edged Harvard's Norman P. Hallowell in the mile (4:21.0). Sol Furth, NYU won the hurdles and was second in the long jump, raising his three-year point total to 25. Everett Uterback, Pittsburgh broke the IC4A long jump mark with 23'5-1/2".

In May 1976, to commemorate the IC4A's 100th Outdoor Championships at historic Franklin Field, historian Lucas captured...the tradition...the flavor...the ambience...of this oldest continuous track and field competition in his 5,000-word introduction to the new IC4A Record Book.

Now, to salute the "75th" IC4A Indoor Championships, John Lucas has again reached into the past and authored a brief "meet-by-meet" narrative of the previous seventy-four. To encompass his voluminous data within this program, a limited amount of editing for content and format was required. The IC4A "family"...past and present...administrative staff, officials, coaches, athletes, and loyal fans...wish to express our sincere appreciation to John for his dedication and herculean effort for this body of work to memorialize a significant "milestone" in IC4A annals...LTB

March 7, 1931 - 102nd Engineers Armory - Pennsylvania 38-1/10, Coach: Lawson Robertson

The legendary track writer, Jesse Abramson, wrote: "In an epic track and field meeting of unsurpassed brilliance that left 8,000 spectators gasping for breath at its dramatic conclusion, a brigade of undergraduate athletes of heroic stature shattered one world's indoor record, established six intercollegiate records and tied another in the tenth annual championships of the Intercollegiate Association of Amateur Athletes of America contested at the 102nd Engineers Armory and won by the University of Pennsylvania." The Quakers scored 38-1/10 points--another record.

March 5, 1932 - 258th Field Artillery Armory, Bronx, New York - New York University 31, Coach: Emil Von Elling

The enormous Kingsbridge Armory hosted these games for the first time and the 6-laps-to-the-mile track assured record runs. The 10,000 fans could only stand and not sit. By the end of the evening, Jesse Abramson said, the crowd was in a "delirium of excitement." The mile mark of Harvard's Penn Hollowell (4:12.6) was faster than both the indoor and outdoor IC4A record. There were new records by local hero, Joe McCluskey, Fordham in the two mile (9:17.6); by Ted Lee, Yale in the pole vault (13'8-5/8"); and NYU equaling the 3:17.8 world mile relay mark. Seven athletes from NYU scored 31 points, and exactly one mile away, that university was celebrating its one hundredth anniversary.

March 4, 1933 - 258th Field Artillery Armory - Yale 32, Coach: Frank Kanaly

Ten thousand fans were not disappointed as the mile relay world record fell to Pennsylvania's four seniors who stopped the new Kirby Electronic Timer at 3:17.0. Dick Bell, MIT ran 7.0 seconds in the dash, tying the world record, and IC4A marks were created by Joe McCluskey, Fordham in winning his third straight 2 mile title (9:16.2), and pole vault (13' 9-3/4") by Yale's co-champions Wirt Thompson and Keith Brown. The 70 yard hurdles saw six men cross the finish line together. "The judges refused to pick winners until the film of the Kirby camera timer was developed."

March 5, 1934 - The New Madison Square Garden, NYC - Manhattan 28-1/2, Coach: Peter L. Waters

Jesse Abramson wrote in the *New York Herald Tribune*: "After operating for twelve years in dimly lighted and cavernous uptown regimental drillsheds, the IC four-A moves its classic into the bright glare of midtown New York." Fittingly, the local boys from Manhattan College won the team title before 15,000 spectators. Four records were eclipsed: George Spitz, NYU, 6"5-3/8" high jump; Yale's Keith Brown in the vault (14'7/8"); Bill Niblock, Bowdoin (49' 10" shot), and huge Henry Dreyer, Rhode Island the 35-pound weight (55' 2-1/4"). Pete Waters' Jaspers got all their points in six events, upsetting defending titlist...Yale.

March 1, 1935 - Madison Square Garden - Manhattan 26, Coach: Peter L. Waters

One athlete and one team stood above all the rest. Columbia's Ben Johnson won the 50 meters (5.9) and long jump (23' 11-11/16"), while the Jaspers of Manhattan College won the 3,000 meters (Tommy Russell), the 50 meter hurdles (Charles Pessoni), and all three relays. IC4A Veterans took gold medals: Keith Brown in both high jump (his first) and vault (his third) and Henry Dryer, Rhode Island (his second) 35-pound weight throw; while emerging star Gene Venske, Pennsylvania won the 1,500.

March 1, 1936 - Madison Square Garden - Manhattan 26, Coach: Peter L. Waters

Coach Waters and his "Jaspers" won their third title in a row, and pleased the locals among the 12,000 fans. "There was fire and spirit in these Manhattanites," wrote Arthur Daley in the *New York Times*. "The one-two achievement of Lou Burns and Bill Ray" in the "1,500," wrote Jesse Abramson, "gave Manhattan a 9-point lift." A new event--the 600 meters--was added to the program and a brilliant run by Syracuse's Eddie O'Brien created a new record--1:21.7.

March 13, 1937 - Madison Square Garden - Columbia 34-5/14, Coach: Carl Merner

Columbia won its first indoor title, scoring all over the Garden track and field. Captain of the team, Ben Johnson, won the "60" (6.3) and the long jump (24' 1/8", a record). Eddie O'Brien, Syracuse defended in the now-shorter 600-yard run (1:31.1...a record) over Howie Borck, Manhattan. "With so many 'eyelash-close' races..." Jesse Abramson wrote: "The 12,000 Garden fans were in a constant state of delirium."

March 5, 1938 - Madison Square Garden - Columbia 27, Coach: Carl Merner

The Columbia Lions won again. World's fastest indoor human, Ben Johnson of Columbia, touched 6.2 seconds in a semi-final (world record) and won the final. Frank Ryan won the shot (51' 10-3/4") and Columbia scored heavily in the vault, long jump, and the 35-pound weight. Art Byrnes of Manhattan high jumped a record 6'6", while teammate Howie Borck won with a record 1:12.0 in the "600." Yale's Ted Day ran a record 7.4 in the hurdles, while Rhode Island giant, 6'6", 245 pound Irving Folwarshtny (called by the press "Shorty" and "Goliath") won the 35-lb. weight (55' 6-3/4").

