Johnstown Wins Withers, Equalling Record

Trojan Trackmen Capture I. C. 4-A Meet

2-Day Event Sees 4 Marks Shattered

Trojans' Score of 71 Points Highest in History of Meet; Woodruff Keeps Titles

New York, May 27.—A smooth-working, high-g geared piece of track and field machinery swept through the sixty-third championships of the Intercollegiate A. A. A. today and turned in a set of record-shattering performances that should stand for many years to come.

Before a crowd of 7,500 in Triborough Stadium, and under perfect weather conditions, the Trojans of Southern California piled up 71½ points, highest in the meet's history, to win the team title for the second straight year and the ninth time since 1925.

Winning five individual events, sharing in two others and adding the mile relay championship as a crowning touch, the Trojans spread-eagled the field so badly that Pittsburgh, in second place, had only 26 points and none of the others got beyond 20.

But while the Pacific Coast Conference champions were making good so handsomely on their awe-some reputation, Long John Woodruff, of Pittsburgh, did all that could be expected of a lone Easterner standing up against this 20-man western invasion.

Retains Two Titles

In his final I. C. 4-A appearance, Woodruff won the 440-yard and 880-yard titles for the third straight year and made this finale the best of the three.

Forced to show fight to retain his quarter-mile honors in a four-man blanket finish which saw him equal the meet record of 47 seconds flat for the third time, he ran a front race in the half-mile an hour and 20 minutes later and set up a new I. C. 4-A mark of 1 minute 51.2 seconds.

U. S. C.'s team score bettered its own mark of 62½ points, established in 1932 at Berkeley, Calif. Woodruff's 880, in which he won by 10 yards over Curtis Giddings, of New York U., who subsequently was disqualified for fouling on the turn, lopped seven-tenths of a second off Ben Eastman's 7-year-old standard.

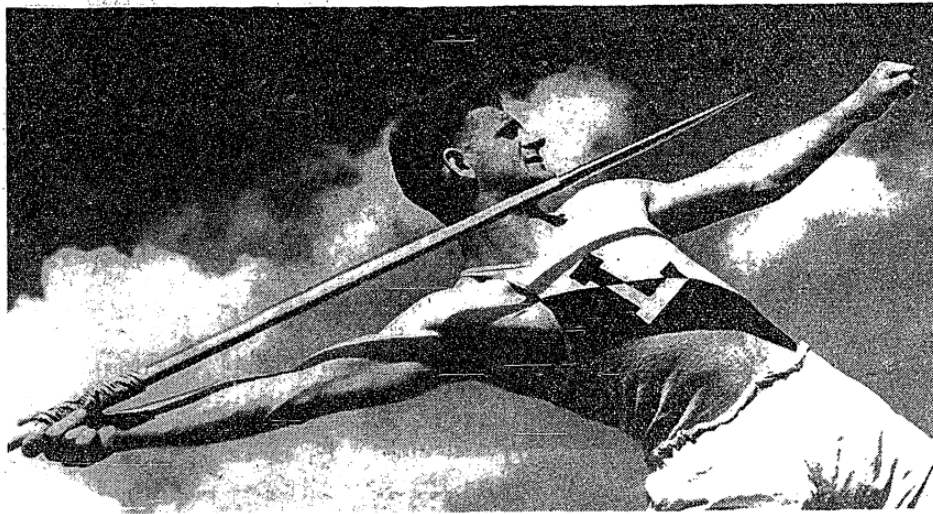
Three New Records

In addition to Woodruff's performances, three new records were made and one meet record was equalled, all by U. S. C.'s representatives. Lou Zamperini, who ran the 5,000 meters on the 1936 U. S. Olympic team brought the one-mile time down to 4:11.2 in his first I. C. 4-A appearance.

Red-head Earl Vickery, who flew over the 220-yard low hurdles in

Belair Star Registers 1:354.5 Mile

Ties Man o' War's Time for Fixture at Belmont; Wins Going Away From Hash

New York, May 27.—William Woodward's Kentucky Derby winner Johnstown took up where his old daddy, Jamestown, left off eight years ago and galloped smoothly and surely to a six-length victory today in the historic Withers mile before 17,500 spectators at Belmont Park.

Back on the tissue paper fating he likes the best, the Belair beauty equalled the track record of 1:354.4 established by the great Man o' War in 1920 and made a show of four opponents in the sixty-fourth running of oldest 3-year-old race of its distance in the United States.

