Water safety continues to be an idea the Board wishes to promote. We published, and you vishould have received, a "Stay Safe and Have Fun" map. This map was designed to help identify loon platforms, choke points, the sand bar, shallow areas and the Kids Don't Float kiosk at Schroeder Park. These maps were given to Schroeder Campground to distribute so users could be familiar with the lake. It is also available on the CLCC website

The U of M Wake Boat Study and Boater Safety Bill did not result in new regulations from the MN legislature this year. As a reminder, please familiarize yourself with boating regulations, available from the DNR online. This is especially true for those 12-17 years old as there are restrictions. Skiers and personal water craft (jet ski) operators have restricted hours. So that all are aware, no one 13 and under may operate a personal water craft, even with an adult on board. Would you put your child in front of you and steer a motorcycle? Please be safe and

responsible. Please see more "Stay Safe and Have Fun" information on page 10.

We continue to see good reporting numbers for our lake's health. A big thank you to Kathy Jonsrud for chairing the Water Quality Committee and Chuck Vinar for securing grant money for us all. The Water Quality Committee has been doing an excellent job ensuring our stewardship has manifested a positive trend for improvement in water quality.

This time of year makes me feel closer to the precious resource that Cedar Lake is. As lakeshore owners, we are all stewards of the lake.

- Take time to see what you, as an individual, can do to help with lake quality. It does not have to be redoing your shore with natural landscaping, although that is a great step. An easy way to reduce nutrient run off into the lake is to not mow within 15 feet of your shoreline.
- Are we using the right fertilizer? Do we need fertilizer? Perhaps get your soil tested.
- Is your septic system running as it should?
- If you have a personal water craft or a wake boat, are you operating it too close to shore?
- Are you shooting grass clippings into the lake?

Many people doing small things can make a huge difference without costing any money.

Loons on Cedar

Again this year, all 4 loon platforms had a nesting pair. At the time of this writing, the south pair are tending to two chicks and the north east pair have a thriving chick.

Sadly, this spring, the sandbar loon platform got blown into the weeds during a significant wind storm. The nest platform was returned to open water and they renested, but this time they laid their eggs outside the nesting bowl, and later abandoned that clutch. For next year, we will look into a better anchoring system and possibly move the platform a bit.

The northwest pair successfully hatched a chick and the first couple of days were doing fine. Then an eagle was hanging out in the area for at least two days. We heard the northwest loons being very vocal and send-

ing out their "danger" call.

A few days later, we did not see the chick with pair.

Nature be cruel. Sometimes we just have to accept we are not in control. However, over all the years of maintaining the loon platforms on Cedar, we should feel good about our success and will continue the program and make adjustments as necessary.

As this year's three chicks grow, please give them space—at least 200 feet. As the chicks develop their diving skills, keep a sharp eye out as sometimes they pop up unexpectedly.

Native Buttercup | All You Can Eat Buffet



We have a large crop of the native buttercup (crow foot) aquatic vegetation on Cedar this year. It has small white (sometimes yellow) flowers, and will mat at the surface. See more information on page 4.

Though a native plant, we don't see it every year on Cedar, and it can certainly be troublesome for boaters and swimmers.

However, buttercup is a choice food for waterfowl, and provides valuable habitat for fish and aquatic insects. A family of wood ducks and malards were recently seen on the north side of Cedar feeding on the buttercup—just like it was an all you can eat buffet!

CLCC Walleye Stocking This Year

This year the CLCC will be stocking walleye fingerlings in Cedar Lake. The stocking will take place in late fall. Currently we have about \$6,700 in the stocking fund. Our goal is \$8,000.

Native Buttercup-Good Weed

Wow, we have a bumper crop of water buttercup (native good weed) on Cedar this year. We don't have this vegetation in large quantities every year. Though it is native vegetation, with strong ecological values, in a banner year like this year it is not much fun for recreation and personal water craft.

Ecological Importance

Water buttercup is a choice food source of dabbling ducks. Both the fruit and foliage are consumed by a variety of waterfowl. Water buttercup is sometimes eaten by non-water birds such as grouse. Also, water buttercup provides valuable habitat for aquatic insects and protective habitat for fish.



Problems

In quiet water, like the shallow bays on Cedar, water buttercup

can form dense mats and hinder access and restrict recreational activities. Calm, still days without much wave action can intensify its dense nature.

If you are in a part of the lake where buttercup is problematic for maintaining navigational channels and swimming areas, please consult the MN DNR Aquatic Plant Management program for guidance regarding permits for removal https://tinyurl.com/bdebprdj.

Please remember this plant is very beneficial and should not be treated where it is **not** a nuisance.

