
If you have any questions, concerns, suggestions or would like to get involved on any of our committees, please feel free to contact any of the Board members.

WHERE FISH?? TO

Where to fish?

Anglers' experience on the lake might beat maps, charts. By Joe Hennessy Minneapolis Star Tribune writer

There is scientific angling and then there Is personal experience. Sometimes the two don't jibe.

According to the script, a study of a lake map should give a good indication of where the fish might be hiding in a strange lake. Personal experience has shown that it seldom pays to paddle across the lake. Fishing frequently is best right in front of wherever the boat is launched.

The depth map of Cedar Lake, one of scores by that name in Minnesota and one of two in Wright County, is an angler's dream. Note in the accompanying map the extreme depth of 108 feet, also the rapid elevation changes in the bottom all around the lake. The logical place to start appeared to be off a reef which cuts almost across the lake and where the depth drops from 2 to 20 feet.

This Cedar Lake is about 55 miles west of Minneapolis, with a good concrete launching ramp on county Road 6, 2 1/2 miles north of state Highway 55. It is about two miles east of Annandale. There is another Cedar Lake in Wright County, that one near Monticello.

Pete Heiden of St. Paul and I looked over the map before we launched the canoe from the access last week. We headed immediately for the obvious choice. The sky was overcast with a few drops of rain and the waves were choppy enough to indicate the fish might be biting closer to the bottom than the surface. A friend had fished the lake a week before and reported catching 1 1/2-pound crappies on yellow jigs,

An hour's paddling, with a little less serious fishing along the way, brought us to the far side of the long point and reef. Yellow jigs were tried, also an assortment of plugs, small spinners and even night crawlers. Total catch in about two-hours included only small bass and half pound sunfish.

We paddled back toward the launching site and cast into some lily pads. It was now getting dusky.

Wham! A largemouth bass hit at a green and yellow jig that was being reeled at the fastest possible speed toward the boat. The fish broke loose. Then another - weighing about three pounds - hit.

We had other action. All were returned, so we can at least guarantee that there are bass in the lake.

So much for experience over science. Fish at the closest possible area to the launching site on any lake. A longer try at this Cedar Lake promises excellent results. Terri Ward, who occupies the adjoining desk in the Star's sport's department, said she and her husband also had excellent results - that included a walleye - at Cedar Lake a year ago. Most of the area we fished was 20 feet or shallower. What might be waiting in the depths. I do not know. Cedar Lake covers 837 acres, with about any depth that could be asked.

The lake provides some strange contrasts in addition to the extreme of depths and shallows. Near the center of the lake, and off the reefs, the water was chilly to the touch. Near shore, where the bass seemed more active, it felt warm. Weed growth comes very close to the surface in most of the shallows, but there was hard, sandy and gravel bottom in places off the reef, and rocks in other places.

I had never before fished this Cedar Lake. But it is one of those within about a 50-mile driving range of the Twin Cities, that I would like to try

The lake is well built up with cottages around most of the shore. But fishing traffic was light on a weekday evening.

Boat rentals are available at Geardink's Resort on the lake's north shore. Mitch Fleming said his grandfather. Charlie Geardink. claims the crappie fishing is the best in the 47 years he has been there. It had been the report of big crappies that drew me in the first place, although my efforts turned quickly to bass instead.

A boat was being launched from the public landing as we left in the near-darkness. For those who know the lake, night bass fishing might be rewarding with surface lures. Fly fishing for crappies should be excellent on calm evenings.

I am so pleased with all of the American flags I see as we go around the lake in our boat. It makes me feel proud that we have such patriotism on our lake. But I need to remind us all of an item of flag etiquette that some of us may not be aware of. The American flag should be taken down before sundown and put up at sunup. This is the way the law reads:

Section 174

"Time and occasions for display; hoisting and lowering:
(a) It is the universal custom to display the flag only from sunrise to sunset on buildings and on stationary flag staffs in the open. However, when a patriotic effect is desired, the flag may be displayed twenty-four hours a day if properly illuminated during the hours of darkness."

DO YOU REALLY KNOW OUR \$1.00 BILL?

Take out a one-dollar bill and look at it. The one-dollar bill you're looking at first came off the presses in 1957 in its present design. This so-called paper money is in fact a cotton and linen blend, with red and blue minute silk fibers running through it. It is actually material.

We've all washed it without it falling apart. A special blend of ink is used, the contents we will never know.

It is overprinted with symbols water resistant and pressed to give it that nice crisp look.

If you look on the front of the bill, you will see the United States Treasury Seal. On the top you will see the scales for the balance-a balanced budget.

In the center you have a carpenter's T-square, a tool used for an even cut.

Underneath is the Key to the United States Treasury.

That's all pretty easy to figure out, but what is on the back of that dollar bill is something we should all know.

If you turn the bill over, you will see two circles. Both circles, together, comprise the Great Seal of the United States. The First Continental Congress requested that Benjamin Franklin and a group of men come up with a Seal. It took them four years to accomplish this task and another two years to get it approved.

If you look at the left hand circle, you will see a Pyramid. Notice the face is lighted and the western side is dark.

This country was just beginning. We had not begun to explore the West or decided what we could do for Western Civilization.

The Pyramid is uncapped. again signifying that we were not even close to being finished. Inside the capstone you have the allseeing eye, and ancient symbol for

divinity. It was Franklin's belief that one man couldn't do it alone, but a group of men, with the help of God, could do anything.

"IN GOD WE TRUST" is on this currency. The Latin above the pyramid, ANNUIT COEPTIS, means "God has favored our undertaking." The Latin below the pyramid, NOVUS ORDO SECLORUM, means "a new order has begun." At the base of the pyramid is the Roman numeral for 1776.

If you look at the art-hand circle, and check it care only bu will learn and then it is starched to make it that it is on every National Cemetery in the United States. It is also on the Parade of Flags Walkway at the Bushnell, Florida National Cemetery and is the centerpiece of most hero's monuments. Slightly modified, it is the seal of the President of the United States and it is always visible whenever he speaks, yet no one knows what the symbols mean.

> The Bald Eagle was selected as a symbol for victory for two reasons: first, he is not afraid of a storm, he is strong and he is smart enough to soar above it. Secondly, he wears no material crown. We had just broken from the King of England.

Also, notice the shield is unsupported. This country can now stand on its own. At the top of that shield you have a white bar signifying congress, a unifying factor. We were coming together as one nation. In the Eagle's beak you will read, "E PLURIBUS UNUM", meaning "one nation from many people."


Above the Eagle you have thirteen stars representing the thirteen original colonies, and any clouds of misunderstanding rolling away. Again, we were coming together as one. Notice what the Eagle holds in his talons. He holds

an olive branch and arrows. This country wants peace, but we will never be afraid to fight to preserve peace.

The Eagle always wants to face the olive branch, but in time of war. his gaze turns toward the arrows.

They say that the number 13 is an unlucky number. This is almost a worldwide belief. You will usually never see a room numbered 13, or any hotels or motels with a 13th floor. But, think about this: 13 original colonies, 13 signers of the Declaration of Independence, 13 stripes on our flag, 13 steps on the Pyramid, 13 letters in the Latin above, 13 letters in "E PLURIBUS UNUM", 13 stars above the Eagle, 13 plumes of feathers on each span of the Eagle's wing, 13 bars on that shield, 13 leaves on the olive branch, 13 fruits, and if you look

Harvesting walleyes from a rearing pond, in the 50s, to plant in local Annandale lakes.


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
