




Where on Cedar?

The CLCC Board of Directors conducted a Member Survey this past summer. We had a great response on the survey, and Board looked at each comment that was submitted.


Here's a summary of a few top line items:


- Hands down the two most important CLCC activities are:
 - Improving/maintaining lake quality.Controlling aquatic invasive species.
- One item that jumped out at the Board is that over 60% of those responding to the survey visit the CLCC website at least once a month.
- Regarding wake boat regulation, about 79% strongly agree or agree that regulations are needed
- Most prefer the newsletter in hard copy and available on the website.
- More information is requested on the new required Boater Education and Certification Program, phased in starting in 2025 (see below).

Minnesota Boater Education and Certification Required for all boaters born after July 1,1987 Phase in starting in 2025

Gone are the days when most boats on the lake were a twelve foot fishing boat with a 9-horse Johnson. Today's popular watercraft are large, powerful, and much more complex to safely operate.

Numerous Minnesota lake and river associations have worked for years to pass a require Boater Education and Certification program, and just such a program was passed by the legislature in 2023.

The phase-in begins July 1, 2025, with the first phase requiring those born on or after July 1, 2004 to complete the program.

Goals of the program include:

- Help to calibrate all Minnesota boater's knowledge with current information and research.
- Increase the likelihood of safe, responsible, and respectful operation.

Minnesota joins more than 40 other states that require a Boater Education and Certification Program





Watercraft Cleaning Stations (CD3) on Cedar Use continues strong trend by Dave Glass, Water Quality Committee Chair




CLCC has made a substantial commitment over the years to give boaters the tools they need to reduce the spread of aquatic invasive species (AIS). We have two watercraft cleanings stations on Cedar—called CD3s.

CD3 historical data from inception shows the unit at the Cty Road 6 is the most popular site. Both sites show the air hose feature is most used.

Our CD3 stations have been used almost 2,500 unique sessions. This has been a great investment for CLCC to keep boats clean and operators aware of the necessity to clean, drain and dry.

These stations coupled with our monitors at both landings have no doubt kept our lake as free as possible from new AIS.

Loons on Cedar 5 chicks for the season

The love of having loons on Cedar Lake is never ending, and the Fish and Wildlife Committee works very hard so we can continue to enjoy them for years to come. We maintain 4 nesting platforms on the lake.

Here is the recap of 2024.

- · Sand Bar: Hatched 2 chicks
- South end: Hatched 1 chick
- East side: Around May 12th the platform was struck by a boater and the platform was abandoned.
- North side: Hatched 1 chick and a few days later was believed to be taken by a predator.

We thought we would end up with 3 chicks surviving for the year. Then a pair of loons appeared with 2 chicks on the mid-east side later in the summer! They had apparently found a natural area to nest. It is known that loons will re-nest if their first nesting is destroyed.

So it ended up being a very successful year after all, with 5 new loons to share their magical call for everyone to enjoy.

The loons left the lake in October to warmer climates; most loons from this area migrate to Florida.

DNR Fish Survey

This summer the DNR completed a fish survey on Cedar Lake.

Area Fisheries Manager Joe Stewig shared that in their preliminary analysis, there wasn't anything of a significant change since the last survey in 2019.

The draft report is expected by the end of the year.

Cedar is scheduled for a DNR fish survey every 5 years. It will take several survey cycles to understand the impact of zebra mussels on the fish population.

What's the Buzz for December?*

- 1st week | Don't count on the ice being safe! But bird watching
 and feeding is certainly safe—and fun! Consider filling up your
 feeders and providing our feathered friends with a heated bird
 bath; it will bring many winter visitors, including chickadees, nuthatches, house finches, and wood peckers.
- 2nd week | This week we often hear the lake ice cracking, groaning, booming and even thundering as it expands and contracts in response to the changing temperatures. Millions of animals are in a deep hibernation; woodchucks, turtles, snakes, lizards, frogs, spiders, ticks, and insects to name a few.
- **3rd week** Astronomical winter begins this year on December 21. This is the shortest day of the year for daylight, and now the days start to get longer.
- 4th week | Will we have heavy snow this year? Only Mother Nature knows for sure! A balsam fir, even with a trim spiral shape, can hold more than six-thousand pounds of snow. Chipmunks stay awake, but we don't see them; they eat from their supply of food in their underground burrows.

Banner Year | No need to treat aquatic invasive species (AIS) Outstanding 2024 average water clarity of 19 feet

The latest CLCC Member Survey shows mission critical status afforded to controlling AIS and improving/maintaining lake quality. We agree. CLCC has a robust program and partnerships with outside vendors and governmental agencies to monitor, detect and manage AIS and water quality.


