Mann leads PSU to ECAC crown

Penn State powered its way to an eighth ECAC team championship in nine years by winning the three-day event Sunday at George Mason University in Fairfax, Va.

The Lady Lions, who were led by junior Carmen Mann, tallied 96.5 points to top the 32-team field. Defending champion George Mason, which snapped Penn State's long string of titles last year, was second with 63 points. Villanova was third (50 points), and Rutgers was fourth (48).

"We had a great meet," PSU Coach Teri Jordan said. "Everyone contributed for us and really came through when we needed it. Carmen had a terrific meet and was our most valuable performer. She had two NCAA qualifying efforts and ECAC records.

"But the story for us was the overall performance. We really hoped to do well this year after losing the title last year, and everyone came through with a big meet. There were numerous lifetime bests for us throughout the weekend, so everyone deserves credit for this victory."

The only win for the Lady Lions on Sunday was in the 4 x 800-meter relay. Junior Teresa DiPerna, freshman Mary Beth Powers, sophomore State College grad Amanda Dudley and senior Kiernan O'Toole combined for an 8:50.92. The splits for Dudley and DiPerna were personal records, as was the total time.

Villanova's Vicki Huber earned outstanding performer honors by shattering the record in the 3,000 with a time of 8:54.59 and winning by more than 150 meters. Mason's Jocelin Wilson and Mann tied for the top spot in the triple jump with a record of 42 feet, 1 1/4 inches. However, Wilson was selected as the triple jump winner with a second-best jump of 41-5 3/4. Mann's No. 2 jump was just one-half inch shorter than that at 41-5 1/4.

Virginia Young of St. John's won the hammer throw with a record toss of 163-8.

Other members of the Lady Lions who placed Sunday included freshman Shelly Mitchell, second in the 400 hurdles (PR of 59.83) and senior Ernestine Marsh, third in the same event (1:00.45) and seventh in the 100 hurdles (14.61); DiPerna, fourth in the 800 (2:08.09), junior Pam Connell, fifth in the 400 (55.92), sophomore Leslie Hummer, sixth in the 200 (25.12) and triple jump (PR of 38-6 1/2) and freshman Kim Kessell, sixth in the shot put (43-3 1/4).

Penn State's 4 x 100 relay team of Mann, Marsh, Mitchell and Hummer finished fourth in 47.40. And the 4 x 400 quartet of Mann, Hummer, Marsh and State College grad Laurie Morrow was fifth in 3:50.09.

3 RU women win in ECAC track

FAIRFAX, Va. — Rutgers finished fourth in the Eastern Collegiate Athletic Conference women's track meet during the weekend, taking three firsts.

Ann Bansemir won the heptathlon and Andrea Conway took the 100-meter dash in 11.82 and the 200-meter dash in 24.24 for RU.

In women's track, distance runner Pam Crandall qualified for the NCAA championships as Dartmouth placed eighth at the ECAC Women's Track and Field Championships.

Crandall finished second at 3,000 meters for the Big Green, close enough to winner Vicki Huber of Villanova — who eclipsed a six-year-old ECAC record by running the distance in 8:54.93 — to earn an NCAA bid.

The Big Green was the only Ivy League school in the top 10, finishing with 25 points. Princeton, which beat Dartmouth last weekend at the Heptagonal Championships, finished in 11th place.

Sarah Beasley scored in two events for Dartmouth, finishing second in the hammer and taking fifth in the shot.

Dartmouth's Liz Walter came in third in the discus. Therese Devlin took fifth in the 1,500 meters and Maura Westerdahl finished sixth in the 400 hurdles.

Lady Lions own big lead in ECAC track

The Penn State women's track team will take a commanding lead into the final day of the three-day ECAC Championships. Penn State leads with 49.5 points, followed by Connecticut and St. John's, who are tied for second with 18 points.

Carmen Mann qualified for the NCAA meet in the long jump, when she captured top honors in 20 feet, 10³/₄ inches. Mann's leap broke the school record of Nina Gage, who had jumped 20-9³/₄.

"It was a pretty significant jump," Penn State Coach Teri Jordan said. "She had a great day."

Saturday's biggest upset victim was two-time defending champion Pam Connell, who placed third in the heptathlon with 4,767 points. Connell was upended by Anne Bannemir, who totaled 5,027 points. Connell did not place in the javelin because two of her throws were

ruled flat, and on the final attempt, Connell fouled by stepping over the line. Penn State's Deb Ford placed fourth in the competition.