March 4, 1939 - Madison Square Garden - Manhattan 36, Coach: Peter L. Waters

Manhattan became the first school to win the team trophy four times, winning three events and scoring in eight. 14,000 fans packed the Garden to see three New York City schools win 10 of 14 events. Artie Burns of Manhattan broke his own high jump record with a 6'6-1/4" leap, while Yale's Jay Shields tied the hurdle record of 7.4. New York University won all three relays on the program. In an exhibition two-mile run, the immortal Glenn Cunningham narrowly defeated fellow Olympian Don Lash (9:11.3 to 9:11.5)

March 2, 1940 - Madison Square Garden - New York University 27, Coach: Emil Von Elling

The *New York Times* sport headline shouted: "NYU upsets Manhattan. Six records broken, including a world record by Georgetown's Al Blozis 55' 3-1/4." Penn State's Barney Ewell won the "60" and broke the long jump record (24' 8-1/8"). Ed Burrows ran a 2:13.8 "1,000"--a Princeton and IC4A record. Championship marks were also set by Ed Dugger, Tufts, high hurdles (7.3), and Jimmie Herbert, NYU--a 1:11.1 "600."

March 1, 1941 - Madison Square Garden - Fordham 25-1/4, Coach: Bob Giegengack

The New York City newspapers were filled with Fordham University's first IC4A team victory, with Coach Giegengack's "Five Year Plan" and with "Fordham's foot-racing forces,"..."The Rapid Rams." Not only did Fordham win the 600, the 1,000, and the two-mile relay, but they scored in the high jump, mile relay, the two-mile run and more points in the 1,000. Eleven of their athletes scored. A full house saw Leslie McMitchell, NYU win again, this time with a record 4:12.0, plus an extraordinary world record in the shot (56' 3-3/4") by Georgetown's Al Blozis.

March 6, 1942 - Madison Square Garden - Penn State 21-7/10, Coach: "Chick" Werner

Penn State's Werner and Fordham's Bob Giegengack ran close in the team scoring and both had angry words over an alleged ineligible State athlete. The problem was not Penn State's Barney Ewell who jumped 25' 2-1/2"--a record. All-American (football and track) Al Blozis, Georgetown broke his own world record with a 56' 3-3/8" toss in winning his fifth (of six...3 indoor and 3 outdoor) IC4A shot titles. It should be noted that Blozis, then an Army lieutenant, died in January 1945 while on a combat mission in Europe. A. Richmond "Boo" Morcom, New Hampshire jumped 6'4" and 14' 4-1/4" in the high jump and pole vault--both winning efforts. Pitt's William Carter won the "60" in world-record equaling time, 6.2 seconds. World War II was creating serious disarray in everything, including the continuation of the IC4A Championships.

March 5, 1943 - Madison Square Garden - New York University 48, Coach: Emil Von Elling

New Hampshire finished fourth and all 12 points were scored by the "one-man gang"--A. Richmond "Boo" Morcom. He won the pole vault (14' 0"), took a second in the long jump and third in the high jump. NYU's 48 points was an all-time indoor IC4A team-scoring effort. Another record to go was the Columbia stylist, Bill Vessie, in the high jump. Vessie was faultless, clearing 6' 6-1/4" and made three unsuccessful efforts at 6' 8". A rare blunder by officials occurred in the two-mile relay won by Fordham. The second leg on each team ran one lap short...and no times were recorded.

March 4, 1944 - Madison Square Garden - Army 47, Coach: Unknown

Very few male athletes were to be found on Eastern College campuses in 1944--in the middle of WW II -- so naturally Army and Navy dominated these IC4A's. Gil Dodds was then studying theology in Boston, and he won the invitational mile in 4:10.2. All the other events were "sub-par," although the brilliant starter from NYU, Eddie Conwell, ran a 6.3 dash. Not a single other event rivaled times or distances compared to previous years. Victory belonged to the meet organizers to have persevered amidst this ultimate wartime stress.

March 3, 1945 - Madison Square Garden - Army 73-1/2, Coach: Unknown

Even veteran track journalist, Jesse Abramson of the *Herald-Tribune* was amazed. "No records were broken, except one: attendance...13,472 fans jammed the Garden." Army and Navy combined for 129 points--almost all the points available on the Garden floor. The war had taken its toll in many ways and no records were approached, let alone broken. The world's champion from Sweden, Gunder Hagg, came in last place in the invitational mile, following a rough, long and dangerous sea voyage across the Atlantic. He ran 20 seconds slower than his 4:01 world record. His mate, Eric Hasken Lidman, did better, finishing 3rd in the invitational 50-yard high hurdles and winning the 60-yard high hurdles in 7.4. There were additional "Special Events" in an effort to make the reduced war-time program more attractive.

March 2, 1946 - Madison Square Garden - Army 53-1/2, Coach: Unknown

The peerless Jesse Abramson, wrote "Eight cadets, including Felix (Doc) Blanchard, Ralph (Twin) Davis, Max Minor and Andy Lamar, piled up an insurmountable lead" in just three events and "no one else had a chance of catching or matching the mercury-gaited or bulging-muscled soldiers from The Plain (West Point)." One name that Abramson forgot to mention was DeWitt "Tex" Coulter, All-American football tackle, who arrived at the shot put area thirty minutes late and still managed to win (53' 3/4"). There were "thrills and spills" all over the Garden as athletes returning from the war had not yet regained top form. The Zamperini Invitation Mile was won by Leslie MacMitchell (4:16.0) over France's Marcel Hansenne.

February 28, 1947 - Madison Square Garden - New York University 35, Coach: Emil Von Elling

The NYU "Violets" retired the IC4A Cup after their fifth indoor triumph. A roaring crowd of 13,000 saw four local boys win first place, led by NYU's Irv Mondschein's record leap of 6' 7-1/4". Both Glenn Davis, Army and stocky Joseph Cianciabella, Manhattan ran 6.2 seconds for the "60," but the latter's time was in the final. Penn State's Curt Stone, destined to become a three-time Olympian (1948-1952-1956) won the 2-mile in 9:17.6. A. Richmond "Boo" Morcom, New Hampshire won the pole vault (13' 6") and extended his IC4A career as possibly its greatest jump field event athlete.

February 26, 1948 - Madison Square Garden - New York University 31-1/2, Coach: Emil Von Elling

Forty-one universities sent athletes but for the sixth time the Violets of NYU won top honors. Horace Ashenfelter III, Penn State, his head filled with Scandinavian training techniques brought home by his coach, "Chick" Werner, lowered the two-mile record to a respectable 9:14.9. Journalist Joseph M. Sheehan of the *New York Times* wrote that the NYU "stalwarts" Irving Mondschein and Reginald Pearman performed with "high inspirational fervor". Tommie Quinn, NYAC, beat Penn State graduate, Curt Stone, in a fast "special" two-mile (9:11.1). It was an Olympic year--the first in 12 years--and many in the Garden that day would be American Olympians in London later that year.

