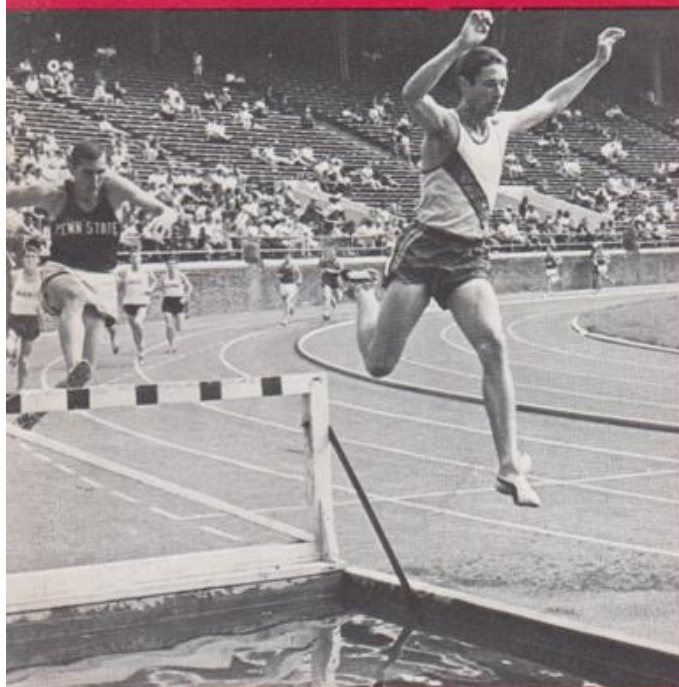

THE COVER BOYS

Four of the record-breakers in the 1968 championships at the University of Pennsylvania's Franklin Field. Upper left is Vince Bizzaro of Villanova as he soared to 16 feet 4 inches in the pole vault, half an inch better than the old mark set by another Villanovan, Rolando Cruz, in 1964. Upper right is Villanova's Dave Patrick, turning in the first I.C.A.A. mile under four minutes. He did 3:56.8, bettering his own 4:04.9 of 1967. Lower left is Terry Donnelly of William and Mary, winner of the 3,000-meter steeplechase in the record time of 8:46.2. Old record was 9:07.7, made by Boston College's Bill Norris in 1966. And lower right is still another Villanovan, Erv Hall, breaking his own record in the 120-yard high hurdles. He posted 13.5 seconds in 1968, after doing 14.1 in 1967. The Long-Playing Records Of Gourdine and Stanfield

At the head of each of the 19 events in this 93rd edition of the I.C.A.A.A. program, you will find a listing of records. The World and American records have academic interest; it is 34 years since a record in either category was established in this meet, where the first consideration of all participants is winning or scoring points.

The other listed records—I.C.A.A.A. championship (i.e., meet records) and I.C.A.A.A. Collegiate (records made by an athlete representing an association member college in any meet under acceptable conditions) are fair targets every year, provided track, wind and sun offer propitious circumstances.

They were powerfully propitious in the championships at Franklin Field a year ago when every meet record on the track, except the 220, was shattered.

The championships, to be sure, were held for the first time on a Tartan surface. The composition all-weather cushion undoubtedly contributed in large measure to the record windfall, though I hazard the guess that Larry James, Erv Hall, Dave Patrick, Dave Hemery and Steve Stageberg might have set meet standards on a cinder track too, given the same weather and Olympic-year motivation.

In the wholesale revision of records—championship and collegiate—for this program, the editor became intrigued with the oldest records in the I.C.A.A.A. book. One is the long jump of 25 feet 9¾ inches, set by Meredith C. Gourdine, of Cornell. The other is the 220-yard (turn) figures of 20.6 seconds, set by Andrew W. Stanfield, of Seton Hall.

The vintage year was 1951; the scene was Franklin Field; the occasion was the 75th anniversary of the country's oldest track organization.

What was so special about those records that they have lasted 18 years, with no immediate prospect that they will be wiped from the book?

The question was put to the author of one of the long-playing records—the Flash, now Dr. Gourdine, who took his doctorate in engineering science at Cal Tech, is now head of Gourdine Systems Inc. (Livingston, N.J.), a research and development firm, and is an inventor of such things as the dynamist paint gun.

As a Cornell junior in 1951, Gourdine won his only I.C.A.A.A. outdoor championships that year. With records improving so steadily, why has his jump mark lasted so long in this meet?

