Letter from your President

At 4:00PM, April 1st, three men were fishing off the pier in the cove by Cedar Acres. The wind had blown the remaining ice into Sunrise Bay completely filling the Bay. There was only a small spot of open water for the fishermen. At 11:30 PM the lake was calm and there was no wind, yet the ice in Sunrise Bay broke apart and floated towards the center of the lake. It looked like the lake was dotted with small islands in the moonlight. By 3:00 AM on April 2nd the small ice islands had shrunk dramatically. At 6:00 AM the ice islands had disappeared and I officially, for my own purposes, called it "ice out" for 2010.

You will find an ice out record published in this newsletter. When we moved to Cedar Lake I collected ice out records from some lake residents and consolidated them into the record published in this newsletter. There were only a couple of discrepancies in the records I collected, probably because of different definitions of "ice out" or recording day or night ice outs. The DNR seems to use the definition of ice being 90% gone. I adopted the old definition some residents had used which was when you are able to reach any point in the lake in a small boat.

At 3:00 PM on April 2nd there were fishermen in a fishing boat in Sunrise Bay. They didn't stay long. Unbelievably, at 5:00 PM someone on a jet ski was doing donuts or swirls or whatever jet skiers call the maneuver on the east shore, south of Camp Courage. If that doesn't signal the start of the 2010 season, I don't know what does.

It looks like nature has provided us with a longer season in 2010. I hope everyone has an opportunity to take advantage of it. There are a lot of Cedar Lake Conservation Club activities to enhance your season and I hope you take advantage of them. There will not be another newsletter before the Purple Martin Fest at Paul Schutte's on June 5th or the July 4th Boat Parade or the Lakeshore Restoration Day at Dennis and Cheryl Wold's on July 17th so I am highlighting them here. Please mark them on your calendars now. These are great opportunities to meet people on the lake and to learn about things that are important to our lake community.

I hope to see many of you at the Spring Fling.

Cedar Lake Water Quality CommitteeUpdate

Curly Leaf Pondweed (CLP) Project Update

This will be our second year (of a 5-7 year project) of controlling curly leaf pondweed on our lake. This year we have a deeper understanding of the complexities of the project and the evolving DNR requirements. We are ready and CLP should be afraid.

In 2009, 94 property owners were contacted for CLP treatment authorization and 91 responded positively (three year authorization). In February of 2010, we began contacting an additional 84 property owners which were identified by an informal July 2009 lake shore survey conducted by CLCC. Of those owners, 68 responded favorably (two year authorization); one owner refused treatment and the rest did not respond. A "no response" must be treated as a "no treatment" per DNR rules.

Shortly after ice-out this year, Professional Lake Management—our contracted vendor for CLP treatment—began a pre-treatment delineation to identify CLP locations. They traveled the entire shoreline from shore out to the weed line. The cost for this delineation was \$400.00. This map will be submitted to the DNR as part of the 2010 herbicide permit application.

The additional permit requirements for 2010 treatment have been submitted to the DNR. The cost of the permit will depend on the number of properties the DNR allows us to treat. Treatment usually takes place when the water temperatures reach 50 degrees, but no later than a week before Memorial Day. Typically, treatment can be expected in early May. Areas treated will be posted with a bright colored sign. There will also be treatment maps posted at each public access site.

How will we pay for the treatment? CLCC has obtained \$6,600 in grant money for the project. We anticipate that this will cover the 2010 project costs. For future years, the CLCC Board of Directors has voted to fund \$1,800-\$2,000/year for the treatment. This money will be funded by the \$10/year that each member contributes (through their dues payment) to the Water Quality Fund. For the balance of the cost, the Clearwater River Watershed District has voted to collect funds through the P-06 project maintenance. The annual cost of the project is dependent on the amount of CLP we will be allowed to treat, so a precise cost to each of us is difficult to predict. Also, as the years go on, there should be less CLP to treat. Our estimate, after the CLCC \$1,800 annual contribution, is that each full unit on Cedar Lake (lake shore owners) will have \$20 to \$30/year of expense.