February 26, 1949 - Madison Square Garden - Michigan State 35-2/5, Coach: Karl Schlademan

Each of the three top teams had three winners. Michigan State's heroes were Fred Johnson (first in the long jump and second in the sprint); Horace Smith and a new 7.2 record in the hurdles, and superb anchor leg by Jack Dianetti in the two-mile relay shortly after finishing second in the mile. Powerful Army cadet, Jim Scholtz, broke the world record in the 35-pound weight toss with 60' 7-3/4", while Yale's Olympic champion, Jim Fuchs, won the shot with 55' 5-1/4". The Zamperini Invitational Mile was won by Sweden's Ingvar Bengtsson (4:02.2), over FBI agent, Olympian Fred Wilt, France's Marcel Hansenne, and another Swede, Erik Ahlden.

February 25, 1950 - Madison Square Garden - Michigan State 21, Coach: Karl Schlademan

Only the thinnest margins separated the top three teams, prompting eye-witness Joseph M. Sheehan of the *New York Times* to call it "one of the wildest and woolliest team battles in IC4A history. It was an eleven-hour jumble of thrills, spills and upsets." The 10,000 fans agreed. Sheehan called them all "enthralled railbirds." Three meet records were broken, Michigan State's Bill Mack ran a 4:11.0 mile; Cornell's Charley Moore sprinted 600 yards in 1:11.0 in a heat; and Dick Church, Syracuse ran a fine 9:07.2 two mile. The "messed up" mile relay was won by the Pirates of Seton Hall (3:22.0), while a powerful Georgetown team "romped home in the two-mile relay in 7:44.6." Fred Wilt capped off the evening by winning the invitation 2 mile in a brilliant 8:55.2.

February 24, 1951 - Madison Square Garden - Manhattan 29, Coach: George Eastment

The great writer from the *Boston Globe*, Jerry Nason, wrote: "The Kelly green jerseys of Manhattan flashed to the IC4A team title and the fire truck red of Don Gehrmann's shirt showed one foot ahead of Fred Wilt in the Invitation Mile" (4:08.6). Seton Hall's Andy Stanfield, a future Olympic champion, was superb, winning both the "60" (6.3) and the long jump (24' 5-1/2"). Joe Deady, Georgetown crushed Ed Burrows' 1940 record (2:13.8) with a great 2:11.7 effort. The IC4A championships, both indoors and outdoors, had for thirty years been the incubator for more track and field Olympians than any other conference in the land. And it would continue to do so.

February 23, 1952 - Madison Square Garden - Manhattan 40-1/2, Coach: George Eastment

The wizard coach from Manhattan, George Eastment, led his team to victory in front of an appreciative 10,000 track and field fans. The Jaspers were everywhere and, remarkably, scoring points in every single event except three. One of his sprinters, John O'Connell, tied the record with a "6.2" dash. In the Invitational races, Fred Wilt of the FBI ran the world's fastest indoor 2-mile in 8:50.5, only a few yards ahead of Horace Ashenfelter and Curt Stone...where in the 880 yards, Reginald Pearman nipped Don Gehrmann in 1:51.3, a tenth faster than the Garden record set by the late John Borican in 1942, and "the fastest half-mile ever run on any eleven-lap track."

February 20, 1953 - Madison Square Garden - Manhattan 36, Coach: George Eastment

It was Manhattan's third straight indoor title, impressive work for Coach Eastment's team over 41 others. Both Joe Sheehan, *New York Times*, and Jesse Abramson, *Herald-Tribune*, agreed that it was a great meet. They used phrases like "Freddy Dwyer's wizardry in the mile"; "notable performance by Penn State's Ollie Sax" and "Manhattan's juicy but curious nine points in the sprint." Freddy's win was "a rare third straight victory." After a great many years covering the sport, it was obvious by their by-lines that Abramson, Sheehan and *Boston Globe's* Jerry Nason knew the sport and loved the excitement on the indoor boards.

February 27, 1954 - Madison Square Garden - Yale 19, Coach: Bob Giegengack

Yale, Boston University and Manhattan engaged in a tight team battle that wasn't decided until the last event, the mile relay. Yale's field coach, Dr. Frank Ryan, had his men scoring in every event but one, helping the Eli to its first title since 1933. B.U. had never been a team factor and coaches Doug Raymond and Ed Flanagan were pleased. The only meet record was set by Fordham's Tom Courtney, 1956 Olympic 800 champion, with an awesome 2:10.9 "1000." It is noteworthy that Giegengack becomes the first to coach two schools to an IC4A title (see Fordham, 1941).

February 25, 1955 - Madison Square Garden - Manhattan 27, Coach: George Eastment

Villanova's Future Olympic 400 meter champion, Charlie Jenkins, was the hardest working athlete of this indoor championship version. "He won the 600 in a fast 1:11.2, and altogether racing in two sixty-yard sprint trials; two 600 trials, and two relay legs--an astounding day's work" (Jerry Nason, Boston Globe). But Manhattan, with only one winner (Charlie Pratt in the hurdles), won the team title. Syracuse ran 7:40.9 in a qualifying heat of the two-mile relay, breaking the record (7:41.6) of Georgetown set 30 years before. Future Olympic champion Arnie Sowell, Pittsburgh, was on cruise-control and "ribbon smooth," winning the "1000" (2:14.7) after having run a world record 2:08.2 a week earlier.

February 24, 1956 - Madison Square Garden - Manhattan 36, Coach: George Eastment

New York Herald Tribune writer Jesse Abramson wrote "Manhattan won the team title and permanent possession of the IC4A Cup for winning the meet five times." Five new IC4A marks were set: Johnnie Haines, Pennsylvania (6.1 "60"); George King, NYU (9:07.2 two mile); Al Hall, Cornell (62'8-1/4" weight throw); Pittsburgh's two mile relay (7:40.1) and Villanova's Donald Bragg (15'2" pole vault). It was a heck of a track meet with the two legendary coaches, Eastment and Jim "Jumbo" Elliott of Villanova, in a very close contest for the coveted first place trophy.

March 2, 1957 - Madison Square Garden - Villanova 46, Coach: James "Jumbo" Elliott

It had to happen. Coach Elliott's superb Villanova won the team title for the first time. From this winning team, Phil Reavis and Charlie Stead tied in a record-setting high jump (6'9-1/2"); Don Bragg took the vault at 15'0"; the mile relay team won (3:20.6); Charlie Jenkins dominated the "600" (1:21/1), and superman Irishman Ron Delany won an unprecedented "double" (2:14.0 "1000" and record two mile 9:06.6). "The 7,130 fans were left in a tizzy."

