ON THE COVER:

John O'Connell, victor and record holder, wins the sprint by a hair over Lindy Remigino, Manhattan classmate. Time 6.2 tied the I.C.A.A.A. standard.

General Information

Track measures eleven laps to mile, and 160 yards to lap.

Firing of revolver denotes beginning of final lap in all races.

In all races there is no penalty under I.C.A.A.A.A. rules for first false start, but competitor is disqualified by second false start.

In hurdle race competitor is not disqualified for knocking down hurdles.

In all relay races baton must be carried in runner's hand and must be passed to next succeeding teammate within clearly marked 20-yard zone, extending 10 yards in both directions from leg finish line.

I.C.A.A.A.A. rules provide that, in races around turns, no runner shall cross in front of another unless and until he is 2 yards in front of his nearest competitor. Interference resulting from breach of this rule subjects offender to disqualification.

Each member college is limited to following numbers of actual participants in various events in Indoor Championships:

- 600-yard run—2
- 1000-yard run—2
- One-mile run—2
- Two-mile run—2
- Relay races—one team
- All other events—4

No contestant may be entered in two-mile run in Indoor Championships if he can cover distance no faster than 9 minutes 55 seconds.

In 600-yard run and 1000-yard run, any qualifier who fails to compete in Final will disqualify himself for further participation in meet, even in other events (relays included) for which he may have qualified.

Competitors must be on time, field contestants entering enclosure five minutes before scheduled start of their event, and track contestants entering enclosure upon completion of race next preceding theirs. As soon as their event is over, competitors will kindly leave track and infield at once.

I.C.A.A.A.A. RULES OF COMPETITION WILL BE STRICTLY ENFORCED BY REFEREE AND OTHER OFFICIALS.

AAU - IC4A TITLE DOUBLE FOR DWYER?

LITTLE FREDDIE DWYER will achieve the unprecedented tonight in Madison Square Garden, that is, if we all read the portents accurately, and, further, if the 21-year-old 140-pound senior from Villanova runs the way he has been running every week for the past six weeks.

For twenty-one years the AAU and IC4A miles (or their metric equivalent in the years of the noble experiment) have been run on consecutive Saturdays in our town.

Dwyer won the AAU mile last Saturday in 4:12.4, surviving the perils and traffic hazards of a 14-man field. If he successfully defends the IC4A mile title he has won the last two years he will become the only man ever to win both the AAU and IC4A championships in the same year. Don't tell Fred about this yet.

AAU mile champions have won IC4A titles, and IC4A champions have won AAU titles. It seems strange that no miler was ever able to put the two titles back to back in the same season. There's no particular reason why this should be an unattainable double. What, therefore, happened to frustrate our IC4A champions in the past twenty-one years?

Let's stroll back through the years and see.

1932—This was the year the AAU first ran the mile in its championships. Gene Venzke, first to run a 4:10 mile that winter as the inevitable milestone to the inevitable 4:00 mile, hadn't yet matriculated at Penn, and Harvard's Norwood Penrose Hallowell, who set an IC4A record at 4:12.4 on the six-lap Kingsbridge Armory track, didn't try for the AAU mile.

1933—Venzke is a Penn freshman. He turns on Glenn Cunningham, who has been beating him regularly this winter, and scores a sensational "photo-finish" victory in the AAU 1500 meters, Manhattan's Frank Crowley, who won the IC4A mile in a surprise shift from the two-mile, didn't run the AAU race.

1934—The jinx, if that's what it is, starts operating. This is the year Princeton's Bill Bonthron could have won both. He had edged Cunningham in the Baxter Mile, but Cunningham turned the table on Bonthron in the AAU, with Venzke a close third, and the next week Bonthron beat Venzke in the IC4A.

1935—As a Penn junior Venzke was a close third behind Cunningham and Bonthron in the AAU, then won the IC4A.

1936—This is the year Venzke could have made the double. He beat Cunningham in the AAU, setting a 3:49.9 record for 1500 meters, but he had the gripe a week later and Manhattan's Louis Burns waltzed home in the IC4A



race that was fifteen seconds slower.

1937-38-39 — Burns, Princeton's Peter Bradley and Manhattan's Bob Hoolahan, the IC4A winners, had no reasonable chance against Cunningham and Chuck Fenske, the AAU winners, these years.