"Search me," said the research scientist. "I guess there aren't that many boys dedicated to the long jump as Ralph Boston was and Bob Beamon is. I'd look for a long, rangy, fast kid who wanted the world to himself. Not that I was that kind. I never specialized in the long jump. I was a jack-of-all trades—competing in the hurdles, the quarter and the jump, usually in five events, for Monty (Coach Lou Montgomery) was interested in winning dual meets."

Gourdine, who started jumping in his last year at Brooklyn Tech, had finally attained 25 feet that spring of 1951. But he wasn't the favorite going into the I.C.A.A.A. championships. Andy Stanfield was. Andy was taller, rangier, faster and more experienced—a senior who was to wind up with nine I.C.A.A.A. titles: three 100s, two 220s, three indoor 60s and one indoor long jump. Plus assorted National A.A.U. sprint titles, Olympic gold medals in the 200 meters and 400-meter relay (1952 at Helsinki) and Olympic silver in the 200 (1956 at Melbourne).

Stanfield had jumped four inches better than Gourdine as they headed for their 1951 showdown in the I.C.A.A.A. The year before in the same meet, Stanfield had tried to emulate Jesse Owens by winning four titles—the 100, 220, long jump and 220 low hurdles—under more trying circumstances than Owens had. The 220 flat and 220 hurdles were back-to-back races. Andy qualified in all

Erv Hall: A Man For All Reasons

Erv Hall is an admired human being.

He is admired by his Villanova teammates who elected him co-captain of one of the most powerful group of collegiate runners in America.

He is admired for his athletic ability—the fact that he can go out on a track in one afternoon and win the 120-yard high hurdles in 13.5 seconds, the 100-yard dash in 9.5 seconds and sprint a leg on a winning 440-yard relay team. He did all of these things in the IC-4A outdoor championships at Franklin Field in Philadelphia last spring.

But there is another side to the Villanova senior which begs exposure if only to serve as a contrast to the blind rage that is disrupting cities and campuses across the nation.

In an interview two days after Villanova's mighty gallop through the Penn Relays late last month, Hall was prevailed upon to state his attitude toward his fellow men.

"People to me are basically ALL people," he said. "I think too many people make the mistake of looking at a person's label before they look at the person.

"I don't see a difference until they show me a difference. You find a lot of friends that way."

Erv Hall has probably felt this way a long time. No act of his on the track, certainly, has ever contradicted his at-peace-with-the-world-and-himself.

A lot of his positive outlook is due to the happiness he has felt at Villanova, and the athletic success there that carried him to the Olympics, where he won a silver medal in the 110-meter high hurdles.

The accomplishment was something of a surprise to a fellow who once was only the second best hurdler on his Overbrook High School track team.

"I never foresaw all these things happening to me," he said. "I wasn't doing that good in high school until the very end. And then everything after that happened so fast. It's like blowing up a balloon and wondering how much the balloon will grow until it bursts."

Erv is sort of an air pocket within a balloon representing Villanova's dynasty in track along the Eastern seaboard in general, and in the IC-4A championships in particular. That balloon has sprung a leak only occasionally in the last dozen years, during which Villanova has won nine outdoor titles.

Hall knows it took more than talent to make that balloon swell.

"I've said this before," related the captain. "The Villanova team is like no other team. We are still basically high school in outlook.

"Usually when you go to college, you become an individual. You practice alone and often think alone. But basically Villanova is TEAM ORIENTED. Everybody is conscious of what everybody else does. Dave Patrick was typical. Dave was so conscious of getting so much publicity that he bent over backwards trying to be normal."

Besides togetherness, Villanova owes its success, according to Hall, to coach Jumbo Jim Elliott.

"Hardge Davis kids around a lot about coach Elliott," said Erv. "He insists that Jumbo possesses celestial powers, that our plane would never crash, for example, because Jumbo would tell the plane not to crash."

Villanova vs Maryland: Track vs Field

Can a strong dual-meet track and field team whip a stellar group of runners for an important team championship?

Or, more to the point, can the University of Maryland's strong field events squad prevail over Villanova's outstanding stable of runners?

These questions will be answered this weekend as the 93rd annual I.C.A.A.A. outdoor championships return to Rutgers Stadium.

Villanova has won seven of the last nine team titles and on the strength of domination by its Olympic athletes has to be favored once again.

At least that's the opinion of Maryland coach Jim Kehoe, never one to be overly optimistic where his track team is involved. Other more objective coaches see the Terrapins at least a 10-point winner.

