ARMY PLACES NEXT

Trails the Middies, Who Annex Third College Track Title in Row

MARGIN IS UNDER 4 POINTS

Dartmouth Finishes Third at
Annapolis—Walsh Wins Mile
in 4:12.3—Douglas Stars

ANNAPOLIS, Md., May 25—Navy's deeply manned squad, performing close to its maximum expectations before an Army-Navy day crowd of 10,000 at Thompson Stadium, today won team honors for the third straight year in the seventieth annual I. C. A. A. A. A. outdoor track and field championships. The midshipmen had the additional satisfaction of topping Army in their dual meet, which was conducted concurrently within the framework of the varsity games.

Taking only two first places but scoring heavily in the shorter flat races, the Annapolis charges of Coach Earl Thomson rolled up a total of 36 5-28 points to repeat their 1944 and 1945 victories over Army, which again was runner-up, with 33 1-7 points. In the dual meet, it was not as close, Navy's margin being 70 1-3 to 55 2-3.

Following the service academies was Dartmouth, with 24 1/7 points; Michigan State, 21 1/2; N.Y.U., 20; Marquette, 13; North Carolina, 12 1/2; Pittsburgh, 12; Holy Cross and Yale, 9 each. Despite the railroad strike, all but a few of the scheduled entries contrived to arrive—Harvard, Cornell and M.I.T. being the most notable absentees—with the result that the most open competition since pre-war days was produced.

Record for Wiesner

While Ken Wiesner of Marquette accounted for the only meet record by clearing 6 feet 6 3/4 inches on his final trial in the high jump, the performances turned in on the outdoor track season's first good day were of a high standard, despite some traffic jams on the sharply angled turns of Navy's four-sided track.

Pouring on the pace relentlessly in what virtually amounted to a solo exhibition, Eddie Walsh, slim, bespectacled 24-year-old ex-GI from Manhattan, ran the third fastest mile in I.C.A.A.A. history by winning this event in a breath-taking 4:12.3, just one and two-tenth seconds off Lou Zamperini's 1939 mark and bettered in this meet only by Les Mac Mitchell's 4:12.2 of 1942.

After the first quarter it was no contest. Walsh moved to the fore at this pole, which he passed in sixty-one seconds, and then pulled steadily away, hitting the half in 2:02.6, the three-quarters in 3:07.4 and traveling the last quarter in 64.9 seconds.

He had a full fifty yards on Army's Bernie Connor, who sprinted past Mark Burnham of North Carolina at the finish. N. Y. U.'s Darwin Bruce charged up into fourth to nip Nick Smusyn of Navy and Paul Tiernan of Manhattan.

Bill Kash, Navy's N. C. A. A. 440-yard champion, won the quar-

ter mile, as expected, outfooting Jim Frazier of Michigan State by two yards in a bristling stretch drive, as another midshipman, Art Bigley, just missed nipping the Midwesterner. Jim McGuire, Colgate's 1944 winner of this event, finished out of the money in this 0:48.6 race, behind the Army pair of John Hammack and Allen Brown.

N. Y. U.'s Frank Martin fought off Jim O'Leary of Holy Cross in a blistering last-lap duel to capture the two-mile run by six yards in the sound time of 9:29.5. It was not until the final furlong that the Violets' two-time N. C. A. A. champion was able to shake off the Crusader. Manhattan's Eddie O'Toole, indoor I. C. A. A. A. titleholder, led going into the final lap but could not hold the pace, finishing thirty yards back, but still well ahead of Dartmouth's John Hanley and Fred Knauss of Army.

Alvah Meeker, Jack Rourke's "sleeper" from Colgate, came up from nowhere in the last 220 yards to win the half-mile by a two-yard margin from Army's Jim Egger and Penn State's Bill Shuman as the two favorites, Frank Leary of Fordham and Floyd Cuff of Navy, failed in the stretch drive. Meeker's 1:54.7 was the best time of the year.

Frank Douglas, stylish Negro

Herb Douglas, stylish Negro sprinter from Pittsburgh, upset favored Jim Pettit of Navy in the 100-yard dash. Stepping the century in a swift 0:09.7 against a slight headwind, Douglas won by a clean margin of a yard from Pettit, with Marquette's Bob Swain third by a step and Bob Strickler and Dick Ambrogi of the midshipmen in the other two scoring places.

