

# Dietzel Uses Psychology; Injured Cadets May Play

Don't believe all those stories about Army's football team you hear coming out of West Point. Those stories that say the Cadets will be without four of their eight backs.

Ever since Paul Dietzel gained prominence as a coach at LSU, he has been known to use psychology on opposing teams, saying certain ballplayers would not play. Then, on the day of the game, the injured player not only would dress, but would start.

Penn State coach Rip Engle is well aware of this, and has drilled the Lions, assuming everyone would be fit to play for the Cadets.

Dietzel said yesterday that wingback John Johnson, tailback Tom Smith and fullbacks Ray Fiske and Don Parcels were injured and would miss the game.

Smith, the breakaway sophomore, turned his ankle on the opening play of the Cincinnati game. Lion assistant coach Joe McMullen, who scouted Army last week, said everything was kept "hush-hush" about the condition of Smith.

"I'll bet he plays," McMullen said. "It's funny sometimes how these injuries manage to heal overnight."

Parcels and Fiske were both injured in the Minnesota game and Dietzel was forced to go with Curt Lindler, a sophomore.

McMullen reported, though,

that Fiske re-entered the game later after Lindler fumbled the ball twice.

While Dietzel seems to be having his problems, three injured Nittany Lions were slowly rounding into shape for tomorrow's game.

Tackle Harrison "Hatch" Rosdahl, guard Steve Schreckengast and fullback Ed Stuckrath suffered injuries in the Rice win, but Engle said yesterday the trio would at least see some action.

"Rosdahl and Stuckrath have really responded to treatments," Engle said. "I never thought earlier in the week that we would get any use out of them."

The Lions spent the greater part of yesterday working on a defense to stop the anticipated running of Cadet quarterback Carl Stichweh.

Against Minnesota last week, Stichweh picked up 67 yards in 13 carries. He also completed 11 of 17 passes for an additional 97 yards.

"Stichweh is great at rolling out with the ball," McMullen said. "And every week he seems to be throwing the ball more and more."

McMullen reported to Engle that sophomore end Sam Champi has been a favorite receiver of Stichweh.

"He's looked so good that letterman Bill Chescavage has been dropped to the second unit," McMullen said. "This boy has great desire. He somehow manages to get to the opposite side of the field on some of the rollouts to provide key blocks."

Both teams will hold light workouts at Beaver Stadium today in final preparation for the game tomorrow.

Army will take the field at 3:15 p.m. and the Nittany Lions will follow immediately after the Cadets are done.

## Mets, Colts Pick 3 'Bargains' In Special National League Draft

CINCINNATI (AP) — The New York Mets grabbed 20-year-old infielder Billy Haas from Los Angeles and pitcher Jack Fisher from San Francisco and the Houston Colts took relief pitcher Claude Raymond from Milwaukee yesterday at \$30,000 each in the National League's gesture to help the newest clubs.

Although each of the eight other teams in the league had submitted lists of four "bargains", the lowly Mets and Colts obviously did not find much comfort in the list of 32. They could have taken a total of eight but they settled for only three.

George Weiss, president of the 10th place Mets, had first pick in the three-way telephone sale that linked New York and Houston with the office of league President Warren Giles. Weiss took a 26-year-old relief pitcher who had a 4-6 record and a 5.43 earned run record in 45 games with the Braves.

## Pointer Pick To Beat Cowards; Possible Information Leak Hinted

WEST POINT, N.Y., Oct. 10—The Pointer was made a prohibitive 17-point favorite over the Collegian Cowards today for Saturday's big ECJW (Eastern Conference of Journalistic Writers) battle. Local bookmakers indicated there had been a leak of vital information from the Cowards.

In University Park, Cowards' coach Joel "Weathervane" Myers went on the air to deny reports that he had passed secret information to Pointer coach Earl Blake. But the Disassociated Press said it had tape-recorded a phone conversation between Myers and Blake in which Myers allegedly gave away all the Cowards' plays.

Collegian business manager Herb "High Ads" Witmer refused to comment on the situation, or on the fact that it is known he will be out of town at the time of the game. The \$10,000 guarantee for the Pointer has been taken out of Collegian funds but Witmer has been unable to account for it.

Amidst the rumors of an information leak, there were also reports of dissention on the Cowards' squad.

Witmer has been indefinitely suspended from the squad because one of the ECJW's secret investigating agents found a female

University employe in his apartment after hours.

Dave "Blimp" Bolbach, who was to start at tight end for the Cowards, has also been suspended from the squad until he loses 40 pounds, Myers said.

Also on the doubtful list for Saturday's game are Mel "The Paw" Axilbund and Phil "Sling-shot" Guest. Axilbund suffered a cut requiring 36 stitches in his right hand when he fell on a Lion's Paw pin, while Guest sprained an ankle when he tripped over a stack of Collegians in the paper's office yesterday morning.
