Fredericks Boosts Nittany Into Lead In IC4A Track

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Defending champion Greg Fredericks boosted Penn State into the first day lead of the 96th Annual IC4A Outdoor Track and Field Championships Friday with a record breaking victory in the six-mile run.

The 133-pound Penn State senior set an IC4A Collegiate record of 27:54.3, sprinting the last quarter of the grueling run in 57.2. Fredericks' triumph gave State six points and a total of 13 after five events.

FAVORED PENN seeking its first IC4A title in 52 years, was second with 12 points and Pitt, third with 10.

Fredericks took the lead shortly after the start of the final lap of the 24 lap race around Franklin Field's tartan oval. He had exchanged the lead several times with Villanova Donald Walsh, but left the runner from Ireland as if he were standing still in the final quarter.

Fredericks' time lowered the record of 28:19.8 set by Jon Anderson of Cornell at Des Moines June 19, 1970. He also bettered his own meet record of 28:23.8, established here last year and qualified for the Olympic trials in July by seven-tenths of a second.

Earlier in the opening program of the two day meet, Fredericks had to scratch from the three mile scheduled for Saturday because a bulky field forced officials to run trials Friday. It was too much to ask the slender distance runner from West Lawn, Pa. to run three and later six miles in one afternoon.

Penn State picked up its other four points on a second place in the javelin by Bob Gill, 6 foot 4, senior from Shickshinny, Pa. The Nittany Lions also qualified six individuals and a relay team for Saturday's finals and had a good chance to edge Penn in what loomed as a close contest for the title.

Penn got a big break in its bid

for a long-sought IC4A crown when sophomore Fred DePalma scored a surprising victory in the javelin, first event of the day. DePalma, who was sick last week with intestinal flu and lost 17 pounds, tossed 233 feet, 11 inches as the favored Jim George of Maryland failed to place in the tricky wind conditions.

Coach Jim Tuppeny, who in six years has rebuilt Penn's ragged team and field forces into an eastern power admitted he would have settled for four points in the javelin. He got eight with DePalma's first and a fourth place from Gary Anderson in the event.

Penn, the winner last winter of the IC4A Indoor title for the first time in 41 years, qualified two relay teams and six individuals for the finals Saturday. The Quakers also picked up points Friday with a third in the long jump and a fifth in the six mile run.

Defending champion Villanova scored four points on Walsh's second in the six mile and qualified six runners for the finals.

PITTSBURGH'S Bill Rea successfully defended his long jump championship and Steve Helm took a second in the discus for the Panthers 10 opening day points.

Navy also qualified four individuals and two relay teams for Saturday.

Other championship winners Friday were Doug Greenwood of Princeton in the hammer with a throw of 185-3 and Notre Dame's Elio Polseili in the discus on a mark of 178-10.

Greenwood was Princeton's first hammer winner since 1925 while DePalma's javelin triumph was the first in the event for Penn since 1922.

Fredericks Finishes First In I.C.4-A Six-Mile Run

PHILADELPHIA, May 26 — Greg Fredericks continues to surprise people, including Harry Groves, his coach at Penn State.

Before the start of the six-mile run in the I. C. 4-A outdoor track and field championships today, Groves held a brief strategy session with his distance runner.

"What do you have in mind?" the Penn State coach asked.

"We're going to set a 27:55 pace," Fredericks replied.

The West Lawn, Pa., senior was timed in 27 minutes 54.3 seconds, the fastest performance ever by an I. C. 4-A collegian and another indication of how far Fredericks has emerged as the East's premier distance runner.

The time qualified Fredericks for the 10,000-meter run at the United States Olympic trials next month in Eugene, Ore. His victory coupled with a courageous third-place finish by Matt Chadwick, enabled Penn State to take the first-day lead in the two-day, 20-event at Franklin Field with 13 points.

Penn, the indoor champion; Pitt, Navy and Villanova, the defending titleholder, joined the Nittany Lions in a close team race that may compensate for the conspicuous absence of many top I. C. 4-A athletes, who are resting or qualifying for the National Collegiate meet next week.

Fredericks, who overtook Donal Walsh of Villanova on the last lap with a 57.2-second

final quarter-mile, is entered in the 3,000-meter steeplechase tomorrow and may run the event for the first time since he left high school if Penn State is in contention for the team crown.