Other Penn State placers include: Stacy Prey, who placed second in the 5,000 in 16:36.11; Wendy Nelson, fourth in the 10,000 in 36:08; Anne Daube, second in the javelin with a throw of 147-10; Kim Kessell, second in the discus in 145-6, and Perpetua Domitrovich, sixth in the discus in 136-6.

Penn State's commanding lead does not seem to be in jeopardy Sunday. All three relay teams qualified for finals as did Leslie Hummer in the 200, Teresa DiPerna in the 800, Ernestine Marsh in the 100 and 400 hurdles, Shelly Mitchell in the 400 hurdles, Connell in the 400; Prey and Becky Williams in the 3,000; Jen Lee and Dana Conley in the hammer, Ford, Hummer and Mann in the triple jump and Kessell and Brenna O'Connor in the shot put.

UVM women place 23rd in ECAC track meet

FAIRFAX, Va. — The University of Vermont women's track team placed 23rd out of 50 teams in the ECAC Championships Sunday at George Mason University, which was about where coach Sandra Ford expected the Cats to be.

"We were shooting for a top-20 finish and no lower than 25th," she said. "We were up against some teams that had 25 women competing. Many of our women had their best personal times of the season. They can hold their heads high. We made our presence known."

Alison Poulin scored 4,701 points and placed fifth in the heptathlon, and teammate Sara Dahl compiled 4,511 and finished sixth.

The 4X100 relay team of Sue Kelly, Robin Proctor, Marcie Capitani and Amy Dwyer ran a 48.9 and finished ninth, and Capitani ran a 1:02.8 in the 400-meter individual medley, her personal best.

Kelly ran a 12.5 100 and a 25.34 200; Dahl ran a 14.7 100 hurdles; and Sari Argillander placed fourth in the 5,000 meters in 16:44.7.

Penn State athletes scored 96½ points and ran off with the team title in the annual ECAC Women's Track and Field Championships yesterday at George Mason University, Fairfax, Va.

Winning the shot put with a 46-3¼ heave for host George Mason was ex-Monmouth Regional High School star Audra Corson. Just half an inch back was Sonia Fitts of St. John's.

The George Mason team was second with 63 points, with Villanova (50) third and Rutgers (48) fourth.

Standouts for coach Roberta Anthes' Rutgers team were Andrea Conaway, who registered a double triumph in the sprints (11.82 for the 100, 24.24 in the 200), and Anne Bansemir, who took the gold medal in the heptathlon, staged Friday and Saturday. For Penn Relays champion Bansemir, it was her second major heptathlon title of the spring season.

Five Villanova women qualified for the NCAA championships yesterday at the ECAC championships at George Mason University.

The qualifiers are: **Vicki Huber**, who won the 3,000-meter title in 8 minutes, 54.59 seconds; **Kathy Franey**, who won on the 1,500 meters in 4:14.33; **Sonia O'Sullivan**, who was second in the same event in 4:16.39; **Michell Bennett**, winner of the 800 meters in 2:05.21, and **Kim Certain**, who took second in 2:06.57. The NCAA meet is scheduled for June 1-3 in Provo, Utah.

Wildcats coach **Marty Stern** also was named ECAC coach of the year.

Rutgers 4th in women's track and field meet

The Rutgers women's track team finished fourth last weekend at the ECAC Women's Track and Field Championships at George Mason University in Fairfax, Va.

"It's our best finish since I've been here at Rutgers," said Coach Roberta Anthes.

Penn State won the meet with 115.5 points, while George Mason (63), Villanova (50) and Rutgers (48) were the top four finishers. Andrea Conaway won the 100- and 200-meter dashes in 11.82 seconds and 24.24 seconds, respectively. Anne Bansemir took the heptathlon crown with 5,207 points.

Other top three Rutgers finishers were Angela Vaughn, who was third in the hammer throw at 153-feet-0 and Michelle Gordon, who copped third in the high jump at 5-8½.

St. John's Woman Sets Hammer Mark

St. John's Virginia Young established a national collegiate record in the hammer throw at the ECAC outdoor track and field championships at George Mason yesterday.

Young's effort of 163 feet, 5 inches eclipsed her old mark of 161-2. Teammate Sonja Fitts placed second in the shot put (46-2³/₄) as the St. John's women finished seventh with 38 points. Penn State won the meet with 115.5 points.