March 1, 1958 - Madison Square Garden - Villanova 29-1/3, Coach: James "Jumbo" Elliott

The New York Times journalist, Joseph M. Sheehan, was correct in that the loss of senior Ron Delany of Villanova would make things a little easier for some other teams, but not till next year. The magnificent Delany from Dublin, Ireland, won the "1000" and the 2-mile again. Another Irishman and an immigrant from Estonia, John Lawlor and Eino Keerd, both of Boston University, took 1-2 in the 35-pound weight. Another non-American, Istvan Rozsavolgyi of Hungary, won the Invitation Mile with a 4:08.7 performance.

March 2, 1959 - Madison Square Garden - Penn State 20.47, Coach: "Chick" Werner

Penn State...winner of only two events, Ed Moran with a 2:09.6 "1000" record and Richard Engelbrink, the two-mile (9:13.3)...defeated Manhattan in the closest and most controversial scoring contest in 28 years. The see-saw battle kept 9,818 spectators in an uproar. Also, the Pitt mile relay ran a record 3:18.6. In 13 scoring events there were winners from 12 different universities, again something unprecedented in the long history of this meet.

March 5, 1960 - Madison Square Garden - Villanova 27, Coach: James "Jumbo" Elliott

The brilliant Tom Laris, Dartmouth College, only a 19 year old sophomore from New York City's Washington High School, ran an 8:59.0 two miles--the fastest IC4A time ever, indoors or outdoors. The score prior to the mile relay was 22 points for both Yale and Villanova. The Yale runner fell down, Villanova won the race and the team title. There were quality events throughout, including a record 7.4 seconds by Maryland's hurdler, Bill Johnson--this time over five barriers. Performances par excellence in the shot (57'0" by Joe Marchione, Manhattan), a 63' 1-1/4" toss in the 35-pound weight by B.U.'s John Lawlor and another Boston University Terrier, John Thomas, over the high jump bar at 7'1/2".

March 11, 1961 - Madison Square Garden - Yale 30, Coach: Bob Giegengack

Nearly 11,000 spectators rose as one on the last event, the mile relay, as the Villanova anchor man pushed another runner and was disqualified, thus allowing Yale to win the meet. There was plenty more excitement, as Yale won its third indoor title, their first since 1954. An injured John Thomas won the high jump, just managing a meager (for him) 6'6". "Jud" Sage, Navy hurled the 35-pound weight 63' 4-1/4", a record. Frank Budd, Villanova tied the IC4A and world record of 6.1 seconds dash, while another Villanovan, Leon Pras, tied the hurdle record of 7.4. Jay Luck, Yale was heroic in the number of times that he ran in the dash and hurdles. The future great finished fourth and second in these two event finals.

March 10, 1962 - Madison Square Garden - Villanova 31-1/2, Coach: James "Jumbo" Elliott

Fifty-one colleges sent several hundred athletes to the 41st Indoor IC4A's and most of the 11,972 spectators came away convinced that the top athlete was Villanova's Frank Budd. The chunky 22 year old senior from Asbury Park, New Jersey, ran 60 yards in 6.0 seconds--a world record...and he did it twice. Joe Sheehan, New York Times wrote: "Villanova's fired-up squad made a run-away of the team title...the 4th victory in 6 years for Coach Jim "Jumbo" Elliott. There were records all over the Garden: Tyrone Pannell, Manhattan tied the hurdles record (7.4); Yale's Bobby Mack ran an 8:58.3 two-mile; Rolando Cruz, Villanova vaulted 15' 3-3/4"; NYU's Gary Gubner's startling 64' 1-1/2" shot was seven feet beyond the old record, and Ted Bailey, Harvard established a new 35-weight record of 63'5".

March 9, 1963 - Madison Square Garden - Villanova 27, Coach: James "Jumbo" Elliott

Villanova smashed the relay record (3:16.3) while their superb vaulter, Rolando Cruz, became the IC4A's first 16-foot vaulter (16'1"). African student Aggray Awori, Harvard ran over five hurdles in 7.3, a record. From the West Indies and Yale, Wendell Mottley ran a record 1:09.9 "600." The two mile relay record fell to Seton Hall (7:39.8). There was no doubt about the best team...legendary Jumbo Elliott had a "lock" on the first place trophy.

March 7, 1964 - Madison Square Garden - Villanova 22, Coach: James "Jumbo" Elliott

Keen but friendly rivals in the post-war years, Villanova and Manhattan fought it out on nearly even terms. The time of Yale's Wendell Mottley (1:09.3) was a "600" world record. Seton Hall scorched the Garden board track with a record 7:33.4, more than six seconds under the IC4A mark. LaSalle's John Uelses vaulted to yet another vault mark (16'1-1/4") while Gary Gubner, NYU won his third consecutive shot title. The track meet had become an American sporting institution--the oldest indoor track and field championship in the world.

March 5, 1965 - Madison Square Garden - Villanova 24, Coach: James "Jumbo" Elliott

Villanova assistant coach Jim Tuppeny "pounded head coach Jumbo Elliott over the head with a rolled-up program." Losing but never defeated, Coach Jim Kehoe of Maryland murmured, "We gave it a whirl" (Frank Dolson, Philadelphia Inquirer). Both Courtland Gray, Navy and Richard Sheer, Maryland ran a record-tying 7.3 in the hurdles semi-finals. Billy Clark, Notre Dame ran fine record two-mile (8:52.7), while Maryland's slick jumper, Frank Costello, cleared 7'0". Jesse Abramson, writing the next morning, was amused by Coach Elliott, who moaned at mid-meet: "We can't beat Maryland." But Jumbo's Wildcats "came on like the US Calvary and scored 18 points in the last five events."

March 4, 1966 - Madison Square Garden - Maryland 28, Coach: Jim Kehoe

The Maryland Terrapins scored all but six of its points in the field, as 64 colleges contested this indoor classic. It was Maryland's first indoor victory and a great satisfaction for Coach Jim Kehoe—Maryland's super runner of the late 1930's and a Pacific Theatre World War II hero. His team won four of the five field events—the high jump (Frank Costello 6'10"); pole vault (Tom Gagner 15'4"); long jump (Ed Marks 24'10-3/4"); and shot put (Ernie Hearon 57' 7-1/2"). Frank Litsky, *New York Times* wrote that Kehoe and his five volunteer assistant coaches never forgot the "field" in "track and field." More than 9,000 fans enjoyed record runs by Georgetown's Ricardo Urbina (2:08.8 "1000"); Dave Patrick, Villanova in the mile (4:06.7 record) and Dave Hemery of Boston University in the 60-yard high hurdles (7.1 second record in the semi-finals).