On a broader scale, however, the smooth-striding 20-year-old is looking forward to a rematch with the country's hottest runner, Steve Prefontaine of Oregon, in the N.C.A.A. three-mile. Competing on a bad foot, Fredericks finished second to Prefontaine in the N.C.A.A. meet last year.

"It's something I've had in my mind since last year," Fredericks said, of the race against Prefontaine, who leads American runners in six statistical categories from 1,500 meters to the 10,000.

Two casualties in qualifying today were Brian McElroy of Villanova, the indoor 1,000-yard champion, whose tender foot did not respond in the semi-finals of the 880; and Jim George of Maryland, who threw the javelin only 207 feet 3 inches, well behind Fred DePalma of Penn.

Penn Takes I.C.4-A Track Title

PHILADELPHIA, May 27—Without help from some of its more touted talent, Pennsylvania ended a 52-year famine today by winning the 96th annual I. C. 4-A outdoor track and field championships.

Relying on another strong individual performance from Bruce Collins and their enormous balance and depth, the Quakers outdistanced their state rivals, Penn State, as well as Villanova and Pittsburgh in a two-day meet that may be remembered more for its perfect weather and the top athletes who did not compete.

Penn finished with 53 points. Penn State, with its best showing in recent years, wound up second with 40.

Collins won his specialty, the

440-yard intermediate hurdles, and the 220-yard dash. He joined Bill Rea, the Pitt long jumper-triple jumper, as the meet's only double winners. His 21.2-second effort in the 220 and one-yard victory over Jim Rudasill of Brown confirmed Collins's strength and stamina as he prepares for the National Collegiate championships and United States Olympic Trials.

In an Olympic year, when performances traditionally improve, today's program saw only one meet record, by Chris Dunn of Colgate. Continuing his string of fine high jumping, Dunn cleared 7 feet 2 inches on his first "Fosbury Flop" and stamped himself as a challenger for one of the three berths on the American team.

Unquestionably, the closeness of the N.C.A.A. meet next

week affected the training strategy of coaches and athletes and the quality of the 65-college competition here.

Missing from the meet to rest for the Nationals were Bob Wheeler, the Duke miler; Fred Samara, the Penn decathlete, and Joe Lucas, the Georgetown steeplechaser.

Mike Keogh, the 5-foot-7-inch, 124-pound Manhattan distance runner, dropped from his specialty, the three-mile, to the mile. He proceeded to outrun Tom Gregan of Villanova and Bruce Fischer of Syracuse en route to a three-yard victory in 4:01.6, a career-best.

Keogh's triumph ended a six-year string of mile titles by Villanova. The Wildcats extended their gold-medal streak

to 18 in the three-mile when John Hartnett outkicked Charlie Maguire of Penn State on the last lap.

After relaxing in last place in the nine-man field through a brisk opening 220 and 58.8-second first quarter-mile, Keogh alertly made one decisive move for the lead coming off the first turn of the last lap.

"I felt it was a good time to go," said the 20-year-old sophomore from Kearny, N. J., and County Cork, Ireland. "I got boxed with 500 to go, so I felt I better move up before the gun went off. With 330 left, I knew that was the place to go."

Marcel Philippe of Fordham, another metropolitan New York runner, also used a decisive kick in the last 200 yards and captured the 880-yard run by four yards from Morgan Mosser of West Virginia. Philippe's time was 1:49.7.

Hill Posts Upset

One of the more unexpected victories came from John Hill, a 6-foot-2½-inch, 245-pound senior shot-putter at Lehigh.

Hill, a sixth-round draft choice by the New York Giants as a center, unloaded a career-best effort in his final meet, 60 feet 1 inch. He became Lehigh's first I. C. 4-A. champion since 1881, when F. W. Dalrymple won the pole vault by clearing 8 feet 9 inches.

Penn's triumph capped a rebuilding program in the sport begun five years ago. The Quakers reign seems secure since only seven of the 53 points produced in this meet were recorded by seniors.

tory without a point from Samara, Karl Thornton, Julio Piazza or Dennis Fikes. The Quakers benefited from Lucas's absence in the steeplechase, and Bob Childs kicked past Jim Allahand of Penn State in the final 100 yards for a 12-yard victory.

