

Theta Xi Captures League H Title

Within the past seven weeks the names Untouchables, Go Team, and Chinese Bandits have gained increasing fame in collegiate football circles, for these are the three platoons that Army coach Paul Dietzel used with tremendous success at LSU.

However, if these names are mentioned to a Penn State Theta Xi, he will most likely think of his fraternity's IM football team. For, as at West Point, these three groups, along with the Golden Gophers, have been used very successfully at Theta Xi.

In fact, these four groups combined forces in swamping Beta Sigma Rho, 31-0, last night. The victory completed an undefeated season for Theta Xi and gave them the League H title. It also marked the fifth game in six that the opposition failed to score.

The scoring barrage was led by Gary Kirby who scored three of Theta Xi's four touchdowns and Bill Johnston who scored once.

Theta Xi's first score came on a ten-yard aerial from quarterback Marlin Biesecker to Kirby.

Biesecker then added the first of his four PATs to make the score 7-0. Before the half ended they added two more touchdowns, one on a 15-yard pass to Johnston and the other on a 25-yard pitch from Biesecker to Kirby. As the half ended Theta Xi held a commanding lead of 21-0.

Delta Sigma Phi captured the League D title by blanking Omega Psi Phi, 10-0. The lone score of the first half came on a 28-yard field goal by Delta Sig's Tom Gerard with 1:30 to go.

They added a touchdown with

5:20 to go in the game on a 25-yard pass from Wendy Wear to John Menichello which climaxed a 70-yard march.

In other fraternity action Myron Kerstetter caught three touchdown passes to lead Delta Chi to an 18-0 victory over Sigma Chi. Sigma Phi Epsilon scored a first down in overtime to edge Alpha Phi Delta, 1-0. Phi Sigma Kappa tripped Zeta Beta Tau, 1-0, also on first downs. Sigma Alpha Epsilon scored a first period field goal on a 25-yard kick by John Gander to defeat Sigma Pi, 3-0.

Dietzel, Donelli Disagree

NEW YORK (AP) — Two of the East's leading coaches — Buff Donelli of Columbia and Paul Dietzel of Army — disagreed yesterday on the question of playing college football games in miserable weather conditions.

"When we have a day like last Saturday—rain, cold and 40 mile an hour winds—I think the game should be canceled or postponed," Donelli told the New York football writers.

"I'm happy we played it because we won," Donelli added, "but it's unfair to the players and to the fans to play in such bad conditions." Columbia beat Cornell, 25-21.

Dietzel, whose Army team downed Boston University 26-0 in similar conditions in Boston, voiced a dissent.

"The elements are there, we should be prepared to play in them," he said.
