But now, thanks to some independent work by one of Cedar's residents, Mr. Clarence Hegg, in checking with various state agencies, it seems that water testing of our lake 55302. (on a small, do-it-yourself basis) can be done at a cost to our club of little or nothing.

Mr. Hegg, who lives on the Northeast shore of Cedar and has a background in chemistry, has found through discussions with Minnesota Pollution Control Agency officials that the MPCA will test samples of lake water for us and determine the nitrate and phosphate level contained in these samples free of charge. The PCA department will also inform us how these level then compare to what an average lake in our area should be. (Nitrate and phosphate counts tell us most clearly how rich a lake is in nutrients which cause excessive weed growth and contribute to making a lake "green" and "dirty".) The MPCA can also help us by suggesting ways that the rate of nutrients coming into the

lake can be slowed.

On Tuesday evening, August 7, a burglary was committed at the residence of Bud Godfrey on Cedar Lake's west side, south of the sandbar. Mr. Godfrey reported to the Wright County Sheriff's Department the theft of his 9克 h.p. Johnson outboard motor which had been kept on his fishing boat moored at his dock. Mr. Godfry (himself a former Minneapolis policeman, now retired) and his wife Ovie, had taken their pon toon boat out for a ride around 9:00 pm. When the returned about an hour later they discovered the smaller motor missing.

A Wright County sheriff deputy came out to the Godfrey home the following day to make further enquiries and seek reports from neighbors who might have witnessed anything unusual. It has so far been suspected that the thief or thieves operated by boat from the lake. Anyone who feels he has any information that might be at all helpfull should contact the Sheriff's office in Buff. alo.

While all of us are cer tainly outraged by such acts of thievery, we would do well to take a lesson from this latest unfortunate circumstance, and take whatever precautions we can to protect our property at the lake; especially now as fall approaches and activity or the lake declines, and especially those of us who are weekend vacationers only and have personal property left unattended for prolonged periods of time (although even year-round residents have no call for feeling secure as Mr. Godfrey, a permanent residenton the lake, can testify.)

A reasonably good deterent to outboard motor thefts is to padlock, chain, or bolt (if possible) the motor to the transom of the boat. While such precautions are

not completely burglar. proof to the determined or well equipped criminal, (point in fact, Mr. Godfrey's motor was padlocked) they do safe guard against the molestations of the unprac ticed or "casual" thie

Another good idea is to copy down and keep handy the serial number of your motor; or if yo prefer, etch your own 6 or 7 didget code numb er somewhere on the motor and record it. If in the event your motor is stolen, these number could help trace and eventually recover it.

ICENSING PROCEDURE

Here's a bit of infor mation from our treasur er, Pete Cook, that may save some of you News readers some waiting time if you're planning on buying any kind of boat either this year o next.

Thanks to a new law passed by the 1973 legislature, it is no long er necessary for anyone who purchases a new wat ercraft to wait anywher from 2 - 4 weeks or lon er for a registration sticker before legally being able to use that watercraft on public waters of this state.

According to the new law, after purchasing a new boat, whatever type the owner can simply go to his local deputy reg istrars office and the re pick up a temporary registration sticker en abling him to use the watercraft(legally, with registration displayed) immediately. In the course of a few wee a permanent sticker wil be sent from the Depart ment of Natural Resources. However, this new no-wait policy applies nly to the registration of new craft, and not t ansfer sales of previou ly owned boats.

HELD AT CEDAR

On July 28, the staff of Oakwood School of Columbia Heights met at the Dean Custer cabin on the southwest shore of Cedar 2. for an old-fashioned New England clambake. Thirty people attended. Many guests came in the morn-3. ing to help, as a clambake is a lot of work as well as fun.

To begin with, a trench 1½ feet deep, 2 feet wide and 10 feet long was dug. The sides and bottom of the trench were lined with rocks that were taken from the lake, (lake rocks will not explode when heated.

A fire was kept going on the rocks until they were red hot, about 4 hours. The hot coals were removed with shovels and the rocks were ready for the 75 clams, 22 lobsters, and 6 dozen ears of corn.

The clams were put onto the hot rocks and covered with a canvas tarp anchored down with rocks to keep the steam in. When the clamshells opened they were ready to be dipped in butter and eaten. While the guests were eating the clams, chef Cheryl Caddy placed the live lobsters and sweet corn on the hot rocks and covered them with a canvas tarp. Thirty minutes later they were ready to eat and tasted perfectly delicious. All that was missing was the salty ocean spray in the air!

It was a first clambake for most of the guests, and they were all eager to try it again.

TERIYAKI

3 to 4 lb. English or chuck roast (tenderized 3 hours.) Cut into $1\frac{1}{2}$ to 2 inch cubes.

Marinete in: 2 tbsp. oil; 2 tbsp brown sugar; 2 cloves garlic (or 1 tsp. garlic powder); 1 tsp. ground ginger; 1 tsp. salt; 1tsp. pepper 4 tbsp. water; ½ cup soy sauce.

Place meat cubes in a plastic bag and pour marinade over. Leave at room temperature at least

2 hours, turning bag occasionally.

Drain pieces and place on grill 5 minutes per side. Brush with marinade while grilling.

Fry some frozen hash browns, toss a salad, and prepare for some good eating!

John and Carol Ronlund have 4 children, Stacy, ge Schwartz cabin on the east side of the lake a little ways south of the end of the sandbar.