"Collins was super, just super," Jim Tuppeny, the Penn coach, said of his bearded hurdler-sprinter, who received a standing ovation from the Franklin Field crowd as he jogged around the track after the 220. Six more first-place points for Penn came from Tom Blair's successful defense of his pole-vault crown.

Exchange Helps Quakers

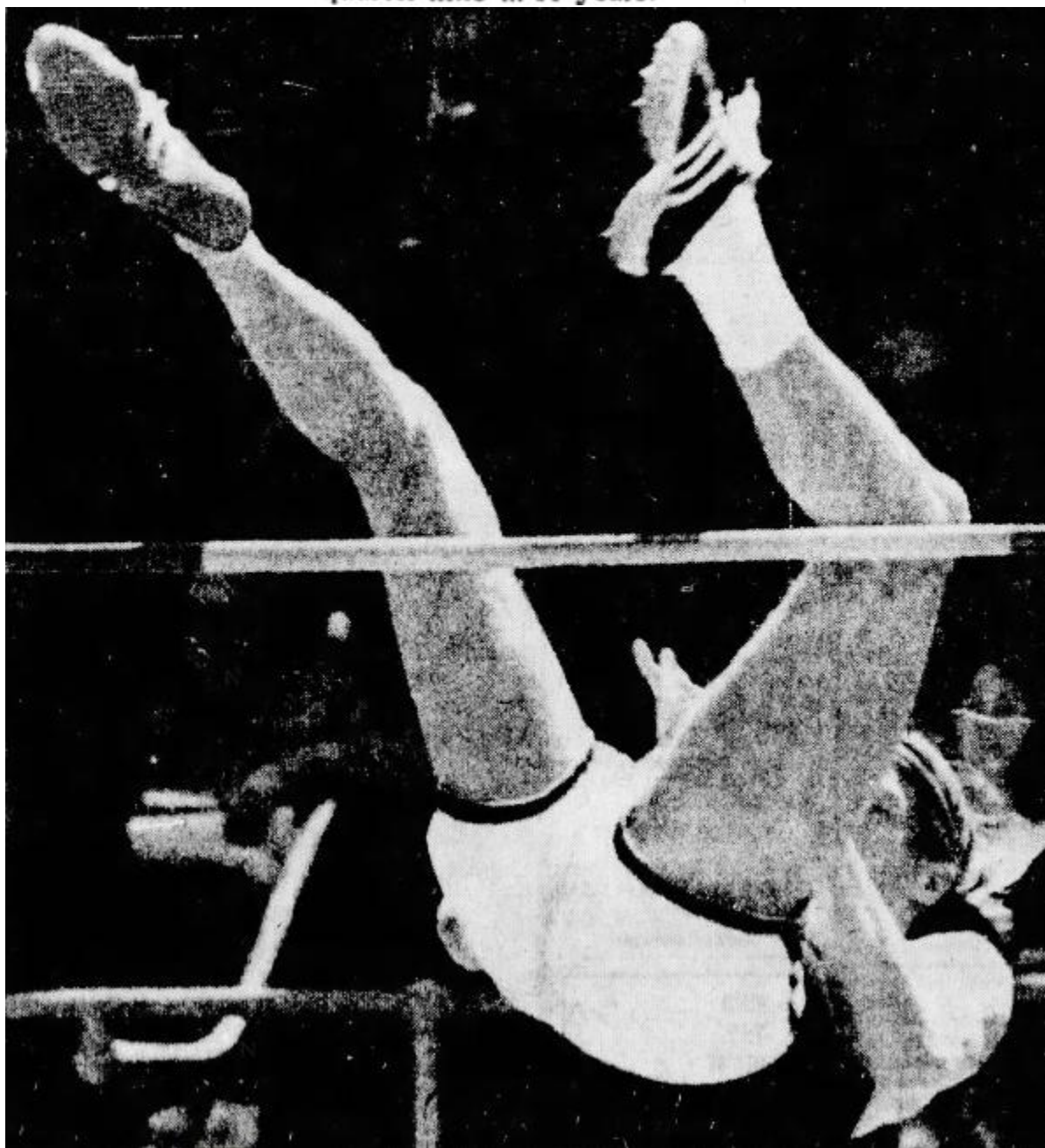
Penn took its first giant steps toward a team title with victories in the 440-yard relay and intermediate hurdles.