March 4, 1967 - Madison Square Garden - Villanova 36, Coach: James "Jumbo" Elliott

"Jumbo's" forces from Villanova won the mile relay, high hurdles (Erv Hall 7.3); distance races (Dave Patrick 4:09.4 and Charlie Messenger 8:59.7)...and they won this championship again. Notre Dame's Peter Farrell (brother of famed Tommy Farrell, St. John's), won the "1000" in 2:12.8. Yale produced two gold-medalists...Mark Young, in the 600 (1:11.5) and football player Calvin Hill, the long jump (24'8-3/4") while Bob Kitchen, Springfield won a new non-scoring event—the mile walk (6:43.6).

March 10, 1968 - "New" Madison Square Garden (33rd St. & 8th Avenue) - Villanova 47, Coach: James "Jumbo" Elliott

Even though "Jumbo" and his team didn't care for the new Garden track, with its low-banked turns, it failed to keep them from an overwhelming team victory, led by Dave Patrick's record-breaking 4:06.1 mile. Sebsebe Mamo, Colby ran a big-time two-mile record of 8:50.7 while American's Peter Chen vaulted 16'4-1/4"...a record. Two athletes that would win Olympic gold medals later this year ran a classic "600" Larry James, Villanova (1:10.2) over B.U.'s Dave Hemery (1:10.8).

March 8, 1969 - Madison Square Garden - Villanova 46, Coach: James "Jumbo" Elliott

At meet conclusion, Maryland's Jim Kehoe congratulated Jumbo Elliott and his team on their tenth indoor championship. "I don't know how you do it, damned if I do," exclaimed Kehoe. Nearly 9,200 spectators couldn't figure it out either. The Wildcats' Larry James ran a record 1:09.2, an 11-lap track world record. Thirty minutes later he ran 48.0 anchoring Villanova's mile relay, coming from 15 yards back and winning by five. Teammate Frank Murphy ran an awesome record "1000" (2:07.1), and Marty Liquori, another Elliott product, who set a new mile mark (4:05.3). Holy Cross's Arthur Dulong capped an evening of records-setting by shattering the two mile mark by nearly six seconds (8:44.9).

March 7, 1970 - Madison Square Garden - Villanova 41-1/2, Coach: James "Jumbo" Elliott

The Maryland track and field team was good...Villanova was better. It was becoming a familiar story. Of course, no one knew at the time that after 37 years, it would be the last IC4A meet held in Madison Square Garden. Wildcats won the "600" (Larry James 1:10.4); "1000" (Andy O'Reilly); a record mile by Marty Liquori (4:02.0); another record in the two mile (Dick Buerkle 8:42.2), and the mile relay (3:17.4).

March 5, 1971 - Jadwin Gym, Princeton University - Villanova 42, Coach: James "Jumbo" Elliott

4,500 fans witnessed the 50th indoor championship and, arguably, the best one ever. Ten records fell as "Villanova's polished runners" won their ninth team title in ten years, their 12th in 15 years. Villanova milers had now won that event eight straight years, as Marty Liquori won his 3rd consecutive race (4:06.1). Another "Wildcat", Lamotte Hyman, set a record 48.5 (440--new event), while 'Nova's two-mile relay team of Liquori, Rick Kell, Karl Kinscherf, and Chris Mason ran a record 7:31.6. A very fine record run in the two mile (8:42.1) was made by Pittsburgh's Jerry Richey. It was the first time on a new flat, 220-yard track, and records fell in the "600" (1:08.5); pole vault (16'4-1/2"); triple jump (50'1"--new event); "880" (1:51.5--new event), and distance medley (9:52.5--new event). The great veteran track writer, Frank Dolson, *Philadelphia Inquirer* had a headline that said it all: "New Site Changes Mood, Not Result. Villanova wins again." The IC4A had moved to a larger and faster indoor facility, on a university campus, however, "old timers" found it lacking something...a kind of "mystique" attached to the wooden boards of the "Garden."

March 4, 1972 - Jadwin Gym, Princeton University - Pennsylvania 26, Coach: James Tuppeny

Writing in the *Philadelphia Inquirer*, Allen Lewis said: "Penn's team, without a title since the glory days of Bill Carr and Barney Berlinger in 1931, had just dethroned Villanova, which had won the championship in 12 of the last 15 seasons, the last five in succession." And Tuppeny had been an assistant coach at Villanova during most of that reign. Records fell, of course, on the big, unbanked astroturf track. Brian McElroy, Villanova stepped a record 2:06.9 "thousand" while Adelphi and Penn State ran record-breaking relays (3:14.9 and 9:47.8 distance medleys, respectively). Tuppeny was incorrect, too modest, when he exclaimed: "Jumbo taught me all I know."

March 5, 1973 - Jadwin Gym, Princeton University - Manhattan 45, Coach: Fred Dwyer

The Manhattan "Jaspers" returned to Eastern track and field dominance after a 17-year absence. Coach Freddie Dwyer, himself the greatest IC4A miler on the 1950's, unleashed champions Ken McBryde (record 51' 3/4" triple jump), a fast "1000" by Cliff Bruce (2:10.6), a brilliant two-mile (8:43.8) run by Irish Olympian Mike Keough. Mike came back with a 4:05.6 anchor on the Jaspers' winning distance medley relay (9:53.5). Chris Dunn, Colgate jumped a record 7'1"; Fordham's fine 2-mile relay team ran a record 7:30.8; Pennsylvania's Denis Fikes ran a record mile (4:02.0); while Seton Hall mile relay ran to another record. The *New York Times* wrote: "In almost every event, including the relays, Manhattan performed up to expectations, a remarkable showing of consistency for a competition that traditionally looks forward to the unexpected."

March 3, 1974 - Jadwin Gym, Princeton University - Villanova 29, Coach: James "Jumbo" Elliott

John Dell wrote in the *Philadelphia Inquirer* that winning coach "Jumbo Elliott went home after this too close championship meet feeling 'like the guy who knocked the jigsaw puzzle pieces off the table and looked down to see a complete picture on the floor.' Everything had to fall into place and it did." Elliott's squad won the half-mile, mile, two-mile, distance medley relay...and its 13th indoor title. Charlie Joseph, Seton Hall ran a record 47.7 quarter-mile, then "The Hall" raced a record mile relay (3:13.3). Eighteen-year-old Ellen Minkow, Syracuse was given permission to compete in the non-scoring one mile race-walk and won in 7:36.1--the first and only woman competitor in IC4A history.

