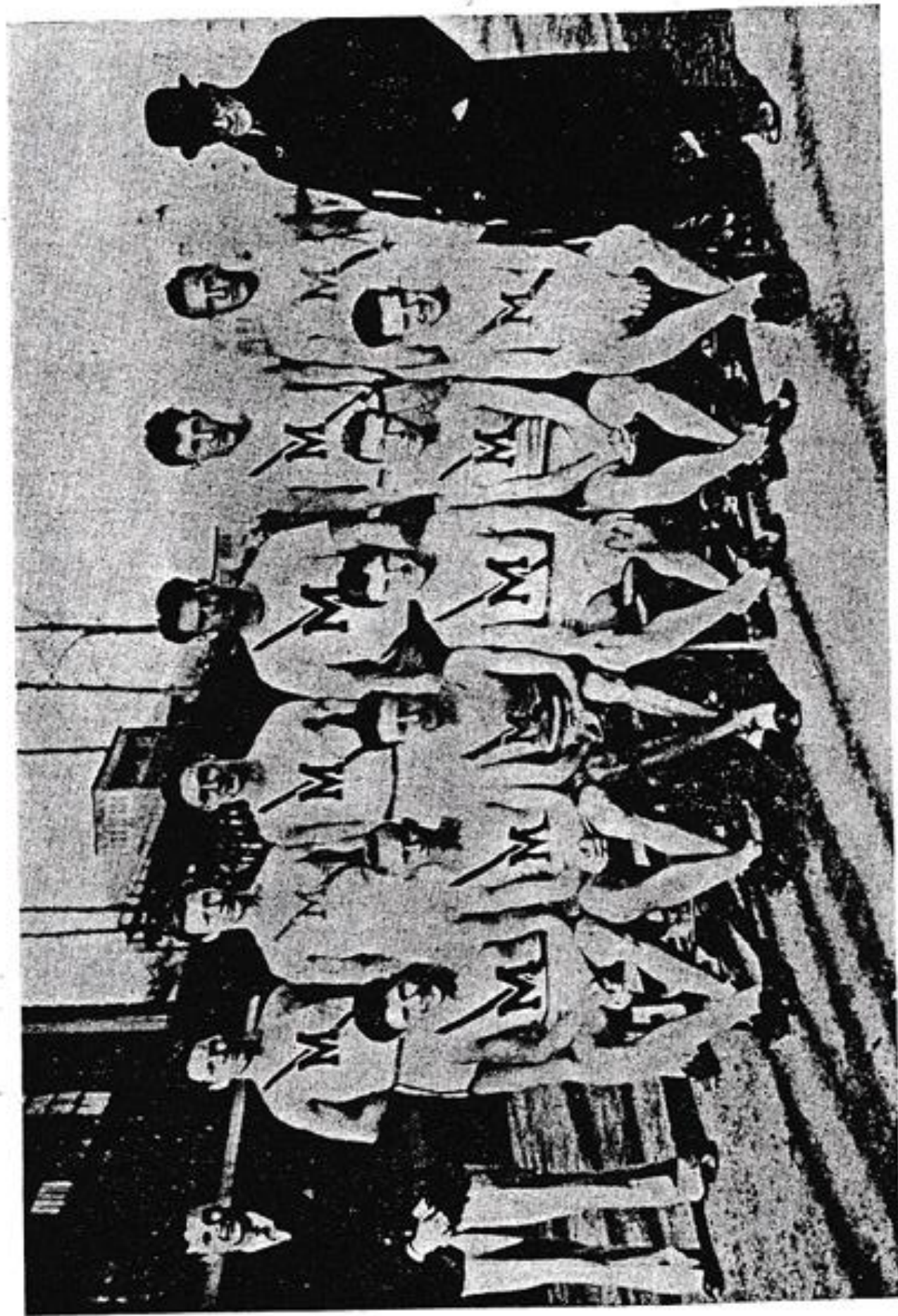

THE 1936 OLYMPIC GAMES

On July 15th the American Olympic team will sail for the Games of the Tenth Olympiad. It will be YOUR team representing YOUR country in the Olympics. Whether or not we send a full team to meet the other countries of the world in friendly contest will depend on your contributions. Other teams will be government subsidized but the United States will send one financed to the last penny by public subscription. The sum of \$350,000 is needed. Many of the athletes in this meet will be on that team. Don't let them down. Give generously so that they will be able to carry the American shield into Olympic competition "for the honor of our country and for the glory of sport."

NOTES ON THE "METRIC SYSTEM"

The so called International Standard was adopted at the Annual I.C.A.A.A. Convention of 1932 for the Indoor Meet of 1934. The Outdoor Meet has been measured in meters since 1933. For the purpose of familiarizing both athletes and spectators with metric distances and times made for such distances the head notes on the following events have been made comparative. In many events the distances in vogue at the Olympic Games and in most countries throughout the world are but little different from the distances in yards. An attempt has been made not only to show these differences but also the differences in time.

In the field events, the heights and distances will be shown in feet and inches, but any record made will be recognized under both the International and the English or Imperial System, because weight dimensions and all field event specifications are identical for both systems:

The accompanying table will be helpful to show relative values.

THE INDOOR TRACK AND FIELD CHAMPIONSHIPS

From almost the earliest days of the I. C. A. A. A. A., there have been indoor track and field meets held by members of the Association in the City of New York, and to these meets athletes from the various universities and colleges came in goodly numbers and provided keen competition.