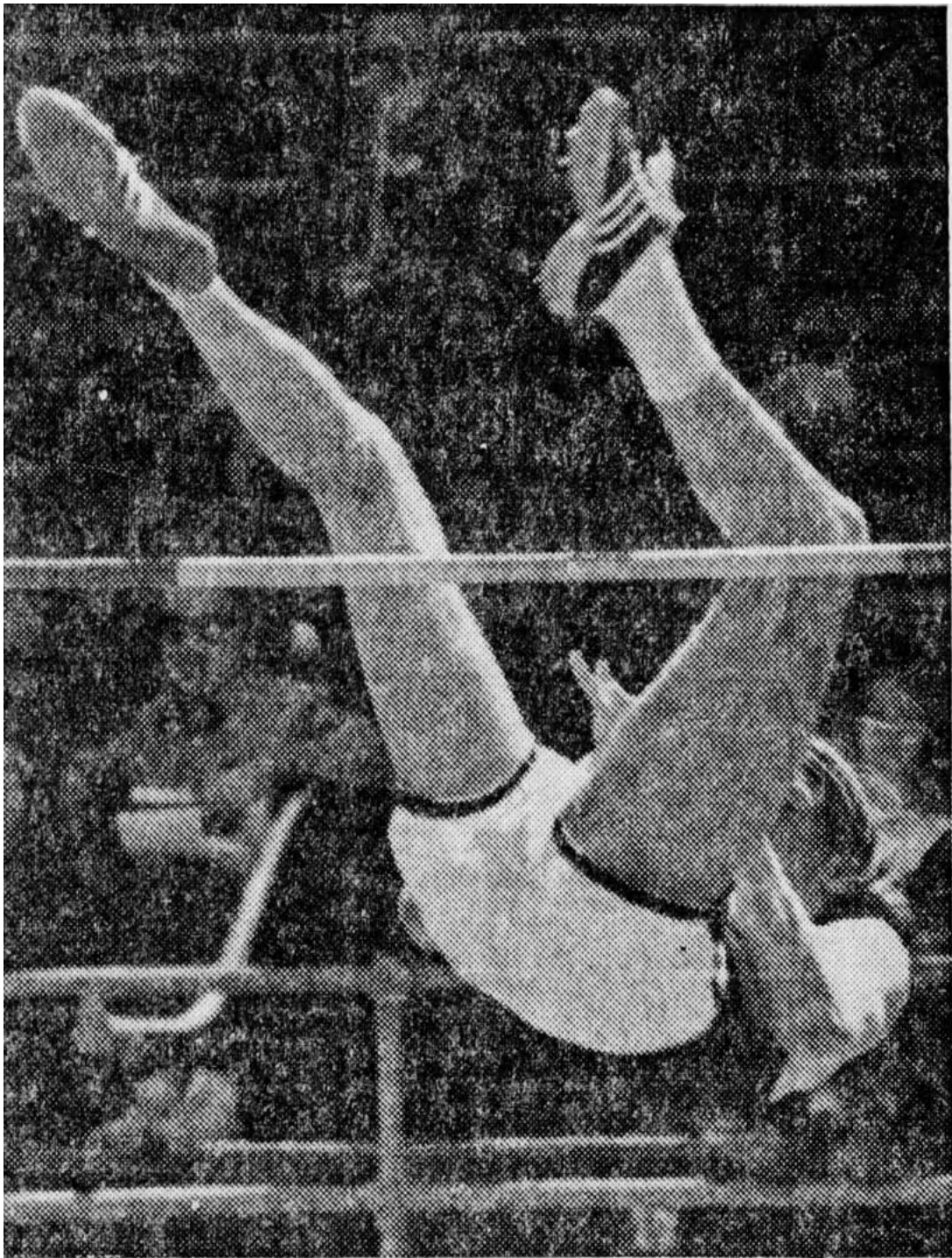
The Quakers beat Penn State by a stride, helped by a deft exchange between Don Clune and Collin Grannum starting the anchor leg. State led by a yard coming into the final exchange, but a late pass nullified a stretch run by Jim Scott.

