A star is born! We have been awarded the Minnesota Star Lake Designation. This award is a big deal. The Star Lake status recognizes CLCC as a valuable resource and the tremendous contributions of our volunteers. We have been recognized for decades of exemplary stewardship through comprehensive management planning for our lake. Of the 10,000+ lakes in Minnesota only 11 have received the Star Lake Award as of this writing. Star Lakes are eligible to apply for special project grants.

The award came with a \$2,720 stipend to be used to further CLCC stewardship projects. This generous stipend is in relation to the ranking we received from our application and the numerous and varied projects. Cedar Lake Memories by Judy Halvorson

Our cabin is the same size footprint, 20 x 22 ft, as when it was built in 1925. My grandparents bought our cabin in 1926. They said it took a half a day to drive out to the cabin from the city on the dusty roads in the open air car. The road then went through Buffalo, right down by Buffalo Lake. I was told our cabin was one of only two cabins on the west side of Cedar Lake at the time; the other one was by the bay, now Miner's. I wonder if there is anyone still on the lake any-where who predates our family?

Our cabin porch, a third of the cabin, had roll-up canvas to cover the screens; they were updated before I was born with barn-style windows that still remain; they are hinged inside at the top and swing up to hook to the ceiling. As a young girl on our way to the Lake from Minneapolis, I remember stopping in Maple Lake for a block of ice for the ice box. The cabin was electrified when I was 4 years old and the fridge was added to the porch—the ice box remained in the tiny kitchen to store pots and pans long after. The fridge had a freezer that held one half gallon of ice cream...if there wasn't too much frost in it.

The kitchen had a skinny 3-burner gas stove and an un-calibrated oven—On, Off and anywhere in between. An old

Hoosier baking cabinet stored the dishes. The sink, with a shelf next to it for the water pail, drained out down the hill in the back yard. We still have the wall mounted kerosene lamp that hung over the kitchen sink but now its decorating the living room. The hand pump was outside. We miss the tasty water it provided. My folks would be one of the first ones out to open their cabin in the spring, and one of the last ones to close up in the fall. We had a Coleman oil burning furnace with a stove pipe up to the chimney. It made the cabin toasty warm, even when we'd come out for a day in the winter. Since we live in Michigan and only spend the summer at Cedar Lake, we need the heat less, so we finally took the old furnace out just this spring to get more space.

We didn't get indoor plumbing until 1988. We did not add on but gave up the small bedroom and, combined with old kitchen, we made a nice kitchen and bathroom. We cut the ribbon on the bathroom door for my mom's eightieth birthday. I took that Hoosier cabinet and had it refinished for my tea china at home in Michigan.

The Candy Castle was the favorite kid spot in Annandale. It sold great penny candy and, if you were clever, you could find some that were two for a penny to stretch the dime you were given. The real deal, however, was the ice cream cones at the old drug store. You could get three large scoops for your dime. My all time favorite was a wonderfully creamy "chocolate marshmallow" made by Brown's Ice Cream. You could also read comics is one corner, even if you didn't buy them.

There were two resorts on the lake in the 50's: Geardink's, of course, on the north end and Crescent Ridge on the south east end just south of the boat access. The Conservation Club met there for a number of years. That's where I learned to polka. My parents were charter members. A number of us west side kids formed a junior conservation club. We taught each other mouth to mouth resuscitation out on the diving dock, invented hand signals to talk to each other safely between our boats and planned swim parties. As kids, we also played in the little woods and had church meetings there. We pretended we were chipmunks when we played in the gravel pit though we weren't allowed. The girls phoned each other during the week to decide if we would bring our Barbies, babydolls or the 8" Ginny Dolls that weekend. Our favorite foods were popcorn. Rice Krispy treats and the pizza we made from a Chef Boyardee box kit and embellished with leftovers from the fridge. Those were the days!!

Help is Here for Getting Rid of Buckthorn! By Cheryl Wold

Before we know it, the snow will melt away and the ice will leave the lake. Signs of spring will begin to appear and the buckthorn will be among the first plants to leaf out. Buckthorn is an aggressive, non-native shrub which crowds out and eliminates other native plants. Buckthorn lacks "natural controls" like insects or disease that would curb its growth. It is also incredibly hardy, spreading by seeds in their berries. Once on the soil, these berries can remain viable for up to 5 years. Birds spread the seed over a wide area. Help control the spread of buckthorn by eliminating it from your property. To assist with the removal of buckthorn, CLCC has purchased a Weed Wrench, available for free use by its members. The Weed Wrench is a manually operated tool designed to uproot plants (up to 2" in diameter). A buckthorn notebook is also available with the Weed Wrench. It covers buckthorn identification, herbicide usage, disposal of cut buckthorn, and alternative replacement plants. Water Quality Committee

The most important part of this article is to invite everyone to attend a meeting where details will be provided on how best to stem the growth of Eurasian Milfoil in Cedar Lake.

