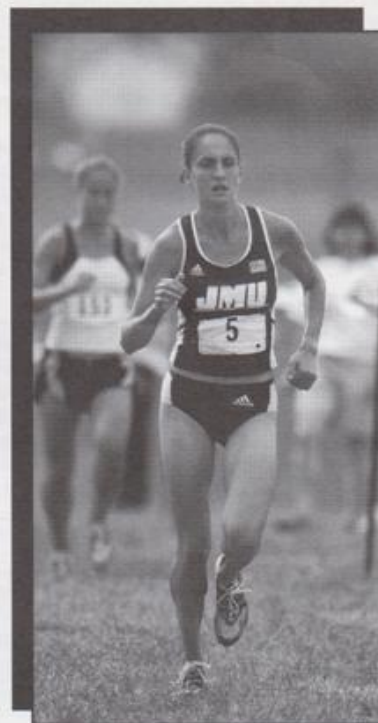

EASTERN COLLEGE ATHLETIC CONFERENCE

The Nation's Largest Athletic Conference

65 Years of Tradition, Diversity and Service

Since its foundation 65 years ago, the Eastern College Athletic Conference (ECAC) has emerged as the nation's largest athletic conference. The ECAC has grown significantly from its charter membership of 58 to 316 member schools in Divisions I, II and III, ranging in location from Maine to North Carolina. During the 2002-03 academic year, the ECAC will host 113 championships in 35 men's and women's sports for over 5,800 varsity teams and 128,500 male and female student-athletes.

HISTORY - The ECAC was founded as the Central Office for Eastern Intercollegiate Athletics in 1938. In 1983, one of the most significant events in ECAC history occurred as the Eastern Association of Intercollegiate Athletics for Women (EAIW) was consolidated into the ECAC. With the addition of women's sports, the ECAC doubled its number of championships and greatly increased its membership.

Through the years the ECAC has been a leader both regionally, and nationally. Comprising more than 32 percent of the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) membership, the conference plays an active role in national collegiate athletics policy and legislation. The conference continues to address many of the same issues affecting college athletics in the past while striving to be an industry leader in the 21st century.

LEADERSHIP - Inaugural commissioner Asa S. Bushnell molded the organization from its formation in 1938 to his retirement in 1970. George Schiebler succeeded Bushnell as commissioner from 1970-72, followed by Robert M. "Scotty" Whitelaw (1972-1989) and Clayton Chapman (1989-98). Current commissioner Phil Buttafuoco assumed chief administrator duties on July 1, 1998. Under Buttafuoco's leadership, the ECAC continues to move towards becoming the nation's leader in conference services and to set the standard by which all others are measured.

LOCATION - The ECAC's headquarters, the Asa S. Bushnell Center, is located in Centerville, Massachusetts on Cape Cod. The picturesque Cape is the site of the annual fall convention and honors dinner as more than 300 athletic administrators attend membership committee meetings, professional seminars, and tournament and affiliate meetings. The remainder of the year, the Bushnell Center is the hub of daily activities focused on championships, officiating, public relations and recognition awards, legislative services, sponsorship, special events and television venues.

CHAMPIONSHIPS - The ECAC administers 113 preseason and post-season events, including the EARC, EAWRC, Avaya and IRA rowing, men's IC4A cross country and track and field, FA fencing, EIWA wrestling and men's EIGL gymnastics championships. From 1997 to 2001, the ECAC sponsored conference championships in "endangered" (men's gymnastics, men's water polo) or "emerging" (women's synchronized swimming, women's water polo) with funding from the USOC as well as men's wrestling and men's and women's fencing.

OFFICIATING - The ECAC assigns officials in 15 sports in Divisions I, II and III, including baseball, men's and women's basketball, fencing, field hockey, football, men's gymnastics, men's and women's ice hockey, men's and women's lacrosse, men's and women's soccer, softball and wrestling. In addition, the ECAC officiating bureaus provide clinics and workshops, improving the level of officiating and attracting the most qualified collegiate officials. The bureaus assign for both conference and NCAA championships and totaled over 39,200 assignments for over 4,400 officials last year.

PUBLIC RELATIONS/RECOGNITION AWARDS - The ECAC publicizes the achievements of its member institution's student-athletes through weekly and postseason awards. Over 700 student-athletes are

honored in the fall, 1,300 in the winter and 400 during the spring through the player of the week program. Annually, the publicity bureau recognizes more than 3,300 student-athletes. The recognition awards program honors student-athletes, administrators and officials at the fall convention.

CONVENTION and MEETINGS - The business of the ECAC is conducted at the annual Fall Convention as well as meetings held each spring and summer, providing the membership opportunities to discuss and vote on conference-wide issues and concerns.

