PSU's Kessell, Crouch win ECAC crowns

Kim Kessell and **Jen Crouch** got Penn State off on the right foot by winning titles at the ECAC Track and Field Championships early Saturday in Fairfax, Va.

Kessell won the discus with a toss of 145 feet, 2 inches while Crouch, the freshman from Saxonburg, Pa., paced a 1-2-3 Lady Lion finish in the javelin with a throw of 159-1. Crouch is a three-time PIAA champ from Knoch High.

Finishing second in the javelin was **Stacey Gibbs** (154-8), one notch ahead of **Ann Daube** (154-2).

Penn State, the defending champion, also came up with a second in the long jump and a fourth and a sixth in the high jump.

Carmen Mann of the Lady Lions, the defending champ, had to settle for second in her specialty with a distance of 20-5. **Simone Brooks** of St. John's, N.Y., beat Mann by four inches. Both distances are good enough for NCAA provisional qualifying.