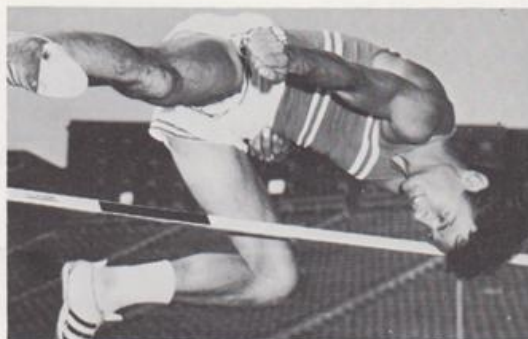
Certainly the College Park institution rates as the chief challenger. The Terps interrupted the reign of coach Jumbo Elliott's Wildcats with titles in 1965 and 1966. In fact, while Maryland never made much of a dent in the team standings until about 10 years ago, it has now finished either first or second each of the last four years.

A year ago, at the University of Pennsylvania's Franklin Field, Villanova scored 63 points to far out-distance Maryland, with 43 points. This after Maryland had scored a convincing victory in a triangular meet with the Wildcats and Quantico Marines.

Two weeks ago, the Terrapins repeated the triangular meet victory. Now they will be out to take care of that team championship.

In the field—where the points count just as much despite Elliott's recent reference to them as "cheap points"—the addition of the discus, javelin and triple jump could make up the difference between the two as measured by the indoor championships in March, which Villanova won with 46 points. Maryland was second with 32½.

Richard Drescher, a 6-3, 235-pound senior, is the defender in the discus and has been consistent at more than 180 feet. Teammate Gary Parsons has a best of around 165 and could be a point-winner.

Wildcat Jim Shillow upset the apparent Terrapin monopoly in the javelin last year, but nothing should deter Dave Reiss and Jack Bacon this year. Reiss has already been beyond 250 feet and Bacon, at 230, should be worth a point or two.

Drescher and Reiss have already shattered I.C.4-A collegiate records this spring in their respective events.

Junior George Braley has suddenly zoomed into prominence as a triple jumper, reaching 49-9¼ a month ago.

These events could be worth as many as 18 points, but the Terps will need the extras, because indoor long jump champ Elliott Garrett is currently ineligible.

Among the other field events, Joe David is a consistent 6-10 high jumper who was second indoors; Buddy Williamson is a 16-0 pole vaulter and the indoor champ; Jack Hanley, a 61-footer, and

Happy Birthday, Dear Football

In about four months, the on-the-field scene here in Rutgers Stadium will be a lot different than it is this week end, as the I. C. 4 - A. championships are held in New Jersey for the second time in the last four years.



On Sept. 27, Rutgers and Princeton will clash here in what will be the Centennial game of inter-collegiate football.

Little did those pioneers know on Nov. 6, 1869, that they, in a way, were establishing a "way of life" when Princeton sent here by train 25 representatives to play a football match against Rutgers.

From that day, Rutgers and Princeton have met a total of 59 times, but never has there been anything approaching what will unfold here in September, although there was great import for Rutgers in 1938 when the teams met in the dedication game of this very Stadium.

The Rutgers-Princeton game, which will be televised by the American Broadcasting Company, will be a symbol of the 100th birthday of the sport. It would have been nice, of course, if Nov. 6, the exact anniversary date, could have been a Saturday this year and that the schedule-makers would have taken the celebration into account when they inked in this year's game.

But the entire season, not just the one game, is being celebrated, and not only by the two colleges which gave a start to what many refer to as "autumnal madness," but by football-playing schools throughout the nation.

Plans for the anniversary have been developing for fully three years, although to some who have been involved that long, the big date has been approaching all too fast, with not enough time left to get ready.

For a year, a Rutgers committee operated pretty much on its own. After a while, interest picked up in many quarters and the National Collegiate Athletic Association, Princeton, the Football Hall of Fame, the College Sports Information Directors of America, The National Association of College Directors of

Athletics and other groups caught the excitement.

Birthday parties are fun, and this one will be that. But it also will, if the various groups achieve their goals, serve as a showcase for the college game, a vehicle for expansion and promotion to make more and more people aware of the spectacular which the college game is today.

The aim is to reach as many "publics" as possible, not just the players, coaches and alumni (who are already convinced), but "Joe Public," the ladies, the kids, and others.

Colleges throughout the country are planning Centennial celebrations. They may take many forms, but in every case, the objective is to pay respects to the game which has taught so much to so many, and the players, who, in experiencing many joys and frustrations, have brought so much enjoyment and thrills to the nation.

Rutgers, quite understandably, has planned special events for each of the six home games on its schedule, but the Princeton week end, of course, will be the heart of it.

The 440-yard hurdles by Dave Hemery, Boston U.—50.4 seconds, a new meet record, was the clocking, bettering by 1.1 seconds the old mark of 51.5, set by Tony Lynch of Harvard in 1965.