Date: Saturday, April 9, 2011

Time: 11:00 AM

Location: Corinna Township Hall

Over the past three months, the Water Quality Committee met on several occasions to discuss how to most effectively treat the Eurasian Milfoil growth, the associated costs, and the financing of those costs. This article contains a very general overview of these topics, which will be discussed in much greater detail at the April 9th meeting. In addition, CLCC members will be asked to consider signing a petition related to the financing of the Eurasian Milfoil treatment costs.

The CLCC Board recently approved the Water Quality Committee's recommendation to have Professional Lake Management (PLM) continue to apply the annual curly leaf pondweed treatment in 2011. This will be our third year of curly leaf treatment in what we expect to be a five to seven year project. In addition, the Board also approved having PLM apply the inaugural treatment for Eurasian Milfoil in 2011. CLCC's Invasive Species Treatment Fund will be more than sufficient to cover this inaugural treatment of Eurasian Milfoil. However, based on discussions with PLM as well as with representatives from the lake associations from several neighboring lakes, it is likely that we will rapidly exhaust our Fund Balance. As a result, the Water Quality Committee is exploring other sources of funding. While every effort will be made to research and apply for grants and other sources of public funds, it is evident that even these funding sources could be insufficient to properly treat this damaging and destructive plant.

As a result, the Water Quality Committee recommended that CLCC work with the Clearwater River Watershed District to explore a potential property tax assessment to provide funds for treatment of the Eurasian Milfoil. This approach would be similar to the special assessment we are paying in connection with Project 06-01. This process will be discussed in greater detail at the meeting on April 9 and, at the conclusion of the meeting, CLCC members will be asked to consider signing a petition directing the Clearwater River Watershed District to begin exploration of such a special assessment.

Emerald Ash Borer by Kathy Jonsrud

Since 2002, emerald ash borer, a non-native insect, has killed tens of millions of ash trees in neighboring states. In May of 2009, emerald ash borer was confirmed in St. Paul, Minnesota. Ash trees lack a way to defend against these pests. Once an ash is attacked, it will be killed. With the largest concentration of ash trees in the country, Minnesota has much to protect. What can you do to slow the spread of emerald ash borer?

First, educate yourself on what emerald ash borer is. The University of Minnesota Extension Service has a brochure titled "*Does my tree have emerald ash borer.*" This can be found at

www.extension.umn.edu/issues/eab.

Second, do not transport firewood. If you carry firewood from one location to another, you may also be transporting invasive insect species and tree pests. Rather than bringing firewood to your campground or cabin, buy locally grown firewood at the campground or in the town you'll be visiting. Also buy only the amount you need for your trip and burn it all. Lastly, do not bring any ash tree materials to the Corinna Township brush pile. In the recent Corinna Township newsletter it states "*The Minnesota Department of Agriculture has notified Corinna Township* that we may NOT allow dumping of ash tree material in our brush pile at the township hall. This is to help slow the spread of Emerald Ash Borer". If you have ash tree waste (branches or logs), the best way to dispose of it is burning it at your site. The Tullibee

On February 17th, just after noon while fishing for crappies on the north side of the lake, I caught a surprise fish a tullibee. have been watching for tullibee for some time, as the DNR has not reported them in their nets for many years.

Tullibee are members of the salmon family and also known as Cisco or Lake Herring. They are silvery-sided, iridescent fish with dainty mouths that feed on small crustaceans and aquatic insect larvae. They don't often end up on the end of anglers' hooks because they



don't typically eat bait-sized prey. These can weigh up to several pounds in inland lakes. They must have cold, oxygen-rich water to thrive. Even slight changes in temperature and available oxygen can squeeze these sensitive fish out of their comfort zone, particularly in central Minnesota which is at the southern extent of their range.

Tullibee aren't the only living things affected by changes in oxygen and temperature, two major drivers of the lake ecosystem dynamics. Low oxygen concentrations in the deeper water is one factor resulting in a severe deterioration of living conditions for most fresh water organisms. Because tullibee are more sensitive to these changes than most other species, they can signal the well-being of our lake. Also the northern pike and walleye that feed on tullibee. So we must continue to protect our lake from excess nutrients such as phosphorus, which is crucial to maintain sufficient oxygen levels in Cedar Lake. Protecting our lake from nutrient enrichment starts at the shore and ends at the farthest edge of the lake's watershed. Here are some things that you can do: Leave shoreline and aquatic plants in place to prevent shore erosion, leave lakeshore wetlands intact to filter pollutants, properly maintain your septic systems and not fertilizing lawns with phosphorus will help reduce oxygen loss.

With all this said, I believe what we have been doing here these past few years on Cedar Lake, has been in the right direction and now I believe we have some proof.

Finally if you are wondering what happened to the tullibee in the photo it is still swimming around in the lake!!!!!

Loon Buoys and Spawning Areas

If you happened past the sand bar last year while the loons were nesting, you saw two buoys that warned boaters to stay clear of the area. Given the heavy traffic and use of the sand bar by families and their dogs, the CLCC authorized the purchase of more buoys to better protect the area so the loons won't be tempted to leave our lake. Also, the DNR will continue to post buoys to protect early season spawning. PLEASE respect the postings and keep your distance from the loon nests and spawning areas.