Also in 2010 we have retained PLM to do a vegetation assessment. This is a requirement of the DNR and also necessary to obtain grants that may become available. PLM will do a point intercept method vegetative survey of our lake, following guidelines established by the MN DNR. Two surveys will be performed, one in May/June and the other in July/August. The cost for this vegetative survey is \$3,150. This was an extremely competitive bid. The

CLCC Board of Directors has voted to use grant money (as mentioned above) to pay for this survey. This survey will put us in an excellent position to be ready for the 2011 treatment.

This project is the largest water quality improvement project CLCC has ever taken on. We are committed to staying ahead of the curve and proactively addressing the CLP on our lake. Watch for more updates regarding the 2010 treatment in the July newsletter.

Swartout Winter Kill

We received information from the Clearwater River Watershed District that Swartout did experience a freeze-out winter kill. This twist of nature made the annual carp seining conducted by the CRWD unnecessary as Mother Nature did the work for us. The annual carp seining is part of the P-06 project to reduce the phosphorus load in our lake. So, a nice savings for the P-06 maintenance budget.

Shoreline Open House – Sat. July 17

A natural shoreline is a complex ecosystem that sustains fish and wildlife and protects the entire lake. Native vegetation along the shore acts as a buffer zone, intercepting nutrients and reducing runoff, erosion and sedimentation. Aquatic plants provide food and shelter for ducks, songbirds and other animals while reducing problems caused by Canadian geese. Native vegetation can also provide beauty to your landscaping with less maintenance and water usage compared to turf grass.

Weed Wrench Available for Buckthorn

Noxious weeds are a problem – whether in our lake or on our surrounding land. If you have buckthorn growing on your property, you probably know of its invasive habit – forming dense thickets and crowding out native plants which have more value to wildlife. Because buckthorn is not native, it lacks "natural controls" like insects or disease that would curb its growth or infestation. It spreads by seeds in the berries, which once on the soil can remain viable for up to 5 years. Birds can quickly spread the seeds over a wide area.

How can you get rid of your buckthorn? Either by cutting and applying a strong herbicide or by pulling out the entire plant by hand (if less than 3/8" in diameter) or with the help of a weed wrench (for stems up to 2" diameter).

CLCC has purchased a weed wrench now available for use by its members. A buckthorn notebook is also available which covers proper weed wrench usage, buckthorn identification, herbicide usage, disposal of cut buckthorn, and alternative replacement plants. DNR TO INSTALL WATER LEVEL GAUGE

CEDAR LAKE HISTORY

Included in this newsletter is a Burke family story written by Beth Trout whose grandfather purchased property on Cedar Lake in 1955.

I'm sure you will find this an enjoyable read. We encourage other residents to write about some of their interesting Cedar Lake memories.

DID YOU KNOW?? 57 years ago (July, 1953) a group of residents on Cedar Lake decided to formally organize CLCC. Membership dues were \$1.00.

then were able to swing out well past the dock and let go in about 15 feet of water. This was a lake attraction for some time. The pontoons from Camp Courage used to come by and then anchor and watch us as we went off the rope swing. Some of the more daring riders would do flips and double flips from the rope before plunging into the water. Come evening, sleeping space was limited and we children slept on the floor, either in the living room or in the garage. In 1984, my aunt and uncle, Bill and Delores Burke, retired to the lake in this home.

For Generations To Come!

In 1955 my grandfather, Clifford Burke purchased Scott's shores lot # 3 on Cedar Lake for \$1,000. He paid the \$10 down and \$10 a month for that lot, unbeknownst to Grandma Isabel, for he knew it was a hardship on the family budget. But oh how he wanted to be on Cedar Lake! Eventually, his secret came out and plans were made for building a cabin, with the help of Art Chamberlain, from Maple Lake, and the Burke family. My mother and father helped build the cabin before they were married. I am thankful for the foresight and determination of Grandpa Burke. Because of him, I have never known a summer without spending time on Cedar Lake! Five generations of Burkes have had that same opportunity!

As a child I remember wonderful summer days, with my brothers Bob, Ken and Terry, filled with water activities, fishing, catching frogs, picking honeysuckles and going by boat to Crescent Ridge Resort for fudgesicles. Water skiing was also a popular activity, especially for my cousins. They were daredevils! They not only took off from the dock, they also yelled, "Hit it" as they stood on top of the bench on the dock! And then there was the rope swing. I remember spending hours on that rope swing. You got on the rope swing at the top of the hill and

It was all about being together at the lake!