1940-41-42—The three-year IC4A reign of Leslie MacMitchell, of N.Y.U. He didn't run the AAU mile as a sophomore. As a junior he beat Walter Mehl three straight miles coming up to the AAU, which Mehl won, but MacMitchell passed up the title mile in order to run a 4:11.6 anchor mile on the

Violet medley relay that set a world indoor record. In 1942, MacMitchell was the AAU favorite, but Gil Dodds, in his first mile race in the Garden, surprised MacMitchell and everyone else by stealing a long lead and saving two yards of it from Leslie's belated rush. MacMitchell beat Dodds in their next two duels in 4:07.8, but the damage had been done.

1943—Frank T. Dixon, MacMitchell's successor at N.Y.U., won the AAU mile in 4:09.6, beating Dodds and outrunning Dartmouth's Don Burnham by 35 yards. But a week later, in a slower jockeying duel, with no Dodds to speed it up, Burnham upset Dixon by one foot in the IC4A in 4:16.2.

1944—Dodds ran away and hid from Burnham by 60 yards in a record AAU mile in 4:08.3, then Burnham won the IC4A again.

1946—Manhattan's Edward Walsh was a close third in the AAU mile won by Navy-veteran MacMitchell, then won the IC4A mile.

1948—Penn State's Gerry Karver might have won the AAU mile this year, but he passed it up in favor of a dual meet with Notre Dame in which Horace Ashenfelter beat him. Then Karver won the IC4A mile.

1949—The IC4A men had no reasonable chance to win the AAU mile this year from Holland's Willy Slykhuis.

1950—John Joe Barry, a Villanova freshman not eligible for the IC4A yet, won the AAU mile in 4:11.5, then Bill Mack, of Michigan State, a non-competitor in the AAU, won the IC4A mile in a record 4:11.

1951—As a sophomore, Dwyer, of Villanova, was third in the AAU mile, 60 yards behind Fred Wilt's 4:09.4, then won the IC4A mile in 4:16.2.

1952—As a junior Dwyer was nowhere in the AAU mile, won by alumnus Bill Mack in 4:11.4, but retained his IC4A title in 4:13.

Now Dwyer takes his last try at the elusive double.

The Villanova senior comes up to the second

A TOAST TO CARL MERNER

THIS is the last Intercollegiate indoor go-round for one of the 4-A's ablest coaches and finest gentlemen. Carl Merner retires this spring after thirty-five years of distinguished service at Columbia.

Carl is making his exit on a high note. We say that flatly because we are as sure as it is possible to be sure about anything in a track meet that he is going to have a couple of winners tonight. We like George Shaw, Columbia's 1952 Olympic hop-step-jumper, in the broad jump and Albert Thompson in the shot put. Don't you?

However, that's merely incidental. Columbia could be shut out of the scoring altogether without lessening one whit our deep and sincere respect for this tall, angular fellow whose mid-western drawl has twanged wisdom into a couple of generations of athletes at South Field and Baker Field.

Columbia, rightfully proud of Carl, "threw" him a little farewell party on the campus last night. As a backdrop for this affair, Irving Marsh and Howie Levine of the public information staff worked up a very fine biographical sketch of the estimable Mr. Merner.

They tell of his athletic prowess at Iowa State and Springfield, where he was a one-man track team, a great football end and a basketball player of no mean ability.

They trace his rich and varied coaching background, which began in 1913 at Kansas State, where he directed the track, football and basketball squads. They tell of his arrival at Columbia in 1916 as basketball coach, his temporary absence for service in World War I, his return in 1918 as freshman football, track and cross-country coach and his eventual accession as varsity track coach.

They tot up his IC4-A champions—thirteen of them, who bagged a total of thirty-three titles. The list starts with Walter Higgins, '22, who ran a 4:19 mile in 1921, when 4:20 still was a magic mark for a varsity miler, and ends with Bill Vessie, high jump champion of 1943.

Between Higgins and Vessie came two-miler Joe Hagen, high jumper Bill O'Connor, high jumper Bob Pitkin, half-miler Bill Patterson, sprinter Sam Maniaci, shotputter Danny Taylor, high-jumper Jim Dillingham, sprinter Ben Johnson, shot-putter Frank Ryan, pole vaulter Dick Ganslen, sprinter Herb Weast and pole-vaulter Warren Broemel.



They note that Carl seldom had more than a couple of good athletes at one time but point out that when he did, as in 1937-38, when Johnson, Weast, Ganslen and Ryan all were on hand, there were no slip-ups and Columbia won the IC4-A team title.

And the biographical sketch goes on to put a lot of other facts and figures about Merner on the record.

There's more to the story than that, though. It's doubtful if any track coach in the country has exercised a good influence on more athletes, young and old, than this tall son of Kansas.

