EASTERN COLLEGE ATHLETIC CONFERENCE

The Nation's Largest Athletic Conference Story and Benefits

Over 60 years of Tradition, Pride, Diversity and Service

Founded in 1938, the Eastern College Athletic Conference (ECAC) is the nation's largest collegiate athletics conference with 292 member colleges and universities ranging from Maine to North Carolina in Divisions I, II and III. ECAC member institutions sponsor over 2,500 varsity teams involving 125,000 male and female student-athletes.

During the 1998-99 academic year, the ECAC will sponsor 102 championships in 22 men's and women's sports and is responsible for over 22,000 officiating assignments, a public-relations/award recognition program and a legislative services department. The ECAC also offers playing leagues for men's and women's ice hockey in Divisions I and III. The Division I men's hockey regular-season and tournament champions receive automatic bids to the 12-team NCAA tournament.

A conference of conferences, the ECAC includes within its organizational structure dozens of playing leagues and other organizations. Colleges and universities from the America East, Atlantic 10, Big East, Colonial Athletic Association, Ivy League, Metro Atlantic, Northeast and Patriot League, along with schools from the Massachusetts, New Jersey, New York and Pennsylvania state athletics conferences, all hold dual membership with the ECAC.

The ECAC headquarters, the Asa S. Bushnell Center, is located in Centerville, Massachusetts, on Cape Cod. It is on the Cape where the business of this nonprofit organization is conducted at its annual Fall and Spring Conventions. Over 300 athletics administrators annually attend the Fall Convention, which includes tournament and membership committee meetings, professional seminars, and an awards luncheon.

One of the most significant events in ECAC history occurred in 1983 with the consolidation of the Eastern Association of Intercollegiate Athletics for Women (EAIW) into the ECAC structure. With the addition of women's sports, the ECAC has doubled the number of its championships.

Over the years, the ECAC has exerted leadership on not only the regional level but also the national level with the NCAA. With over 25 percent of the NCAA made up of ECAC members, the conference plays a leading role in national collegiate athletics policy and legislation.

Several ECAC administrators have served as both NCAA and ECAC presidents, including Bill Flynn, Boston College; John Toner, Connecticut; and Eppy Barnes, Colgate. Past NCAA Executive Director Dick Schultz, former Cornell director of athletics, served on the ECAC Executive Council.

The ECAC was founded as the Central Office for Eastern Intercollegiate Athletics with a charter membership of 53 colleges. Under the leadership of Commissioner Asa Bushnell, the conference addressed the concerns of its members in much the same fashion as today.

Bushnell molded and guided the organization from its inception until his retirement in 1970, at which time his long-time associate, George Shiebler, was appointed commissioner. Robert M. "Scotty" Whitelaw, who joined the ECAC in 1960, replaced Shiebler upon his retirement in 1972. After serving as ECAC commissioner for 17 years, Whitelaw retired in 1989. His place was taken by Clayton Chapman, who joined the ECAC in 1971 and retired June 30, 1998. July 1, he was succeeded by former NCAA Senior Assistant Director of Championships Phil Buttafuoco.

CHAMPIONSHIPS - The ECAC provides preseason and postseason venues to its membership and creates a highly competitive arena for member institutions to showcase the talents of their student-athletes. The conference also administers championships for nine affiliate organizations including EARC and IRA Rowing, IC4A cross country and track & field, ILA Lacrosse, IFA Fencing, EIWA Wrestling and EIGL Gymnastics. Beginning in 1997, the ECAC was awarded USOC Conference Grant Funds to enhance and support conference championships in Olympic sports that are considered "endangered" (men's gymnastics, men's water polo) or emerging (women's synchronized swimming and water polo). Additional grants were awarded to the ECAC in men's and women's fencing and wrestling in 1998. The grant program will fund these ECAC championships through the year 2001.

OFFICIATING - The ECAC assigns officials in Divisions I, II and III in 15 sports, including baseball, men's and women's basketball, crew, cross country, fencing, football, gymnastics, men's and women's ice hockey, men's and women's soccer, swimming and track & field, and wrestling. The ECAC supervisors of officials provide clinics and workshops to improve the level of officiating and to attract the most qualified officials at the collegiate level. The officiating bureaus assign officials for both conference and NCAA regional championships. The ECAC Officiating/Negotiating Committee, representing the ECAC membership, negotiates for all bureaus for which the conference assigns officials.

PUBLIC RELATIONS/RECOGNITION AWARDS - The ECAC publicizes its member institutions and student-athletes through weekly and postseason All-Star Awards in baseball, men's and women's basketball, football, men's and women's ice hockey, and softball. The ECAC publishes a quarterly newsletter, a Directory & Record Book and football and ice hockey media guides.

CONVENTIONS AND MEETINGS - The business of the ECAC is conducted at the ECAC Fall and Spring Conventions, which provide opportunities for the membership to discuss and vote on common issues and concerns. The ECAC Fall Convention on Cape Cod is attended by 300 administrators.

INTERNSHIP PROGRAM - The ECAC has established the prestigious Asa S. Bushnell internship program, employing three interns at the conference office each year providing them with a perspective on collegiate athletics, primarily through public relations and administration of its championships. Candidates must hold an undergraduate or graduate degree from an ECAC institution.

