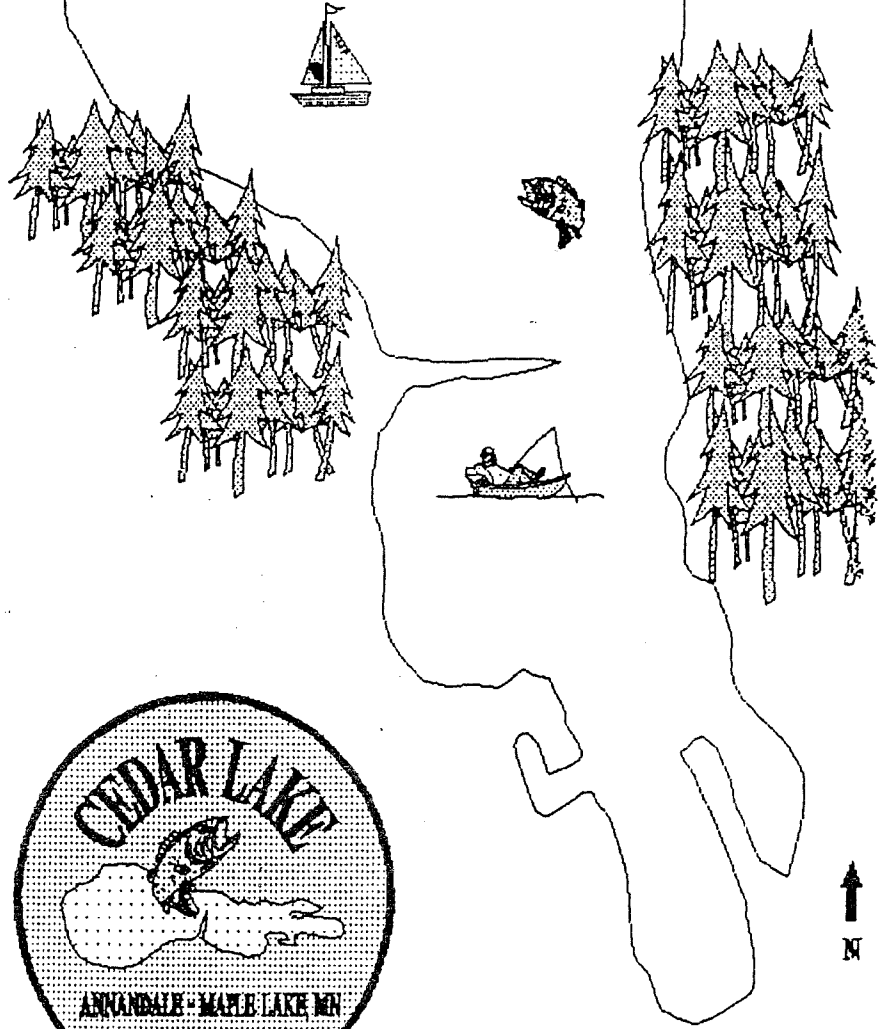

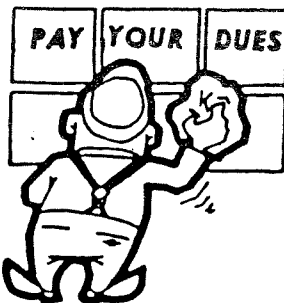
MEMBERSHIP

Dear Member,

On behalf of the Turn In Poachers Board of Directors, I wish to express our gratitude and appreciation for your support. We are honored to have you as a member of TIP.

Since TIP's inception in 1981, we have grown to be an organization of over 25,000 concerned conservationists. We have paid out rewards totaling \$253,000.00 and only 40% of people reporting poaching violations request a reward. The total number of arrests in the last twelve years is over 4,900. Our conviction rate in 1993 was 99%. These are figures you can be proud of! Poaching is a nationwide problem; we have a long way to go but we in Minnesota have made an impact, thanks to YOU!

The public support throughout Minnesota, the widespread knowledge and growing acceptance of our objectives, and the enthusiastic endorsement by our statewide conservation organizations have all been most gratifying. The overwhelming support of the TIP-sponsored Restitution Law demonstrates your desire to provide additional protection to our priceless wildlife and fisheries from criminals who scorn our state laws. Between January 1991 and February 1994, \$220,000 has been raised from restitution penalties. This money goes to the DNR game and fish fund for replacement, propagation and protection of wild animals. Finally, criminals are paying to replace what they took illegally.

Again, our heartfelt thanks for your contribution and positive support of the Minnesota TIP program!

PLANNING ON BUILDING AN ADDITION?

A DECK? OR A GAZEBO?

Do you need a permit?....."Yes!" You must talk to Wright County Planning and Zoning.

The only thing not requiring a permit is something under 150 square feet. No matter what size, you must be 75 feet from the high water mark.

There are no exceptions to the set back rule. It includes all types of decking and gazebos.

When you apply for a permit you need to know what zone you're in and your lake classification. Cedar Lake happens to be classified as "general development."

The cost of a permit starts at \$50. for decks, garages and the like...and can run up to several hundred dollars for major construction.