Through Columbia's generosity and Carl's sufferance, the Light Blue's splendid facilities at South Field and Baker Field for years have been the training center for New York's school, college and club athletes; holiday visitors from out of town and the foreigners who come here from time to time.

Rain or snow, heat or cold, Carl is always there at trackside, quick to offer a word of encouragement or advice—and equally quick to lay down the law.

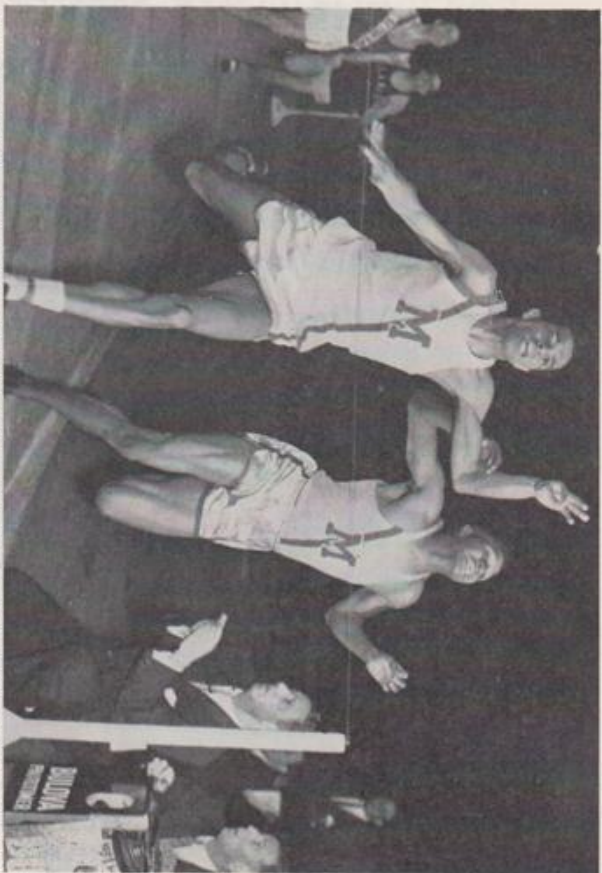
An equable, easy-going fellow otherwise, Carl is stirred to righteous wrath instantaneously at carelessness, particularly as it applies to the misuse or mistreatment of equipment. Woe betide the jumper who avoidably splinters a crossbar, the weightman who is casual about his line of fire, the sprinter who neglects to refill his starting holes.

They'll pay dearly for their sins with an inimitable Merner exhortation that will leave their ears burning — and will be better men for it, as are all who have known this fine teacher.

Dr. John L. Theobald, Columbia's 1925 track captain and now president of Queens College, sums it up well when he says "Coach Merner was one of those who contributed most fully to my education. Carl has the rare attribute of being both an effective coach from the standpoint of winning teams and a thorough master of the education of young men, in terms not only of sportsmanship but also of their philosophy of life."

Happiness, health and long life to Carl Merner on the Bucksville, Pa., farm to which he intends to "retire". We wonder if the neighboring agriculturists know what tough competition they'll be facing at the next State Fair.

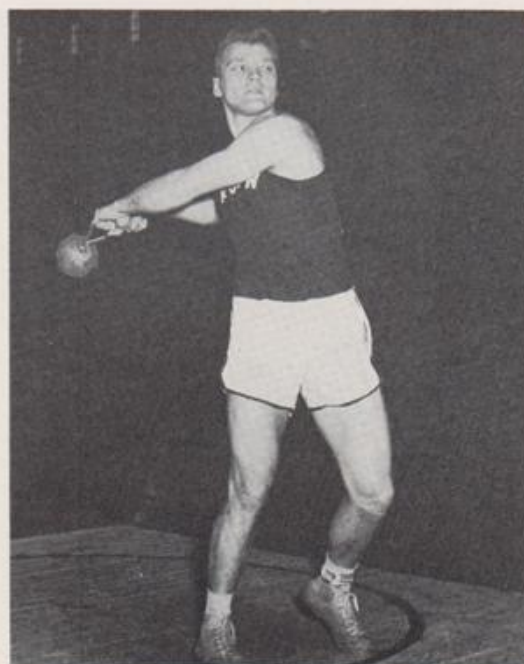

SLOW-MOTION STUDY OF JET-PROPELLED JASPERS

THREE ACES make a strong hand, no matter whether the stakes are a poker pot or the IC4A team title. Only an incurable poker-face like Manhattan College track coach George Eastment could keep from flashing an ear-to-ear grin over the fact that his bid for 1953 honors is loaded with three ace sprinters who may well sweep the 60-yard dash: Lindy Remigino, Jack (Rabbit) O'Connell and Joe Schatzle.



