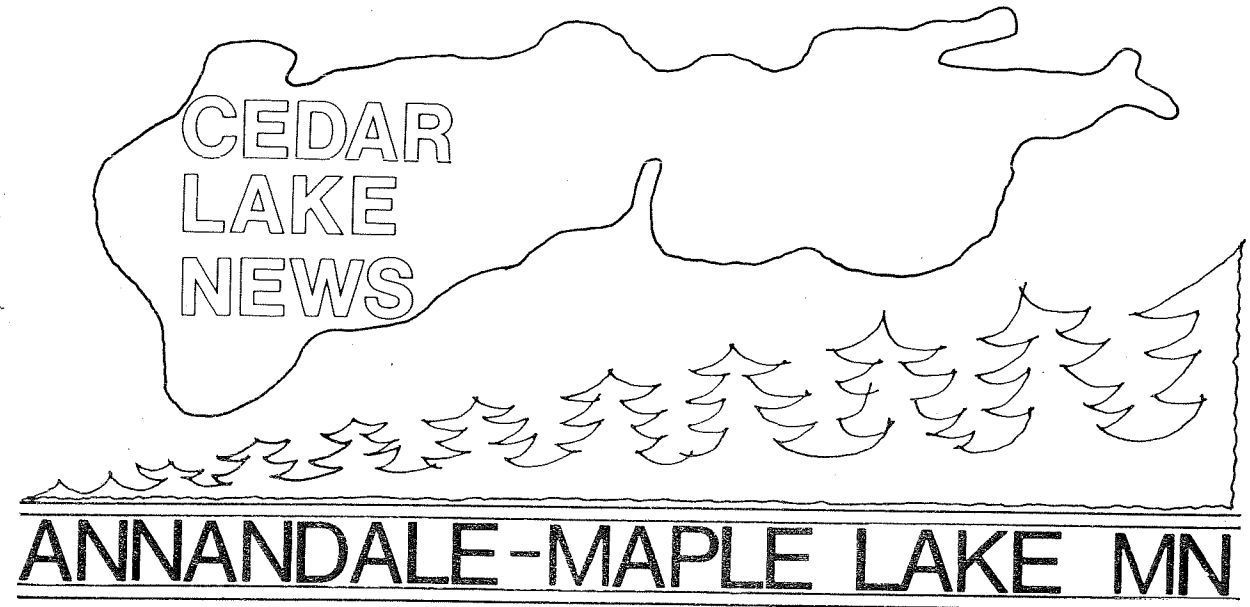

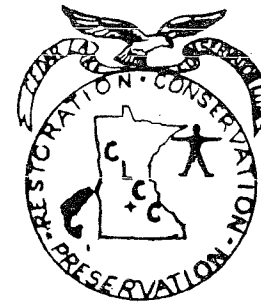

THE C.L.C.C. HELPED AT THE FEDERATION BEER BOOTH AT THE WRIGHT COUNTY FAIR IN HOWARD LAKE ON SATURDAY, AUGUST 5TH FROM 10 A.M. TO 4 P.M.. SCHROEDER PARK

THE FOLLOWING REPORT OF THE WRIGHT COUNTY BOARD APPEARED IN THE WRIGHT COUNTY JOURNAL-PRESS DATED SEPTEMBER 7, 1978.

"THE PRELIMINARY PLAN FOR SCHROEDER PARK WAS ACCEPTED. THE PLAN CALLS FOR A REDUCTION OF CAMPSITES FROM 105 TO 65 IN AN ATTEMPT TO PRESERVE THE NATURAL ENVIRONMENT AND TO IMPROVE THE RECREATIONAL EXPERIENCE. PARKS ADMINISTRATOR SCHMIDT SAID 65 SITES WILL ADEQUATELY SERVICE NORMAL WEEKEND CAMPING AND WILL SERVE TO ELIMINATE THE OVERCROWDED CONDITIONS OF THE HOLIDAY WEEKENDS. CONSTRUCTION OF A COMBINATION STORAGE BUILDING - SHOP - RESIDENCE FOR THE CAMP MANAGER IS INCLUDED IN THE PLAN. THE OLD BARN AND WINDMILL WILL BE REMOVED."

SOME OF THE BOARD MEMBERS OF C.L.C.C. MET WITH A COUNTY BOARD MEMBER AND DISCUSSED THE SITUATION AT THE NORTH END OF THE LAKE. WE HOPE THE ABOVE HELPS IMPROVE SOME OF THE PROBLEMS THAT HAVE EXISTED AT SCHROEDER PARK.