INTERNSHIP PROGRAM - The prestigious Asa S. Bushnell internship, named after the ECAC's first commissioner and established in 1976, offers students from ECAC institutions hands-on experience in all areas of operation of the nation's largest athletic conference. Former interns proudly represent the ECAC in all fields of the sports industry as directors of athletics, commissioners, broadcasting executives, professional franchise front-office positions, sports information directors and coaches.

LEGISLATIVE SERVICES - The ECAC maintains a legislative and compliance service to assist the membership with the application of NCAA and ECAC regulations. The conference sponsors workshops and seminars, processes hardship waivers and facilitates the Collegiate Commissioners Association National Letter of Intent program.

SPONSORSHIPS - The ECAC actively pursues the development of sponsorships that garner financial support of corporate and individual entities. Through sponsorship, the ECAC enhances championship events for participants while supplementing associated event operation expenses. Conference sponsors may receive, but are not limited to official access to the membership, television exposure, event signage, event entitlements, tickets and hospitality, and the opportunity to promote volume incentive buying programs.

TECHNOLOGY - The conference's two Web sites feature real-time management and cutting-edge technology. The nation's leading online officiating system site is a password-protected extranet that allows for real-time access to its membership and officials as changes occur to their schedules. The conference's main Web site is managed by a custom developed auto-content management system, giving the staff the ability to release conference news as it happens. The site also offers interactive polls and features for the fans. The ECAC is also on the forefront of other Web-based technology including creating a bid-generation Web site for membership travel needs as well as an officials' payment service.

TELEVISION - ECAC Productions coordinates with institutions, television vendors and broadcast partners to produce and obtain clearances of quality sports programming to promote the conference and its members. Televised sports events include football, men's gymnastics, men's and women's ice hockey and wrestling. These events are aired through partnerships with regional sports networks including Empire Sports, the New England Sports Network (NESN), Home Team Sports, Sunshine Network and Comcast Broadcasts.

SPECIAL EVENTS - The ECAC hosts events such as the Eastern College Football Awards Banquet, the ECAC Division I Women's Soccer Classic on Cape Cod, three conventions and a trade show. The ECAC also hosted the NCAA Division II Indoor Track and Field Championships at the Reggie Lewis Center and the NCAA Division III Baseball Regional in Harwich, Massachusetts in 2002. In 2001, the ECAC hosted four NCAA championships including the Frozen Four, the Division III Baseball Regional, the Division I Swimming and Diving Championships and the Division II Indoor Track and Field Championships.