Wins Going Away

The Greentree Stable's Hash, one of the rank outsiders in betting that saw Johnstown start as a 1-7 favorite, finished second a neck in front of W. E. Boring's Porter's Mite, while the winner's highly regarded running mate, Gilded Knight, came home a badly beaten fourth. George D. Wiener's Burt Rod was fifth and last.

Johnstown won the Withers and the \$15,750 out of the purse that went with it the same way he won the Woodhaven Purse, the Wood Memorial and the Derby at Churchill Downs. He went to the front at once by a length, pulled out to four lengths at the quarter and held the comfortable margin around the final turn where Jimmy Stout gave him his head for just a minute.

The big bay charger responder with a will and in 100 yards was another two lengths to the good. There Stout took him in hand again and the pair of them were just breezing at the finish, while the race itself dropped back to Hash and Porter's Mite, who ran stride for stride in a stirring battle for second money.

The Mite, achieving a remarkable comeback after a series of poor efforts, extended himself a bit too much trying to catch the spangler. Ciks of Johnstown around the turn and lacked the extra ounce of drive necessary to hold the fast coming Hash in the closing yards. Hash barely got up, and the Mite was six lengths better than the disappointing Gilded Knight, which finished second to Challeon in the Preskness. Birch Rod was beaten off by four more lengths.

Just Breezed Along

Jockey Stout said Big John was "just breezing along, all the time, and 'we are a conch in that Belmont Stake next Saturday if the trail again is fast'."

Young Jim Fitzsimmons, son of old Sunny Jim, who trains both Johnstown and the Knight, said the latter had pulled up sound and had no excuses for the defeat.

Johnstown's scintillating time—0:23, 0:46 1-4, 1:10 and 1:354.5—established him again at the top of

23.1 in yesterday's eliminations for a new record, hauled that down to 22.8 in final.

And Bob Peoples' javelin throw of 223 feet 11¾ inches, which led the qualifiers yesterday, stood up as the best performance of the two days. U. S. C.'s Jim Humphrey tied the record of 14.4 seconds in winning the 120-yard high hurdles.

The Trojans also placed one-two in the discus, with Phil Gaspar and Art Wrotnowski; tied for first with Loring Day, and took third with Irving Howe in the pole vault; and put two men, Clarke Mallery and Jack Wilson, in a three-way tie for first place in the high jump.

Most Thrilling Race

The 440 was the most thrilling race of the day. Erwin Miller, of U. S. C., coming out of second position at the start, led down the chute with Woodruff at his shoulder and Don Watts, of California, third. They held that order as they came into the straightaway with inches separating them and Long John almost pocketed.

Woodruff, who has to lengthen his stride when he wants to run faster, gave it all he got as they came into the last 30 yards. Literally, he fought his way up between the two Westerners and literally, he won by pushing his chest into the tape bare inches ahead of U. S. C.'s Howard Upton, who came up like a streak on the outside

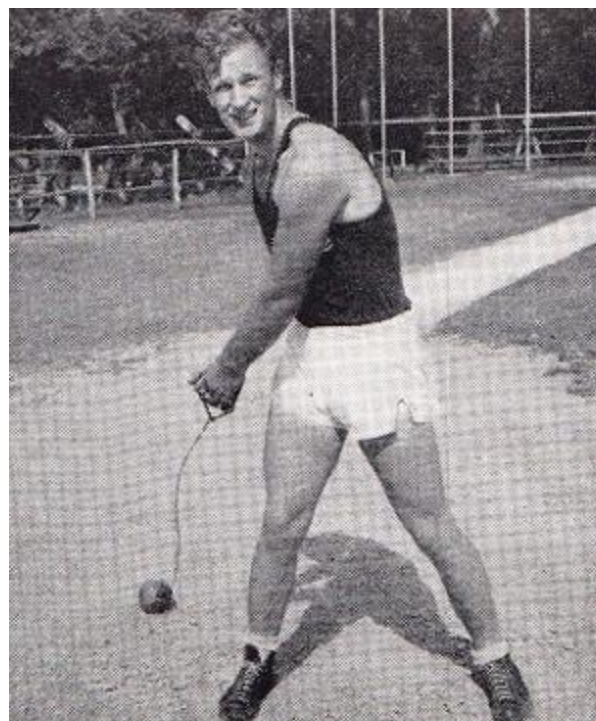
