
How do I read a Map? How to read a Map







A map is a picture of a place. Look at a Map: a) What is the Title of the map?

b) How big is the area in the map?

c) Where is North?

d) Has it got Points: symbols?

e) Has it got Lines: roads or rivers?

f) Has it got Areas of colour: woodland?

g) Has it got Lables: road numbers or name?

h) Is the map colourful or black and white?



Start on one side of the map:

Pick a road and as if you were on a bike, go down it. Take some different routes to the other side of the page.

What Points: symbols do you pass?

Which Lines: roads or rivers do you cross?

Do you travel through Areas of colour: woodland? What are the Lables: road numbers or a town name?

Are there any photos or images on the map?

Tower of London on OpenStreetMap.org 2 miles across North at top



Points: Tube station, Historic Site, Hotel Lines: Railway, River, Road, Bike path

Areas: City, Park, Docks

Text: Tower Bridge, London, Thames

There is a layer you can

switch on for satellite imagery. Tower of London: CA



Imagine what the houses look like in this area or what the church looks like or what the river looks like. Is it a hilly area? Is there a School? What shape is it? Imagine where your classroom or the playground would be ..

Which square is the school/post office/church/park/river in? These are coordinates (find the numbers - read along the bottom of the page then up the side of the page)
