For my last letter as the Cedar Lake Conservation Club President, I feel obliged to highlight some of the many accomplishments we've made the past two years. I also want to sing the praises of our CLCC Board. But before I do either of those, I first need to address a couple quick items.

First, thanks to all who made the Picnic and Music on the Water on July 17th a huge success. The weather was perfect, the food and comradery were great, and the band, STIM PACK, was excellent. We've already booked the band for next year—save the date July 16, 2022.

I also need to address a question that has been on the minds of a lot of the membership lately. Namely, "What's up with the algae bloom we've been experiencing this year?"

You can read the details in our Water Quality Committee's report on pages 4-5. But here are the highlights. The water quality team, along with board leadership, met with our engineer from the Clearwater River Watershed District. The engineer explained that she knows it is a filamentous algae. She also knows that the algae bloom is primarily the result of the record heat wave we experienced in June, along with a lack of rain and wind. Many area lakes are experiencing the same conditions. Additionally, she noted that, unless the weather changes, we could be in for a tough summer in terms of algae blooms. Lastly, but importantly, she noted that, because of the years of advocacy and water quality management by the CLCC, conditions would be a lot worse than they are.

Please know that the Water Quality Committee continues to actively explore as many options and ideas as possible to address these kinds of issues on both a near-term and a long-term basis. In other words, more to come.

Recently, you may have noticed some new signage in front of residences identifying our board members' property on the lake (see page 14 for more information). Please take a minute to thank a board member for volunteering to help make Cedar Lake the amazing place it is to live and relax. As noted by our CRWD engineer, the CLCC has both a history and a reputation for proactive lake management that is second to

none. Don't take the hard work of our volunteers and decades of thoughtful stewardship for granted. All the things the CLCC does could not happen without the passion and dedication of numerous individuals – your friends and neighbors – around Cedar Lake.

For accomplishments in the last two years we've:

- Worked with Wright County Parks to purchase and place a CD3 station (self-serve watercraft cleaning station) at Schroeder Park to help reduce the spread of aquatic invasive species. We're currently working with Wright County Soil & Water and the DNR to allow us to purchase and place a CD3 station at the County Road 6 access.
- Partnered with Corinna Township to put a gate up at the end of Ireland Avenue during non-winter months to funnel traffic to monitored accesses.
- Increased our budget for access monitoring by 50 percent. Monitoring has expanded to include Wurm's Landing (east side, off of 72nd Street), which will provide data about the best approach for future monitoring efforts at this landing.
- Continued with successful control of aquatic invasive species curly leaf pondweed and eurasian water milfoil. We've paid for divers to search for starry stonewort and participated in state wide efforts to identify starry stonewort.
- Stocked walleyes.
- And, after having to skip a year due to the pandemic, we celebrated our lake community with a picnic at Camp Courage and enjoyed an extra fun day of Music on the Water with a terrific band.

And there is so much more we do, including outreach with Schroeder Park (e.g., the Kids Don't Float program), True Friends, known VRBO's, and other area lake associations.

CLCC is led by an awesome group of people and Cedar Lake is blessed because of all of them. Thank you all for your teamwork and dedication.

And thank you for the opportunity to serve as CLCC President, it's been an honor. I wish you and your families a terrific rest of the summer.



The Clearwater River Watershed District (CRWD) is a local unit of government established in 1975 by citizen petition. CRWD's mission is to promote, preserve, and protect water resources within the boundaries of the District in order to maintain property values and quality of life.



In the 1960's and 1970's, those who enjoyed and fished the Clearwater Chain of Lakes noticed an increase in rough fish and more algae blooms. A grassroots effort identified that a watershed district, with powers of enforcement, abilities to assess through county property taxes, and the ability to obtain state and federal grants could tackle the mission of protecting and preserving the Clearwater River Watershed lakes and streams. Numerous projects to decrease phosphorus loading were scientifically identified in the early 1980's and continue to operate and improve water quality to this day.

The CRWD is run by five managers who are appointed by County Commis-

sioners: two from Wright

County, two from Stearns, one from Meeker. Dawn Cole from Cedar Lake currently serves as a Wright County CRWD Manager.

CRWD is one of the older organized watershed districts in the state of Minnesota and has a strong history of efficient projects and delivering results. CRWD has initiated dozens of water quality improvement projects over the years in all areas of the District; to the right is a list of the larger projects. Additionally, CRWD has been exceptionally successful at securing grants for projects. The initial projects in the 1980's and 1990's received about \$2 million in grants and more recent projects have benefited from over \$3 million in grants. Cedar Lake CRWD Projects

Cedar Lake, as part of the CRWD, has two projects with the watershed, both started by citizen petition.