Our recent all-lake delineation survey for AIS showed no areas of eurasian water milfoil needing treatment, no starry stonewort and just a handful of curly leaf pondweed. We will continue with delineation surveys and keep a watchful eye. We expect limited, if any, need to treat AIS in 2025.

The spiny water flea sur-

vey did not occur this year due to staffing and weather conditions; it is still on tap for next year. As a reminder, no spiny water flea have been discovered on Cedar.

This year's lake report cards are ready (to the right). The report shows us still on the good side of three critical lake measurements:

- phosphorous,
- chlorophyl (algae amount),
- and water clarity at an exceptional 19 feet this year.



Zebra Mussel Safari Year 2 and results from resident survey

Zebra Mussel Safari | Year 2

Cedar, along with several other Minnesota Lakes, is participating in a University of Minnesota multi-year study to better understand the cyclical nature of zebra mussel infestations.


Six residents on Cedar hosted zebra mussel collection plates over the summer, and the research scientist from the U of Minnesota is analyzing the plates that were collected in September. We are looking at results to come in December. *Hats off to Holly Linn* for the project management and coordination on Cedar!

2024 Resident Zebra Mussel Survey


Since the fall of 2020, we have surveyed the lake residents regarding the presentation of zebra mussels on their lake equipment. Each year we get a good response and our thanks!

The bumper sticker for this year is:

- Over 97% saw zebra mussels on their equipment. In 2020, 87% detected zebra mussels.
- About 64% saw more zebra mussels compared to last year. In 2020, 51% indicated more than the year before
- About 38% described the zebra mussels as "moderate to heavy". In 2020, 13% described in that way.




How would you describe the zebra mussles on your equipment this fall?

What can I do to help improve water quality? By Dave Glass, Water Quality Committee Chair

Just like a home, work needs to be done on the lake to not only maintain your investment, but also improvements to keep or increase value. CLCC will continue to monitor watercraft at landings, work on removing carp and improving water quality upstream, search for aquatic invasive species and stay close to respected lake steward-ship thought leaders.

Current and voluntary best management practices will not be sufficient to maintain healthy lakes and shield impaired ones from additional pollution and effects from climate change. Even if all existing laws were followed to the letter, lakes would still be subject to unacceptable levels of nutrients and other contaminants. Targeted action will be required to cut off unregulated sources of pollution. We appreciate the donations to

the Water Quality Visionary Fund to help keep our lake clean and enjoyable. Besides the donations, other ways to help begins at home on your property. Start thinking about ways you can impact a positive difference to water quality.

On page 10 of the newsletter, there is an article on the Lake Steward program. I encourage you to read it and check out the referenced websites. The links are provided and it will not take much time.

We are not trying to take away beaches, or be yard police, far from it. We want to encourage you to be an owner who is aware of what you do and how it affects the lake. For instance, if you pump from the lake to water your

lawn, you may not need to fertilize at all due to the nutrients in the lake. Job eliminated.

If you see someone who has planted a natural shoreline during a boat cruise and have questions, stop and chat. People love to talk about their shoreline, I know I do. I can see the lake, I have no geese, I have beautiful flowers, butterflies, hummingbirds and other birds all year. Stay tuned for more information in the coming newsletters. In the meantime, if you have any questions please reach out.



Top ways to help your lake from your yard

- -Plant native and diverse vegetation with deep roots near your shoreline.
- -Create a raingarden, install gutters, and direct the flow to a raingarden for filtering.
- -Pick up pet waste and litter.
- -Reduce salt use.
- -Start home composting.
- -Install a rain barrel.
- -Plant home food gardens.
- -Do not blow lawn clippings or leaves into the lake
- -Maintain your septic system.
- -Avoid attempting to treat aquatic weeds on your own.
- -Avoid the use of fertilizers and pesticides.
- -Change from Kentucky Blue Grass to a fescue or other type of low maintenance lawn.
- -If you have rip rap, plant native vegetation in it.
- -Plant trees and shrubs in your upland lot.

Clearwater River Watershed District (CRWD) Update

Cedar enhanced carp control to continue improving water quality

Stars are carp barriers

The Clearwater River Watershed District (CRWD) is wrapping up a two year project that will benefit Cedar and the three lakes upstream that flow into Cedar (Swartout, Albion and Henshaw).