Down the shore, a lake lot stood empty (Scott's shores lot #5). My father, Bob Burke, inquired about the lot and then wrote the woman who owned it. She lived in Florida at the time and did not have an interest in selling the lot. But several years later, the woman called my father and said the lot was for sale. My parents bought the lot and in 1979 built a log cabin there. This is the cabin where my husband, Phil, and I passed on the Cedar Lake experience to our daughters, Megan and Lauren. As tradition would have it, there were usually more people staying in the place than beds --but no matter! It was all about being together at the lake! And we have fond memories of the 4th of July pontoon parades. My relatives, Dan and Elaine Gephart, who lived on the east side of the lake, provided the pontoon. Rather than go with the traditional Red, White and Blue theme, we would pick a theme of our own. Several crazy themes included: Hawaii, Elvis, and Christmas.

In 1993, my parents retired to Cedar Lake, having lived in Faribault, MN for 30 years. They sold the log cabin and purchased the home and cabin of Adelbert and Martha Olson, Scott's shores #1 and #2. My father was so excited to be living on Cedar Lake year round, and in a well-known fishing spot! Unfortunately, my father was diagnosed with brain cancer shortly after, and died in 1995. My mother Sue carried on the family tradition of hosting 4th of July, and welcoming family and friends to the lake. In my dad's absence, I taught my daughters how to catch and clean fish and other important skills such as rowing a boat and building a campfire.

In 2008, my husband Phil and I had the cabin on Scott's shore lot #1 torn down and began building what will be our retirement home some day. In January of 2009, our home was completed. We were excited to be next to my mom, with the hope that we would have many more years of Cedar Lake experiences with her. That was not to be. On April 9, 2009 my mom passed away, leaving a legacy of unforgettable memories of good times on Cedar Lake. These memories have been instilled in my children and hopefully will be shared with future generations to come!

CLCC PROPOSED BY-LAW CHANGES

By-Laws Committee

The CLCC By-Laws Committee has convened for two long work sessions and has an updated By-Laws Draft.

The original By-Laws, as conceived some 57 years ago, are well written and worked for us for a long time. The committee pruned the document and added some changes one intervening term shall elapse before that person may to reflect our times. For example, in 1953, e-mail and data privacy were not as big of a concern as it is today. With our current privacy concerns, we felt the need to write language in the By-Laws protecting members' information. Other changes include changing the fiscal year to the calendar year and creating a fair voting process.

A Board of Directors approved draft of the By-Laws was printed in the February 2010 newsletter and is also provided below. Print copy will be available at the Spring Fling on May 29th, 2010. The membership approval vote will be at the Annual Meeting on Saturday, August 28th, 2010.

Article I - Name

The name of this organization shall be the Cedar Lake Conservation Club, Inc.

<u>Article II – Purpose</u>

Its general purposes shall be to promote fellowship among the residents and parties interested in the development, beautification and conservation of Cedar Lake, Corinna Township, Wright County, Minnesota and the property around it banding them together to accomplish the following specific purposes:

- game fishes; to guard against pollution of all kinds coming into Cedar Lake; to combat unwise drainage or flooding projects.
- To engage in surveys and promote any scientific work and research possible and to disseminate any knowledge thus acquired to educate the interested public.
- To accept, receive and administer any gifts to the organization generally without designation of a purpose or in accordance with any specific designation.
- In general, to preserve and protect the beneficial wild life, fish life and natural beauty of Cedar Lake and surrounding community and to restore, replenish and increase the same.
- To purchase or acquire real estate or personal property to further the above purposes.

Article III – Membership

Section I. Membership is open to all.

Section 2. A person becomes a member upon payment of dues. Dues are collected annually.

Section 3. Voting membership is restricted to riparian owners and their immediate families. Each riparian property is restricted to one vote.

Section 4. The membership year runs from January 1 through December 31.