Scott, however, compensated for this oversight by beating the starter's gun in the final of the 100-yard dash. The race was not recalled, and Scott held off Rudasill and Bernie Gansle of Penn at the tape. The time was 9.7 seconds.

Collins, the smooth-striding sophomore from Chester, Pa., outran Dan Slevin of Tufts and Jim Elwell of Temple, the defending champion, in the 440 hurdles. Collins' time was 50.9, but he coasted from the last hurdle to the finish line obviously saving himself for the 220 final later in the day.

Villanova's slim hopes for a 12th team title in the last 16 years ended quickly in the 440, as Mike Black wrote St. Joseph's into the Intercollegiate Association of Amateur Athletes of America record books for the first time. Greg Govan, the Wildcats' top threat, faded to fifth. Black's time, 47.7 was the slowest winning I.C. 4-A quarter-mile in 11 years.

Scott won the 100 at Franklin Field Saturday in :09.7. The sophomore from Carlisle also placed fifth in the 220. He'll compete in the 100 only because he hasn't met the NCAA qualifying standard in the 220.

Fredericks won the six-mile event Friday in record time, but this week he'll concentrate on the three-mile. A year ago, Steve Prefontaine of Oregon won the NCAA three-mile run and Fredericks placed second.

De Palma's Javelin Win Gives Penn Jump in IC4A

Philadelphia, May 26 — Favored Penn needed only one championship event today to indicate it probably would win its first outdoor IC4A track and field title

in 52 years. The Quakers upset Villanova by a couple of points to capture their first indoor title this past winter in 41 years.

Maryland, one-point loser to Villanova in the outdoor IC4A a year ago, was figured to be one of four clubs—the others are Villanova, Penn State and Navy — to press Penn this time, but the Terrapins stumbled at the outset as Penn moved up.

First Win Since '22

With a 255-2^N javelin throw this spring, by far the best in the IC4A, Jim George of Maryland was supposed to win that event—the first to be completed—hands down. He didn't even qualify for the final, throwing a best of only 207. Don Fisher got the Terps a single point in the spear throw—the only one they earned in the first four field events, where they are usually top-heavy.

As George failed, Penn soph Fred DePalma gave the Quakers their first six points by winning a 233-11 javelin. This marked his school's first triumph in this event since George Bronder did it in '22.

The absence of Paul Corrigan in the discus also hurt Maryland's chances. Winner the last two years, Corrigan failed to compete because of sudden academic difficulties.

Greenwood Wins Hammer

Incidentally, Gary Cortina of St. Joseph's won the duel of brothers in the discus, finishing fifth with 159-0. Brother Greg, a Notre Dame linebacker from Trenton, N.J., failed to make the final. But he is favored to win the shot-put tomorrow.

A best-ever throw of 195-3 gave Doug Greenwood of Princeton the gold medal in the hammer. Mike McDermott of NYU, who had been given a good chance of winning, was third with 192-7.

Greenwood went to Princeton from Tuxedo Park as an outstand-

ing guard prospect (5-11, 210 pounds) and starred as a freshman. But then he came down with mononucleosis and gave up football.

The other first-day final in the field events, the long jump, went to Pitt soph Bill Rea, as expected. He had done 26 7½ this spring and was expected to break the oldest record (25 9¼) record for the IC4A books, made by Meredith Gourdine of Cornell 21 years ago but only managed 25 1¼ in becoming the first champion to repeat.

The 96th IC4A, oldest track meet in the U.S., didn't get by the first day without hassle.

The pairing sheets contained the information that the half-mile trial heats would produce the first four finishers in each heat for the semifinals. The starting judge failed to notify all contestants that only three would qualify, however and the games committee had to discuss several protests when it was announced only three survived.

Bid to Relax Games Rules

Lausanne, Switzerland, May 26 (AP)—The Association of International Sports Federations agreed unanimously today to seek a liberalization of the amateur rules in the Olympic Games.

The decision, taken behind closed doors at the Association's annual meeting, was seen as a step away from the rigid interpretation of Olympic amateurism long imposed by International Olympic Committee IOC President Avery Brundage.