Commencing with the late nineties and continuing thereafter for many years, Columbia University as a member of the I. C. A. A. A. A. held in the Old Madison Square Garden an Annual Indoor Track and Field Meeting, and to this more than to any indoor meeting of that time there came the athletes from the various members of the Association. After these meetings it was the custom to have, either in one of the assembly rooms of the old Garden, or at the Columbia University Club which was then at Gramercy Park, social gatherings of the competitors and their friends and these get-together meetings were indeed enjoyable and convivial gatherings of the champions and also rans of the years past, as well as of the competitors of the day.

In 1915 the I. C. A. A. A. A. felt that it would be advisable if this meet instead of being held by a member of the Association were held directly and with the authority of the Association itself. At that time it was considered desirable to discourage the indoor meet being, either championship in character, or held with the end in view of giving an opportunity to the teams of the various universities to show individual rivalry or of competing on a basis of team superiority.

The competitors were by groups and as then stated in the Constitution of the Association the meeting was "for the purpose of bringing together the athletes and their supporters in an athletic and social gathering."

The tokens given were miniature copies of the emblem of the Association, the Borghese Gladiator, and it was thought by many that the proper note had been struck for competition at this time of year when athletes were supposed to have been more in process of training than to have reached the high point of their proficiency.

These carnivals were held during the years 1915-21. Unfortunately their success was not so great as contemplated, and apparently were too idealistic for both competitors and spectators, a conclusion which became doubly apparent through the success of other indoor meets where so-called individual championships were competed in.

The result was that in 1922 the I. C. A. A. A. A. concluded to change its indoor meet from that of a gathering of groups to a stated championship, but to the end that opportunity might be given for the competing of those who might not be individually of the same high class as the Outdoor Intercollegiate Championship the events were set down to be largely of a relay character, thereby affording an opportunity for team supremacy though be it that at least one member of such team might not be of championship calibre. This indoor championship meet met with immediate favor and is now the indoor classic of intercollegiate competition.

GENERAL INFORMATION

The track is soft wood and spikes are permitted which, with banked turns, permit faster and safer running.

All events are scratch, i.e., none is handicap.

Points are scored for all events except the Freshman medley relay: 5 for 1st, 4 for 2nd, 3 for 3rd, 2 for 4th, 1 for 5th.

A complete score sheet will be found at the end of the program.

For field events see the latter half of program.

Position on the track and the order of competition in field events is determined before-hand by lot.

In relay events only one team may compete for each college or university.

All events on the curved track except the 1500 and 3000 meter runs are started in measured staggered lanes so that each man will run the same distance.

ARE YOU GOING TO THE 1936 OLYMPIC GAMES?

Important and Interesting Facts on Travel Requirements.

By F. A. GECKS, *Manager*

GERMAN TRAVEL FUNDS COMPANY, NEW YORK

Before leaving for Germany, it is advisable to convert your American dollars into "German Travel Marks". These "Marks" may be used to defray all your travel expenses with Germany, such as: hotel bills, railway and bus fares, restaurant, amusement and in fact all miscellaneous personal expenses that may arise. By so doing, a saving of about 40% is realized. At the present rate of exchange you can obtain about 4 Marks for a dollar whereas, if you wait until you get into Germany to convert your dollars into Reichsmarks you will receive only about 2½ Marks for a dollar. In other words, you will suffer a loss of about 40%.

Ordinarily, the amount of these Marks permitted to be cashed daily is limited to Reichsmarks (without obtaining special permission). However, the German authorities have raised this limitation to 100 Reichsmarks per day during the period of the Olympic Games for these special reduced Travel Marks.

After the travellers have cashed their Travel Mark checks or Travel Mark Letters of Credit, they receive actual German Reichsmark banknotes or silver. The checks are issued in 50 and 100 Reichsmark denominations.

They can also be used to defray incidental expenses on board German steamers as on board SS. "Manhattan" and SS. "Washington" of the U. S. Lines.

It is possible to arrange to have Travel Marks paid out to a tour manager to defray the expenses of an entire group or tour. This eliminates the necessity of each member of the group or tour making the calls themselves at the banks.

A refund will be made for any unused Travel Mark Checks when the traveller returns to this country.

And, just a word about automobiles—Foreign motorists will be allowed to take their automobiles into Germany without the usual custom duties or customs guaranty deposit during the period of the XIth Olympic Games in Berlin and Kiel. The required "Olympic Advance Certificates" will be issued from July 25th to August 16, 1936, and are valid until September 16, 1936.

THE NEW TRACK

The track used tonight is not only newly constructed, but incorporates novel ideals in design intended to promote speed and fairness for competitors. It is 150 meters for one lap and is 18 feet wide. The central straightaway is 24 feet wide.

While no banking over which a number of races must be run at different speeds, can be perfect the banks of the track have been constructed on scientific computations considering the centrifugal force and strain on the runners and are believed to be a fair compromise for all races.

The lanes are designated by white borders 4 inches wide with various colored stripes 4 inches wide beside them to aid in identifying each lane. Each lane will be measured 8 inches from the inner margin and not 12 inches as is the case with the curb lane. To make this inner lane the same as the others a 4 inch red strip is painted beside the curb and this may not be stepped on under penalty of a foul.