Dartmouth's Joe Conley stuck his chest into the tape with a last-stride lunge for a photo decision in the 120-yard high hurdles over Sherwood Finley of Yale. Floyd Simmons of North Carolina and Harold Mayhew of Michigan State. He was clocked in 15 seconds.

Returning to the runway after his triumph in the dash, Douglas uncorked a mighty leap of 24 feet 4 $\frac{7}{8}$ inches to win the broad jump and become the meet's only double victor. He beat Charles Nash of Army by more than a foot, as Navy's two-time winner, Fred Bouwman, could do no better than third.

Wiesner's leap sent into the discard the mark of 6 feet 6 $\frac{5}{8}$ inches set by Delos Thurber of Southern California at Randalls Island in New York in 1938. The Midwest also produced the pole-vault winner, Ted Wonch of Michigan State taking this event by clearing 13 feet.

Another grand performance in the field events was turned in by Army's unbeaten Bill Chynoweth in the javelin. The whip-armed ca-

Dartmouth also came up with the winner in the low hurdles, taken by Alan Snyder in 24 seconds flat, with Simmons and another Dartmouth man, Bill Kimball, next in line. Pettit was beaten in the furlong dash, in which he was favored too, Swain leading him to the tape by two yards in 22 seconds flat.

Navy's crack quartet of Fred Bouwman, Jim Garibaldi, Bigley and Kash romped to a fifteen-yard victory over Fordham in the mile relay in the academy record time of 3:18.6, as Army lost its last chance to end the reign of the midshipmen by doing no better than fourth, behind Michigan State. Bigley was running his sixth race of the day and Kash his third.

N. Y. U. scored its anticipated one-two slam in the shot-put, as Bernie Mayer won with a toss of 52 feet 9 inches and Irving Kintisch placed second with 51 feet 11 inches.

Frank Remaka, ex-soldier from Holy Cross, was a surprise victor in the hammer throw, which along with the discus, was completed in the morning. Despite the fact that he did not arrive in Annapolis until 1 A. M. after spending more than twenty-four hours on the road hitch-hiking from Worcester, Remaka whipped the weight 165 feet 7 inches to beat Dartmouth's Sam Felton,

3 COLLEGES FORCED OUT OF MEET TODAY

Strike Keeps Cornell, M.I.T.
and Harvard Trackmen Away
From Annapolis Games

ANNAPOLIS, Md., May 24—Although the railroad strike is throwing a partial spike into proceedings, the seventieth annual intercollegiate A. A. A. A. outdoor track and field championships will go on as scheduled at Annapolis tomorrow, most of the thirty-eight colleges entered having got their athletes to the scene by plane, bus, private car or other improvised means of transportation.

As officials went into their pre-meet seeding conference tonight, they had received definite word from Harvard, Cornell and Massachusetts Tech that these colleges would be unable to make it, and were in doubt as to the status of several more distant entries.

N. Y. U. Among Contenders

However, Army, tabbed as the chief rival of Navy's defending squad; New York University, Manhattan, Columbia and Fordham from New York; Dartmouth, Pennsylvania, Princeton and Yale of the Ivy League circle, and Pittsburgh, Penn State, North Carolina, Marquette and Michigan State from fairly far afield were all

present or accounted for, assuring the spiked shoe classic of its widest entry since pre-war years.

Some squads that did arrive came in reduced numbers, a factor likely to accentuate the superiority of deeply-manned Navy and Army, who, in addition to battling it out for I. C. A. A. A. team honors, will hold their annual dual meet within the structure of the championship games.

