Warm fall greetings to all. Another season of putting away boats and hauling the aluminum to shore has occurred. The fall colors were beautiful this year and we got an extended summer through October. The lake level is down, but not as much as last year.

I hope everyone participated in the zebra mussel survey; see more details on page 9. We believe that with the low water levels preventing upstream phosphorous from reaching our lake over the last two years and the filtering ability of the mussels, our lake has become very clear. The clear water however, leads to more native weed growth.

This past year brought us heat, an extended drought, wind, more wind and then some more wind. Lake levels decreased throughout the summer, after being on the high side in May (more details on page 5). Some residents suffered watercraft equipment damage from summer storms. This was a hit or miss windstorm. Hopefully all was insured.

Cedar Lake had more filamentous algae this year. This is believed to be caused by the excessive rains in the spring along with summer heat. Also, there is emerging science that zebra mussels increase algae blooms. It is occurring on many lakes in Minnesota—even lakes that had not had previous algae blooms. We are not suffering alone. Usually filamentous algae are considered more of an aesthetic concern; we continue to work with water experts to understand the recent changes on our lake and impact of climate factors, zebra mussels, and lake dynamics.

We continued a substantial investment to monitor two landings this year: County Road 6 and Schroeder Park. We did not monitor Wurm's landing this year, due to the minimal amount of traffic. Please take a moment to review the details of our access monitoring on page 6.

Our annual meeting was held in September and we had a decent turnout. Orv Jonsrud was our sole departing Board member. This was Orv's second term on the Board. Thank you for your time as a director and volunteering on other projects.

We welcomed three new Directors: Bonnie Sadergaski, Mary Ann Wells, and Beth **Trout**. Thank you for volunteering and we look forward to serving with you. See the article about our new directors on page 8.

Our visionary fund had another robust year with over \$23,000 donated. The 120 contributions so far this year ranged from \$10 to \$5,000. We are a charitable 501(c)3 organization, so check with your employer to see if they have a donation matching option for you, effectively doubling your gift.

At our last Board meeting in September, Treasurer Chuck Vinar offered to explore a safe, conservative way to place our funds in order to take advantage of higher interest rates. Carter Diers will be stepping down as Chair of the Nominating Committee after 14 years. Thank You Carter! Sue Wolf will be the new chair for the Nominating Committee.



Loons on Cedar Three chicks made it this year

Again this year, all 4 loon platforms had a nesting pair. The south pair of loons were first to have a clutch and their two chicks did very well.

The spring brought storms which we believe were just too much of a challenge for the sand bar loons to overcome. They tried two clutches, but neither were successful.


The northeast pair successfully raised one chick. The northwest pair had a late chick, and we believe an eagle got it. So, as best we can tell, a total of 3 new loons were added to the Cedar Lake flock.

The loon platforms are tucked in for the winter. The Fish and Wildlife Committee takes wonderful care of the platforms and will get them out next spring as soon as the ice is out.




Cedar Lake Levels 2022—A Year of Extremes

The CLCC Water Quality Committee monitors the lake level and provides yearly data to the DNR. Numerous readings are taken throughout the summer. Hats off to Water Quality Committee member Karl Leslie for many years of collecting readings.

This year was certainly a year of extremes. In May, after significant rain fall, the lake almost reached our mandatory 300 ft no-wake level of 999.17 ft (or 2.42 on the gauge at County Rd 6). Then, by the end of the summer, the lake level was 2nd lowest over the last 7 years.

- The lowest known level of 997.21 on Cedar was in 1946.*
- The 2021 end of season level (997.65) was the lowest over the past 7 years.
- This year's end of season was about 6.9 inches lower than the end of season average, adickebert@hotmail.com
- nd 1.92 inches higher than 2021.



Limited Aquatic Invasive Species (AIS) Treatment Needed in 2022 Expenses Covered by DNR Grant



The Water Quality Committee is delighted to report that, again this year, limited aquatic invasive species (AIS) control was required on Cedar.

The only AIS requiring treatment was curly leaf pondweed, with 7.6 acres treated in May.

We anticipated there would be limited eurasian water milfoil to treat this year. Our vendors reported that there were no patches of EWM requiring treatment. The patch of robust vegetation on the north side was identified as northern water milfoil (good weed—native). Out of caution, several samples were taken from this area for genetic analysis. The results will help us identify treatment, if needed, for 2023.