U of M Wake Boat Study Phase II to Study Prop Wash

In the fall of 2020, U of Minnesota researchers installed five sensors at differing distances and depths from the shoreline of a Minnesota recreational lake to measure the height, energy, and power of waves generated by non-wakesurf and wakesurf boats.

The study found that wakesurf boats produced the largest waves under all conditions evaluated, with the overall largest waves



generated during slow plowing speeds associated with the sport of wakesurfing. The study also showed that when wakesurf boats operate under their typical wakesurfing conditions, they require greater distances to reduce their wave characteristics to levels equivalent to non-wakesurf boats. This data can be used to inform boat operational distances necessary to reduce wave height, energy, and power to levels deemed acceptable.

Phase II

Building on Phase I's findings, researchers will now focus on characterizing propeller wash, which is a general term for the turbulent jet produced by the boat motor and propel-

ler. The propeller wash produced by large recreational boats is powerful, and has the poten-



tial to cause mixing of the water column and suspension of inorganic sediment (silts and sands) and organic detritus. Available research on this topic is extremely limited however. Researchers will explore this topic through a field-based research study that will take place on Minnesota waters. The study will aim to address the following questions:

- How deep does propeller wash penetrate into the water column for different boat sizes and usage scenarios?
- At what depth does propeller wash begin to interact with the lake bottom, and what happens when it does?

Through robust characterization of wake waves and propeller wash, data driven decisions can be made that protect our prized lakes and rivers.

2022 Aquatic Invasive Species (AIS) Control on Cedar | Limited Treatment Expected \$8,500 of Grants Awarded for AIS Treatment

Though we are lucky to be in a "steady state" with curly leaf pondweed (CLP) and eurasian water milfoil (EWM) control, new strategies and methods are evolving which we want to leverage. Below is a summary of our 2022 strategy.



Paying for AIS control | Clearwater River Watershed (CRWD) Projects on Cedar

The Clearwater River Watershed District is a local unit of government focused on promoting and protecting waters. Cedar has two projects with CRWD which are leveraged to pay for AIS control.

Delineation (survey) of Lake Vegetation is the Cornerstone to AIS Treatment Strategy

Each year we do professional, detailed delineation to identify the areas of CLP and EWM. The vendor we use for these delineations, Freshwater Science, is a recognized thought leader in vegetation identification. Each of these delineations costs \$950.

Curly Leaf Pondweed (CLP) Treatment | Completed May 23

CLP treatment was completed on May 23 (area in yellow on the map to the left). The weather was perfect that day for treatment and the results were excellent.

Eurasian Water Milfoil (EWM) Treatment | *IF NEEDED* Summer to Early Fall

We continue to be in an excellent position with regards to EWM control. Last year, for the second year in a row, there were no areas large enough to require treatment. We still have a very small presence of

EWM on Cedar. and we are carefully watching areas to understand if we need to treat. Last year, a potential area of hybrid EWM (cross between the invasive and native northern water milfoil) was found on the north side. Our vendor will be conducting sampling and DNA testing to understand the best treatment

approach for that area (in red on the map to the left).

If we have EWM to treat in 2022, we estimate it would be less than 10 acres and chemical treatment costs (using the new chemical ProcelleCOR that has produced excellent results for us) of \$9,168.

Starry Stonewort | None identified on Cedar, But All Hands on Deck to Watch

Starry stonewort is one of the newer invaders with a particularly fearsome potential for matting and interfering with lake recreation and ecology. All of our vendors are on the watch for starry stonewort, and we have scheduled a diver assisted search late in the season. The diver assisted search costs \$800.

AIS Treatment Grants | Cedar Receiving up to \$8,500

- DNR: The process for the DNR AIS treatment grants once again changed this year. The changes were followed closely, and we were awarded \$6,000 for use over 2 years.
- Wright Soil and Water: Once again, we were successful with this grant application. We have been awarded \$500 for CLP and \$2,000 for EWM.

Watercraft Cleaning Stations (CD3) on Cedar Plans for a Second Unit at Cty Rd 6 Access


CD 3 at Schroeder Park

CLCC and Wright County Parks sponsored the first CD3 watercraft cleaning station in Wright County in 2020.

The Schroeder Park station (north side of the lake) is **free to use** and continues to be very popular with boaters to help reduce the spread of aquatic invasive species

Last year, the CD3 unit at Schroeder was busy, with over 330 users and the tools used 850+ times.

CLCC is working with the DNR and Wright Soil and Water Conservation District and hopes to sponsor another station at the CTY Rd 6 landing in 2022.





CLCC Purchases \$27,500 of Extra Access Monitoring 30% More Inspections So Far This Year

CLCC has made another major commitment this year to reduce the spread of aquatic invasive species (AIS). As in past years, Wright Soil and Water Conservation District has a program for lakes to purchase additional access monitoring to augment the access monitoring provided by Wright County.