O'Connell is the defending champ tonight. Remigino reigns as "the world's fastest human," an automatic distinction that goes with the 100-meter Olympic gold medal. And Schatzle has beaten both on many occasions. Together, they comprised three-quarters of America's greatest sprint relay team: unbeaten since they first teamed up two years ago.

Faithful track and field followers don't have to be reminded that O'Connell won the National AAU 60-yard title last year . . . that Remigino tied the world record of :10.2 for 100 meters in a post-Olympic meet in Norway . . . or that Schatzle, as a soph, swept both the 100 and 220 yard Met Intercollegiate crowns. Instead of raking over old records, and dressing them up in even older cliches like "jet-propelled Jaspers," your reporter decided to go behind the scenes for a closeup study of the three aces.

In what respects are Remigino, O'Connell and Schatzle alike? How do they differ? What are their temperaments, their training techniques, their plans for the future? Tarry awhile and learn the facts we gleaned on the Jasper campus.

First, their physical difference. O'Connell is tiniest at 5-foot-5 and 128 pounds; then comes Remigino at 5-8 and 140, and finally lanky Schatzle at 5-11 and 155.

These Three Musketeers of Manhattan are very buddy-buddy. They're in the senior class, majoring in physical education, but Uncle Sam may end their camaraderie after graduation. O'Connell and Schatzle are Lieutenants in the Marine Reserves, while Remigino becomes draft bait in June.

All three are good students. Not Phi Beta

Kappa caliber, though Lindy did make the honor roll last June. All of them think that Charlie Pratt, Manhattan's hurdler, is as good as they are, and they're sure they'll continue unbeaten no matter whether Pratt or Vern Dixon becomes the fourth man in their 1953 sprint relay, replacing anchor-man Bob Carty, who has graduated.

O'Connell, who runs the first leg of their relay, has a real bullet start; the other two have a stronger "kick" in the last 10 yards.

Schatzle paces himself best in training, while O'Connell and Schatzle work so zealously that they are inclined to overwork, unless Coach Eastment keeps a careful check-rein on them.

O'Connell is the coldly factual, phlegmatic, fatalistic member of the trio. "If I run fastest, I'll win; if I don't, I won't." But he fairly exudes a cold confidence.

Remigino has the opposite temperament. No matter how well he runs, he's quick to insist "there are better runners than me." Even after studying the photo-finish print of the Olympic 100 meters, he wasn't quite convinced that he had won. And when someone soon afterward mentioned Andy Stanfield (200-meter winner) and Jim Golliday (whose injury cost him a place on the team), Lindy earnestly said, "If they had been in today's race, I wouldn't have finished first."

Schatzle's outlook is somewhere between the extremes of his two chums. He knows he's good, yet he doesn't have the firm confidence of O'Connell nor the expressed unassurance of Remigino.

Remigino is engaged to be married. Schatzle also has a steady girl. O'Connell is footloose and fancy free.

O'Connell and Schatzle have the commonplace first names—John and Joseph. On the other hand, Remigino's full first name is "Lindbergh." His dad, an Italian immigrant, was thrilled by famous people in the 1920's, so he named Lindy for the flier, and his older brother Rudy for Rudolph Valentino.

half of the assignment with unbeatable references. With little warning before this year that he would take command, Dwyer has won the Washington Star mile in 4:19.4, the Boston K. of C. 1000 in 2:11.6, the Philadelphia Inquirer mile in a meet-record 4:09.7, the Wanamaker Mile in 4:08.2, the Hunter Mile in 4:09.2, the Baxter Mile in 4:09.8 and the AAU mile in 4:12.4.

Confident, superbly conditioned, a clever racer, flexible in his tactics, capable of running a front race from gun to tape or equally adept at spurting from behind in the last quarter or the last lap, young Fred has, week after week, beaten old Fred Wilt, Don Gehrmann, Sweden's Ingvar Ericsson, Germany's Rolf Lamers, Brown's Walter Molineux, Georgetown's Joe LaPierre, the IC4A outdoor mile champion, Sweden's Sture Landqvist and Bob McMillen, the almost Olympic hero who made one ill-advised visit to Eastern board track.

In two of those races, however, Molineux pushed his chest in front of Dwyer in the last 100 yards and was beaten off in his bid for the pole.