THE FOLLOWING HAS BEEN DISCUSSED AT MANY FEDERATION MEETINGS

IN MINNESOTA, MORE THAN 115,000 ACRES OF PRIME WATERFOWL HABITAT HAVE BEEN BOUGHT BY THE U. S. FISH AND WILDLIFE SERVICE. THE PURCHASES ARE CONTINUING AT THE RATE OF \$,000 TO 6,000 ACRES PER YEAR, ALL WITH FUNDS DERIVED FROM FEDERAL WATERFOWL STAMPS BOUGHT BY HUNTERS.

STATE OFFICIALS FEEL THAT STEEL SHOT WILL BE REQUIRED FOR SPORTSMEN HUNTING MIGRATORY WATERFOWL ON PUBLIC SHOOTING AREAS, DESPITE A CONTROVERSY IN WASHINGTON OVER ENFORCEMENT OF THE REGULATION.

GAME BIOLOGISTS SAY THAT BETWEEN TWO MILLION AND THREE MILLION DUCKS DIE EACH YEAR FROM LEAD POISONING PICKED UP IN PELLETS WHILE FEEDING ON LAKE BEDS.

ABOUT AN EQUAL NUMBER OF DUCKS ARE SHOT BY SPORTSMEN EACH YEAR.

SOME HUNTERS FEAR THAT STEEL SHOT WILL PREMATURELY WEAR OUT THEIR GUNS. MOST MANUFACTURERS DISPUTE THIS.

THE LEAD SHOT SLOWLY KILLS A BIRD.

WHY DO LEAVES CHANGE COLOR.....

WHY DO LEAVES CHANGE COLOR? FOR MANY YEARS I BELIEVED THAT THE FIRST FROST BROUGHT ON FALL'S SHIFTING SCENERY. HOWEVER, I WAS TO LEARN THAT IT IS THE LENGTH OF THE DAY AND THE INTENSITY OF THE SUNLIGHT THAT TOGETHER WAVE NATURE'S COLORFUL WAND ACROSS THE LAND.

ACTUALLY, THE LEAVES OF BUSHES AND TREES DON'T REALLY TURN COLOR, BUT SIMPLY LOSE THEIR GREEN COLORATION. THE GREEN IN PLANTS IS CAUSED BY CHLOROPHYL, A LIFE-ESSENTIAL INGREDIENT FOUND IN ALL SUN-LOVING PLANTS. AS AUTUMN ADVANCES, A HORMONE TRAVELS DOWN EACH LEAF TO THE BASE OF ITS STEM WHERE IT JOINS THE BRANCH. THERE, THE HORMONE CREATES AN ABSCISSION LAYER, A ROW OF CORKY CELLS WHICH BEGIN TO BLOCK THE VEIN SYSTEM OF THE LEAF. WITHOUT WATER, THE LEAF CAN NO LONGER MAKE FOOD AND THE CHLOROPHYL BEGINS TO BREAK DOWN.

WHEN THE GREEN CHLOROPHYL DIES, THE COLOR OF THE SAP THAT EXISTS IN THE LEAVES BECOMES PROMINENT. VARIOUS KINDS OF SAPS ARE FOUND IN DIFFERENT TREES AND SHRUBS. IN FACT, TREES OF THE SAME SPECIES MAY HAVE DIFFERENT SAP FORMULAS, DEPENDING UPON THE SOIL IN WHICH THE PLANT LIVES.

AS THE SAP DRIES, THE LEAF TAKES ON THE COLOR OF THE SAP CHEMICAL, WHICH MAY VARY FROM BRIGHT YELLOW, ORANGE YELLOW, GOLD, DEEP RED, OR VARIOUS SHADES OF PURPLE. MAPLES, SUMAC, AND SOME OAKS ALL TURN RED FROM AN ACIDIC SAP, BUT DIFFEREDNT SHADES OF RED OCCUR ON EACH SPECIES.

WHY DO LEAVES FALL? AS AUTUMN AGES, THE LAYER OF CELLS THAT STRANGLLED THE LEAF BECOMES A NOOSE THAT WEAKENS THE FIBERS SO THAT WIND AND RAIN WILL SNAP THE STEM, SENDING THE LEAF FLUTTERING TO THE EARTH. THERE, IT WILL DECAY, EVENTUALLY ENRICHING THE SOIL, SO THE CYCLE OF LIFE CAN CONTINUE.

LUCKY FOR MINNESOTANS, FALL COLORS DO NOT BURST UPON US LIKE FOURTH OF JULY FIREWORKS, BUT ADVANCE GRADUALLY NORTH TO SOUTH ACROSS THE STATE.

WE HOPE BY THIS TIME ROBERT ENGSTROM HAS RECOVERED FROM HIS FALL. IT WAS REPORTED BOB FELL OUT OF A TREE THIS PAST SUMMER AND WAS UNFORTUNATE ENOUGH TO BREAK BOTH LEGS.