Villanova University scored a total of 63 points to overwhelm the field in the 1968 outdoor I.C.A.A.A.A. games and earn championship laurels. Second-place team was the 1966 winner, Maryland, which totaled 43 points, with Rutgers far back in third place with 18.

The talented Wildcats now hold four legs on the seventh Championship Cup and need one more title to retire it. Previous victories came in 1963, 1964 and 1967. No. 6 was retired by Villanova in 1962, after it had led the field in 1957, 1958, 1960 and 1961.

That cup had been in competition since 1933. Of five former cups, two were won by Harvard and one each by Yale, Cornell and Southern California.

Each of the Association's Trophies is held by the championship team for the year following its victory and becomes the permanent possession of the college that wins it five times, exclusive of ties.

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GENERAL INFORMATION

N.C.A.A. RULES OF COMPETITION WILL BE STRICTLY ENFORCED BY REFEREE AND OTHER OFFICIALS.

Track measures four laps to mile.

All events are scratch, i.e., none is handicap.

Firing of revolver denotes beginning of final lap in all races.

In all races there is no penalty for first false start, but competitor is disqualified for second false start. However, starter's recall no longer nullifies false start by any competitor.

In hurdle races competitor is not disqualified for knocking down hurdles.

In all relay races baton must be carried in runner's hand and must be passed to next succeeding teammate within clearly marked 20 meters zone, extending 10 meters in both directions from leg finish line.

Governing rules provide that, in races around turns, any competitor willfully jostling, running across or obstructing another competitor so as to impede his progress, shall be disqualified. If in any race competitor is disqualified for any of these reasons, Referee shall have power to order race to be rerun with disqualified competitor excluded or, in case of heat, to permit any competitors affected by act resulting in disqualification, other than disqualified competitor, to compete in subsequent round of event.

Any competitor may be disqualified if, in opinion of Referee, he has in any way been aided by coach, teammate, or anyone connected directly or indirectly with team concerned, such as, running along-side of teammate, being stationed at various points near track, or located nearby any of field events for purpose of aiding or coaching competitor after race or field event has officially been started.

Each member college is limited to following numbers of actual participants in various events in the Outdoor Championships:

One Mile Run	2*
One Mile Relay	One Team
All other events	5

Nominee or qualifier who fails to compete in any running or hurdling event for which he has been nominated or has qualified will be ineligible for any further participation in meet.

In four weight events (shot, discus, javelin, and hammer), broad jump, and triple jump, each contestant shall be allowed three preliminary trials. The first six men in the standing at the completion of the trials will qualify for the final. Each finalist will then receive three additional tries.

All performances made in field event trials shall be counted with performances in final in determining final place winners. Each competitor shall be credited with best of all his efforts.

Competitors must be on time, field contestants entering enclosure five minutes before scheduled start of their event, and track contestants entering enclosure upon completion of race next preceding theirs. As soon as their event is over, competitors will kindly leave track and infield without delay.

In each event 16 points are scored: 6 for first place, 4 for second, 3 for third, 2 for fourth, and 1 for fifth.

*(Plus (1) one more upon approval of Games Committee, provided all three representatives of affected college are of championship calibre.)

Sometime during the week prior to the game, official ceremonies known as First Day Exercises are expected to be held at which a commemorative stamp will be issued. Exactly where and when this will take place has not yet been announced by the Post Office Department.

On Friday night, Sept. 26, the Rutgers students will conduct a parade through town, with some 25 floats and 20 musical organizations participating. The floats will be designed by student groups with the Centennial as the theme. Some of football's great teams and moments will be depicted.

Also on Friday evening, there will be a reception for the press, radio and television and dignitaries, who are expected from throughout the nation.

Although it is unsettled at this point, there is an excellent chance that a Princeton eating club and a Rutgers fraternity will stage on Saturday morning a mock replay of the 1869 game.

During the pre-game and halftime ceremonies (all details not yet worked out), all Rutgers and Princeton captains of past games will be introduced and will participate in the official coin-toss. Centennial medallions from the N.C.A.A. will be presented to the Rutgers and Princeton players, and the marching bands and glee clubs from the two universities will perform.

Serving as master of ceremonies will be Ozzie (and Harriet) Nelson—Ozzie, of television, radio and film fame, being a former Rutgers quarterback. Presiding over all the festivities will be blond Barbara Specht, the nationally-elected Centennial Football Queen, who is pictured on these pages.