Will Molineux be the agent who will frustrate Dwyer in his bid for the AAU-IC4A double as Venzke, Bonthron, MacMitchell, Burnham, Walsh and all others were balked?

Presently, we shall see.

Remigino and Schatzle have been bothered by leg pulls earlier this season, so it may be up to O'Connell to carry the sprint load. But he's in trim for any and all assignments. Earlier this year, he won the Senior Met AAU crown, and followed it with a point-scoring broad jump against Army and a West Point Field House record-tying :06.2 for 60 yards.

Though they know they can't make a living out of running, all three have a genuine love for the sport. They love to run against each other, because all three are sparked by tough competition; and they love to run together, because the baton-passing event gives them the thrill and glow of teamwork. They have great mutual respect, and there has never been any hard feeling between them.

Underdogs against UCLA in the 440-yard relay at the Los Angeles Coliseum last year, they managed to reach the tape first. Rated behind the half-mile Texas relay team anchored by Dean Smith, one of our 100-meter Olympians, the young men from Manhattan not only kept their unbeaten string alive, but, for the second straight year, ran the fastest 880-yard relay in the country.

Collectively or individually, these three sprint aces from Manhattan are real standouts. They're definitely the ones to beat in tonight's IC4A . . . a task that is Mercurial if not Herculean.

I. C. A. A. A. NOTES

Possibly the finest collection of sprinters ever assembled on one campus will be aiming for a 1-2-3 sweep in the 60-yard dash when Manhattan sends John O'Connell (defending Champion), Lindy Remigino (Olympic champion) and Joseph Schatzle (Metropolitan champion) to the mark. As sophomores, Remigino and O'Connell were 2-3 behind Andy Stanfield, with Schatzle running the relay. As juniors, O'Connell and Remigino were 1-2, with Schatzle on the injury list. This is their last time around in the IC4A indoors. . . . Last time any college achieved a 1-2-3 grand slam was 1936 in the outdoor IC4A 800 meters. Which College? Manhattan, of course, with Louis Burns, Howie Borck and Bill Ray.

Ollie Sax, of Penn State, comes into his first IC4A varsity test with excellent speed references. Last Saturday he ran a virtual dead heat with Mal Whitfield in the National AAU 600 in 1:10.4. The IC4A record is 1:11, set by Cornell's Charley Moore in the trials in 1950 before he won the final in 1:12.2.

Albert Thompson, of Columbia, suddenly found his shotputting groove this winter. He put up all-time Lion records of 52 feet 5½ inches in the Metropolitan meet, and 53:4¾ in the AAU Nationals. The former George Washington H.S. student also set an all-time Columbia mark with 59 feet 11½ inches in the 35-pound weight throw. . . . George Shaw, his teammate, cleared 24 feet for the first time in winning the Metropolitan title with 24:2¾.

Dave Patton, nephew of the late General George (Blood and Guts) Patton, became Army's third 50-footer in the shotput, joining Tex Coulter and Doc Blanchard, when he won the event against Princeton with 50:4. An Army brat, the six-foot, 190-pound Patton has great potentialities if he concentrated on the event. But he'd rather be a gymnast.

When Villanova's Fred Dwyer won the AAU mile he was the first undergraduate to do it since NYU's Frank Dixon beat Gil Dodds in 4:09.6 in 1943. No IC4A miler has ever come into the indoor championships with such a string of triumphs behind him. Dwyer has won six straight miles and one at 1000 yards, and boasts the fastest varsity times in both events, 2:11.6 and 4:08.2.

Dwyer isn't the only undefeated miler in the IC4A eight-furlong classic. Army's Lewis Olive, from Louisville, Ky., a transfer from the University of California, has won all his dual-meet miles this winter—in 4:19.2, 4:18.8 and 4:20.8, beating Manhattan's Bob Kubic, Penn State's Bob Gehman and Princeton's Toby Maxwell. Coach Carleton Crowell says he hasn't been extended yet.

Two years ago, when he was prepping for the Military Academy, Olive won the National AAU junior 1000 in 2:19.2.

Penn Coach Ken Doherty has developed vaulter Van Zimmerman and shotputter John McCallum into IC4A champions since he left the green pastures of the University of Michigan for Franklin Field. Dr. Doherty, who had scads of racing champions at Ann Arbor, hasn't had one yet at Penn, but better days are a-coming. John Haines, the Red and Blue freshman, who won the AAU 60-yard title from a field that included two Olympic champions, a national AAU champion, an IC4A champion, two other former National AAU champions, can be considered a bright prospect in IC4A competition the next three years.
