HARVARD AGAIN A WINNER

MANY RECORDS BROKEN BY THE COLLEGE ATHLETES.

VERY SUCCESSFUL GAMES ON THE BERKELEY OVAL — YALE GETS SECOND PLACE AND PRINCETON THIRD — THOUSANDS WATCH THE CONTESTS.

Harvard's athletes are once more triumphant on the track and in the field, and the crimson is flying high. The Mott Haven Cup went to Harvard two years ago, after the most interesting series of intercollegiate contests this country has ever seen. A year ago Harvard sent the pick and flower of her athletes to meet the teams of Yale, Columbia, and a dozen other colleges, and the result of the meeting was that the name of Harvard was the first to be engraved on the new intercollegiate championship trophy, that replaced the Mott Haven Cup. Yesterday Harvard sent her athletes out once more, and once more they go back to Cambridge with Harvard's name above all others. Records were equaled and records were made, not only by Harvard's athletes, but by those of other colleges, yet Harvard won 46 of the 119 points of the contests, while her nearest competitor, Yale, got but 25 points.

All who knew, or thought they knew, anything about college athletics said that Harvard would win the sixteenth series of intercollegiate games, yet few would have dared to predict such a victory. Last year of the 119 points she won but 32. This year she gets 46, and had her runners in the quarter and half mile done as well as as they were expected to do, she might have had a majority over all. The atmosphere must have taken on a crimson hue, however, on the Cambridge campus last night when the news of the victories on the Berkeley Oval were received.

It was a perfect day for candidates for all-around athletic championship honors to meet, and all the conditions were in harmony. The beautiful Berkeley Oval, a natural amphitheatre, was a picture to gaze on. The cinder-track, which had been rolled and wetted down for a week, was as smooth as a floor.

The sport was scheduled for 2 o'clock, and it began promptly. In fact, the management was above criticism in every respect. An hour before the games started, however, the crowd began to come. When it had ceased to come those who should know said that a moderate estimate of the number present would be 7,000. Of course the students predominated. Every college had its representation. Looking around the slopes from the field one could easily see by the waving colors where Harvard, Yale, Princeton, or any other college had massed its adherents; but as if the colors were not enough, there was a perfect fusillade of distinctive college cheers across the field.

Where you find the students you will find the fair sex. There were at least 2,000 women present yesterday, mostly young and generally fair. They appropriated to a very large extent the big south stand. Their athletic partisanship found a field for expression in the colors of their wraps and parasols, and the result was that the places they occupied were like great banks of bright color. Hundreds drove out to the Oval. The field was given up largely to their conveyances, and there were gathered over a hundred tally-hos, breaks, drags, buckboards, dog carts, and tandems, each bearing its complement of laughing youth.

Records were equaled or broken in ten of fourteen events. The 100-yard dash was a comparatively easy thing for the famous Luther H. Cary, Princeton's great sprinter, and Princeton's boys cheered themselves hoarse when, after the trials, it was seen that three of the four men left for the final wore the orange and black, practically insuring the college first, second, and third, and eight points. Cary pushed himself in the final in an attempt to equal the world's record of 1:09 4-5. He was 10 seconds, however, covering the 100 yards, equaling the collegiate record and beating the intercollegiate record of 0:10 1-5.

In the 120-yard hurdle the records counted for nothing. H. L. Williams, Yale's famous hurdler, was out to break them, even though he had Harvard's Fearing and a dozen other good men against him. This he did by first winning his heat in 0:16, equaling the world's and the collegiate records, and lowering the intercollegiate record from 0:16 1-5. When it came to the final, running almost neck and neck with Fearing, he touched the string in 0:15 4-5, making a new record for all other hurdlers to try to equal.

Then it was time for G. B. Shattuck, Amherst's man, to distinguish himself in the 440-yard dash. He won his heat without effort. Coming to the line in the final, against a lot of the best quarter-mile runners that ever crossed a line, he started well, ran with full confidence, and finished in 0:49 1-2, breaking the intercollegiate record of 0:50. The collegiate record is 0:49 and the world's record 0:47 3-4.

In the mile run W. B. Woodbridge of Princeton, comparatively unknown on the track, proved himself a wonder and would have had first place had the run been ten rods less. In the mile walk Collis was the winner from the start. Eight of the twelve men walking against him were properly disqualified. Collis lowered the intercollegiate record of 7:06 4-5 to 7:05 4-5.

Williams, Yale's hurdler, came up as a record smasher in the 2:20-yard race. He won his heat easily. Running with Fearing beside him in the final, he won in 0:25 1-5, lowering the intercollegiate record of 0:25 1-4. The world's record and the collegiate record is 0:24 4-5.

There was a beautiful finish between Harvard's three bicyclers in the final of the two-mile race, they being less than a wheel apart. In the half-mile run there was but one-fifth of a second of difference in the finish of Wright and Turner, yet Wright's victory was clear.

The 220-yard dash, the last event, was the record breaker of the day. Cary won his heat in 0:22 1-5, equaling the intercollegiate record. In the final he established a new world's record of 0:21 3-4, and Lee and Vredenburg, the second and third men, equaled the intercollegiate record of 0:22 1-5. The old world's record was 0:22.

Records were also broken in the field. E. D. Ryder, Yale's great pole vaulter, ran up an intercollegiate record of 10 feet 7 inches and a collegiate record of 10 feet 7 3-4 inches, and got over 10 feet 10 3-4 inches. He has a world's record of 11 feet 5 inches to reach. In the hammer throwing the intercollegiate record of 98 feet 6 inches was broken by Finlay of Harvard, with a throw of 107 feet 7 1-2 inches, only 9 inches less than the world's record and the collegiate record. In the running high jump Fearing of Harvard, with 6 feet, bettered the intercollegiate record 1-4 inch, though he jumped 4 inches less than the collegiate and world's records.

Victor Mapes, Columbia's broad jumper, beat the intercollegiate and collegiate records by covering 22 feet 11 1-4 inches. The former record was but 22 feet 6 inches and the latter 22 feet 9 1-4 inches. The world's record is 23 feet 3 1-2 inches.

The tug-of-war was easily Columbia's. The team were J. S. Douglass, Captain; W. P. Robertson, No. 2; R. A. Monks, No. 3, and E. H. Miller, anchor.