Pettit Favored in Dashes

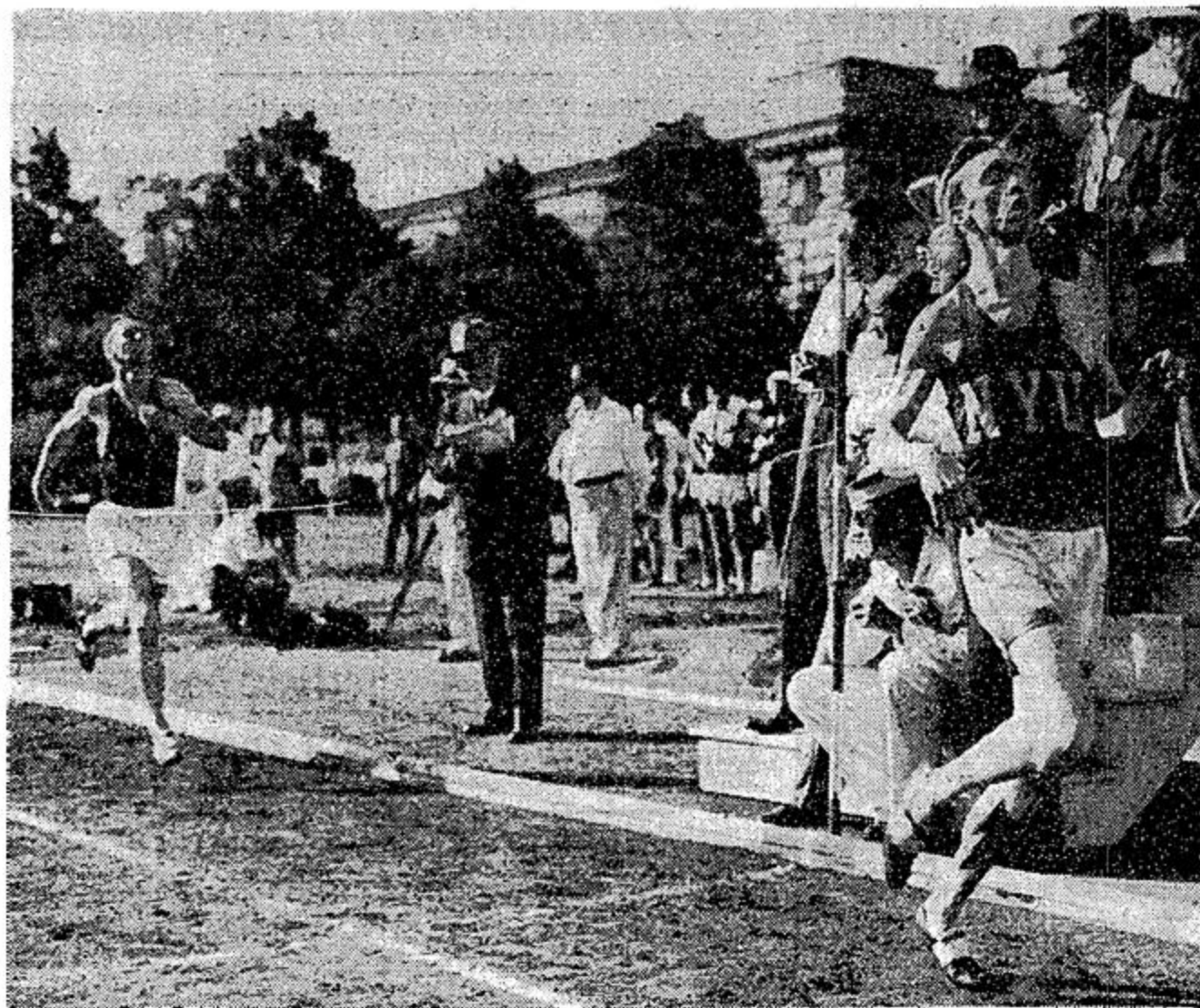
Navy's hopes of winning for the third straight year rest mainly in a fleet group of runners headed by Jim Pettit, favorite in the 100 and 220 yard dashes, and Bill Kash, choice in the 440. Coach Earl Thomson's mile relay quartet is regarded as a certain victor and Art Bigley in the low hurdles, Floyd Cuff in the 880, Nick Smusyn in the mile and Fred Bouwman in the broad jump figure to score heavily.

Army, I. C. 4-A. indoor champion for the last three years and twice runner-up to Navy outdoors, upset the midshipmen in the heptagonal games last Saturday, but cadet strength does not stand up as solidly in the wider competition of this meet as it did in the restricted Ivy League affair.

Of the five Army winners at Princeton, only Bill Chynoweth, javelin thrower, rates at the top of his field here. However, the cadets still have plenty of scoring potential and figure to make a good fight of it, with Bernie Conner, miler; Fred Knauss, two-miler; Charles Nash, broad jumper, and Felix Blanchard and Ralph Davis, shot-putters, leading the way.

Navy also will face Army in baseball and golf here tomorrow.