And once again, none of the newest invader—starry stonewort—was found on Cedar.

The Water Quality Committee remains vigilant and is already making 2023 plans for AIS control. The Committee will continue to work with the DNR and a variety of

other lake management experts to develop thoughtful, comprehensive and cost effective AIS management strategy.

Watercraft Cleaning Stations (CD3) on Cedar Plans for a Second Unit at Cty Rd 6 Access Move Forward

CLCC and Wright County Parks sponsored the first CD3 water-craft cleaning station in Wright County in 2020.


The Schroeder Park station (north side of the lake) is **free to use** and continues to be very popular with boaters to help reduce the spread of aquatic invasive species.



This summer, the use of the CD3 remained strong with over 300 users and tools used over 600 times. Over the past three years, the number of users has remained steady.

Progress has been been made in

working with the DNR and Wright Soil and Water Conservation District for the second station at the CTY RD 6 landing. We expect the new unit to be ready for use early next spring.

Cedar Extra Access Monitoring | Over 1,700 Inspections in 2022

CLCC made another major commitment this year to reduce the spread of aquatic invasive species (AIS). As in past years, Wright Soil and Water Conservation District provided a program for lakes to purchase additional access monitoring to augment the access monitoring provided by Wright County.

The CLCC Board of Directors contracted for an extra \$27,500 of access monitoring in 2022.

Here is a summary of the 2022 Cedar access monitoring statistics:

- 1,784 inspections (last year was 1,313).
- 1,782 hours of inspections for a total cost (includes inspections provided by Wright County) of \$39,700.
- Inspections per hour were 1.00, which is similar to previous years.
- Fishing boats were the most common watercraft inspected.
- 171 entrance inspection violations were detected, up from previous years.


Zebra Mussels on Cedar Resident Survey Points to Decreasing Density

Zebra mussels colonies were first discovered in 2018 on Cedar. We started non-scientific resident surveys to gain an understanding of the changes in the population and density.

This year, though a few residents reported heavier infestations, there appears to be a trend that our infestation may be peaking, as some residents reported a decrease.

A few highlights include:

- Most (97%) report seeing zebra mussels on their equipment
- 22% saw less zebra mussels on their equipment.
- The percentage that saw more zebra mussels decreased from 70% in 2021 to 45% in 2022.
- Those describing zebra mussels as moderate to heavy decreased from 44% in 2021 to 33% in 2022.



Cedar Lake Property Owners:

The Cedar Lake Conservation Club (CLCC) plans to treat curly leaf pondweed and eurasian water milifoil, both aquatic invasive species/nuisance species, in Cedar Lake in 2023. Additionally, if starry stonewort, an aquatic invasive species, is discovered, treatment will be conducted.

The Minnesota Department of Natural Resources is planning to provide to the CLCC a waiver of the requirements that the Association obtain signatures of approval by owners of lakeshore property. Instead, the CLCC will notify property owners of the treatment through the:

- CLCC newsletter which is mailed to all residents of Cedar Lake.
- CLCC website <u>www.cedarlakecc.org</u>.
- Annandale Advocate and Maple Lake Messenger (local weekly newspapers).

With regard to 2023 treatment:

- The proposed timeline for treatment is May October.
- The target species for the treatment is curly leaf pondweed (CLP), eurasian water milfoil (EWM), and starry stonewort (SSW) if discovered.
- The products being used are aquatic herbicides and/or harvesting methods appropriate to control CLP and EWM, and SSW if discovered. Chemicals that are anticipated to be used are: CLP-diquat, EWM-ProcellaCOR, SSW (if discovered)-cooper sulfate.
- If the landowner does NOT want treatment to occur adjacent to the landowner's property:

CLCC 2022 Annual Meeting Recap of Meeting | 3 New Directors Elected to 4 Year Term

The CLCC Annual Meeting was held on September 17; attendance was good and quorum was easily reached. President David Glass led the meeting and provided an overview of the successful year. Here are the highlights:

- Recognized outgoing Director Orv Jonsrud, and the membership elected three new Directors: Beth Trout, Bonnie Sadergaski, and Mary Ellen Wells. See more information about the new Directors below.
- Access monitoring was performed at the CTY RD 6 and Schroeder accesses. See page 6 for details.
- Cedar experienced robust native vegetation and filamentous algae in several areas this year. Other lakes have experienced the same, and our vegetation mapping expert believes the cool spring and lower water levels favored certain natives. Also, our increased water clarity stimulates vegetation growth. We now see vegetation in 18-21 feet of water (previously was 12-15 ft).
- Limited aquatic invasive species control was needed, and 2022 expenses were covered by a DNR grant. See page 6 for more details.
- CLCC Picnic and Music on the Water were once again great community celebrations. Next year the Picnic and Music on the Water are planned for July 15th, 2023—mark your calendars!
- The Fish and Wildlife Committee maintained purple martin houses, a chimney swift tower, and loon platforms.
- The popular Kids Don't Float free life jacket loaning station at Schroeder Park was maintained by Mark Grimme—CLCC Director.
- Treasurer Chuck Vinar provided a review of the strong CLCC financials.
- The Board continues to monitor emerging lake issues such as: 2nd tier developments; Boat Operator's Certificate in the state legislature; vacation rental regulations; and the U of M Wake Boat Study.

Stay Safe and Have Fun | Ice Safety Tips

DANGER

THIN ICE

The CLCC Board of Directors regularly discusses safety concerns on Cedar. Cedar is a highly recreated lake, and a shared value in our community is a safe and fun experience for all using the lake.

Winter brings a whole new set of ways to have fun on Cedar. "Hard water season" is right around the corner, and it is time to start thinking about getting the fish houses ready, snow shoes out of storage, and snowmobiles tuned up for the winter season.

As you are getting ready to enjoy the winter season on Cedar Lake, *keep in mind that ice is never 100% safe*. With that

being said, the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources offers the following guidelines from their website, to help us STAY SAFE and HAVE FUN!

New Clear Ice Only

- Under 4 inches STAY OFF the ICE
- 4" Ice fishing or other activities on foot
- 5"-7" Snowmobiles or ATVs
- 8"-12" Car or small pick-up
- 12"-15" Medium truck

Double the ice thickness for white ice or snow ice, as white ice/snow ice is half as strong as clear ice.

Ice Safety | Did you know?

NEW ICE IS USUALLY STRONGER THAN OLD ICE.

4" of clear newly formed ice may support one person on foot, while 12" or more of old partially thawed ice may not.

ICE SELDOM FREEZES UNIFORMLY.

It may be a foot thick in one location and only an inch or two just a few feet a away.

THE INSULATING EFFECT OF SNOW SLOWS DOWN THE FREEZING PROCESS.

The extra weight also reduces how much weight the ice sheet can support. Also, ice near the shore can be weaker than the ice that is further out.

SCHOOLS OF FISH OR FLOCKS OF WATER FOWL CAN ADVERSELY AFFECT THE RELATIVE SAFETY OF THE ICF

The movement of the fish can bring warm water up from the bottom of the lake. In the past this has opened holes in the ice causing snowmobiles and cars to break through.

Cedar Lake Favorite Recipes By Kobie Diers

This recipe is a family fall favorite! Served best while it is warm with vanilla ice cream.



Apple and Pear Crisp

- 2 pounds ripe Bosc pears (about 4)
- 2 pounds firm apples (about 4)
- 1 teaspoon grated orange zest
- 1 teaspoon grated lemon zest
- 2 tablespoons freshly squeezed orange juice
- 2 tablespoons freshly squeezed lemon juice
- 1/2 cup granulated sugar
- 1/4 cup flour
- 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 1/2 teaspoon ground nutmea

TOPPING

- 1&1/2 cups flour
- 3/4 cup granulated sugar
- 3/4 cup light brown sugar, lightly packed
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1 cup old-fashioned oatmeal
- 1/2 pound (2 sticks) cold butter, diced

DIRECTIONS

- 1. Preheat oven to 350 degrees.
- 2. Peel, core and cut the pears and apples into large chunks. Place the fruit in a large bowl and add the zests, juices, sugar, flour, cinnamon, and nutmeg. Pour into a 9 by 12 by 2-inch oval baking dish.
- 3. For the topping: Combine the flour, sugars, salt, oatmeal, and butter in the bowl of an electric mixer fitted with the paddle attachment. Mix on low speed for 1 minute, until the mixture is in large crumbles. Sprinkle evenly over the fruit, covering the fruit completely.
- 4. Place the baking dish on a sheet pan and bake for 50 minutes to 1 hour, until the top is brown and the fruit is bubbly.