The CLCC Board of Directors has purchased \$27,500 of access monitoring in 2022. This will provided approximately 4 shifts of weekend monitoring (2 shifts each at CTY RD 6 and Schroeder accesses) and 4 shifts of weekday monitoring each week during the boating

season.

Wright County, using historical access monitoring data and predictive modeling from the U of Minnesota, modified their approach this year. The busier lakes with a higher risk of AlS infestation—like Cedar Lake—are receiving a larger share of the Wright County sponsored access monitoring.

As of the end of June 2022, over 660 inspections have been completed on Cedar. Compared to last year, 475 inspections were completed by the end of June—30% more inspections so far in 2022.

When on Cedar, Stay Safe and Have Fun

The CLCC Board of Directors regularly discusses safety concerns on Cedar. Cedar is a highly recreated lake, and a shared value in our community is a safe and fun experience for all using the lake.

Summer on Cedar is a magical time. Here are three items the CLCC Board would like all to remember and share with visiting family and friends:

- There are age restrictions on the operation of some watercraft. Please see the article below for more information.
- Probably the issue we hear the most complaints about is the operation of personal water craft (jet skis). Take a moment to review the restrictions (see article to the right).
- Finally, take advantage of the Kids Don't Float free life jacket loaner station at Schroeder Park (north side of lake). CLCC has partnered with Wright County Parks for this popular service.

Watercraft Operation Age Restrictions and Education

Q: Do you need Minnesota Boating Education?

A: You need education if you are 12-17 years old, unsupervised, and will be operating a boat over 25hp. And yes, if you are 14 to 17 years old, are unsupervised, and will be operating a personal water craft (jet ski).

- —Anyone 13 and under may not legally operate a personal watercraft (jet ski).
- —Anyone 18 years of age or older may operate a motorized vessel or personal watercraft (jet ski) without any restrictions.

Personal Water Craft (Jet Ski) Operation Laws

Personal watercraft (PWC) are really fun. Over the years, they have gotten sleeker and faster. Please remember these top line PWC Minnesota DNR laws and remind your visitors who may not know:

- No one 13 and under may operate a PWC. Ages 14-17 must complete the Minnesota Boater Education (see article to the left and below).
- Anyone operating or riding a PWC must have a life jacket on.
- PWCs must travel at slow no-wake speed (5mph or less) within 150 feet of shore (unless launching or landing skiers directly to or from open water), docks, swim rafts, or any anchored boat.
- PWC operation is allowed only from 9:30am to 1 hour before
- If the machine is equipped by the manufacturer with a lanyardtype engine cutoff switch, it must be attached to the person, life jacket or clothing of the operator when underway.
- You may not chase or harass wildlife.

Starry stonewort is a particularly troublesome and aggressive aquatic invasive species. It can quickly form very dense mats, choking out native vegetation, impacting aquatic habitat, and severely limiting recreation. There are three lakes close to Cedar with the infestation: Lake Sylvia, Pleasant, and Lake Koronis. Pleasant and Lake Sylvia caught their infestations early and have been able to control the growth.

What can we do?

- If you must take your watercraft to a lake with starry stonewort, it is imperative to do a decontamination before going to another lake. THOROUGHLY inspect bunk trailers as it can be spread by fragments.
- Learn how to identify starry stonewort. Here's a great video: https://youtu.be/te9iF5OTdtg.
- Join others on August 20th to search for starry stonewort in Wright County: <u>z.umn.edu/</u> StarryTrekRegistration.
- Watch the lake carefully for changes in vegetation. Report any suspicious vegetation to Kathy Jonsrud (kjonsrud@yahoo.com).

Cedar Lake Favorite Recipes By Leslie Kreutter

Gardens will soon be overflowing with zucchini and here's a perfect recipe to enjoy the bounty. You might want to make a double batch; cookies disappear at the lake!



Zucchini Cookies

1/2 cup white sugar

1/2 cup brown sugar
1/2 cup softened butter
1/2 tsp baking soda
1 large egg, beaten
with fork
1 tsp vanilla
3/4 cup peeled and
shredded zucchini
1/2 cup chopped walnuts

6 oz chocolate chips 2 cups flour

- 1. Beat sugars and butter until fluffy.
- 2. Mix in baking soda. Mix in eggs and vanilla. Add zucchini and stir. Add chips and mix well.
- Add flour in 1 cup increments. Dough should be stiff.
 May be chilled first for easier handling.
 Drop by teaspoonful on to sprayed cookie sheet.
 Bake at 350 degrees for 10 to 12 minutes.
- 4. Cool on sheet for 2 minutes and then on cooling rack.