LEGISLATIVE SERVICES - The conference maintains a legislative and compliance service to assist its membership with the application of NCAA and ECAC regulations. The conference sponsors workshops and seminars, processes hardship waivers and administers the Collegiate Commissioners Association National Letter of Intent.

SPONSORSHIPS - The ECAC seeks the support of corporations desirous of increasing their penetration of the college market. Support can take various forms: enabling or enhancement of ECAC activities and events; products for ECAC championships and discounted rates for ECAC member institutions. Current sponsors include AmeriSuites; Budget Rent a Car; CCM; DD Martin; Itech; Koho/Titan/Canadien/Heaton; Market Segments, Inc. (MSI); Reebok; Spalding; and Stall and Dean.

SPECIAL EVENTS - The conference manages events such as the ECAC Holiday Festival in basketball at Madison Square Garden and ECAC-Hockey East Doubleheader, the Eastern College Football Awards Banquet at the Meadowlands and the ECAC Women's Basketball Holiday Festival.

TELEVISION - The conference manages an "ECAC TV Game of the Week," for football and ice hockey carried on Empire Sports Network and New England Sports Network; and football on Tri-State Media. Comcast, Home Team Sports, Madison Square Garden Network, and SportsChannel, also carry various ECAC events, including the men's gymnastics championships.

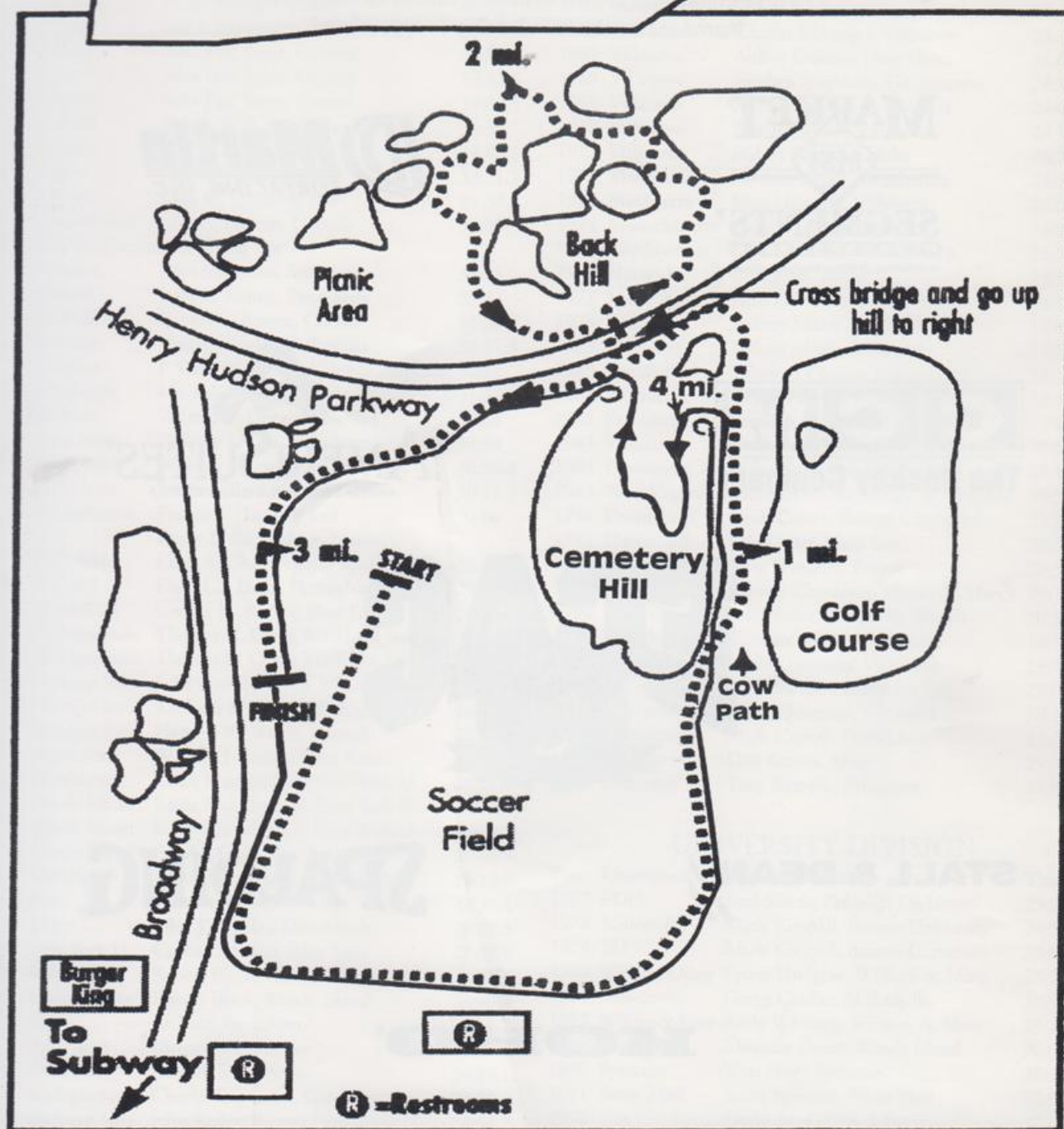
