

Delta Upsilon Just Keeps Rollin' Along

Like ol' man river they just keep rollin' along. Delta Upsilon, year in and year out one of the most consistent winners in intramural sports at Penn State, won the IM All-Point Trophy for the third straight year with a total of 1085 points.

DU clinched the title in the qualifying heats of the IM track meet last spring, but for months before that there was little doubt that DU would win all the marbles.

Phi Gamma Delta finished second with 855 points, over 200 points behind the winners. Beta Theta Pi was third (792) and Phi Mu Delta fourth (783). Tau Kappa Epsilon and Acacia tied for fifth with 739 points.

Others in the top twenty in the order of finish were: Phi Epsilon Pi (738), Beta Sigma Rho (713), Lambda Chi Alpha (705), Sigma Pi (693), Phi Delta Theta (663), Alpha Zeta (655), Phi Kappa Phi (650), Theta Chi (602), Chi Phi (559), Alpha Sigma Phi (577), Triangle (575), Alpha Chi Sigma (573), Alpha Chi Rho (509), Phi Sigma Kappa (509), Theta Chi (506), Zeta Beta Tau (493), Theta Delta Chi (483), Sigma Phi Epsilon (457), Alpha Epsilon Pi (452), and Alpha Gamma Rho (451).

DU won the boxing title for the fourth time in the last six years and also won the handball doubles tourney, but it was their consistency in all sports that gave them the title.

Four fraternities repeated their championships of a year ago. Phi Epsilon Pi won badminton for the third straight year and TKE won its third consecutive handball singles title.

Omega Psi Phi won track for the second straight year and Lambda Chi Alpha repeated in golf (team).

Sigma Pi was the only fraternity besides DU to win a title in two sports, winning both soccer

and swimming. Other winners were: Phi Gamma Delta (basketball), Phi Kappa Theta (bowling), Triangle (golf medal), Chi Phi (horseshoes), Beta Theta Pi (tennis singles), Beta Sigma Rho (tennis doubles), Delta Sigma Phi (football), Phi Mu Delta (volleyball) and Delta Theta Sigma (wrestling).

What is even more remarkable than DU's three straight IM crowns is the success that fraternity has enjoyed in IM circles for the past 15 years. DU has never finished lower than fifth while copping five titles during this period.

The glittering trophies that adorn the DU living room range from badminton to boxing.

IM Director Dutch Sykes thinks that the key to DU's success is "their thirds and fourths and the participation of every man."

"They have always done it this way," he said. "They have been making this great team effort for some time."

"Other houses have more athletes than us, but we have always had a tradition of IM interest," said Tom Edwards, a member of DU since 1958.

"We feel that IM sports bind us closer together," he said. "Almost every student has played some sport in high school and the spirit of the house towards intramurals makes him want to participate."

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Coaches Rate Buckeyes Tops In Country

Two Big Ten schools head up the 10 teams picked to dominate the 1961 college football season by the nation's leading football coaches.

In a pre-season poll conducted by Newsweek magazine, 125 coaches rate Ohio State's Buckeyes, led by All-American fullback Bob Ferguson, as the number one team in the nation.

They name Iowa's veteran squad, with backs Wilburn Hollis and Larry Ferguson to spur an explosive attack, the number two team, and pick Kansas as the number three team behind the quarterbacking of John Hadl and power of halfback Curt McClinton.

Despite the loss of All-American quarterback Jake Gibbs and 17 other lettermen, Mississippi is in fourth place. As one coach says: "They're got a winning touch."

In fifth spot is Penn State, the power of the East, with two potential All-American ends — Bob Mitinger and Dave Robinson. "If we have some luck and avoid injuries," says coach Rip Engle, "we'll be OK."

Alabama, traditionally strong on defense, won the coaches' nod as the number six team. Tackle Billy Neighbors and center Lee Roy Jordan anchor the line, and led by quarterback Pat Trammell, Alabama also has a potent attack.

Texas, with a versatile, proven backfield built around flashy halfback Jim Saxton, wound up as the coaches' seventh choice. Longhorn coach Darrell Royal says, "We've got some problems in the line. We've got to get the breaks."

Other Southwest conference coaches say Royal has the players he needs to make the breaks.

After a disappointing 1960 season, Louisiana State is picked to come back into the top 10 as

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Pitt Whips Miami, 10

Pitt's aroused Panthers stormed back from a 7-0 halftime deficit to defeat Miami 10-7 in a game that started in balmy 87-degree weather and ended in a driving rainstorm.

Pitt's lone touchdown came in the fourth quarter after halfback Fred Cox booted a 38-yard field goal.

Cox raced 20 yards around end and just as he was about to be tackled, he lateraled to sophomore quarterback Paul Marha. Marha raced the remaining 60 yards for the TD that iced the game.

Miami threatened repeatedly in the first half but could score only once on a short pitch from quarterback George Mira to Larry Wilson.

Moving to the Midwest, heavily favored Iowa State was held to a scoreless tie by Drake for three quarters but the Cyclones struck for three touchdowns in the final period to win, 21-0.

The deadlock was broken when Iowa State sophomore tailback Ozzie Clay cracked over the goal line on a two-yard plunge. Starting tailback Dave Hoppmann then added some insurance with two touchdown passes, one to Larry Montre and the other to Dick Limerick.

Richmond's highly touted junior Mel Rideout lived up to his press notices as he led the Spiders to a 35-26 victory over West Virginia.

He completed 12 of 31 passes for 168 yards and three touchdowns and scored once himself.

West Virginia sophomore Fred Colvard also did a fine job, scoring three touchdowns and setting up a fourth.

Larry Glueck did some fancy running to lead Villanova to a

stunning 33-0 upset over Miami of Ohio.

After running the opening kickoff back 66 yards, he scored touchdowns on a 30-yard run and a 5-yard sprint after taking a pass from Jack Sherlock. Villanova was a 13-point underdog.

In other games, halfback Tommy Carmignani led Furman to a 27-6 victory over Presbyterian. Buffalo overcame nine major penalty calls and beat Gettysburg 14-6 and Wyoming rolled over Montana, 29-0.

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