March 8, 1975 - Jadwin Gym, Princeton University - Seton Hall 37, Coach: John Moon

Neil Amdur, veteran sport journalist for *The New York Times*, quoted an irritated but winning coach, John Moon: "My three Seton Hall quarter-milers were running against themselves in a section of the 440-yard dash final. It was wrong, and everybody in the place knew it was wrong. And it fired us up." The Pirates won their first team title over a strong Maryland team. There were plenty of thrills and records in the cavernous Jadwin Gym. Boris Djerassi, Northeastern hurled the 35-pound ball 66' 10-1/2"; Tom Howell, Rutgers jumped 7'2"; the Princeton relay team ran 7:27.0 for two miles; while Seton Hall blazed a 3:12.9 mile relay, and the Hall's Charlie Joseph tied his own quarter-mile mark of 47.7. This was also the initial Indoor Championship under the leadership of the new IC4A Administrator...Art Farnham...a former MIT coach.

March 7, 1976 - Jadwin Gym, Princeton University - Maryland 38, Coach: Jim Kehoe

Track and field, essentially individual sport, has a powerful team element, and it was manifested in this close team struggle between Maryland's "Terrapins", Seton Hall's "Pirates", and the Villanova "Wildcats". As usual, it was Maryland's skilled field event champions against the runners from "The Hall" and "Nova" that eventually earned them their second team title. Honors were spread: Jim Peterson, Georgetown won a new event, the 3-mile in 13:37.4; Ed Lennex, St. Joseph's upped the triple jump record to 53'3"; while Mel Embree, Harvard did the same with a 7'2-1/4" high jump. Maryland's Dennis Ivory didn't break the long jump record but his 25' 1/4" leap was a great performance for a teenage freshman. Senior Orlando Greene won the "880" in record time (1:50.7) and remarked: "I've been trying to win this race for three years, for myself and for Seton Hall."

March 6, 1977 - Jadwin Gym, Princeton University - Villanova 51, Coach: James "Jumbo" Elliott

Former great athlete from Maryland, now coach, Frank Costello, didn't think he could beat Jumbo Elliott's team, but Costello didn't share that concern with his excellent Terrapin team. They fell short in a spirited team competition. William and Mary's Dave Lipinski broke the vault record by a quarter inch (16' 8-1/2"), while Irishman John Treacy, Providence lowered the three-mile mark to 13:36.55. Work horse for Villanova, Mark Belger, set the "880" record (1:50.7). The three relays went to schools that had been there before: mile - Villanova (3:15.6); 2 mile - Manhattan (7:29.9); distance medley - Georgetown (9:59.3). The meet was now becoming a fixture at Princeton's Jadwin Gym, although many former athletes, fans, and coaches still longed for the familiar boards of Madison Square Garden.

March 5, 1978 - Jadwin Gym, Princeton University - Villanova 64, Coach: James "Jumbo" Elliott

It was a repeat performance, i.e., Maryland's team building a lead on Jumbo Elliott's Villanova crew. But, as Gordon Forbes wrote in *The Philadelphia Inquirer*: "In the final 65 minutes of yesterday's Jadwin Gym showcase for Jumbo's splendid runners, the Wildcats won 6 of 7 races" and...the meet. The remarkable Franklin Jacobs, Fairleigh Dickinson cleared the high jump bar more than twenty inches above his head (7'4") for an IC4A record. Villanova's brilliant Mark Belger clocked an astounding 1:48.74 "880" record. All times were now electronically measured to the hundredth of a second. Belger's teammate, Tim Dale, sprinted a record 47.69 in the "440"; while Army's Curt Alitz ran a record three mile (13:23.82). Records fell in the hurdles as frosh sensation Rinaldo Nehemiah, Maryland ran 7:23. Another Terrapin, Bob Calhoun, jumped a record 25' 1-3/4" to go along with his victory in the 60-yard dash. In a friendly \$5 bet, both head coaches had predicted that their team would not win the meet. Coach Elliott lost, and when young Frank Costello collected his bet, Jumbo handed him a \$50 bill and asked for \$45 change. "Heck," replied Frank, "I'd never seen a fifty dollar bill in my life." It was a very good track meet.

March 4, 1979 - Jadwin Gym, Princeton University - Villanova 99, Coach: James "Jumbo" Elliott

Nowhere in Jumbo Elliott's illustrious 45 years of coaching at Villanova was there anything that might hint that his team would score 99 points in this championship meet, their third title in a row, their 16th team victory. Three schools scored a total of 211 points. The "Wildcats," the "Terrapins," and the "Jaspers" were everywhere on the Jadwin Gym floor. Harvard's Geoff Stiles became the meet's first 17-foot vaulter (17' 1-1/4"). Garnett Edwards, West Virginia broke "Skeets" Nehemiah's record with a 7.17 seconds effort. Bob Kania broke a "barrier" with a 70' 2-1/4" throw in the 35-weight, and Villanova's Sydney Maree, from South Africa, ran a fine 13:23.65 record in the three-mile event. An hour later, despite a sore leg, the 22-year-old anchored his distance medley team to a win. Even more remarkable was Don Paige's anchor on the two-mile relay. He started more than 35 yards back, ran a stunning 1:49.14, adding to Villanova's luster, which included winning all three relays.

March 8, 1980 - Jadwin Gym, Princeton University - Villanova 66, Coach: James "Jumbo" Elliott

Old time track and field athletes from forty years earlier would have been amazed at the changes in their IC4A program--in the proliferation of events, in the elevated quality of running, jumping, and throwing performances. For the first time since the Olympic Games year 1936, the metric system was utilized. Athletes and coaches played "mind games" in selecting from the new "metric menu" 400/500/800/1500/3000/5000. But, in the end, Jumbo's Villanova team edged a surprisingly powerful Fairleigh Dickinson and the always skillfully coached Maryland "Terps." For the first time, in large numbers, runners from the African Continent ran very well and altered the outcome of the team point scoring.

March 8, 1981 - Jadwin Gym, Princeton University - Maryland 97, Coach: Stanley Pitts

It was Stan Pitt's 42nd birthday. He was the new Maryland track coach. It was a double celebration, for the Terrapins won the meet with nearly a hundred points. "The Maryland guys were really psyched," said Chris Person, winner of the "500." Business man and new assistant coach, Frank Costello, complemented his own Maryland team for quality, depth, and team spirit. There were records everywhere. Rodney Wilson, Villanova drove the hurdles record down to 7.28. The talented Sydney Maree, Villanova dropped the 3,000 meter mark to 7:54.91; while Mt. St. Mary's Gudmund Olsen totaled 3,854 points in a new event--the indoor pentathlon.