Cedar Albion Swartout Henshaw (CASH) PO6 Project

In the early 2000's, Cedar Lake residents noticed declining water quality and more frequent algae blooms. The three lakes to the south of Cedar—Swartout, Albion and Henshaw—drain into Cedar, and Swartout has a wetland that drains into it. After years of monitoring, historical data, and input from affected residents, a large capital project to reduce the amount of phosphorus coming into the waters was established. The project—called **Cedar Albion Swartout Henshaw (CASH) PO6**—started in 2006. Enhancements were added to the project in 2013 with the benefit of a \$278,000 grant secured by CRWD. The primary goal of the project was to reduce phosphorus in Cedar Lake to a yearly average of 20ug/ml. **In 2018, this goal was achieved.**

The project includes limestone treatment ponds, rough fish managements

(barriers and seining), curly leaf pondweed control, and best management practices for surrounding lands. The project maintenance is high priority for the CRWD; regular enhancements and modifications are defined and executed. Recent maintenance activities—all under the oversight of the district engineer—for this project include:

East Swartout Treatment Area: Breach repair in 2018, installation of new fish barrier, nuisance vegetation control, engineer inspection of sand-iron filter, weirs (structure to direct water), outlet pipe, fish barrier

Old HWY 55 Treatment Area: Rock repositioning, nuisance vegetation control, addition of smaller limestone in swale (contour in treatment area), engineer inspection of sheet pile weir

Segner Pond: GPS survey of diversion berm (structure to direct water), inlet channel, and limestone filter berm. Periodic additions of limestone and nuisance vegetation control

Henshaw, Swartout, and Illsely Avenue Fish Barriers: Repairs or replacement in 2019 Curly Leaf Pondweed: Annual treatments

The annual budget to maintain this project has historically been \$45,000 to \$60,000 per year. The assessment for this project is on the Wright County property tax statement.

Cedar Aquatic Invasive Species (AIS) Project

The other Cedar project with CRWD is the **Aquatic Invasive Species (AIS) Project**. This project started in 2011 and the funds are used for the management of aquatic invasive species, recognizing that new infestations are happening and strategies to manage AIS are evolving. The Cedar Lake Conservation Club has a very active role in this project, managing the AIS control strategies and treatments which helps to keep administrative costs low. The CRWD serves as a fiscal agent and provides oversight. The annual budget to maintain this project has historically been \$20,000 to \$30,000 per year. The assessment for this project is on the Wright County property tax statement.

Cedar Lake and CRWD Frequently Asked Questions

Q: We had an unusual early summer algae bloom on Cedar Lake this year. Is the Cedar Albion Swartout Henshaw PO6 project working?

A: Yes, the project is working and has delivered excellent results. Frequent water quality monitoring has shown that the total phosphorus (TP) level (graph to the right "Historical TP") on Cedar has declined since the beginning of the project in 2006, and water clarity (graph to the right, "Historical Secchi Depth") has increased. The elements of the project are carefully monitored and maintained by CRWD (see first page for a brief description of recent maintenance activities).

The bloom in early summer of 2021 was filamentous algae. The cause of the bloom was record breaking June temperatures, lack of rain, lack of wind, and lake mixing dynamic. Deep lakes with a long fetch (long narrow shape) like Cedar are sometimes more impacted by periodic algae blooms. Filamentous algae does not require much in terms of nutrients.


Many lakes are experiencing abnormal algae growth this year due to the weather conditions, even lakes with much lower phosphorus concentrations


Water clarity on Cedar remains excellent, measured at 18 feet in late June of 2021.

Without the aggressive management and project implementation driven by the Lake Association and supported by the District, these blooms would likely be much worse and last longer.

Q: Can we eliminate algae blooms?

A: Unfortunately, no, algae blooms cannot be completely eliminated. However, Cedar's project to reduce phosphorus in the lake, over the last decade, has delivered excellent water quality and significantly fewer and less severe blooms. Some homeowners get a DNR permit to use an algicide on their shoreline. More information can be found at www.dnr.state.mn.us/shorelandmgmt/apg/regulations.html





Q: Are there more things we should be doing to decrease the phosphorus in Cedar and reduce the chance of algae blooms?

A: When Cedar's original project was developed, there were numerous strategies examined to control phosphorus. At this time, the primary

A: When Cedar's original project was developed, there were numerous strategies examined to control phosphorus. At this time, the primary strategies used are sediment/nutrient basins, rough fish management, and best management practices for surrounding land. Other strategies identified in the original engineer's report included ferric chloride treatment, wetland restoration, and shallow lake drawdowns. Additionally, CRWD has explored shallow lake (e.g., Albion, Henshaw, Swartout) phosphorus management strategies, including alum treatment analysis and bird control. Careful monitoring of Cedar's water quality continues and will help understand if future project enhancements are needed.

Q: What can I do to help reduce the nutrient load to Cedar Lake?

A: Each of our individual actions as lakeshore owners make a difference.

