YALE IS AGAIN TRIUMPHANT

"OLD ELI" DEFEATED HARVARD IN ATHLETICS BY 13 POINTS.

Glenny, Richards, and Morgan Made a Poor Showing, but Hickok, Cady, and Kershaw Saved the Day—Hickok, Sims, and Jarvis Broke Records, and Ramsdell Proved Himself a Great Athlete—Harvard Beat Pennsylvania, and Princeton Lost.

Glenny failed in the cycle contest, Richards was too slow in the sprints, Morgan again lost in the mile run, and many other track athletes sent here by Yale did not cover themselves with glory in the inter-collegiate championships yesterday, but sturdy Hickok, muscular Kershaw, and speedy Cady saved the day, and once more the colors of "Old Eli" floated triumphantly. It was an unexpected victory, and proves the correctness of the old saying regarding the representatives of the famous New-Haven institution—they always are at their best when the odds are against them.

Harvard was confident of victory. The Cambridge men figured on securing at least 40 points, and they would not allow more than 25 for their old rivals, but the Yale boys were out to win, and they bobbed up serenely just when the crimson adherents least expected it. As a result, Yale has added another to her long list of victories on land and water, and every graduate and undergraduate of the New-Haven college has reason to feel proud of the achievement of the athletic team of 1894.

George Ade, the old Yale oarsman, whose son is a member of the football team, was on the grounds early, surrounded by a coterie of Yale "rooters." Early in the day the expression on his face betokened fear and anxiety, but toward the close it changed, and when Yale's victory was assured he smiled and warmly grasped the hands of some of his classmates, and joined in with the younger element in cheering the successful athletes. Mr. Ade is a great lover of outdoor sport when Yale wins, and, if the eleven can follow up the victory of the Mott Haven team this Fall and wipe out the stigma of the Princeton defeat of last year, his happiness will be complete.

Harvard was closely pressed for second place by the University of Pennsylvania team, which finished only 4 points behind the crimson boys. If Orton had won the mile race, and he was put down for a sure winner in the event, the Quakers would have finished in front of the Cambridge cracks. Indeed, the Pennsylvania boys for a time made it lively for Yale. If Orton had won both his events—the mile and the half—and Bucholtz had followed up his victory of last year in the pole vault, the chances are that New-Haven would be in mourning to-day. But Orton failed to show up in his old form, and the best Bucholtz could do was to vault second to Kershaw, although in the settlement of the "tie" for second honors he equaled the Yale man's best effort.

Ramsdell was the star yesterday. The Pennsylvania crack won the broad jump with 22 feet 1 inch, the 100-yard dash in 0:10, equaling the record of ex-Champions Cary, Baker, Wendell, and Sherrill, and the 220-yard run in 0:20, one-fifth of a second behind Cary's best time. In both of the sprints Ramsdell won with apparent ease, and good judges say that he could have done much better work if pressed. He is a grand runner and covers the ground with little effort, using at all times the very best judgment. Judging from his easy victories yesterday, he must be ranked as the equal of any of the champions of years gone by. Pennsylvania has reason to feel proud of Ramsdell, who alone gained 15 of the 20½ points credited the Quakers.

F. F. Goodman, a bright-faced sixteen-year-old New-York youth, who is attending the College of the City of New-York, upset all calculations in the two-mile cycle race, defeating Champion Glenny and a smart field in hollow style. The victory was a very popular one, and the successful rider was borne off the field on the shoulders of a crowd of fellow-collegians, while the spectators cheered the plucky little rider.

From an athletic standpoint the meeting was a grand success. The track was soft and not considered fast, but, in spite of that fact, Sims broke the two-mile bicycle record in his opening heat, and Jarvis knocked a few seconds off the mile-run time. Again Yale's strong boy, Hickok, indulged in some record-breaking performances. He threw the hammer 123 feet 9 inches and the shot 42 feet. Like Gray and Mitchell, Hickok appears to be able to establish new figures at the least provocation.

A big, able-bodied youth from Cornell named Patterson frightened the admirers of Hickok in his trials. One of his throws was 125 feet 1 inch, but it was foul because he lost his footing, and went an inch over the line after having tossed the projectile. In the finals Patterson only got third place, but he is a coming man, and will yet make his mark in field events.

Berkeley Oval, where the contests were held, was in good condition, but the officious college boys who handle the events made the 2,000 spectators present weary. They were slow and tiresome, and it was only through the combined efforts of "Father Bill" Curtis, the referee, and "Sam" Cornell, the clerk of the course, that the events were all decided. As it was the last race was finished a few minutes before 8, and it was with difficulty that the men could be distinguished in the darkness. Once when the officials attempted to interfere with "Father Bill" he was on the point of quitting his position. But he finally decided to stay after telling the officious youths what he thought of them.

Poor Princeton! The Tigers had entries in nearly every event, but, strange to say, not one of the men gained a point. This is the poorest showing ever made by the youths from Nassau Hall. A few years ago, when poor Walter Dohm was alive, and Cary, Borchertling, Turner, and other stars were at college, Princeton was a power in athletics, but to-day the work of the team is enough to drive Trainer Mc-Masters crazy.

The quarter-mile run was the opening event. In the final Merrill out out the pace and never was headed, Marshall, the colored boy from Harvard, passed Sanford on the back stretch, and challenged Merrill, but the effort was too much for him and he had to fall back to third place, the Yale man beating him easily for second honors in the last spurt. Sanford appeared to tire near the finish.

There were over fifty entries in the 100-yard dash. After a number of trials Ramsdell won the final with apparent ease and the spectators were surprised when the time—0:10—was announced. Patterson of Williams had no difficulty in finishing ahead of Bucholtz of Pennsylvania.

It was by the gamest kind of work that Cady won the high hurdles. He was repeatedly tackled by Garcelon, but managed to breast the tape ahead of the crimson fellow.

The two-mile bicycle race brought out a big field of starters. In some of the heats the boys loafed, and relied on their sprinting qualities, but on the whole the racing was good. The final heat was won by Goodman of the College of the City of New-York, with Gorbey of Cornell second, and Glenny of Yale, the favorite, third. It was a grand race, and Goodman only won by about six inches. He started second, and allowed Gorbey to cut out the pace. On the last lap, just as the bell rang, there was a scramble to get in front, and Sims of Swarthmore, who had broken the record in the first heat, and Ottman fell. Gorbey dashed away, followed by Goodman, with Glenny hopelessly behind. At the home stretch, Gorbey looked like a winner, but clever little Goodman had judged his pace to the inch, and passed his opponent a few yards in front of the tape. It was a grand piece of work. Goodman has been training on the Berkeley track for weeks past, and is reported to have covered the distance in less than 5 minutes. He said before the contest to a reporter for The New-York Times:

"I'll win if some of those big fellows don't pocket me."

Orton cut out the pace in the mile run, and appeared to be pumped out when he made his final effort. Jarvis kept up a steady gait, and won with yards to spare. He took the lead 75 yards from home, and thereafter appeared to increase his advantage at every stride.