March 6, 1982 - Jadwin Gym, Princeton University - Fairleigh Dickinson 56, Coach: Russ Rogers

Russ Rogers was ecstatic; his team defeated the nearly unbeatable Villanova perennial champs. Eighty-five schools sent 1,175 athletes for the two-day competition; thus Fairleigh Dickinson's victory was impressive, especially after winning only one of 16 events. Records fell, as usual. Mt. St. Mary's Gudmund Olsen scored 4,089 points in the pentathlon (55 meter hurdles; long jump; shot put; high jump; and 1,000 meter run); Ed Yearwood, Morgan State recorded 47.24 for 400 meters; Rod Wilson, Villanova repeated in the hurdles (7.26 record); Seton Hall's Derrick Peynado lowered the 500m record to 1:02.10; John Hunter, Villanova ran a record-breaking "1,000" in 2:22.27, while tall Navy midshipman Leo Williams jumped a record 7' 4-1/2". Lastly, Ray Treacy, Providence ran a record 5,000m in 14:02.73. Double Olympic champion Charlie Jenkins (1956) coached Villanova to the second place trophy. But, one individual was missing from Jadwin Gym that weekend...a coach who had...for over 30 years...a profound impact on the IC4A. "Jumbo" was gone, for almost a year now, and the track world mourned the passing of this extraordinarily charismatic and successful leader.

March 6, 1983 - Jadwin Gym, Princeton University - Villanova 92, Coach: Charles "Charlie" Jenkins

Charlie Jenkins had been a winner on the track and this day he led his Villanova team to their 18th victory...the first time for Jenkins as Coach. "My objective coming in was to maintain the program," said Jenkins. "Jumbo was such an incredible man and incredible coach," added the new Villanova leader. Two nationally-ranked field event teammates from Boston University led a score of quality winners. Declan Hegarty hurled the 35-pound weight 69' 9-1/2", while Nick Saunders reached world-class with a record leap of 7' 6-1/2". Huge Augie Wolf, Princeton broke the oldest record on the books (Gary Gubner's 1962 mark of 64' 3-1/2") with a shot record of 64' 10". Eugene Norman led a strong Rutgers team with a 7.14 hurdle record, while Reggie Henderson, George Mason lowered the 500 record by a fraction (1:01.91). Little Mt. St. Mary's seemed to have a lock on the pentathlon and this year's record performance (4,293 points) was by Rob Pendergrist with marks of 7.7, 22' 8-1/2", 49' 4-1/2", 6'6" and 2:46.5 (1,000m).

March 4, 1984 - Jadwin Gym, Princeton University - Penn State 62, Coach: Harry Groves

Veteran coach Harry Groves was pleased at winning the IC4A indoor title. "And why not," he said. "It's been 25 years since Penn State won this meet. And remember, many of our point scorers are 'walk-ons'." One of these "walk-ons" was Randy Moore, who won Penn State's only event--the 800 (1:51.47). Dartmouth won the distance medley relay in record time (9:45.07). Declan Hegarty of Boston University via Ireland threw 35 pounds of weight 70'9"--a record. Another record, 26' 3-1/2" in the long jump, was credited to John Parker, George Mason, while his teammate Reggie Henderson, defending his "500" title, ran a record 1:01.90. Lastly, Fairleigh Dickinson's Elliot Bikani lowered the 5,000 record to 14:01.16.

March 3, 1985 - Jadwin Gym, Princeton University - Villanova 59, Coach: Charles "Charlie" Jenkins

This was a marvelous meet, highly competitive individually and team wise. It was Villanova's 19th team victory and Coach Jenkins's second win as a head coach. "It came down to the last event--the mile relay. Penn State, the defending champ, needed second place to retain its title" (*Centre Daily Times*). The Nittany Lions finished fourth; Villanova won the relay and the meet. It was an old story in this oldest indoor college track meet. John Marshall, 6'4" Villanovan, Olympian, and future head track coach at his school, won the 800 meters (1:49.1); Manhattan's Willie McLaughlin recorded a record-breaking "400" (47.06) on the unbanked Jadwin Gym track. Astonishingly, two athletes from the same school, Boston University's Greg Gonsalves and Nick Saunders, jumped 7'5"; while Mt. St. Mary's Bill Motti set a record 4,102 points in the pentathlon.

March 10, 1986 - Jadwin Gym, Princeton University - Villanova 52, Coach: Charles "Charlie" Jenkins

Charlie Jenkins was euphoric. His team, Villanova, won this meet--again. Son "Chip" contributed to the school victory with a record run at 500 meters (1:01.45). Villanova slashed the mile relay record down to 3:12.38, with young Jenkins contributing a 47.0 "leg." Penn State's fine-looking distance runner Eric Carter, was the first to dip under 14 minutes for 5,000 meters (13:58.55). Ray Humphrey, Georgetown won both the long jump (25' 10") and a record triple jump (54' 5-1/4"). Maryland's Bill Skinner was equally impressive, winning the high jump (7' 1-3/4") and hurdles (7.22). Conor McCullough, Boston University kept the 35-pound weight throw "in the family" with a record toss of 71' 4-1/4", and national champion Lee McRae, Pitt brought the sprint record down to 6.13 seconds. To no one's surprise, it was a great track meet.

March 8, 1987 - Gordon Track, Harvard University - Penn State 53, Coach: Harry Groves

Coaches are curious people. The new miracle-fast 220-yard "banked" track at Harvard engaged the minds of IC4A track coaches and they accepted the invitation to compete, extended to them by the nation's oldest school. When it was over, Penn State had a single-point edge on Villanova, with George Mason in hot pursuit. The track lived up to its new reputation, as did a group of great athletes. The veteran warrior-coach Harry Groves did a great job of teaching track and field and leading young men. "You've got to be good and to be lucky to win this thing," he told the print media. Penn State's talented freshman, C.J. Hunter, won the shot. Senior Ray Levitre ran a perfect 800 in a record 1:48.19. In the 400, Penn State's Michael Timpson had a 3 meter lead coming off the last turn, but Princeton's Steve Morgan powered down the home straight to catch the Nittany Lion at the finish line. After 1/2 hour of studying the photo, officials called it a dead-heat, and both were credited with a record (46.81). Bill Skinner, Maryland was awesome again, with two wins: the hurdles (7.17) and high jump (7'3"). Tracy Baskin, Seton Hall lowered the "1,000" mark to 2:22.19, as did Georgetown's two-mile relay (7:26.9). The record-breaking continued, with a distance medley relay mark by Villanova (9:44.56), a fine long jump (26' 5-1/2") by D.D. Manns, James Madison, and a big pentathlon total (4,224 points) by Bill Muzzio, George Mason.

