IC4A Mark for Cappy

Randall's Island, New York, May 30— Manhattan ran away with the 77th IC4A Championship, its second in a row, as Charles Capozzoli set the only new meet record.

Manhattan, led by Olympic sprint champion Lindy Remigino who won both sprints in 10.0 and 21.7, scored 42 points to 22 for Columbia, 14½ for Army, and 12½ for Yale.

Capozzoli, running on a wet track in cold weather, ran the fastest 2-mile ever clocked in a collegiate race. Pushed for 6½ laps by John Joe Barry, Capozzoli finished in 9:00.2. He passed the mile in 4:28.8, six laps in 7:47.6, and seven laps in 7:55.3.

Morris Curotta, a senior at Seton Hall and two-time Olympian for Australia, ran his greatest race, blazing around two turns on the bad track to win the 440 in 47.3.

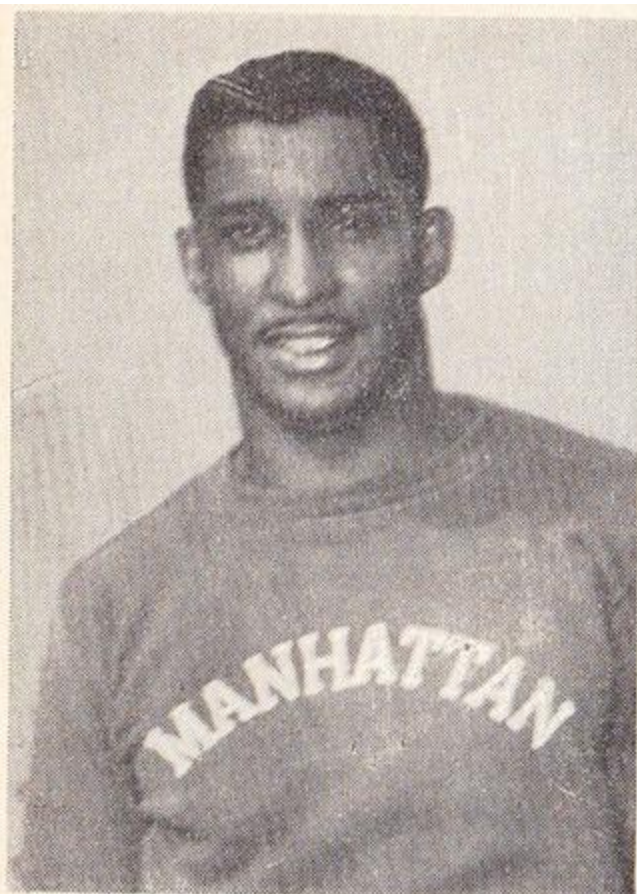
Two major upsets saw Lew Olive of Army win a 4:11 mile and Mike Stanley of Yale win a 1:53.4 half-mile. Olive, a Negro from Kentucky who showed great promise as a freshman at California in 1949, simply trailed Dwyer and LaPierre through laps of 60.6, 2:04.9, and 3:10, followed LaPierre past Dwyer on the last backstretch, and kicked home with four yards to spare. Stanley, who had an injured foot all winter, came back in the 880 after going unplaced in the mile, waited until his over-eager opponents had run themselves out, and won with a strong kick.

Chief casualty in the meet was Yale sophomore Henry Thresher, who pulled a muscle in the 100 heats. Yale lost another man in the heats as quarter-miler Ross Price fell. Manhattan's Charles Pratt, a broad jump contender, failed to qualify with a leap of 21'9¼". Georgetown's Carl Joyce was declared ineligible at the last moment.

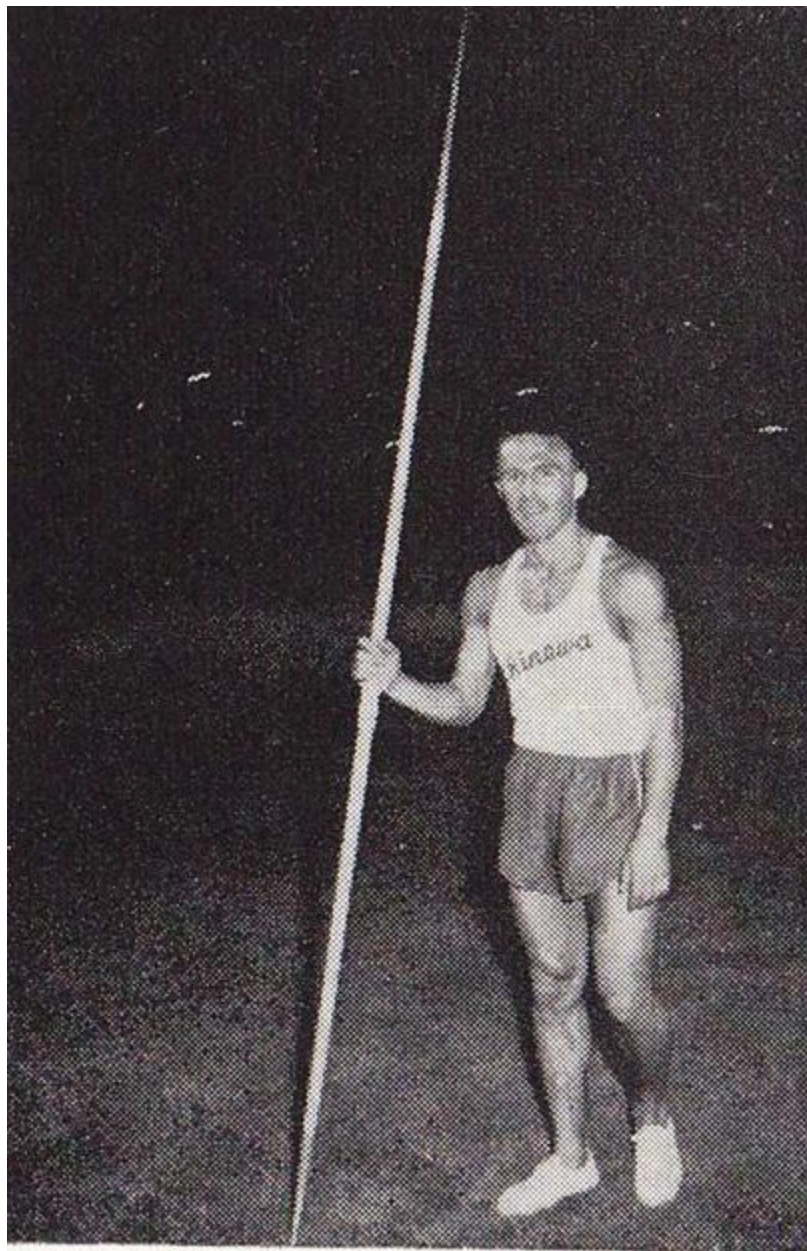
A near-casualty was Manhattan's Steve Dillon who barely qualified with four inches to spare on his last hammer throw and then moved up to second in the final.

Columbia's strong showing was a grand finale for Coach Carl Merner who is retiring. Columbia capped it all with a great upset victory over Manhattan in the mile relay. Roy Williams opened with a 49.6 leg against 50.5 for Manhattan's Wally Pina. But Ron Lucas put Manhattan in the lead with a 49.3 lap against Steve Passloff's 50.8. Then Ron Ferrara ran 47.8 to pull away from Columbia's Rudy Clarence (48.2), and it looked like no contest. But Columbia's Fred Schlereth, who has quietly developed into one of the nation's top collegiate 440 men, sizzled around in 47.2, edging Lou Jones (48.3). Manhattan ran without Vern Dixon, injured.