Rutgers hopes to have on display the four paintings in the Chevrolet Sports Art Collection, and it is expected that brief remarks will be made by Presidents Mason W. Gross of Rutgers and Robert F. Goheen of Princeton.

Following the Princeton game, Rutgers will be host to Cornell, Lehigh, Navy, Columbia and Colgate, with special ceremonies scheduled for each game, although detailing them here is unnecessary.

It should be quite a show, and we haven't even mentioned the football game, itself, which Coaches John Bateman and Jake McCandless and their players will do their utmost to make one of classics.

By the way, McCandless certainly has selected a unique game in which to make his debut as head coach.

Anyone here today, of course, is a track buff. But you're also a booster of college athletics, and we hope that during the course of 1969 you will join in wishing a happy birthday to the King of College Sports. ●

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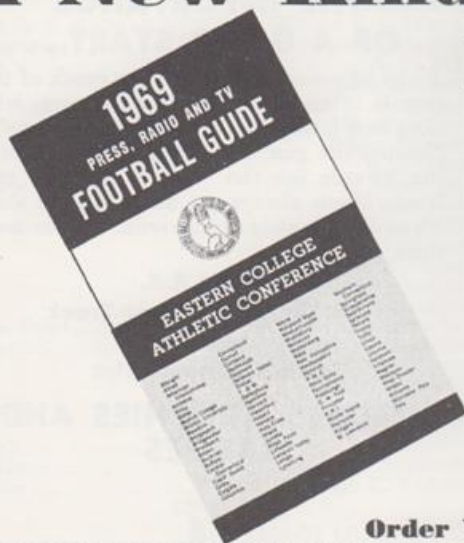

four, but pulled a muscle winning the 100 and that ended his four-title quest. At that, his qualifying jump stood up for fourth place, beating Gourdine.

In 1951 Stanfield contented himself with a triple effort. He won the 100; he won the 220 around a turn in the aforementioned 20.6, which was to be expected of a man who never lost an I.C.A.A.A. sprint, indoors or out.

Between times, Andy also was the first to break the 20-year-old I.C.A.A.A. long jump record of 25-3½, held by Richard Barber, of U.S.C. But Andy could not psych Gourdine out of the jumping title.

"The night before the meet, I had this dream," recalled Gourdine. "I dreamed that I jumped 26-3. (Note that Gourdine, even in a dream, his own dream, did not aspire to breaking Owens' 16-year-old world record of 26-8¼). I drew the third flight, which meant that 18 jumps were taken before my turn. I was disturbed because the runway—this was cinders, you know—had been chewed up. It looked like Coney Island. I fouled my first jump. Foul jumps are not measured; but the judge sneaked a measurement. It was exactly 26-3.

"Andy was jumping before me, and he broke the record with 25-6. I was still held by my dream and came back with a jump of 25-9¾. Andy then took off on one that measured 25-9. My new record was safe."

Isn't there anyone in the house eager to take home the long-playing records of Flash Gourdine and Andy Stanfield? •

Drescher, a 55-footer, are potential shot put point-getters, while Mike Neff may get a point in the elong jump. He has been beyond 23 feet.

There may be as many as 40 points in this crop of talent and Villanova doesn't figure to have more than token entries in the field portion of the program and certainly no one of the stature of last year's champions, Shillow and pole vaulter Vince Bizzarro.

A year ago, Maryland scored 20 points on the track, with Roland Merritt accounting for most of them. The rugged senior sprinter with the long stride is a doubtful 220 defender. He pulled in the ACC meet three weeks ago.

It was here that Maryland, an I.C.4-A member since 1944, won its first outdoor championship in 1965. The Terrapins would like nothing better than to present Kehoe with a parting gift by duplicating that feat. Kehoe becomes athletic director at Maryland on July 1. •

None of the Olympic candidates on the Villanova team benefited more from the veteran coach's training techniques and ministrations than Hall. Although Erv's times and performances generally listed him about fifth best in U.S. 120-yard hurdle ranks, Jumbo insisted that the tall, mild-mannered young man would make the Olympic team.

"The workouts he gave me made me sharp," recalled Hall. "And he kept telling me I was going to make it. I thought most of the time I was going to make the team but a lot of it came from Jumbo telling me.

"It was uncanny how he predicted my times within a tenth of a second. I ran 13.3 and I thought then I could go faster. Jumbo thinks I can, too. I figure this year I should go under 13.2. I think that's part of the reason he didn't let me go in the Penn Relays. He didn't want to take a chance because we had the ICs, NCs and AAUs coming up."

Any predictions on the team race?

"We've won two in a row and I can't see us losing this one," he replied. •
