Over-heated dogs	Dogs may become overheated	Bring plenty of water and a dog bowl for them. Remain alert to risks of over heating	Owners to read risk assessment posted on WTW web site	Dog Owners	On the day
Uneven ground, slippery, muddy and wet underfoot	People may slip, trip and fall.	Advise to wear suitable footwear and bring walking poles if required.	Advise to take care on the day and lead the group slowly if ground becomes slippery	Walkers / SM	Prior to the walk and on the day
Dog mess created along the route	Wild animals and crops	Advise on responsible dog ownership prior to setting off.	SM to carry spare doggy bags	Walkers / SM	On the day

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Sown and sprayed fields	Dogs and crops	Keep dogs to paths and on leads if they tend to run off. Recall dogs immediately if they stray onto fields. Do not let dogs eat crops	Owners to read risk assessment posted on WTW web site	Walkers / SM	Prior to the walk and on the day
Game birds and other wildlife	Dogs may run off and chase them	If dogs are likely to chase wildlife, maintain good recall and close contact with your dogs at all times	Owners to read risk assessment posted on WTW web site	Dog Owners	On the day
Horses or cyclists on roads	People may be hit, dogs may be frightened, horses may be frightened.	Advise to keep a watch out for other users and keep dogs on leads if horses / cyclists seen.	Owners to read risk assessment posted on WTW web site	Dog Owners / Walkers	On the day
First aid requirements	Caused by walking in the countryside	SM to carry first aid kit/. Walkers to carry own first aid kits. Advice given along the way if paths uneven or new hazard identified. Steady walking pace.	None	SM	On the day
Emergency Contacts	May be required if accidents occur	SM to gather emergency contacts before setting off	Also carry GPS signalling unit if no phone signal	SM	On the day
People and dogs may become unwell on the walk due to pre-diagnosed conditions	Walking may increase symptoms or exacerbate pre-existing conditions	All walkers to complete a Health Declaration for themselves and their dogs prior to walking and agree that they are fit and able to walk the route. SM to hold all health declarations and to refuse participation if it is felt	Make sure all forms are signed and handed in before a walk	SM & all Walkers	Prior to the walk and on the day.

Walkers / Dogs become unwell	People fall ill and cannot continue or fall behind	Advise on difficulty of walk, for people to decide if they are able to undertake it (and if their dogs can do the same).	Post a back-marker & mid-walker (with high vis-vests and walkie-talkies) to ensure no one is left. SM to keep in contact with back and mid-markers and walk at a pace that all walkers can do.	SM / Back marker	Prior to the walk and on the day.
Livestock (sheep)	May come across sheep in Drewton and Comber Dale	Dogs kept on leads and under supervised control by owners.	Restate on the day as we approach- put dogs back on leads if they are off-lead and keep under very close control. To walk in single file past any livestock	Dog Owners and SM	On the day
Approaching other walkers and dogs	Dogs may be reactive (ours or theirs)	Put dogs back in leads	Keep to the side of the path and let others walk by	Dog Owners	On the day
Stream at bottom of Comber Dale	Owners may not want dogs to go in stream (the water looks clean)	Put dogs back on leads as we approach the Wolds Way sign		Dog Owners	On the day
Approach to road after Austin's Stone	Dogs may run onto road if not on leads	Take short cut off road	Put dogs back on leads as we approach road after St Austins Stone	Dog Owners	On the day