Article IV - Officers

Section 1. The officers of the organization will consist of a president, vice president, secretary and treasurer. They shall be elected by the Board of Directors.

Section 2. Consecutive terms of officers shall be limited to two terms per person for any one position. At least again be elected to that office unless the Board of Directors by three-fourths vote of the total Board waives these conditions. A term is designated to be one year in dura-

Section 3. Vacancies occurring before the expiration of terms of office may be filled by a majority vote of the Board of Directors until the expiration of that term.

Section 4. Resignation from an office shall be submitted to the Board of Directors.

Section 5. An officer may be removed from office by three-fourths of the voting members present and voting at a specially called meeting of the membership.

Section 6. The president shall be the chief executive officer. He/she shall preside over the meeting of the board of directors and all membership meetings. He/she shall represent the organization at all times. His/her actions as a representative must be reported to the Board of Directors.

Section 7. The vice president shall fulfill the duties of the president in the event of his/her absence or disability or as directed by the president. The vice president shall be the chairman of the membership committee.

Section 8. The secretary shall be in charge of all min-To propagate, protect and preserve the game and utes of all meetings of which he/she is a part. He/she shall keep record of these and be in charge of keeping all records and files of the organization. Meeting notices shall follow approved Board of Directors' processes.

> **Section 9.** The treasurer shall have custody of the funds of the organization. He/she shall prepare and sign checks as authorized by the Board of Directors or the president. Signatures of either the president or treasurer will be required on all checks. He/she shall keep an accurate account of all receipts and disbursements and shall at all Board of Directors' meetings, submit a statement of the financial transactions since the previous meeting. He/she shall make a full report at the membership meetings whenever requested by the president or Board of Directors to do so. An audit shall be held prior to the departure from office of each current treasurer and at least once every two years.

Article V - Committees

Section 1. There shall be such committees as established by the Board of Directors.

Section 2. The nominating committee shall be a standing committee. The members shall not be directors or officers and shall elect their own chairperson. The committee shall nominate candidates for election as directors

at the annual meeting. Such nominees shall be eligible to hold such office by virtue of being a voting member and being willing to serve if they are elected. Nominations will be accepted in writing for board members no later than 2 weeks prior to the annual meeting. The committee shall attempt to nominate board members from unrepresented or all geographic areas of the lake.

Article VI – Board of Directors

Section 1. All board members must be voting members of the club.

Section 2. The Board of Directors shall consist of not more than twelve members elected annually by the voting members at the annual meeting. Board Members shall serve for a term of 4 years. No director may be re-elected 15th, 2010; Bass May 29th, 2010) until Saturday, August to the board until having been off the Board for at least one year, unless appointed by the board. The president may serve on the board one full year after completing his/ her term as president.

Section 3. The Board of Directors shall be the governing body.

Section 4. A quorum of the Board of Directors shall constitute a majority provided that all members were given written notice of that meeting. A quorum shall be lost in the event that fifty percent of those directors attending when the meeting is called to order leave prior to adjournment.

Section 5. A Director may be removed from office by three-fourths of the voting members present and voting at a specially called meeting of the membership.

Article VII - Meetings

Section 1. The meetings of the members shall be held at such times and places as the Board of Directors shall determine. At least one meeting shall be held each year. Twenty-five voting members or more shall have the right to call a meeting of the members by directing the secretary in writing to call the special meeting at the time and place indicated in the notice.

Article VIII - Privacy of Information

Section 1. Mass correspondence shall be a representation of the Cedar Lake Conservation Club and its mission. Membership information is the property of the CLCC and shall not be sold or shared.

<u>Article IX – Amendments</u>

Section 1. All proposed amendments to the By-Laws shall be published in the newsletter before presentation at a membership meeting.

Section 2. Adoption of any amendments shall require a two-thirds majority vote by the voting membership in attendance.

Article X – Expiration

Should the CLCC dissolve, all assets of the Cedar Lake Conservation Club, Inc. will be donated to a nonprofit organization(s) approved as such by the Internal Revenue Service and as decided upon by the Board of Directors.

Article XI – Financial Records

Cedar Lake Conservation Club Inc. financial records are kept on a fiscal year basis covering the period January 1 through December 31.