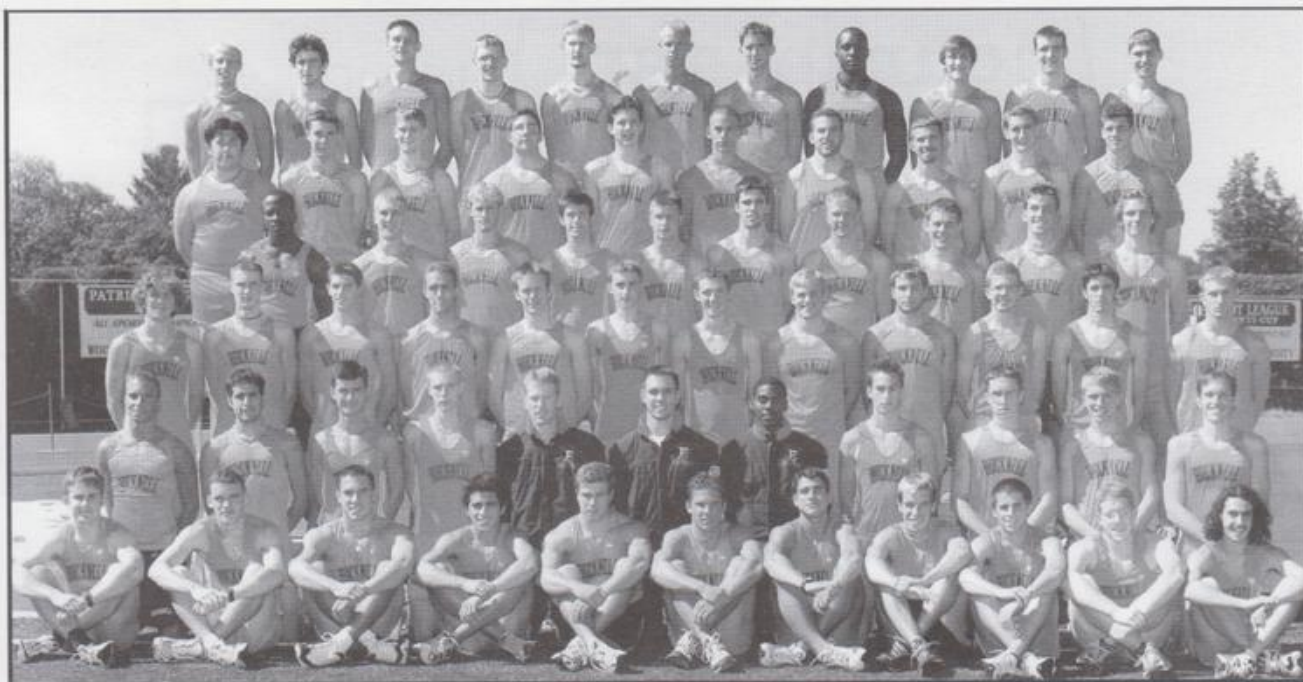

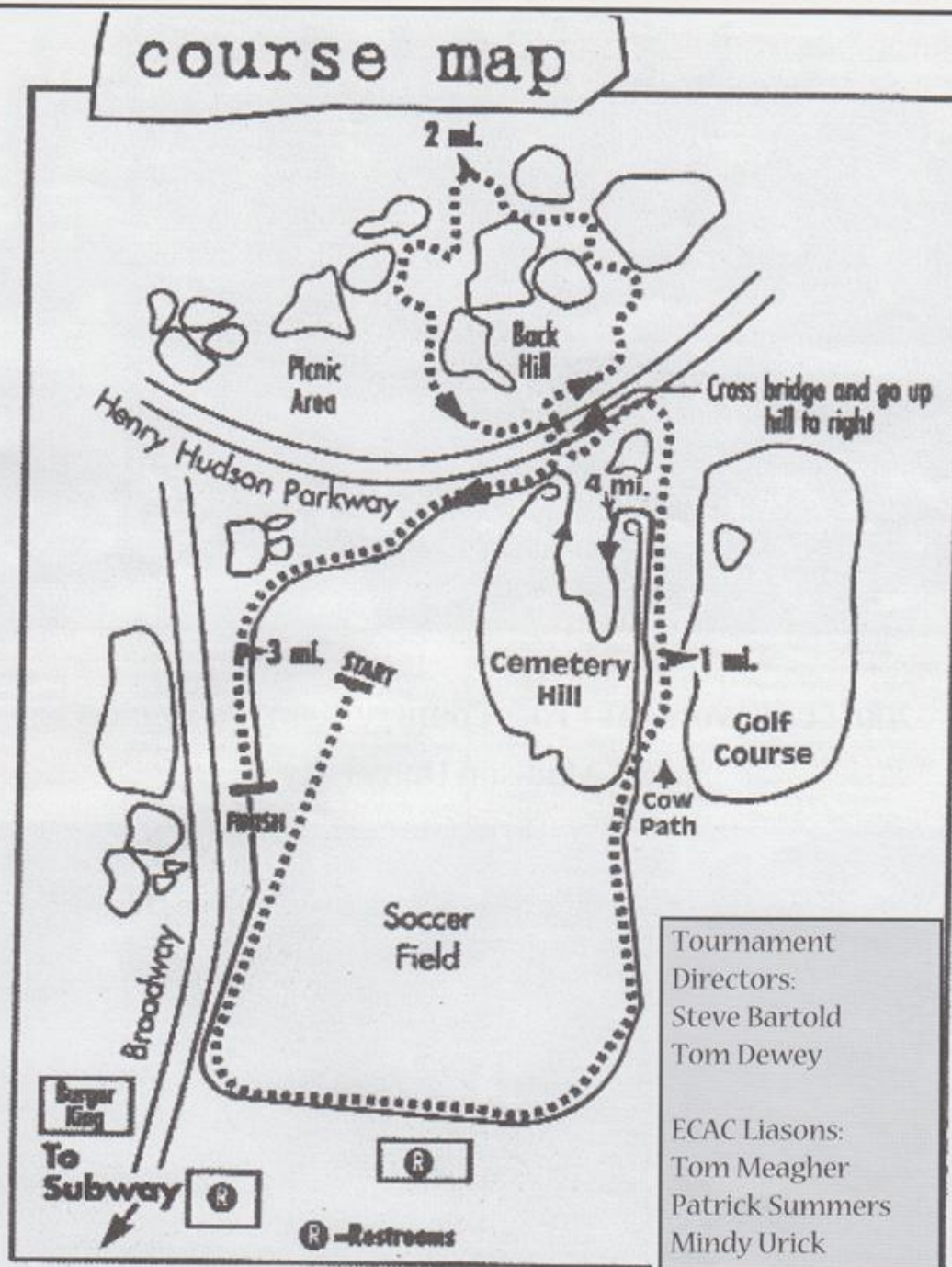