Last year, the populations of carp in each lake of the Cedar chain were determined with electrofishing, then radio trackers were installed on some fish. This spring the radio trackers were used to better understand where the carp are spawning and how they moved through the season. It also provided data about the effectiveness of our existing carp barriers.

What have we learned?

- Cedar had very sparse carp populations, likely because of our five current carp barriers (see the picture to the left—the yellow stars are carp barriers) and other water quality measures. Albion and Henshaw also have low carp populations, probably due to 2023 winter kill.
- Swartout's carp population is relatively high (estimated at nearly 3,900 carp). Its carp are relatively young (2-5 years) and averaged 26 inches in length. The number of carp in Swartout is reducing vegetative cover and diversity—both important for water quality.

What's Next?

- Analyze data from the radio trackers to understand how the carp are moving and spawning.
- Determine the most cost-effective approach to reduce the carp population in Swartout.
- Continue to survey carp biomass and abundance every 2-3 years.

If Cedar has few carp, why do we care about Swartout's problems with carp?

Swartout's water quality is important to residents because carp's rooting behavior releases phosphorus from the lake bottom into the water. Phosphorus causes algae growth. Swartout is upstream of Cedar. When heavy rains overwhelm Cedar's filtering systems, phosphorus-loaded water washes into Cedar from upstream lakes.

This enhanced carp control initiative is part of the original Cedar, Albion, Swartout, Henshaw (CASH) project begun by CRWD in 2007. Funding for this project comes from the CASH project's ongoing maintenance fund.

Aquatic invasive species project assessment increase for 2025



Cedar Lake also has an Aquatic Invasive Species (AIS) project with CRWD. This project pays for AIS treatment and control, and in recent years, is the primary source of funds tor the access monitoring on Cedar.

The amount collected for this project has changed over the years. At the start of project maintenance, the

annual amount collected from 2015 to 2019 was \$30,000. In 2020, Cedar Lake requested a decrease to \$22,000 due to limited AIS treatment needs and DNR and Wright County AIS grants.

The fund can be used for access monitoring costs, and the CLCC has committed, since 2018, to fund about 1,600 extra hours of access monitoring. This extra provides coverage for most weekends on Cedar.

Since 2021, access monitoring costs have risen by 20%. The cost of 1,600 hours of monitoring in 2024 is \$29,000.

After careful consideration, and with the urgent threat of the aquatic invasive species starry stonewort in nearby lakes, the CLCC BOD wishes to keep the access monitoring at the current level. To continue funding this current level, the Board requested the CRWD Board of Managers to increase the annual assessment for 2025. The amount of the increase for most Cedar Lake properties is expected to be about \$50/year. This summer, the increase was approved by the CRWD managers for 2025.

The Clearwater River Watershed District (CRWD) is a local government unit serving portions of Wright, Meeker, and Stearns counties in central Minnesota. The District promotes and protects water resources in order to maintain property values and quality of life. Cedar Lake is part of the District and directly benefits from two CRWD projects.

You may or may not have heard of The Lake Steward Program*. This started with the Gull Chain of Lakes (promoted by MN Lakes and Rivers) to among other things, help lake associations improve water quality.

The CLCC continues with a deep stewardship and dedication to water quality. According to a recent set of articles on Minnesota Public Radio, Kirsti Marohn spotlighted this issue in

her series *Trouble by the Water: Minnesota's Vanishing Lakeshores*. Here are a few highlights:

- Nearly half the state's natural shorelines are gone.
- Natural shorelines continue to vanish by 1 to 2 percent a year.
- Water running off mowed lawns and hard surfaces continues to pollute lakes.
- A single pound of phosphorus in a lake can produce 500 pounds of algae.
- Many of Minnesota's lakes are in trouble.

The Lake Steward Program, strictly a volunteer effort, has succeeded where other efforts have failed, by using a quiz to get lakeshore owners interested, and then making contact which is personal and centered on the individual lakeshore owner, their family, and their relationship to their land and the water.

The MN DNR has scored 836 lakes. Out of a possible score of 100, Cedar Lake scored 62. Our shoreline quality rating is "Low quality

habitat". We can be better.

The process starts by sending 10 questions to "score your shore" to the resident. If the property qualifies, a sign is awarded designating the owner as a Lake Steward. If the property does not qualify for a sign, volunteers can talk with owners to develop plans to qualify, if they so choose. On Gull Lake, 614 owners were contacted to take the quiz, hundreds have done so. In only three seasons, 63 Lake Stewards have been awarded, and there are currently more than 90 owners working to become Lake Stewards.

How can we make this happen on Cedar?