March 6, 1988 - Jadwin Gym, Princeton University - Georgetown 70, Coach: Frank Gagliano

Georgetown won its first IC4A Indoor Championship since 1925. Veteran coach, Frank Gagliano, and his excellent staff, led the team to five individual victories, including the long jump by three-time titlist Ray Humphrey, and a sweep of all three relays. Mike Stahr's 4:00.06 was a mile record. No one in Jadwin Gym could remember a time when Villanova had not turned out a single gold medal winner. It had been a very long time. A new order was beginning to take place with schools like James Madison, George Mason, East Carolina, C.W. Post, Iona, and others taking their place next to the other great eastern teams. Examples were Bentley's Mark Ivanov winning the pentathlon (3,944 points); Howard Burnett, New York Tech, the "400" (47.38); and the McNeill's from East Carolina (Lee 6.29 "55" and Willie 21.53 "200"). This meet was also the first under the leadership of the new IC4A Administrator...Larry Byrne...who replaced the retired Art Farnham.

March 4, 1989 - Jadwin Gym, Princeton University - George Mason 72, Coach: John Cook

Veteran journalist and track and field historian, Jim Dunaway, pointed out in the March 6, 1989 issue of *The New York Times* that "George Mason Wins First Indoor Title." He went on to describe John Cook's team coming from behind, scoring third in the mile relay and victories in the 4 x 800m relay and the triple jump by Gene Koranting. George Butler, pole vault coach at Maryland, was pleased when his pupil John Finney created the only meet record 17' 4-1/4". It was the kind of "stuff" that had made Eastern intercollegiate track a great outdoor sport, beginning in 1876, and since 1922--the indoor version.

March 3, 1990 - Gordon Track, Harvard University - George Mason 103, Coach: John Cook

Scoring a hundred points in any indoor championship had never been done until Coach John Cook's George Mason team did it this year. Another superlative was C.J. Hunter, Penn State in taking his fourth consecutive shot put title (62' 5-1/4"), Steve Brown from Harry Groves' Nittany Lion team broke the "5,000" record with a fine 13:52.36. John Cook from George Mason, the athlete, not the Coach, ran 1:48.74 in his heat and a 1:49.36 in the "800" final. James Jett, with the gloriously appropriate last name, won both sprints for West Virginia (6.25 seconds and a "200" record 20.86). The East Carolina mile relay (they ran 4 x 440 on Harvard's "yard" track) broke the record with 3:11.76, but so did the second and third place teams, George Mason (3:11.85) and James Madison (3:12.11). It was simply a classic way to end a fine championship meet.

March 2, 1991 - Jadwin Gym, Princeton University - George Mason 102, Coach: John Cook

Istvan Bagyula of Hungary found his way to Northern Virginia and George Mason. His 18' 4-1/2" vault was "big time"...a record, and led his school to a monster 102-point team victory. The exciting Notre Dame football player-sprinter from Wilkes-Barre, PA--Raghib "Rocket" Ismail--ran a blazing 6.16 to win the 55 meters. There were no other records unless one counts the fact that more than forty schools scored in this great traditional championship at Jadwin Gymnasium. Frank Zarnowski was not the head coach at Mt. St. Mary's, but his expertise in multiple events helped Rob Pendergrist win consecutive pentathlon titles. John Cook's team had won this meet three years running, and seemed to have begun some kind of athletic dynasty.

March 8, 1992 - Jadwin Gym, Princeton University - Manhattan 64, Coach: Fred Dwyer

This one was awfully close and *Track and Field News* (April, 1992) quoted victorious Coach Fred Dwyer "The team really dug down." James Jett, West Virginia lived up to his name and won both dashes (6.20/21.41), while Mason's Istvan Bagyula was in a class by himself, vaulting to a record 18' 8-1/4". Rob Pendergrist of Mt. St. Mary's was making a habit of winning the pentathlon (4,030 points), while the relay titles were shared between Seton Hall (3:11.67 - 4x400m), Georgetown (7:29.89 - 4x800m) and Boston College (9:49.81 - Distance Medley).

March 7, 1993 - Gordon Track, Harvard University - Georgetown 67, Coach: Frank Gagliano

Ron Reid of the *Philadelphia Inquirer* wrote that Coach Marty Stern's Villanova team was looking for its 21st indoor title, but that Frank Gagliano's Georgetown Hoyas took the title without winning a single event. This outing, the third on this famed oval, featured an astounding "4-flat" double victory by super-soph Louie Quintana (4:00.19--mile; 4:00.9 anchor on DMR). Rob Pendergrist, Mt. St. Mary's won his fourth consecutive Pentathlon with a record (4,293 points). Seventy-four teams sent athletes to this premier eastern track and field championship on the campus of Harvard, which was covered with a blanket of fresh snow.

March 6, 1994 - Jadwin Gym, Princeton University - Georgetown 87, Coach: Frank Gagliano

Deep within the sub-floor of Princeton's Jadwin Gym, Georgetown started the meet with 16 points in the 35-pound weight. Peter Cyr and Jesse Saglio, two fifth-year seniors who shaved their heads, threw 69' 5-1/4" and 67' 5-1/2" (first and third place). Mark Sivieri, Georgetown, ran a 4:07.80 winning mile. Seton Hall's Kevin Lyles had a fine double in the long sprints, winning both "200" (21.31) and "400" (46.90). A nightmare for the print journalists was the spelling of the top two long jumpers: Envinna Chukukere, West Virginia (25' 3/4") and Princeton's Ugwuna Ikpeowa (24' 6"). It is noteworthy that the Georgetown weight-throwers were coached by Harold Connolly, the 1956 Olympic Games hammer-throwing gold medalist.

March 5, 1995 - Jadwin Gym, Princeton University - Georgetown 86, Coach: Frank Gagliano

"Georgetown's middle distance runners overcame Seton Hall's speed to win the IC4A indoor track championships for the 3rd straight year" (*New York Times*, March 6, 1995). The Hoyas' Bryan Woodward defended his 800m crown. The Seton Hall hero, Kevin Lyles, won the "400" (48.22), was second in the "200," and anchored the 1600m winning relay (3:16.63). The super jumper with the difficult name--Ugwuna Ikpeowa, Princeton--won the triple jump (52' 4-3/4") and the long jump (24' 10"). On the eve of its three-quarters of a century existence, the indoor IC4A meet appeared strong and popular in the face of difficult times for the sport, both indoors and outdoors, nationwide.