- Restore your shorelines to a more natural state. CRWD offers cost sharing grants for shoreline restoration (<u>www.crwd.org</u> and click on "Incentives" near the top). Here is more background from MN DNR on shoreline restoration: https://www.dnr.state.mn.us/lakescaping/index.html.
- Consider leaving 10-15 feet of un-mowed area on the shoreline to serve as a buffer zone for lake run-off. The buffer zone also discourages geese from visiting the yard.
- Proper septic maintenance reduces the chance of harmful introductions into the lake.
- If you must fertilize your lawn (yep, it is a hard passion to break), insist on a non-phosphate fertilizer and try fertilizing every second or third year.
- Keep informed about CRWD projects at www.crwd.org.

CLCC Goes Big On Extra Access Monitoring Stepping Up to Reduce the Spread of AIS

CLCC has made a major commitment in 2021 to reduce the spread of aquatic invasive species (AIS). As in past years, Wright Soil and Water Conservation District is offering a program for lakes to purchase additional access monitoring to augment the access monitoring provided by Wright County.

The CLCC Board of Directors has purchased an extra \$31,217 of access monitoring in 2021. This will be paid using funds from the Clearwater River Watershed District Cedar AIS Project. In 2020, CLCC purchased \$25,000.

Fisheries on Cedar | Are the walleyes hungry?

"I can't seem to catch walleyes on Cedar" is a common topic of conversation for Cedar Lake anglers. Walleyes have never been an easy catch on any lake—at least for me.

I have been fishing Cedar since the early 70's and have never caught a limit of walleyes on one outing—usually one or two, if that. I have always said to people that Cedar can be a tough lake to fish for walleye. Other species can be a bit easier; bass and northerns are often a good bite.

Cedar Lake is made up of many contours and, at one spot, an extreme depth of 108'. Fish have many places to hide, hang out at, and feed. From my observation, Cedar has always had plenty of forage fish (minnows) and zooplankton to feed on. When these populations are high, your fishing luck decreases.

Now that we have the zebra mussels in the lake, this could also change a few things. Zebra mussels filter algae from the water, taking food that zooplankton eat. With the water becoming clearer, the weeds grow to a deeper depth. Will our fish hang out more readily in those areas now and be easier to catch? Time will tell as we continue to monitor our lake during these changes. And I guess that is why it is called "fishing", not "catching".

As I see it, challenge can be good for all of us. Our walleye fishing here does that, maybe even testing our patience. Cedar residents value the quality of our fishing and we will continue to monitor it. CLCC, for now, will continue to stock walleye fingerlings in Cedar along with the DNR.

Call of the Loon on Cedar

Cedar had 4 nesting pairs of loons this year and produced a total of 6 chicks.

- South pair: first to hatch with one chick.
- Sandbar and NE pairs: hatching at about the same time, the sandbar family had one chick and the NE pair boosted twins.
- NW pair: Last to hatch, twins again!


It appears that all the chicks have survived. The chicks are now diving, but sometimes a bit inexperienced when they surface. If a chick dives nearby while you are cruising about, cut your motor till you see it surface again.

Loons can be very territorial so the distance between nesting sites is crucial. The Cedar Lake sites are always posted with advisory buoys as we obtain an annual permit through the Wright County Sheriff's Department.

The life span of a loon can be 25 to 30 years, but they are a very vulnerable species. Less than pristine water quality, predators, human disturbance (such as boating too close to loon nesting areas and families), discarded fishing line, and lost lures can be fatal to them. The loons can't be taken for granted, so let's all give them a chance. With everyone working together, we will continue to hear the call of the loon on beautiful Cedar Lake.

Watercraft Cleaning Station at Schroeder Park on Cedar Lake



Because of your generous donations to the CLCC Visionary Water Quality Fund, a collaborative effort has been formed with Wright County Parks for a watercraft cleaning station at Schroeder Park on the north side of Cedar Lake.

This station is a first in Wright County. Last summer was the first year it was in use and there was excellent uptake. The tools were used over 900 times by 330+ users.

The cleaning station is called CD3 (stands for clean, drain, dry, dispose) and is <u>free to use</u>. The station is designed to be a self-serve, easy-to-use system that reduces the spread of aquatic invasive species. The lighted station at Schroeder is solar powered and the tools available for watercraft cleaning include: wet/dry vacuum, air blower, weed

grabbers, and wrench.

Did you know? Mulching fall leaves is the best way—don't blow or throw them into the lake!

In the dog days of summer, we don't often think about the fall chores, but they will be here before we know it.

University of Minnesota Extension recommends using your lawn mower to mulch the leaves. The tiny bits of mulched leaves will be turned into organic matter to fertilize your lawn and help reduce weeds.

And certainly no throwing or blowing of leaves into the lake; yes some end up in the lake, but not a whole yard full.



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

Grasshoppers

1/2 gallon vanilla ice cream

1/2 cup creme de menthe

1/2 cup white creme de cacao

- Soften ice cream in the refrigerator for about 20 minutes.
- Using a hand mixer, put 1/2 of the ice cream in a large bowl, and add a bit of the crème de menthe and crème de cacao. Mix just till blended.
- 3. Keep adding ice cream and the liquids, mixing just till lumps of ice cream are incorporated.
- 4. Keep in freezer—holds well for about a week.