Step 1: We would like to assemble a team (1-3 people) that can help respond to surveys, visit properties and share education and grant resources with the shoreline owner.

Step 2: Distribute the Lake Steward quiz to our members.

Step 3: Contact quiz responders and ask to visit the property.

Step 4: Conduct site visits.

Step 5: Order signs.

Cedar Lake Water Levels | Another year of wide variations

The CLCC Water Quality Committee monitors the lake level and provides yearly data to the DNR. Numerous readings are taken throughout the summer. Hats off to Water Quality Committee member Karl Leslie for many years of collecting readings.

We had another year of extreme water levels. In June of 2024, after an unusually wet spring, the had a very high level (999.19 feet) and our mandatory 300 ft-no wake was put into effect. Here are a few more tidbits:

- The lowest known level of 997.21 feet on Cedar was in 1946.*
- This year's end of season lake level was more consistent with recent history, rather than the unusually low levels of 2021 and 2022.
- An annual fluctuation of the lake level is usually about 1 foot.

2025 Aquatic Invasive Species Treatment Notice

Cedar Lake Property Owners

The Cedar Lake Conservation Club (CLCC) plans to treat curly leaf pondweed and eurasian water milfoil, both aquatic invasive species/puisance species, in Cedar Lake in 2025 if warranted. Additionally, if starry stonewort, an aquatic invasive species, is discovered, treatment will be

The Minnesota Department of Natural Resources is planning to provide to the CLCC a waiver of the requirements that the Association obtain signatures of approval by owners of lakeshore property. Instead, the CLCC will notify property owners of the treatment through the:

CLCC newsletter which is mailed to all residents of Cedar Lake.

- CLCC website www.cedarlakecc.org
- Annandale Advocate and Maple Lake Messenger (local weekly newspapers).

- The proposed timeline for treatment is May October.
- The target species for the treatment is curly leaf pondweed (CLP), eurasian water milfoil (EWM), and starry stonewort (SSW) if
- The products being used are aquatic herbicides and/or harvesting methods appropriate to control CLP and EWM, and SSW if discovered. Chemicals that are anticipated to be used are: CLP-diquat, EWM-ProcellaCOR, SSW (if discovered)-copper sulfate.

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
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


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A Step Back In Time | Fall 1977 Tidbits from CLCC Newsletters

Cedar Lake Favorite Recipes Kathy Fischer—CLCC Director

This is a fall favorite at our home and very easy to do! Paleo/Low carb with an Instant Pot and slow cooker option.

Chicken Tortilla-Less Soup

Ingredients

2 large boneless skinless chicken breasts, salted 2 10-ounce cans diced tomatoes with green chiles

- 1 14.5-ounce can low-sodium chicken broth
- 1 cup chopped onion
- 2 teaspoons garlic powder
- 1 teaspoon onion powder
- 1-3 teaspoons chipotle pepper powder
- 1 teaspoon cumin
- 2 teaspoons chili powder
- 1 teaspoon dried oregano
- 1 teaspoon smoked paprika
- 2 medium zucchini
- 1 14-ounce can unsweetened, full-fat coconut milk

Poring by Chard Malik

Directions

- 1. Sprinkle salt on both sides of the chicken breasts and place in Instant Pot insert.
- Add all the rest of the ingredients, except the coconut milk, to the Instant Pot and gently stir.
- 3. Secure lid on Instant Pot with valve in Sealing position. Set to Manual High Pressure for 18 minutes. Instant Pot will pressurize, then cook time will begin.

3. When cook time ends, Natural Release of

pressure for 10 minutes. After 10 minutes, immediately and carefully Quick Release remaining pressure and remove lid.

- . Transfer chicken breasts to cutting board and set aside.
- 5. Set Instant Pot to Sauté mode. Add coconut milk and stir.
- Dice chicken breasts to bite sized pieces, or shred. Return chicken to Instant Pot and stir.

Serve with fresh avocado slices, thinly sliced red onion, chopped fresh cilantro, and lime slices.

To Make in Slow Cooker

- 1. Add all ingredients except coconut milk to slow cooker and stir.
- 2. Set slow cooker to LOW heat for 6-8 hours or HIGH heat for 4 hours.
- 3. After 6 hours on LOW or 3 hours on HIGH, check chicken doneness with internal meat thermometer. When chicken reaches 160 Fahrenheit, remove chicken and set aside. Dice or shred chicken.
- 4. When ready to serve, add coconut milk and shredded chicken.
- 5. Serve hot with garnishes listed above.
